Step 3. Pin the two layers of frim together along the length leaving ½ inch free at the tail end. Stitch very close to the edges either by machine or by hand, using an overcasting stitch. Other decorative handstitches may be used.

Step 4. Finishing the edges - Fringed edge: Pull a few threads from the two loose ends of the tail to form a narrow self fringed

Finished edge: Fold both ends of the tail in towards each other and machine stitch or slip stitch by hand.



Fur-like fabrics are seen again this fall. You may be planning to make a garment out of this type of fabric. Simple patterns with few seams and easy shapes are best st are best suited to fur-likes. Use polyester or heavy duty cotton thread. Size 14 machine needles should be used for medium weight fabric, size 16 for heavyweight. Hand needles to be used: sharps or betveen size 6 or 7; embroidery size 4, 5, or 6.

Fur-like fabrice are fairly firm. Most garments will not require lining or underlining. Jackets and vests that are open may be lined, i'desired, Use interfacing if the design equires more support than the fabric has by it-

Reduce bulk wherever possible. Cut facings from lining fabric or bind edges with fold-over braid. Use a "with nap" layout with the pile running down on all pattern pieces. Place pattern pieces on the back of a single thickness or fabric and cut from the wrong side. Cut only the backing, not the fur. Use sharp scissors or a razor blade to cut the fabric. Tailor tacks or chalk are the best marking methods for pile fabrics.

In stitching use light pressure on the presser foot and stitch length of 8 to 10 stitches per inch. Stitch seams in the direction of the pile. Use a long needle to pull out an pile that catches in the seams or double-stitched seams may be used. If it appears bulky, cut pile from the seam allowance as close to the backing as possible. I f fabric ravels. ziazga or overcast seam allowance. If seams won't stay flat, catchstitch them to the backing.

For double-stitched seams, stitch the plain seams and cut pile from seam allowance as close to the backing as possible If fabric ravels, zigzag or overcast seam allowance. If seams won't stay flat, catchstitch them to the backing.

For double-stitched seams, stitch the plain seam and cut pile from seam allowance. Stitch again 1/4 inch away from first stitching. Trim seam allowance next to second row of stitching.

To stabilize shoulder seams, stitch pre-shrunk seam binding into seam. To eliminate bulk in darts, slash open, shear pile, finger press open, and catch stitch edges to back-

Of course, zippers and buttonholes are not successful on fur-like fabrics. Use frogs, loops and buttons, bul tons, buckles, buttons

and chains, covered snaps, large covered hooks and eyes called furrier hooks.

To hem, for smooth short piles, handles as you would any heavy fabric. Finish edge and catchstitch to backing. For long haired fur-likes, make a faced hem, using extra wide hem facing or a strip of lining fabric.
