According to testimony, Elix had been scuffling with his wife on that date when she fell striking a doorknob. She later died of injuries received in the fall.

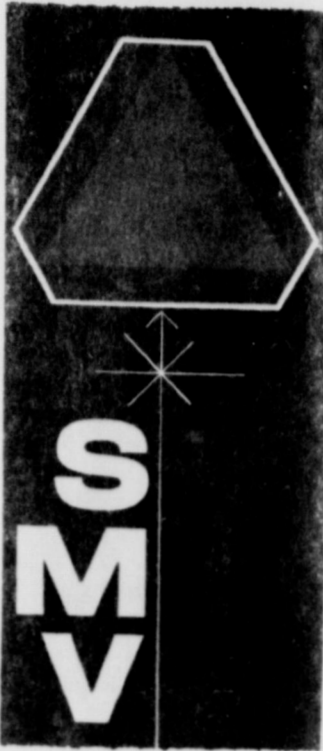
John W. Armstrong, 22, of Wellington pleaded guilty to forgery charges and was sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary at Friday's session.

2. At night, the reflective red border of the SMV emblem glows brilliantly in the path of approaching auto headlights. The unique, hollow red triangle immediately identifies a slow moving vehicle.

Use of SMV emblem is recommended by: National Safety Council; American Society of Agricultural Engineers; National Institute for Farm Safety; Automotive Safety Foundation; and National Safety League of Canada.

The 4-H Clubs of Wheeler county are selling this SMV emblem as a public service project. The aim of the clubs is to get one on every tractor, trailer and other slow moving vehicles.

### National Farm-City Week Meet

In recognition of National Farm and City Week, the members of the Wheeler Kiwanis club each invited a farmer or rancher to their noon luncheon meeting Monday.

Bill Brooks, Chairman of the Agriculture Committee, presented Duane Scott, supervisor county demonstration plots in Wheeler and surrounding counties, with a plaque for the work which he has done in Wheeler county. Duane selects these plots and oversees the planting, fertilizing development and harvest. He keeps the records for each of the individual locations.

As a result of his work a total of 200 soil samples have been tested in Wheeler county.

Speaker for the meeting was James C. Murphy, area farm management specialist of Amarillo. Mr. Murphy told the group of a project which will result in a book on the economic situation of the panhandle.

A study is being made of the total economy of the Panhandle. Wheeler County has some oil and gas activity, however, the majority of the economy relies on agriculture. The cost of producing agricultural products is rising and in most cases net return remains the same or declines. To improve the economy, it will be necessary to study the total resources—natural, capital and human, to find which holds the most promise and which fall short for future needs.

Mr. Murphy pointed out that the secret of the new discount houses is merchandising; likewise the secret to our future economy will be the development of the available resources with the most potential. It may be necessary to develop new methods and new techniques.

Raising surplus crops cannot be profitable, according to Mr. Murphy.
