WHEELER SCHOOLS ENROLL 405

Wheeler school enrollment shows an increase of 20 students over last year's enrollment. Superintendent Arling Cordell stated that 135 students enrolled for classes 9-12 and 270 pupils are enrolled in classes 1-8.

The first problem facing the school system with the beginning of the new year is the large first grade class. The first grade enrollment this year amounted to 40 which is too many pupils for a beginners class. It will be necessary for the class to be divided and a new teacher hired to carry the overflow.

Enrollment was held Friday August 27 with the first full day of school being Monday. A general assembly was held in the gym Friday morning with enrollment for the high school following the assembly. School was turned out Friday at 12.

Enrollment of 1955-56 showed a total of 353 in the school system. 249 of these students were enrolled in classes 1 thru 8 and 104 enrolled in high school.

Records for 1964-65 show 122 pupils enrolled for high school classes and 263 for grade school. The total enrolled at the start of the year was 385.

TWO ACCIDENTS REPORTED, ONE SUSTAINS INJURIES

Two accidents Tuesday and Wednesday resulted in one being injured and damage to two trucks, a Ford station wagon and a Ford pickup. At 9:45 Tuesday evening a truck driven by Joe Roberson, 32 ran under the back of a second truck which was stopped at the red light intersection of 152 and 83.

Sheriff Bus Dorman and Wright-Denson Ambulance were within a block of the accident when it happened. Roberson was sitting upright in the truck with the windshield shattered over him. He had received a gash on the forehead and a minor concussion. He was conscious at the time he was taken from the truck but was or what had happened he was not aware of where he was or what had happened. He was taken immediately to the Parkview hospital where he received emergency treatment and was released Thursday morning.

The truck which had stopped at the light was knocked

into the intersection by the impact. Both trucks were headed east after the collision.

A stationwagon driven by Glenda Henderson struck

a pickup driven by Gordon Whitner Wednesday morning. The mishap occurred 5 miles west of town. Only minor damage was done to the vehicles with no injuries being sustained.

SEPTEMBER 22 SET ASIDE FOR CO. CROPS TOUR

The honorable George W. Heffley, Wheeler county Judge has officially proclaimed Sept. 22 as Wheeler County Crops Demonstration Tour day. This one day has been spotlighted to publicize the demonstration work that is being conducted through the Northwest Texas research demonstration program and to bring farmers and businessmen up to date on the latest research information concerning crops and livestock and crop production combinations in this area of the state.

The program which will last most of the day will begin with a tour of the research demonstration plots at 9:00 a.m. at the Kelson school. School buses from Shamrock, Wheeler and Kelson school systems will provide transportation for all interested persons that plan to attend the tour. Stops on the tour will concern crop fertility and variety plots. Completion of the tour will be about 12:30 and the buses will unload back at Kelson where a free barbecue will be provided for the farmers and businessmen of the county by the Wheeler and Shamrock Chamber of Commerce and the Wheeler county Farm Bureau. The barbecue will be held on the Jack Young farm which is located 1/4 mile south of Kelson on the east side of the highway. Noon entertainment will be provided by the Wheeler county Farmers Union.

The honorable Grainger McIlhenny, state Representative of Wheeler will give the opening address preceding the afternoon program. Outstanding authorities representing the Texas Ag. Extension Service and the United States Department of Agriculture will expound on the latest research information concerning crop production, range management, livestock production, soil fertility, weed control and farm management.

Farmers will be notified by Charles Jackson, Wheeler county Ag. Agent around September 1 of the field day and all farmers will be expected to submit an intent as to how many will attend the barbecue from his farm by Sept. 10 to the county agents office. Each chamber of commerce will obtain a count from the businessmen. The field day is being

sponsored by the Wheeler county Farm Bureau, Shamrock and Wheeler chamber of commerce, Wheeler county Farmers Union, the Wheeler county program building committee and the Texas Ag. Extension Service.

Co Agent Reports

Wheatland soil samples are beginning to put into the soil lab at the South Plains Research and extension center here as top producers try to get early reports so they can carefully plan their wheat fertility program.

Business has picked up sooner than usual and I'm glad to see it," says Jim Valentine, Extension Soil chemist at the Center.
"It indicates that many producers are realizing the benefits of getting an early fertilizer recommendation from their wheat ground." Valentine said an August soil test has important benefits where wheat will be pastured or if the ground needs phosphorus. In both situations preplant applications give the most profitable results.

An early soil test is not as important where test indicate that only nitrogen is needed or where the wheat will be used only for grain. He said research indicates yields are about the same when nitrogen is applied preplant in split applications or as top dress in Feb. Wheat that will be grazed early growth, Valentine said. Nitrogen can be applied any liquid form should not be left on the surface for long periods. Wheat life other fields crops needs phosphorus while plants are young. While a soil test indicates a phosphorus deficiency, the phosphorus should be applied so it will be in the moist soil in reach of permanent roots. Phosphorus moves only slightly from the point of application so it is best to apply ahead of planting.
"Complete information on soil sample collection may be obtained through the county agents office."
