"A childs personality is for the most part the result of home influence" said the president of the Texas Panhandle Mental Health Assoc. in his lecture last week in the fellowship hall of the Methodist Church. He added, "14% of school children have some type of emotional problem and it takes parental understanding, assurance and security to bring about stability. Some children must have specialized help and there are far too few places to offer such help," he continued. Amarillo has a Center for the mentally retarded and emotionally disturbed children which is

courtesy of Cantrells Fuel and Supply of Shamrock. A annual report of the Wheeler county Soil conservation district will be given by Bill Brooks of Soil Conservation Service. He will be assisted by the board members of the Wheeler county soil Conservation district. The Wheeler county Agent will also present a program on forage

Jack son states a qualified voter is a zone 2 landowner who is over 21 years of age or older Wives of eliaible landowners can vote and should do so since they have an interest in their soil c aservation district.

The agent points out that eoil conservation districts are political subdivisions of the state of Texas and by

sponsibility of carrying out a soil and water conservation program in their district. Through them such items as technical service, equipment leadership in small waterservices are provided to cooperating landowners.

The area covered by zone 2 of the Wheeler county soil conservation district extends from the Gray county line to the Oklahoma state line. The area of the zone includes the southern portion of Wheeler county and the north ern boundry follows an irregular line from Gray county line to the Oklahoma line. The line extends from one mile north of US66 to the Magic City road then North

to the North Fork of Red

followed east along Red River to the South section 21 owned by Mrs. W J Stephens. The line then extends due east across US. 83. 2 miles north of Twitty to the shed projects and many other southwest corner of section 31 which is the J R Hefley farm and then north to farm road 1906. The boundry then extends east on farm road to Kelton then due east of Kelton to the Oklahoma state



#### Legislation On Hunting

The most recent piece of Texas legislation that applies to outdoor recreation is House Bill 73. It became effective on September 1,1965. says County

agent, Charles D. Jackson. The Act limits the liability of any owner, leasee or occupant of real property who gives permission to another person t center his

"premises" for purposes of hunting, fishing and or camping. The word "premises" in this case means lands, water, water courses and private ways including all buildings, structures, machinery and equipment.

House Bill 73, says Jackson is designed to encourage land uses for hunting fishing and/or camping that are non-commercial. It does not limit or change in any way the liability that applies to c. mmercial recreation enterprises that operate for a profit.

The provisions of the Act specifically state that if a landowner allows other persons to enter his premises for hunting, fishing and or camping he does not 1. extend any assurance that the premises are safe for such purposes, or 2. owe a greater degree of care to persons granted permission than he owes to a trespasser, or 3. assume any responsibility for injury to persons or property caused by an act of persons granted permission.

Duty to Get Well

Mrs. R, injured while crossing he street, had no trouble establishing a claim against the negligent motorist. However, he was willing to pay only for her original injurynot for the "permanent disability" she said she had.

In a court hearing, he explained that her disability could probably be cleared up if she would just submit to corrective surgery. But to Mrs. R, this was indeed adding insult to injury.

"Why should I risk my life in a major operation," she demanded, just so he can pay me less damages? Not only is such an operation dangerous, but often it doesn't even do any good."

That made sense to the judge, who ordered the motorist to pay for her disability in addition to paying

Yet, the motorist did have a point worth weighing. Is it the wrongdoer's fault if you, as the victim, don't make a reasonable effort to get well? In all fairness, the law has to draw a dividing line between harm truly caused by the wrongdoer and harm truly caused by your own

neglect. For example: A woman's foot was injured in a railroad accident, and her doctor ordered her to use crutches during the healing process. Nevertheless. because she found the crutches awkward, she often hobbled around without them. As a result, a court ruled later that she could not collect damages for being left with a

permanent limp. In another case, a man's failure to consult a doctor for almost three months-despite a serious back injury-barred him from collecting damages for the complications that

developed. Even submitting to surgery might be included in your duty to take care of yourself. If the operation is both simple and safe, a court may find you at fault for refusing to

After all, the law is not forcing you to get well. It merely says that, if you foolishly fail to try, you should not expect somebody else to pay for the consequences.
