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## MUSTANGS SWAMP LONGHORNS 51-0 Groom Defeats Wheeler Colts

The Wheeler Jr. high Colts went down to their second defeat of the season last Thursday as they took the road to Groom and came home on the short end of a 36-12 score.

Groom took the opening kickoff and moved 63 yards in eleven plays for their first score and used up all of the first quarter with the drive.

The touchdown was made on the last play of the initial quarter and when Groom made the two pointer, Wheeler was behind 8-0.

The Colts took the ensuing kickoff and came right back with a 59 yard drive to score. Buddy Woods made the touchdown off his left tackle on a reverse after making 36 big yards in the drive off the same play.

The future Tigers from Groom made quick work of the Colt defense after taking the ball once more and used six plays to go ahead 16-6 with 25 seconds to play in the half.

Groom scored the first time they had the ball in the second half with the Touchdown coming on a 28 yard pass play and the score mounted to 24-6 after the two pointer was run.

Three touchdowns were made in the final period with Groom's big fullback rambling 19 yards to paydirt to set off the scoring in the quarter. The Colts came right back and scored in two plays after the kickoff with a pass from Simmons to Keith Woods getting 41 yards and then Buddy Woods went around his left end for the final 24 yards.

Groom got their final six points with a little over a minute to play and ended the game with their comfortable 24 point margin. The Colts have yet to get in the win column with two losses and one tie on the record. The Colts will close out their season against the Lefors Jr. high this Thursday night at 7 p.m. on Nicholson Field in the only game they have had at home this season.

For the second week in a row, the Wheeler Mustangs put an undefeated team in the loss column as they completely routed the Darrouzette Longhorns 51-0.

The Longhorns put a scare into the Mustangs for two plays after the opening kickoff as they moved to the Wheeler 28 yard line on a 29 yard pass and run play on the first play from scrimmage and followed with a 14 yard dash to put the Mustangs in the hole. From that point the Mustangs regrouped and forced the Longhorns to punt and got the ball on the Wheeler 22 yard line.

Vanpool and Smith got short chunks out of the Longhorn defense to put the ball on the 47. Mike Good threw only one pass in the game but came up with the bomb as Hunter gathered it in to complete a 53 yard scoring play. Vanpool ran the two points around his right end and the Mustangs were on their merry way to their sixth win in a row this season.

Two plays deep into the second quarter the Mustangs struck again with Fred Goad getting his first TD of the year with a four yard punch over left guard. Vanpool again got the two points.

The Longhorns fumbled on their three but Wheeler presented the pigskin right back with a fumble and this was the only threat the Mustangs made that they didn't cash in on.

Fred Goad got his second TD of the night with a 35 yard punt midway of the second quarter and with Tom Smith adding the two points the visiting Mustangs had 24 points.

Wheeler used a recovered fumble on the Darrouzette

30 to move in for their fourth TD of the game and Tom Smith got all of the yardage with just two runs. He went over from the two and the Mustangs took a 30-0 lead into the dressing room at halftime as the attempted kick for the extra point was no good.

Fans had hardly gotten settled for the second half, when Vanpool took the kickoff on his twenty and headed for an 80 yard return with his only company being an official as he crossed the goal. Dorman's aim was good on the extra point try and the margin rose to 37-0.

Coach Hill poured his reserves into the fray at this point and they completed the game except for one short period when the Longhorns threatened following a 56 yard pass completion to the Mustang eight yard line.

Wheeler put down this threat with a fumble recovery at the three. One play was needed from that point and Wheeler had six more points. Vanpool broke loose and 97 yards later was over the double stripe with his second TD of the night. Dorman kicked the extra point.

The Mustangs got the chance for their last tally late in the final period when Rives intercepted a Longhorn pass on the midfield stripe and returned it to the Darrouzette 32. One pass completion and four running plays put the ball on the Longhorn four and Bobby Ware got the distance with a quarterback sneak for the final touchdown of the game. Once more Dorman split the uprights and the score read 51-0 in favor of the Mustangs.

### ATTEMPTED ROBBERY RESULTS IN SHOOTING; WRECK FOLLOWED

An attempted robbery in which a storekeeper was shot and a car-truck collision injuring three persons occurred within 30 minutes Wednesday night at the Gage-

by Store located 13 miles north of Wheeler on the Wheeler-Hemphill county line on highway 83.

G.L. (Ting) Aderholt, 45 was shot in his right shoulder

in an armed robbery attempt about 6:15 p.m. Mr. Aderholt was admitted to Parkview hospital in Wheeler where he was released Thursday.

Injured in the car-truck collision about 6:45 p.m., were Nick Nemsger, 18, Marvin Byron, 16 both of Spearman and Steve Helton of Briscoe. All three youths were admitted to Parkview hospital with Byron and Helton being transferred to Northwest Texas hospital in Amarillo later in the evening. Nemsger was released from the hospital and Byron and Helton are in satisfactory condition in Amarillo.

At 9:00 p.m. highway patrolmen arrested a 17 year old Masan, Mich., youth about 8 miles west of Conway in Carson county. At the time of arrest David Lee Swab had a 22 caliber pistol in his possession.

Swab was brought back to Wheeler county jail where he was arraigned Thursday afternoon before Justice of the Peace Dick Guynes in Wheeler on a charge of robbery by fire arms.

Swab pulled up to the pumps at the Gageby store and Aderholt serviced his car. While the car was being serviced, the youth entered the store and stayed for a few minutes. He then got back in the car. When Aderholt walked up to the car to collect, Swab opened fire.

The first shot missed and Aderholt turned to run. The second shot struck him in back of the shoulder.

P.A. and Bob Martin pulled up from the west, north of the store at the time of the robbery attempt and scared the youth away. County Sheriff Bus Dorman stated that Swab apparently went 2 miles north and turned

west onto a farm-market road. When he came to the Miami-Mobeetie road he turned south and went to Mobeetie. Turning west on 152, the stocky built fugitive went through McLean way of Laketon and was arrested at Conway for speeding.

Ting Aderholt identified Swaub at 2:00 a.m. in Parkview hospital. Swaub is being held on \$10,000 bond and awaiting the next session of the Grand Jury presently scheduled for the fourth Monday in November.

Following the robbery, Nemsger, Byron and Helton pulled into the store. When they pulled back onto the roadway their vehicle was struck by a truck traveling south. Two of the youths were thrown from the vehicle with one being pinned in the auto. The ruck driver escaped injury in the accident. The wreck was witnessed by Dan Dorman who was at the store with his father, Sheriff Bus Dorman. Wright-Denson Ambulance Service of Wheeler was called and the three were taken to the hospital for treatment.

Nemsger received separated ribs and a concussion. Helton's pelvis was broken in three places and his back peeled. Byron's pelvis was broken in four places and he received a broken arm. They are to be transferred from Amarillo Saturday.

However at press time it was not known whether they were to come home or being returned to Parkview.

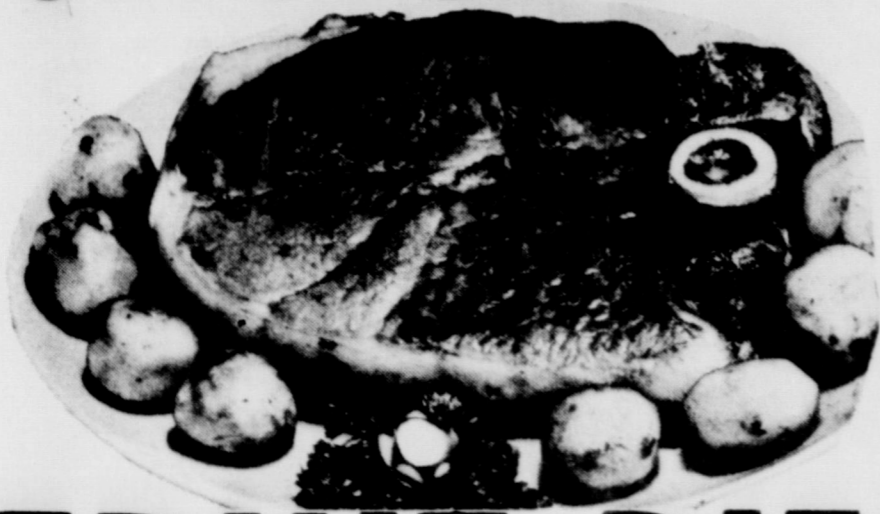

## Co. Home Dem. Agent Reports

It's Apple Time again! Jonathan, Red and Golden Delicious are the leading varieties on the market.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture the apple crop is expected to run larger than average.

This fruit is one of the favorites of all ages. Children are especially fond of apples as a nutritious dessert or after-school snack.

To keep apples at their best eating-apples should be kept refrigerated and away from strong foods. For best results use a covered container or a plastic bag to prevent the apples from absorbing or imparting flavors to other foods. Smaller apples keep better and longer than the larger ones.

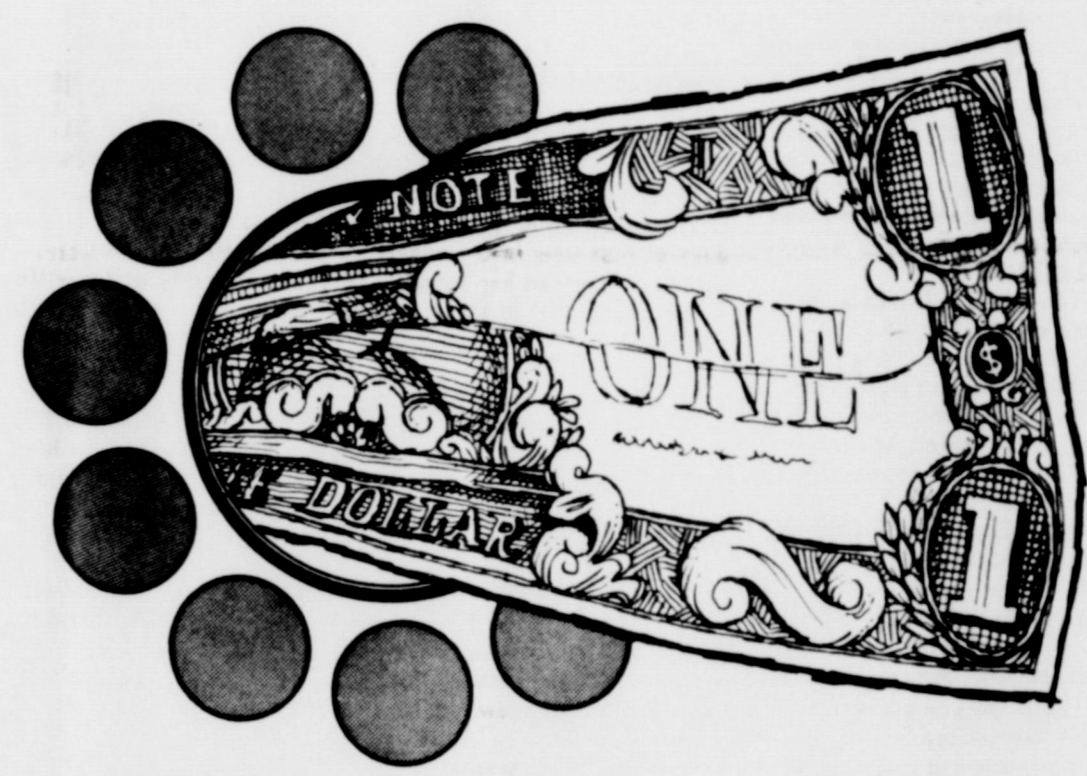
For fullest flavor, look for apples with good color. Very hard apples generally each flavor and the over-ripe ones are often soft and mealy.

If you are planning to cook apples, cook over low temperatures. Let the subtle apple flavor speak for itself; don't overshadow it with too much seasoning.

The top crust on a double crust apple pie acts as a flavor-sealer. Since many baked apple goodies do not have a top crust to seal in the flavor try using a sheet of cooking foil. Press the edges of the foil over a casserole or open dish before placing it in the oven and then remove foil about 10 minutes before baking time is over to allow the surface to brown slightly.

For Halloween, you may wish to serve "Apple-Wiches", to prepare: Core crisp apples, but do not peel. Cut into 1/4 inch thick crosswise slices. Spread half of the slices with a filling and then top each with another apple slice, brush with lemon juice and serve.

For the fillings use: chunk-style peanut butter, liverwurst sparked with a dash of hot pepper sauce, equal parts of sour cream and divided ham blended together; cream cheese; thin rings of garlic cheese or some other flavored cheddar cheese.

### Books for the Blind

In 1931, Herbert Hoover occupied the White House and Stanley Kunitz (not yet a Pulitzer Prize-winning poet) was the young and imaginative editor of the Wilson Bulletin for Librarians...

On February 28, 1931, President Hoover signed the Pratt-Smoot Act which authorized the expenditure of \$100,000 annually by the Federal government to coordinate and expand library service for the blind on a national and regional basis. Concentrated at first on the provision of Braille books for blind readers, the program today also includes Talking Books, (books and magazines recorded on unbreakable microgroove records), the machines on which to play them, magnetic tapes and a variety of other services, supported by annual appropriation in excess of \$2,400,000.

Today there are fifty-four agencies lending Talking Book machines to blind readers and thirty-two regional libraries supplying Talking books and other materials. Complete lists of these, together with all other essential information will be found in a small but admirable clear and explicit booklet, "Books for the Blind" revised edition, 1965 prepared by the division for the blind of the Library of Congress, Washington D.C. 20540, and available without charge from that source upon request.

In a recent development the ink print editions of both Talking Book Topics and Braille Book Review have been given new and enlarged formats with larger type for the benefit of partially sighted users. At the same time the editorial content of both the ink-print and Braille editions have been expanded to include articles of special interest to blind readers and book reviews reprinted from leading reviewing journals.

For practical and educational reason the Braille and Talking Book programs are complementary. Each performing a useful and needful function. But because it would obviously uneconomical to duplicate any large number of titles, the selection staff is faced constantly with deciding which medium to use. Two factors are helpful in this situation; the circumstance that certain types of books have been shown by experience to be better suited to one medium or the other and the fact that an increasing number of Braille readers today are also Talking Book users.

Although there is no census figure for the blind in the United States, reliable estimated place the total in the neighborhood of 400,000. Of this number about 80,000 or 20% are regular borrowers of Talking Books or Braille or both a respectable batting average in any library league.

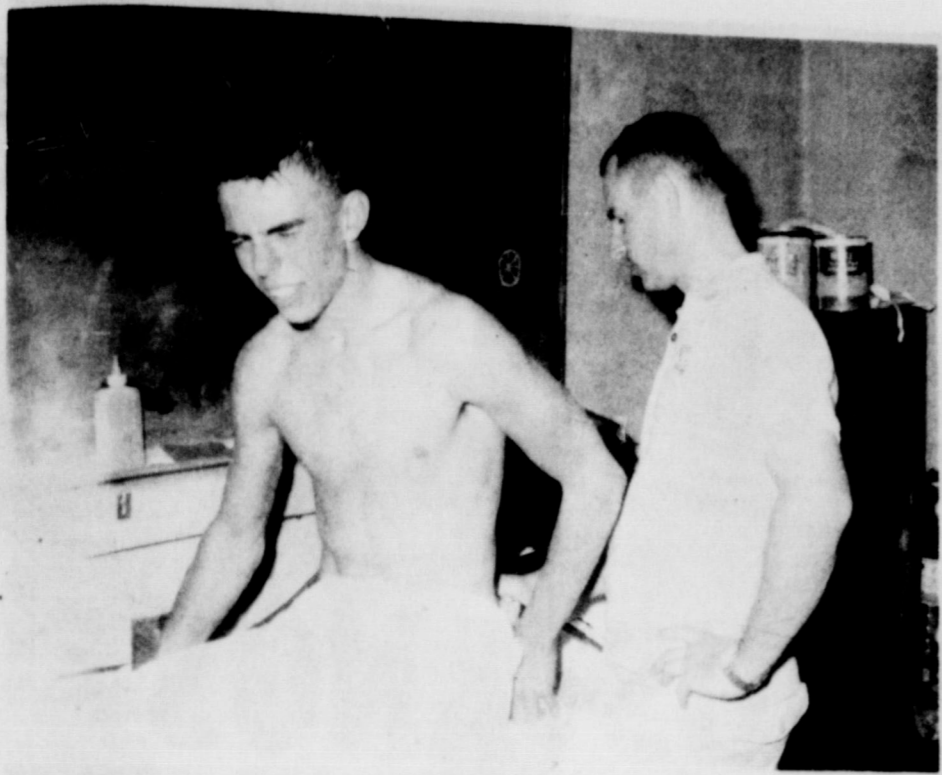

**Facts From Local Farmers Home Ad.**

Over 39,766 families of farmers, ranchers and rural residents in Texas benefited from Farmers Home Administration loan services during 1965. This is an all time high according to L J Cappleman, State Director for the agency.

Loans made or insured by the Farmers Home Administration in Texas during the fiscal year ended June 20 totaled a record \$88,289,230

State Director Cappleman said that the FHA preserved its longstanding record for keeping its various lending programs in a sound position during fiscal 1965. Repayments of principal and interest by borrowers totaled the largest volume collected in the agencies 30 year history.

"This good credit record signifies the initiative and integrity displayed by the people of rural Texas in their vast self-help effort which these loans represent," Cappleman stated.

Included in the number of Texas Rural people benefitting from these programs are the members of 28,245 families forming rural groups that use F H A credit. Most of these groups borrowed funds to develop rural community water systems.

State Director Cappleman emphasized that loans to strengthen family farms and build rural homes continued as the agency's largest programs in fiscal 1965.

The following types of loans are available to the rural people of this area: Farm Ownership Loans, Operating Loans, Rural Housing Loans on farms and in rural areas not exceeding 5,500 acres, Soil and Water loans for development of land, Economic Opportunity loans to low income groups for agricultural enterprises and non-agricultural enterprises; Water Association loans to develop water system in rural areas;

Senior Citizen Housing to individuals over 62 years of age; Senior Citizen Rental housing to individual or groups and non-profit organizations; Loans to cooperatives; Recreation Loans.

Twenty-two members of the livestock and range sub-committee of the Wheeler county program building committee met at Nora's Cafe at 7:00 p.m. on October 14 to make plans for the 1966 Wheeler county livestock program. Featured speaker for the program was Allen Robinson of Merrill, Lynch, Fenner and Smith. He presented a very interesting program on the livestock futures market. His office is located in the First National Bank Building of Amarillo and he is always willing to present programs of this type to interested cattlemen.

The evening meal, a T-bone steak dinner, was sponsored by H&H Milling Co of Wheeler, Canadian Production Credit Association of Wheeler and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau.

Clarence Zyback of Briscoe was re-elected Chairman of the livestock and range sub-committee for the coming year. Tom Puryear of Kelton will continue to be responsible for the screwworm control committee and Dusan Pak-an of Pakan will continue to head up the brucellosis committee. These three men have contributed much to the Wheeler county livestock program. The accomplishments completed in 1965 include \$1300 collected for the state wide screwworm control program. This is a larger contribution than any surrounding county made. The county has also been declared a Modified Certified Brucellosis free county as a result of the testing program that was conducted.

This program will be one of the better accomplishments made by the Wheeler county cattlemen. Livestock and forage cattle demonstrations, beef cattle pregnancy testing schools, performance testing work, parasite control and many other types of educational activity has been carried out by this committee during the year.

Plans for the coming year include a broad educational program designed to meet the needs of livestock producers in the county. Frank Walker of Wheeler was elected to head up a "Hat Show" for 1966. Time and place will be decided at a later date. A back tag program which involves a market testing program for maintaining our modified certified brucellosis accreditation was asked for by the committee. The committee asked for more information about drylot feeding of beef cattle for the coming year. A bull fertility testing demonstration and another pregnancy school was planned for the coming year. Grub and internal parasite as well as external parasite control demonstrations were also planned. Assistance with performance testing programs will be continued. Livestock feeding information will continue to be made available for all producers interested in feeding. The committee stressed the need for commercial steer

feeding programs for 4-H members and breeding projects instead of a wet lot program of steer feeding. During the meeting I wondered what a XIT Cowboy would have thought if he could have overheard our plans in educational work for cow men for next year. Drastic changes have been made in management of livestock in recent years and I believe they are here to stay. I bet the old XIT cowboy would have lost his teeth when one committee member mentioned the fact that he had tasted artificial beef.

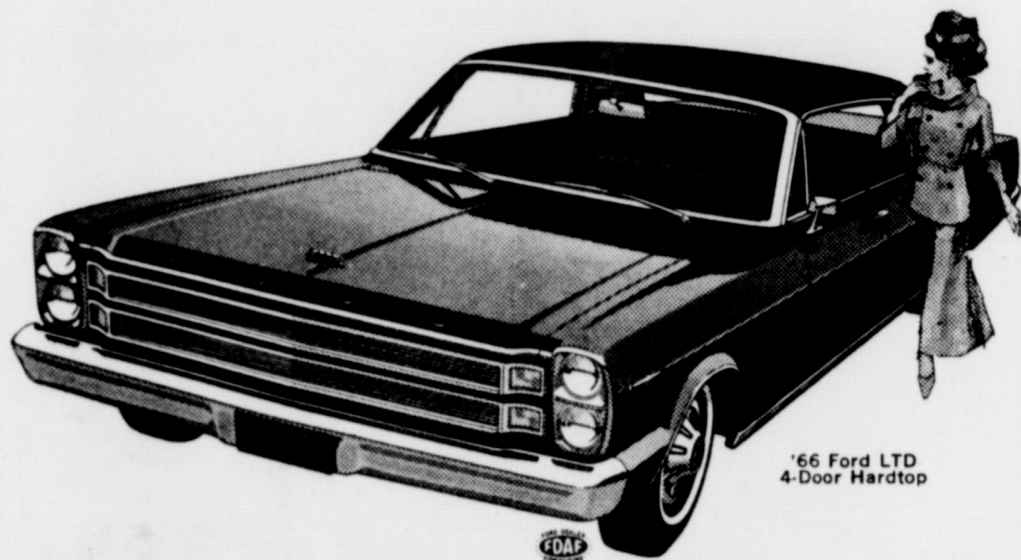

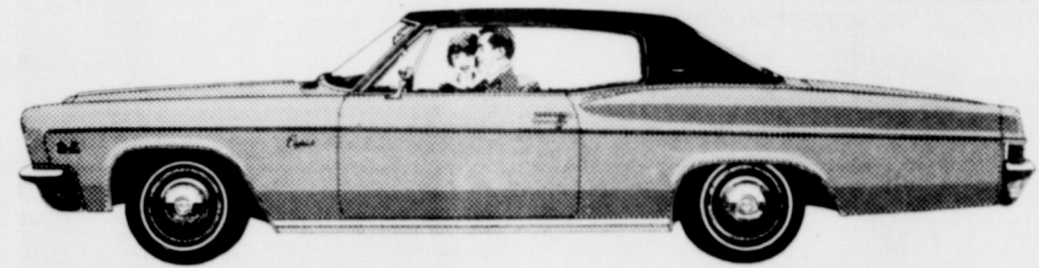
