WHEELER COUNTY HERMIT DIES

Noble Chancy Myers, 86, died Monday, Nov. 29, at his home. Home to Mr. Myers in the winter was a dugout on a section of land he bought in 1914. The furnishings consisted of a table, a wood burning stove and a bed of burlap bags and wire mesh.

Chancy Myers is known to be worth \$60,000. A bank book and the title to his section of land were found in a cave close to his home. The bank book showed \$20,000 deposited in the First National Bank of Wheeler. Mineral rights on the land were worth \$3,200 or more and the land is worth an estimated \$40,000.

A few feet from his "winter home" was a small one room shack which Myers called his summer home. The shack had no furnishings except a piece of wire stretched across the end covered with papers and burlap bags. The floor was covered with magazines, papers and cans.

Mr. Myers had left home when he was 14 years old and for a short time worked on a ranch in Texas. He bought his Wheeler county farm in 1914 and farmed awhile. In the early 1920's he went to Paris, France and worked in a slaughterhouse. Other countries visited were Spain and Argentina.

Mr. Myers walked 5 miles to Mobeetie each Wednesday until last year when he began to lose his strength. Since that time a neighbor, Milton Finsterwald, and Richard Brown of Wheeler, who leases Myers land, have carried him his food and drink.

It is not known why he chose to be a hermit. His talks of the places he had visited were quite interesting, according to a number of people who knew him.

Chancy Myers had been ill for the past four years. Milton Finsterwald had visited Myers Sunday evening and found him dead when he returned Monday morning.

Myers was born in Elk Falls, Kan. on Nov. 22, 1889. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Daisy Fuller of Oklahoma City and several nieces and nephews.

Graveside services were held Wednesday, Dec. 1, at 2:00 p.m. in the Araphoo Cemetery, north of Clinton, Okla.

Mr. McIlhany was elected to the legislature in 1949; and is now serving on the following standing committees in the House of Representatives: Chairman of Military and Veterans Affairs; a member of Agriculture; Criminal Jurisprudence; Highways and Roads and State Affairs.

In making the appointment Speaker Barnes said: "I consider Mr. McIlhany to be experienced, capable and knowledgeable in the legislative process. These things give him the proper insight to make a successful study and to arrive at conclusions which will be beneficial to the legislature as well as to the people of Texas."

TIPS ON CHRISTMAS MAILING

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history." Postmaster Virgil Jamison said today.

Nationally about 99 percent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

"ZIP Code use and the cooperation of the public in mailing early were the main reasons for our success. With the same or better cooperation this year, we expect to handle an even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush."

Mr. Jamison had advice which would help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season.

A. Up date last year's address list and include ZIP Codes. The phone book is usually a good source for local addresses.

B. Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials; boxes, tape, wrapping paper, etc.

C. Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved or that undeliverable cards will be returned if a return address is on the envelope.

The postmaster emphasized again this year that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He urged that cartons be packed tightly by using stuffing material to fill up the empty space around the merchandise.

He also asked that all mailers make an effort to address their letters, cards and packages as clearly as possible

 Farmers in the Kelton and Twitty area seem to be satisfied with the results that they are getting from the use of Scare-Away guns in combating the crow and bird problems. It has been estimated that Wheeler county crop losses are in excess of \$100,000 yearly as the result of different type bird damage. It is hoped that this new device will help the situation to some degree. If you are not familiar with these guns you will think the county is full of hunters if you are driving in this area.

These guns, which have been used successfully in rice producing areas, are built of steel construction and operate inexpensively on carbide and water or acetylene to produce thunder clap explosions at regular or irregular intervals. These units are set and serviced once each day with one to two pounds of nut carbide.

High Quality Bulls Available in Wheeler County
 Local livestock producers may want to shop at home for their herd bulls when they start their herd bull shopping. Local breeders are raising horn and polled Hereford, Angus and Charolais cattle. Out of these herds almost any type bull desired can be found. Many of these bulls will be selling in the performance tested sales and registered sales over the area, but many will be available locally at private treaty also. All of local herds are free of Brucellosis and Tuberculosis and our local breeders have made an extra effort to follow a solid breeding program and up grade their cattle at every opportunity.

Forage Analysis:
 Crude protein analysis has run from 17.3 to 28.2 percent on alfalfa samples tested at the Texas A&M Analytical Lab. The digestible protein on these samples ranged from 13.1 to 23.4 percent for Wheeler county alfalfa. Before you buy or sell hay you may want to first have it tested. Information concerning these test is available at the county agents office.

Wheat Rust over County!
 Rust has shown up on a lot of the early wheat. This was caused from dampness and lack of cold weather. Leaves affected will die back to the ground, but new leaves will not be affected. Cold temperatures will relieve the situation more than anything. It is difficult to determine to what degree yields have been affected.

Texas October Milk Production up from a Year Ago.
 Milk production in Texas during October amounted to 252 million pounds according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is up 1 percent from October 1964 production and 3 percent above the previous month's production.

Care of Leather Gloves
 Many styles of leather gloves now come in washable leathers: pigskin, glace kid, capeskin, sued, doeskin and chamois. These leathers have been treated with special chemicals to make easy to care for.

Here are some good ideas on how to care for leather gloves.

After wearing leather gloves, inflate the fingers and air them out before storing. Fold the thumb inward and stretch each glove to shape while holding the fingertips with one hand and the cuff with the other.

You should not fold, roll or crease long leather gloves. Place each pair flat in a drawer, using tissue paper for wrapping so the leather can "breathe" fresh air during storage.

Make it a rule to suds leather gloves at the first sign of soil. They cannot be washed successfully after dry cleaning, because some of the fats and oils added to the leather to make it washable will dissolve in the cleaning process. Sudsing will not "degrease" the gloves enough to cause harm.

Wash leather gloves in warm soap or detergent suds. Don't rub leather on itself; just work the suds into the leather gently, using a well-lathered sponge or fingers to massage soiled spots. Highly colored may "bleed" a little, but usually there is no loss of color when dry.

After gloves are sudsed clean, rinse them thoroughly, roll briefly in a towel and then inflate the fingers. Hang them over a towel rack or spread them flat on a turkish towel. Avoid heat. Perforated plastic glove frames are convenient shaping devices which can be hung up for hurry-up drying.

Leather gloves should be softened by "working" them while still damp onto the hands, a finger at a time. If the gloves dry completely, roll them briefly in a damp towel to soften. You can also "massage" and manipulate the leather between your fingers until softens up.
