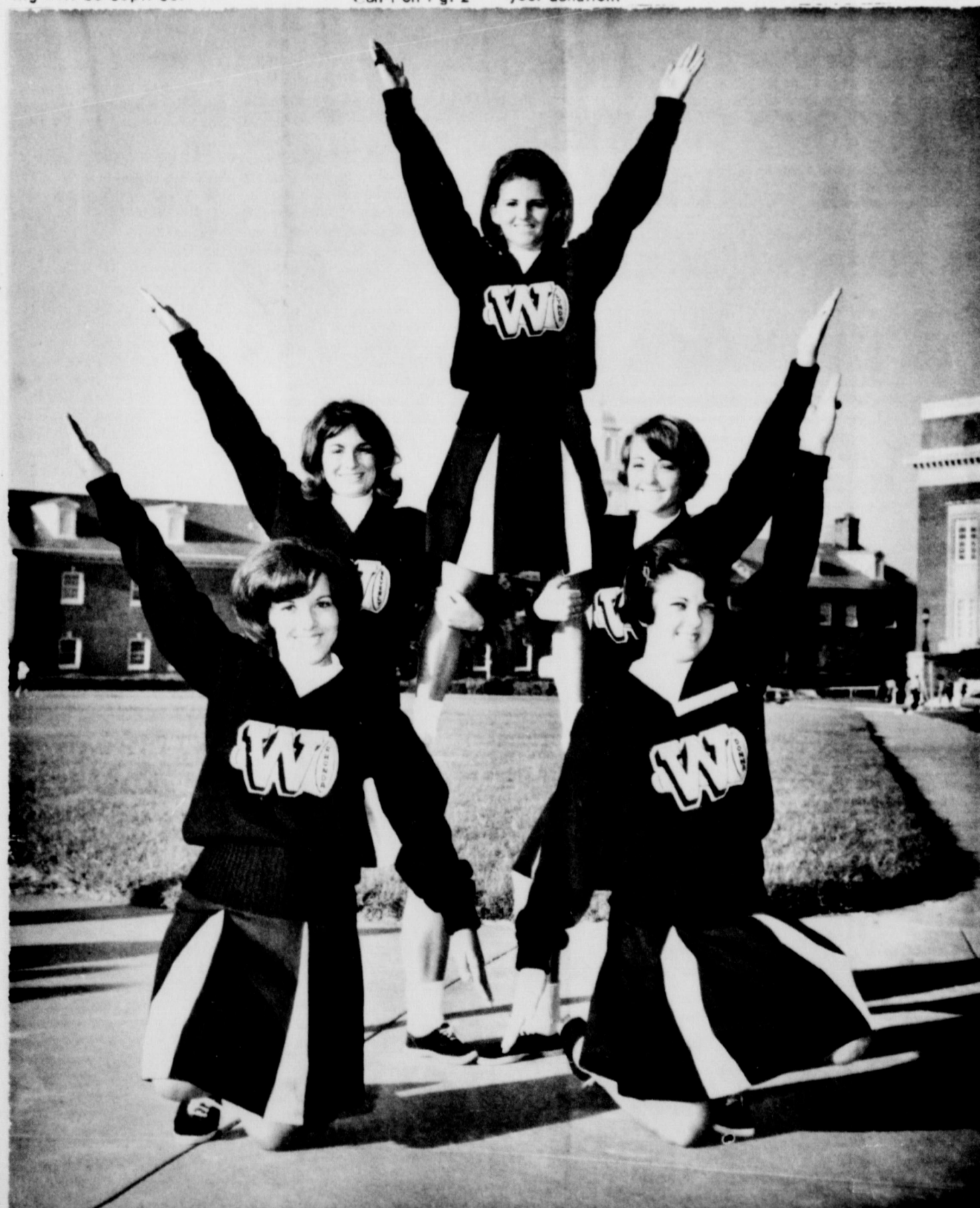
You will undoubtedly be asked to join. In order that everyone in the community may understand what we are trying to do, let us take this time to explain.

# OIL NEWS

Wheeler county's producers and royalty owners are maketing some \$7 million in crude oil and natural gas a year, according to statistics released by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas association this week.

Ranking 106th among Texas' oil and gas producing counties. Wheeler county in 1963 received some \$5.2 million from wellhead sales of oil and an estimated \$1.8 million from natural gas. County production of oil was approximately 1.8 million barrels natural gas, 14.6 billion cubic feet.

Farmers ranchers and other mineral owners share in a \$880,000 distribution of oil and gas royalty payments annually.

The Association based its annual study of this county's oil and gas output on statistics compiled by the U S Bureau of Mines for 1963. Production data for 1964 would be approximately the same.

Statewide, Texas oil and gas wells produced an estimated \$3.6 billion in income, \$2.9 billion from oil, \$730 million from gas.

Data from the Texas employment commission indicate direct employment in oil and gas industry jobs for more than 235 Wheeler county citizens with a payroll of approximately \$1.3 million a year. Because oil operations requirements require such a large number of service contractors and supply firms which are not included in this figure, direct employment figures are only part of the story of local economic impact.

An important indicator of activity is the amount expended on drilling of wildcat wells seeking new fields and those wells drilled to develop fields already located. The association estimates that in 1964 approximately \$3.8 million was risked by Texas oil and gas operators on drilling ventures in Wheeler county.

About 1.3 per cent of this expenditure or \$49,000 went into dry holes.

A tabulation by the oil and gas journal shows 79 wells were drilled in the county in 1964, 65 oil, 13 gas and one dry hole. A total of 308,000 feet of hole were drilled--280,000 for development wells and 28,000 for wildcats.

In addition to local school and county property taxes by oil and gas operators taxes on production from wheeler county flowed into the state Treasury at the rate of about \$368,000 a year.

An upgrading of the county's gross economic output is contributed by the operation of one plant which can process some 30 million cubic feet of natural gas a day to remove liquids such as butane and propane.

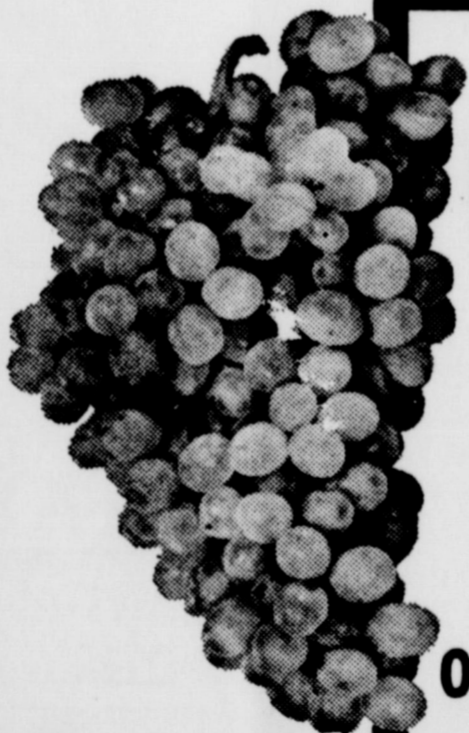

## Co. Agent Reports

### BY CHARLES JACKSON Performance Testing of Beef Cattle:

During August of this year I assisted Marion A. "Tom" Bryant of Kelton with his performance testing program by assisting George C. Davis of Shamrock in grading the calves. This is the tenth consecutive year that Tom has been keeping individual records on his beef herd. Each of his cows are numbered and an individual record has been maintained on each individual cow as to weaning weight and grade of each calf. This year calves averaged 280 days in age.

His calves also received no creep feed during the nursing period. The steer calves averaged 555 lbs. at weaning and the heifer calves averaged 500 lbs. The average grade for the steers were between choice and choice minus. Average grade for the heifers were choice. Last fall he carried over several light calves that born too late to sell. As yearlings the heifer and these averaged 689 and the steers averaged 781. He has been keeping the heifers that have the highest weight and grade each year as replacements. If he finds it necessary he can cull his herd quick by using his records.

### Farmers advised to Claim Gas-Tax Refund!

Farmers can get a four cent per gallon refund on each gallon of gasoline used for farming purposes during the 12 month period ending June 30 by filing a claim with the Internal Revenue Service.

The tax refund claims are to be submitted on form 2240 available at the county agents office or through the Internal Revenue Service. State taxes may be refunded by completing the necessary forms provided by the State Comptroller, Austin, Tex. The claims must be postmarked no later than Sept. 30. The federal tax

forms should be mailed for federal tax refund to District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Dallas, Texas.

Extension Farm Management Specialist John Seibert says sufficient records should be kept by each claimant to enable the internal revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the claim for the federal tax refund. Seibert said a farmer who uses 2,000 gallons of gasoline a year could probably compile the necessary records and fill out the form in about one hour and for the next hours work he would get a refund of \$80 for the federal gas tax refund.

### Watermelon plants dying in the field

This week I had a call from R. L. Bob Stokes who lives east of Shamrock on the Oklahoma line, concerning his watermelons. His plants have died in each of his fields. Four different varieties in three different fields are affected. Varieties affected are Tender Sweet, Black Diamond, Tom Watson and Garsonian. I have sent several diseased plants to the Texas Agricultural Extension service lab at Lubbock for a complete analysis. 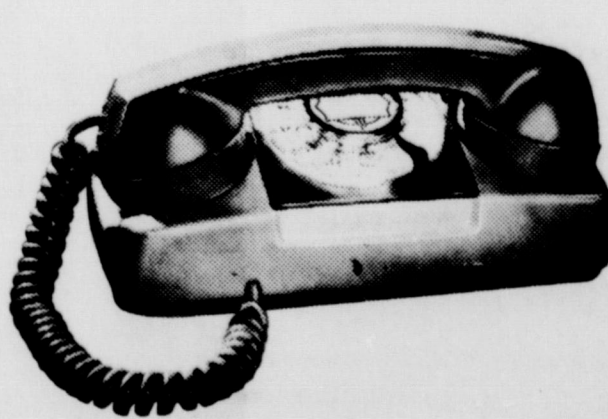

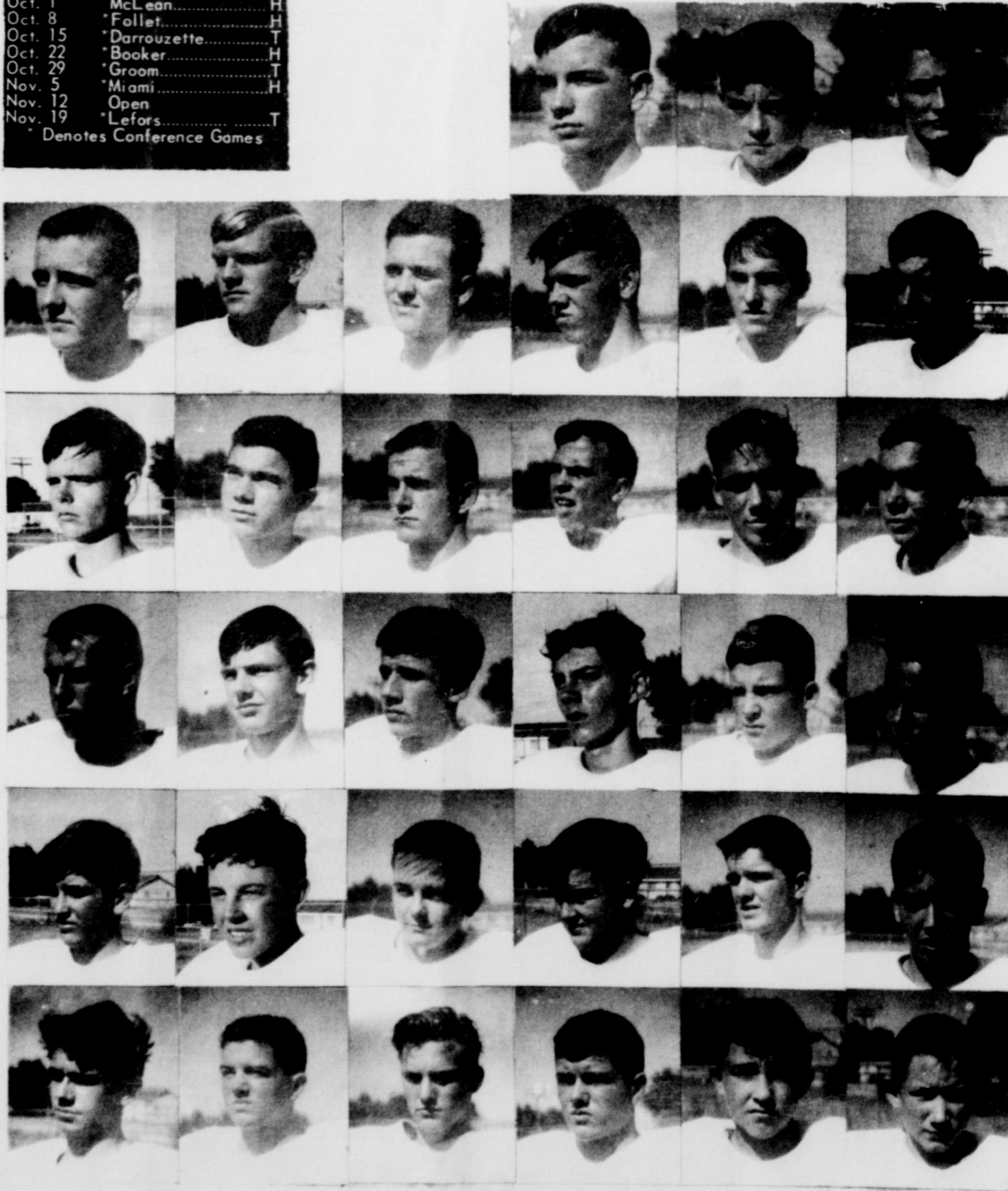

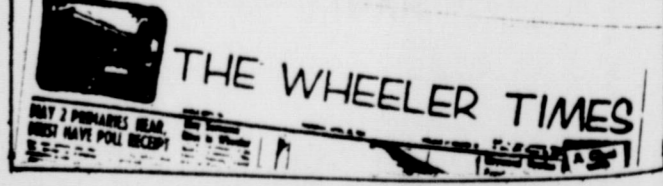
