Range Riders Hold Rodeo July 1-4

You may not see fireworks, but well known rodeo performers will see plenty of stars when they face L. D. Ward's rugged rodeo stock at the thirtieth annual Will Rogers Range Rider Rodeo scheduled for July 1, 2, 3 and 4 in their arena at Highway 66 and Bell Avenue in Amarillo. Lured by top prize money, cowboys are already beginning to arrive in town to be on hand when rodeo books open June 29. Rodeo Chairman Cliff Lowrance reports that riding clubs are also anticipating the parade planned for 10:00 A.M. on Saturday morning, July 1, in downtown Amarillo sponsored by the Amarillo Chamber

of Commerce and the Range Riders. They will be vying for first, second and third place trophies, and with other "Honor America Day" Parade units will follow a route beginning at the intersection of 12th and Polk Streets. They will continue north on Polk to Fourth Street and then turn east to the Amarillo Civic Center. The general public is invited to participate by bringing American Flags to greet the riders since pictures will be sent to our President and Congressmen to show that patriotism is strong in the Texas Panhandle and Golden Spread. Announcer Jim Miller from Rapid City, South Dakota, will be making his first appearance in Amarillo on the rodeo circuit. He promises to keep crowds well informed on the fine points and progress of individual performers when the go-rounds begin at 8:30 P.M. nightly. To further celebrate this Thirtieth Annual Rodeo, the Will Rogers Range Riders will host a Queen Contest for girls 15 through 19 at 2:00 P.M. on July 1. The 1972 Rodeo Queen will then be presented at the first rodeo performance that Saturday evening. Two well-known western bands have been engaged by Recreation Chairman Wayne Snider for dances on Saturday and Monday evenings, July 1 and 3rd, immediately after the rodeo performances. These will be held in the Rec Hall on Range Rider premises. General admission tickets for rodeo performances is \$2.00 for adults and seventy five cents for children under twelve. Savings Bonds Sales In County

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$2,837,000 in Wheeler county were reported today according to the County Bond Chairman. Sales for the five-month period totaled \$45,994 for 21% of the 1972 goal of \$220,000.00. Sales for the State of Texas during May were \$17,314,314—a 1% increase over May 1971 when sales were \$16,476,145. January-May sales totaled \$91,572,743 with 45% of the \$202.3 million 1972 goal achieved. Nationally, sales of E and H Savings Bonds amounting to \$573 Million were reported during May—24% above 1971 sales of \$462 Million. Total sales for the five-month period amounted to \$2,715 Million—18% above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds totalling \$142 Million were reported for the first five months of 1972—36% above the \$105 Million exchanged in 1971.

Tornado Alert Sounded Saturday

Wheeler citizens had their sleep interrupted at 3:00 a.m. Saturday morning, June 24, with the sounding of the tornado alert. The National Weather Service notified the Wheeler Fire Department of the sighting of a funnel approx. 16 miles east of Pampa.

The storm watch group then went on duty and remained on watch until 5:00 a.m. The cloud apparently split and went each side of Wheeler. No rainfall was recorded for Wheeler Saturday.

Wheeler Citizens again had their sleep disturbed early Sunday morning with an electrical storm. The small cloud produced loud claps of thunder and .31 inches of rain. The moon was shining while the rain was falling.

Wheeler city received .07 inches of rain Thursday, June 22.

A recorded .22 fell Friday, June 23. An afternoon shower Tuesday afternoon produced lightning, thunder and a few drops of rain. Large hail was reported north of Shamrock.

Joe Rogers reports the official rainfall for June now stands at 2.29, a total of 10.13 has fallen for the year.

The rains have been spotted and the amount received in town in some cases does not even compare to the amount received a short distance from town.

Swimming Lessons Will Be Offered

Larry Tracy, manager of the Wheeler Swimming Pool, announced this week he will be offering swimming lessons beginning July 11. The course will be divided into 10 sessions. Courses for beginners, advanced beginners and intermediates will be offered.

Students will swim Tuesday thru Saturday mornings beginning at 10:00. Beginning swimmers must be able to stand in the shallow end of the pool. At the shallow end, the pool is 3'6" deep. No student will be accepted if he does not meet this requirement.

After completion of the course, Red Cross certificates will be given qualified students. Cost of the lessons will be \$12.50 per student.

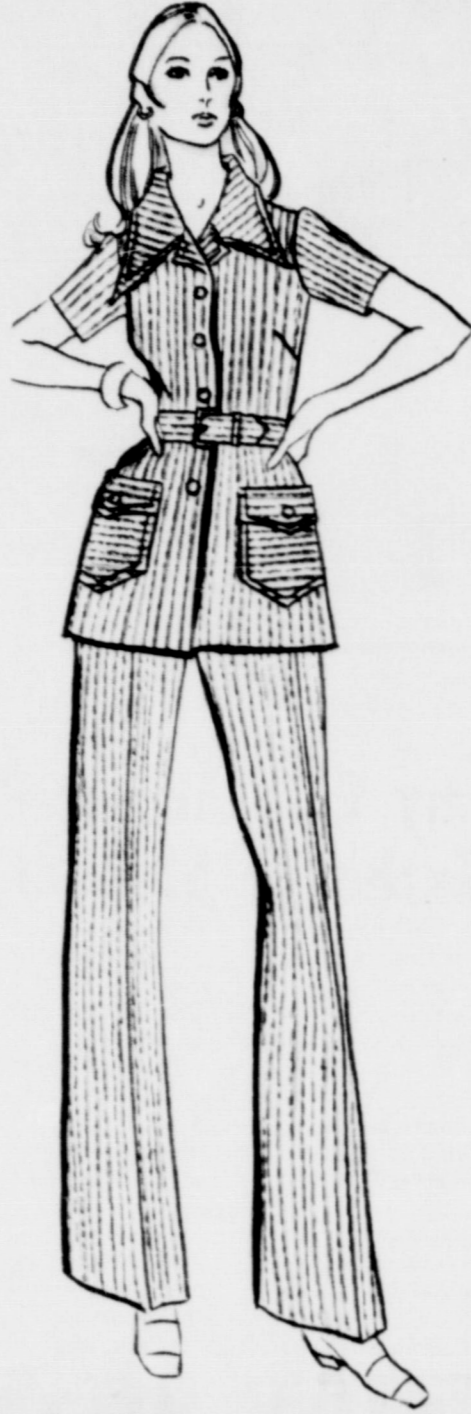

Oh, the joys of summer!
Even though things are hectic during summer months, it is nice to have the freedom to set routines of the cool year!
Our 4-H'ers will enjoy cook-out (weiner roast) Saturday at the Magic Bridge. The fun begins at 7:30 p.m. 4-H'ers are busy people. Besides working on their projects, many have summer jobs, either on the farm, or in town.
June is always designated as dairy month, but dairy products can be just as enjoyable and just as nutritious during the other seven months! I don't know how many of us use sour cream in our cooking.
There are, of course, many ways to use sour cream. Here are some recipes which you may want to try.

(good with seafood)
1 cup dairy sour cream
1 tsp. prepared horseradish
1/2 cup chopped dill pickles
1/2 tsp. salt
Blend the ingredients together and chill. Serve with seafood.
SOUR CREAM & EFF SAUCE
(good as a sauce over vegetables)
1 cup dairy sour cream
hard-cooked eggs, as desired
3 tsp. garlic powder
Blend sour cream and garlic powder. Stir in the desired amount of hard-cooked eggs or serve the sauce topped vegetables with wedges of hard-cooked eggs.
Homemakers, not more than a generation ago,

didn't have supermarket shelves full of super cleaning solutions to choose from. Instead they used a few basic ingredients from the hardware store to create some very effective cleaning products.
Create and experiment with your own home care products. You may like them better. Here are a few:
GENERAL HOUSEHOLD CLEANER
2 tsp. ammonia
2 tsp. liquid detergent
1 qt. water
Cleaning Windows and Mirrors one of the following:
(a) add 4 tsp. household ammonia to 1 qt. warm water
(b) add 2 tsp. vinegar to 1 qt. warm water.
(c) use 1 tsp. kerosene to 1 qt. of warm water
(d) use 1 tsp. washing soda to 1 qt. of warm water.
First remove surface soil with tissue or soft cloth. Then apply cleaning liquid

with a soft cloth or sponge. Rub dry and polish with newspaper or cloth. Avoid spilling ammonia on painted or varnished woodwork as it may injure the finish.

1 small can pimentos, chopped
1 1/3 cup vinegar
1 cup celery, chopped fine
1 green pepper, chopped
1 green pepper, chopped
1/4 cup salad oil
1/2 cup sugar
Wash and rinse sauerkraut drain well. Combine chopped ingredients; add sauer-

kraut. Mix oil, vinegar and sugar until sugar is dissolved; pour over vegetable mixture. Let stand in refrigerator several hours before serving. Salad keeps well in refrigerator, well covered, for several days. Serves 8.

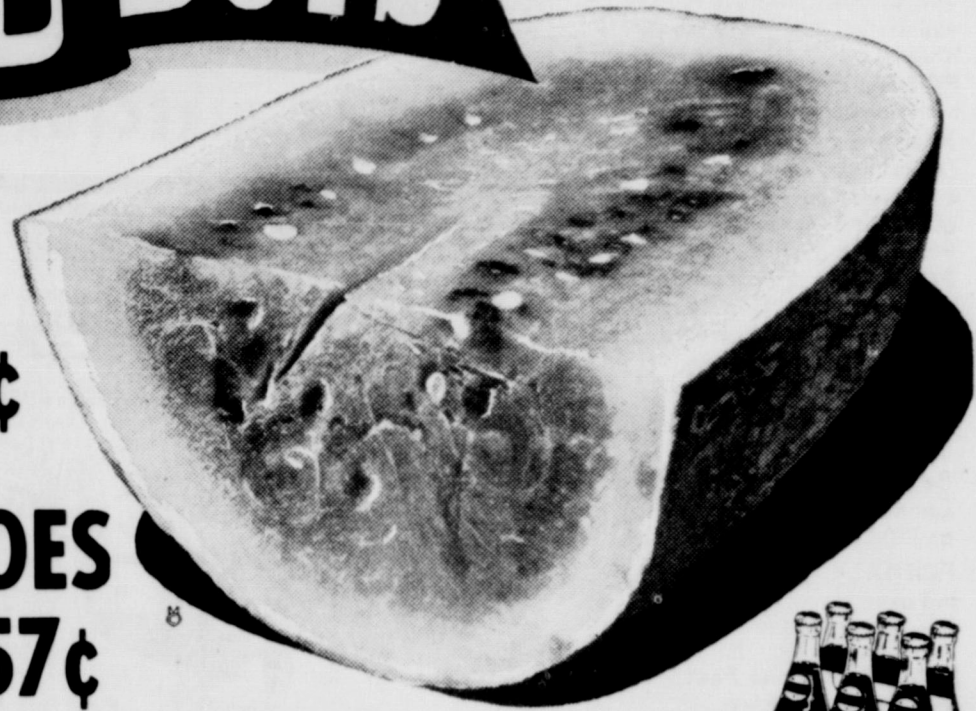

Neighbors at Odds

Grouchy Mrs. Baxter, an apartment dweller, had two reasons for cooking cabbage so often. First, she liked cabbage. Second, she liked to waft the cooking odors out of her open kitchen door, into the apartment of the new neighbors across the hall.

When the neighbors finally haled her into court, Mrs. Baxter insisted she had a right to cook whatever and however she pleased.

But the court ruled that she was guilty of committing a nuisance, by maliciously inflicting discomfort on others.

Psychologists tell us that hostility grows as living space shrinks. One of the law's touchier tasks is to mediate between neighbors at odds. And, as the above case indicates, evil intent may make the big difference in court.

This is shown even more clearly by the law's changing attitudes toward spite fences. Such fences, erected deliberately to block off the daylight from a neighbor's house, used to be tolerated as a lawful exercise of property rights.

But now they are forbidden almost everywhere. As one court commented, in condemning a spite fence 11 feet high: "The right to enjoy the sunshine is a natural one, and no man can shut out the light of heaven for no better reason than to gratify his malice toward his neighbor."

Nonetheless, when we choose to live in an urban environment, we are also choosing the reasonable degree of vexation that goes with it.

In another case, a family had a ventilating fan that blew cooking smells out of their kitchen, in the general direction of the house next door.

But this time, when the neighbors went to court to complain, the judge took due note of the fact that the houses were 27 feet apart. At this distance, he said, the degree of annoyance was too slight to awaken the law's disapproval.

The judge said he would not interfere "without some evidence that (the cooking odors) were revolting to a point beyond the effect of ordinary neighborhood exhalations."

Across the Fence

Thunderstorms in the mornings has been the trend for the past week. Gordon Stiles had five head of grown cows that were struck and killed by lightning last Thursday in an electrical storm.

Fifty farmers and ranchers from Beckham County Oklahoma will come to Wheeler on July 10 to our grass observation plots and grazing management research demonstration work. The group will arrive at Wheeler at 12:30 p.m. for lunch at Nora's Cafe in Wheeler. The tour will be coordinated by Herman Seymour, County Extension Director for Beckham County, Oklahoma. The group will leave the Merritt High School, southwest of Elk City at 8:30 a.m. on a 50 passenger activities bus.

Stops will include the Jim Taylor ranch where native grass pasture rotations will be seen and Old World Bluestem will be seen. How They Use Bermuda Grass in a Cow Calf Program will be discussed on Dale Tracey's ranch. At 11:20 a.m. the group will arrive at Bernice Clift's ranch for a tour and discussion of lovegrass production. The rest of the afternoon's program will be of Wheeler County grass research and a tour of Beef Cattle Co. feedlots with a discussion of their operations by Joe R. Weatherly, manager.

If you would like to make this tour let me know. We have blanks available. The first stop at Wheeler will be at 1:30 p.m., Monday July 10, at the Wheeler Gin. That "white stuff" on your favorite rose or crepe myrtle might be powdery mildew.

Numerous shrubs and flowers in Wheeler County are showing symptoms of powdery mildew. This mold first appears as whitish patches on leaves and then spreads over the entire leaf. Such surface growth produces thousands of

fungal spores daily. Winds carry these spores long distances to infest other plants.

Particularly susceptible are phytinia, rose, crepe myrtle, verbena, evonymous and zinnia.

Products containing Benomyl, a relatively new systemic material, are some of the best controls. Other materials including Falpet, Phalton and Actidione PM are also effective. Unfortunately, not all fungicides will control powdery mildew. Check the label to see if the product contains one of the suggested materials.

Generally a spray schedule of every 10 to 14 days is required. Follow the directions on the label of each material used and handle all with care.

Lovegrass pastures have gotten away from us with all the rain we've had. Cattle are spot grazing pastures badly. Spot grazing can reduce cattle gains from 1/2 to 1 pound per day and must be corrected by rotation grazing, spot mowing, and/or spot fertilization.

When lovegrass leaves get more than 40 days old, they become coarse, unpalatable and low in nutritive value. The grass should be grazed while young. If we're going to get the 300-500 pounds of beef weeping lovegrass is capable of making let's get with it now and get the old growth off.

NOTICE! Screwworms have been reported in one case in Donley County-Clairemont. Be on the lookout for screwworms in this area. Collection vials are available at the County Agricultural Agent's office for anyone who needs them. Let's watch this closely as it is predicted that we will have a case or two in this county this summer.

Movie Chatter

"Tora! Tora! Tora!" the mammoth recreation of the events leading up to the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor will be unveiled here this Friday and Saturday at the Rogue Theatre.

Three years in the making, filmed on locations in Japan, Hawaii and Washington, D.C., "Tora! Tora! Tora!" traces the events culminating in the attack of December 7, 1941 -- "the date of infamy" -- that catapulted America into World War II.

Telling the story from both sides as it occurred on the highest diplomatic, political and military levels, it is climaxed by a full scale restaging of the attack itself photographed on the actual locations in Hawaii where it all took place almost 30 years ago, at such historic sites as Ford Island, Hickam and Wheeler Fields, Kole Kole Pass, Schofield Barracks, Waikiki and Aloha Tower.

The story is told in the style of Darryl F. Zanuck's "The Longest Day," intercutting the Japanese side with the American side. Japanese characters speak in Japanese with English subtitles provided for their dialogue.

Extensive official cooperation and assistance was provided by both the Japanese and U.S. governments in authenticating all information, materials and props used in the film. In this sense, "Tora! Tora! Tora!" can be described as a film historical in itself; never before have two former warring nations joined creative minds to make a

motion picture of their first battle.

"Tora! Tora! Tora!" in Japanese means "Tiger! Tiger! Tiger!" This was the code signal flashed by Lt. Cmdr. Mitsuo Fuchida back to the Japanese carrier Akagi to signify his attack squadron had achieved complete surprise in the strike against the U.S. Naval Base, Pearl Harbor.

It is climaxed at 0749 hours of that fateful morning when Cmdr. Fuchida screamed into his inter-com, "Attack! Attack! Attack!" (To! To! To!)

It ends as Japan gains a spectacular-but only fleeting victory over U.S. forces and Admiral Yamamoto, architect of the strike, Harvard educated, and a man who went to war against the U.S. with reluctance, realized the treachery of the act and comments, "All we have done is to awaken a sleeping giant and fill him with a terrible resolve."

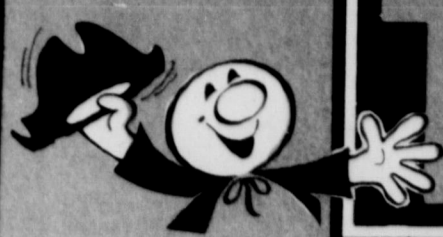
