Antique Auction In Canadian

An auction sale of antiques from Canadian's historic WCTU Building, plus other antiques to be consigned to the sale from homes in the Canadian area, will be held Saturday afternoon, September 23, at 1:30 o'clock in the Canadian City Auditorium.

Proceeds from the sale will go into a fund for remodeling and refurbishing of the 61-year-old red brick colonial building... the only such structure in the nation built, owned and maintained by a local chapter of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. The building, still used regularly for meetings and as the site of the WCTU's annual Holiday Bazaars, also serves as a community center and houses the Canadian Public Library.

Complete renovation of both floors of the building is now being completed. Meeting rooms and library have been air conditioned and re-decorated, and all new furnishings are planned.

At the auction sale Saturday, offerings will include many items of antique furniture which have been used in the WCTU parlors and meeting rooms since the building was first opened in 1911. There are sideboards, washstands, library tables of various sizes, a hand-carved captain's chair, and more than a hundred solid oak dining room chairs. There is also a collection of oil paintings in ornate frames of the period; old light fixtures; some gas space heaters; and a huge mounted American Eagle.

Tom Abraham of Canadian is in charge of arrangements for the sale, and two Canadian businessmen, Malouf (Oofie) Abraham and Bob Ward will be the auctioneers.

Items to be offered at the auction will be on display at the auditorium.

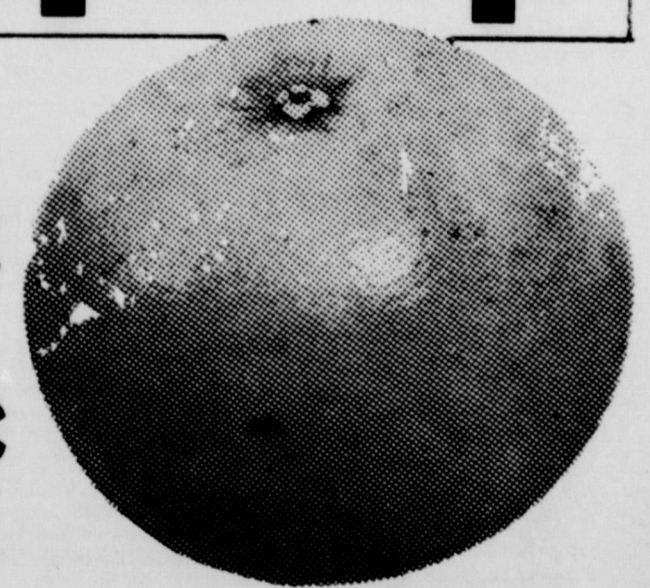

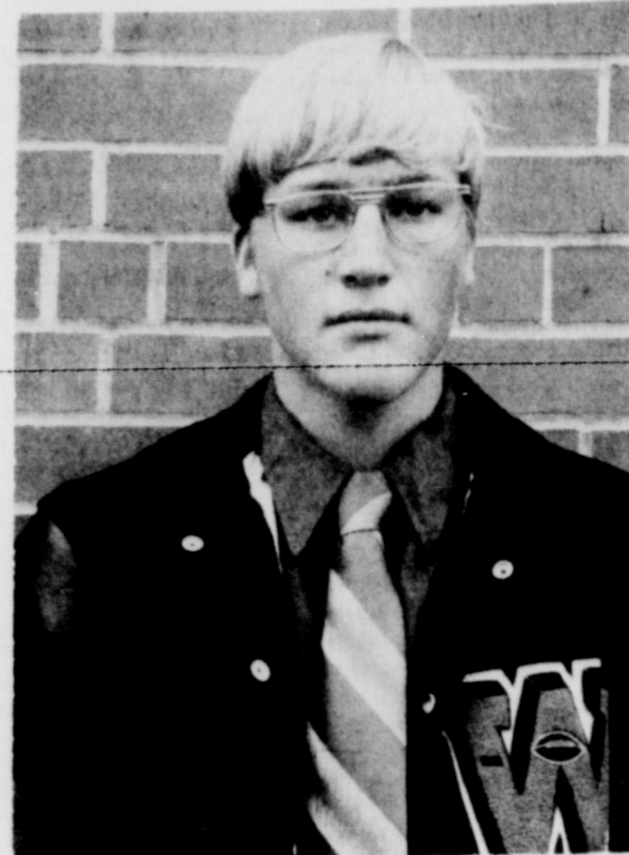

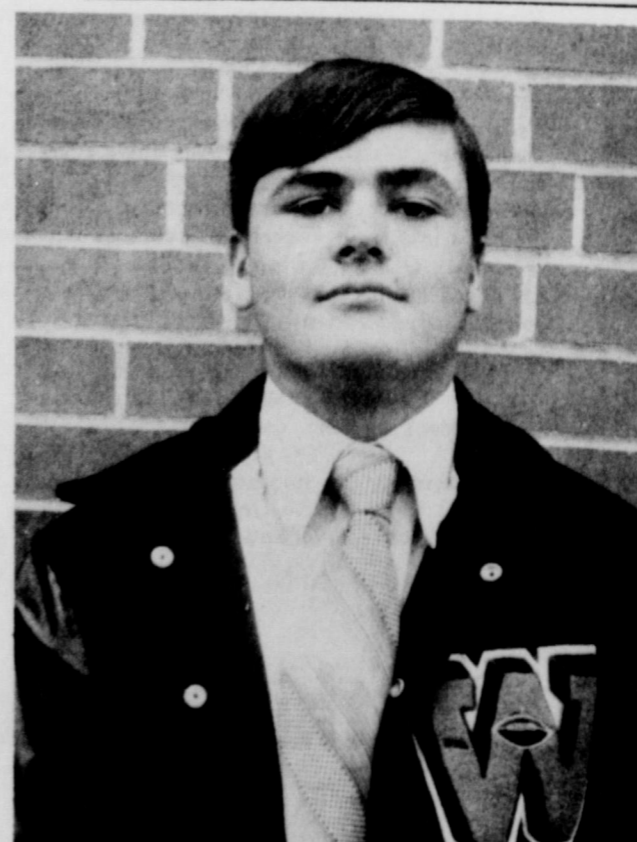

Also new is an aerosol
spray that, when applied to
the new cut edge of fabric,
helps prevent raveling and
eliminates the need for
pinkings or seam binding.
This "Ravel Gard" is a form
of liquid nylon suspended in
an aerosol propellant. It fills
in the areas between the
fibers and prevents them
from separating. It dries
quickly, is invisible, can
be used on any type or
color of fabric and will not
be removed by washing or
dry cleaning. It may also
be sprayed on the seams of
completed garments. This
could be a help!

Have you noticed what
pretty braids and trims are
available at stores now.
Some look like they would
make beautiful belts. Here's
one way to make one.

Step 1. Measure your
waist (or hip, depending on

how you plan to wear the
belt) and add eight inches.
Double the total amount.
That's how much braid you'll
need. Purchase two metal,
plastic or wooden rings.

Step 2. Fold the entire
length of trim in half. The
double thickness will make
a firm, unwrinkled belt that
will look attractive on both
sides. Slip the rings be-
tween the layers and secure
them at the folded end by
stitching across the width of
the belt.

Step 3. Pin the two layers
of trim together along the
length leaving 1/2 inch free
at the tail end. Stitch very
close to the edges either
by machine or by hand, using
an overcasting stitch. Other
decorative handstitches may
be used.

Step 4. Finishing the
edges - Fringed edge: Pull
a few threads from the two
loose ends of the tail to
form a narrow self fringed
edge.

Finished edge: Fold both
ends of the tail in towards
each other and machine
stitch or slip stitch by hand.

1 3/4 cups graham cracker
crumbs
2 tbs. granulated sugar
5 tbs. butter, softened

FILLING
3 (8oz.) pkgs. cream cheese,
softened
1/4 cup granulated sugar
3 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
TOPPING
1 (1 lb., 5 oz.) can cherry
pie filling

Blend first three ingre-
dients; press firmly against
bottom and sides of a 9-inch
spring form pan. Blend fil-
ling ingredients using low
speed of mixer. Pour into
crust and bake in a pre-
heated moderate oven (375)
about 40 or 50 min. Chill
thoroughly. Garnish edge of
cake with some of cherry
pie filling; serve rest with
cake. Makes 12 (about 2 1/4
inch) wedges.

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

This is the fair season! Besides the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo (Sept. 18-23), counties are having fairs also. Collingsworth County had their fair Friday, Sept. 8. Mrs. Clarence Zybach and I helped judge in the textiles and canned foods divisions. Sure were lots of pretty and good exhibits!

This afternoon (Thursday, Sept. 14) I will be judging in the Beckham County Fair held in Sayre, Oklahoma. It's so much fun to see the things people have done and to have the chance to meet people.

What do you think about Wheeler County having a county fair again, as you have had in the past?

We have had a good response on the consumer education mailout pamphlets that we will be mailing. Thanks for your response; it gave me an idea of approximately how many pamphlets to order. As soon as they come in, we'll be mailing them. If you lost your questionnaire, I sent, or you didn't get one and you would like to receive the pamphlets, call my office or write Bob 505 Wheeler. We received a couple of return forms that weren't signed. If, after a reasonable length of time, you do not receive the pamphlets that you indicated you wanted, call or write. We'll know then who to send them to.

Radio Program - F for homemaking and agricultural information, listen to KBYP at 7:30 a.m. on Friday morning. They will be using some tapes on current homemaking and agricultural concerns, from A&M, and some that I have made.

Fur-like fabrics are seen again this fall. You may be planning to make a garment out of this type of fabric. Simple patterns with few seams and easy shapes are best suited to fur-like fabrics. Use polyester or heavy duty cotton thread. Size 14 machine needles should be used for medium weight fabric, size 16 for heavy-weight. Hand needles to be used: sharps or between size 6 or 7; embroidery size 4, 5, or 6.

Fur-like fabrics are fairly firm. Most garments will not require lining or underlining. Jackets and vests that are open may be lined, if desired. Use interfacing if the design requires more support than the fabric has by itself.

Reduce bulk wherever possible. Cut facings from lining fabric or bind edges with fold-over braid. Use a "with nap" layout with the pile running down on all pattern pieces. Place pattern pieces on the back of a single thickness of fabric and cut from the wrong side. Cut only the backing, not the fur. Use sharp scissors or a razor blade to cut the fabric. Tailor tacks or chalk are the best marking methods for pile fabrics.

In stitching use light pressure on the presser foot and stitch length of 8 to 10 stitches per inch. Stitch seams in the direction of the pile. Use a long needle to pull out an pile that catches in the seams or double-stitched seams may be used. If it appears bulky, cut pile from the seam allowance as close to the backing as possible. If fabric ravel, zigzag or overcast seam allowance. If seams won't stay flat, catchstitch them to the backing.

For double-stitched seams, stitch the plain seams and cut pile from seam allowance as close to the backing as possible. If fabric ravel, zigzag or overcast seam allowance. If seams won't stay flat, catchstitch them to the backing.

For double-stitched seams, stitch the plain seam and cut pile from seam allowance. Stitch again 1/4 inch away from first stitching. Trim seam allowance next to second row of stitching.

To stabilize shoulder seams, stitch pre-shrunk seam binding into seam. To eliminate bulk in darts, slash open, shear pile, finger press open, and catch stitch edges to backing.

Of course, zippers and buttonholes are not successful on fur-like fabrics. Use frogs, loops and buttons, buckles, buttons and chains, covered snaps, large covered hooks and eyes called furrier hooks.

To hem, for smooth short piles, handles as you would any heavy fabric.

Here's a good fruit salad - 1 can fruit cocktail drained 1 small can crushed pineapple, drained 1 small carton small curd cottage cheese 1 cup miniature marshmallows 1 cup coconut 1 cup cool whip 1/2 cup nuts (optional) Sprinkle in and mix with all the above ingredients. 1 small package dry jello (any flavor). This salad can be made early and refrigerated. It will also keep well, if fruit is well drained.
