WOFFORD ATTENDS MEETING

Increased public support has enabled the March of Dimes to finance nearly 100 birth defects treatment and research centers as compared with 77 a year ago, according to Harry Wofford.

Mr. Wofford, who is the chairman of the Wheeler County Chapter of The National Foundation-March of Dimes, has just returned from the annual pre-campaign meeting of the voluntary health organization in Dallas, Texas.

Pointing to the fact that National fund-raising receipts increased during the past campaign for the third successive year, Mr. Wofford predicted an increase in Wheeler County during the 30th Anniversary campaign next January.

This prediction was supported by 350 other March of Dimes leaders who attended the meeting.

"Birth defects is the Great Destroyer which snuffs out the lives of half-amillion unborn babies and kills 60,000 children and adults in this country each year, Mr. Wofford stated.

Noting that more than 250,000 American babies are born with defects each year, he said that March of Dimes Birth Defects Centers are developing newknowledge through clinical research and providing skilled treatment to children who afflic-

Your School

"How Good is Your child's School?"

What to Expect of your School First you need to clarify in your own mind what you should expect the school to do for your child. In other words, what are, or what should be, the goals of education?

Too many parents limit their evaluation of elementary schools to how well they are teaching reading, writing and arithmetic and of high school to how well they help meet college admission requirements. These are important, but you should expect more from your school if your child is to become a

well-rounded individual. The best-known and most widely accepted set of purposes of American education is known as the "Seven Cardinal Principles of Education." These principles were first expressed in 1918 by a commission appointed by the National Education Association. Almost 50 years later, in a 1966 survey con-Byers Hostess To ducted by the NEA, American teachers returned an overwhelming verdict in favor of the principles, and

the statement is still considered a valid measuring stick against which to check school curriculum and activities. The "Seven Cardinal Principles" call upon the schools to seek these objectives: Health, Command of Fundamental Processes (including the "three R's), Worthy Home Membership, Vocational Competence, Effective Citizenship, Worthy Use of Lei sure Time and Ethical Character.

Another way of looking at goals of education was stated in 1938 by the Educational Policies Commission of the NEA and the American Association of School Administrators under these four headings: Self-Realization, Human Relationship, Economic Efficiency, and Civic Responsibility.

In 1961, the EPC proposed still another approach to school objectives, The Commission's new proposal holds that the "central purpose" of education should be the development of rational thinking, for rational thinking is essential in the schi evement of all other purposes of education. And all educational activities should be carried out in ways that develop the thinking pro-

Keep these objectives in mind as you appraise your child's school. And keep your mind open.


