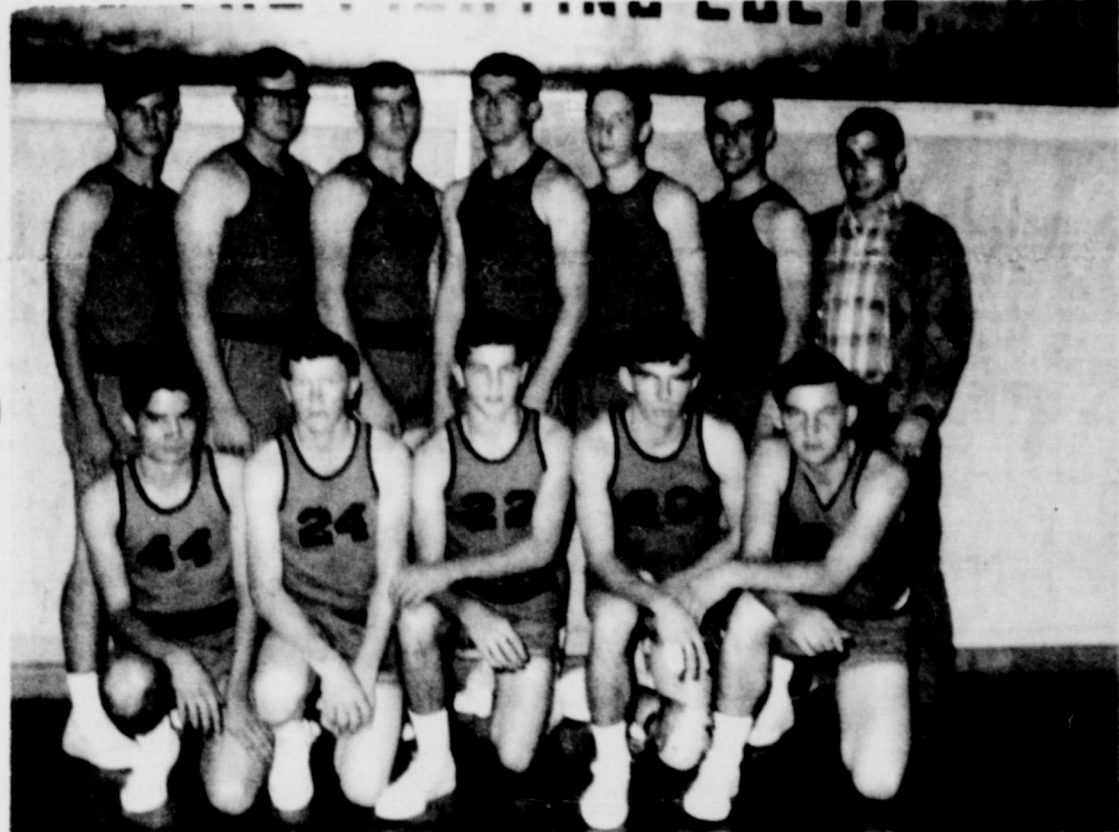

Three Arrested in Narcotics Case

Three persons, two of whom are Wheeler County residents, have been charged with unlawful possession of marijuana after they were arrested late last Tuesday allegedly with the narcotic in their car.

W.R. Lasater, his wife, Christa, both of Wheeler County and William G. Haggerty, 27, of Rochester, N.Y., were charged before Wheeler County Justice of Peace, Cecil Ameron.

They were arraigned and bond was set at \$5,000 each for the Lasaters and Haggerty remains in Wheeler County Jail in lieu of \$5,500 bond.

Wheeler County sheriff's deputies and patrolmen from the Department of Public Safety arrested the trio late Tuesday in the Lasaters' car about one mile north of Shamrock on U.S. 83.

Officers said two boxes of marijuana and some seeds were found in the car.

The narcotics have been taken to the DPS Crime Lab in Austin for analysis.

"We had some information that some hippie-type was bringing the stuff in on the bus and Haggerty was the only one that looked like it," an official said. He described Haggerty as having "long hair and looks like a hippie."

(Buck) Britt Is Buried Wednesday

Clayton, N.M. - Funeral services for W.E. (Buck) Britt, 69, owner of the Pasamonte Ranch near Clayton, who died Monday at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo were held Wednesday morning in the First Methodist Church with Rev. David Shaw, pastor, officiating.

His body was brought to Amarillo Wednesday afternoon for burial at Llano Cemetery under the direction of Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Directors.

A native of Childress, he raised Hereford cattle, Quarter horses and Palominos. A member of the board of directors of LaMesa Park since 1958, Mr. Britt was well known in the New Mexico area as a breeder of race horses.

Survivors include his wife, Elizabeth of the home; a son, Sam of Greenville, a brother, T.M. Britt of Wheeler; a sister, Mrs. E.J. Caperton of Shamrock and five grandchildren.

House Sweat?

 Several people in Wheeler County have mentioned having problems with their homes "sweating." The average home basement and some ground floors rooms trap humidity because the air does not circulate and change constantly. Eventually, excess moisture spreads throughout the house, becomes visible as mildew on wallpaper, up-

holstery, books, furniture rust on tools, loosened veneers and floors. Even worse is the invisible damage--the weakened joints, the warps and strains that show up as ceiling and walls crack later on. The home management specialist, Jay Arrington, at A&M University advises a dehumidifier at the answer to an excess moisture problem.

Some of the dehumidifiers extract water by chemical absorption whereas others operate on refrigeration cycles with a compressor, evaporator and motorized fan. Features vary from model to model, but it is well to look for a dehumidifier with an automatic humidistat which maintains a healthy humidity level.

Dehumidifier for the home range in extraction capacity from 12 pints to 96 pints every 24 hours. The average size unit - 32 to 49 pints capacity controls moisture in areas from 15,000 to 19,000 cubic feet. The majority of today's advantage dehumidifiers are about the size of a table model TV and have the additional advantage of portability. No special wiring or installation is needed. They may be plugged into any standard 115/120 volt convenience outlet. Here's to a dryer house.
