J.R. PRICE FORMER COUNTY SHERIFF DIES IN SEMINOLE AT 86

John Riley Price, 86 died Tuesday, Oct. 31, 1967 at the Twilight Acres Rest Home at Seminole, Texas.

Mr. Price was born August 22, 1881 in Tarrant County, Texas and grew up at Bridgeport in Wise Co. In the early 1900's he was a cowboy at Palo Duro Canyon and moved to Wheeler County and worked for A.C. Neel on his ranch, northeast of Wheeler. He later became co-owner of the ranch. Mr. Price served as sheriff of Wheeler County from 1923 until 1927. He sold the ranch in 1929 and moved to Clovis in 1933.

Mr. Price moved to Seagraves in 1939 and went into real estate until his retirement last year.

BUCKS PASS MUSTANGS

If mistakes are made against White Deer, you suffer the consequences and this is the Mustangs did last Friday night as the Bucks put it on Wheeler 32-6.

The Mustangs gave the visiting Bucks two golden opportunities with their kicking game and a misdirected pass which ended with an interception gave the Bucks another and the powerful state ranked bunch turned all three into touchdowns.

It took White Deer just three plays to score the first time they had the ball. Taking the pigskin at their 46 with a punt the Bucks turned Lonnie Lane loose for two plays and they had a first down at the Mustang 14.

Lane got 34 yards at his left end and was knocked out of bounds by Frankie Rogers on the second carry. Stan Bush swept the other end after the Bucks were set back five and the 19 yard scamper was good for six points with just under three minutes having elapsed. Martinez kick was wide for the extra point.

The Mustangs were unable to move and once more had to punt and White Deer seemed destined to get on the scoreboard but a fumble recovery by Donald Rives stopped the drive at the Wheeler 10 yard stripe. Driving out to the 42, the Mustangs were hit by a 15 yard clipping penalty and the Mustangs were forced to punt but had the strong south wind to their backs as the second quarter had just started.

Dave Britt took a little bit too long getting the punt

off and Monte Kries put the big rush on and blocked it and the Bucks had a first down at the Wheeler 16.

Not forgetting the good luck they had at the flanks, the Bucks used Lane at his left end for 12 yards and Bush carried over from the 2 as he swept the Mustangs right side.

The Mustangs took the kickoff and marched to the White Deer 43 where they lost the ball on downs but forced the Bucks to punt and Hawpe's short kick of 18 yards gave Wheeler the ball at the Mustang 42 as time was running out in the half.

Mustangs Meet Tough McLean

The always tough McLean Tigers will be to tame Friday night if the Wheeler Mustangs continue to be successful in their quest of the District 2-a Championship.

As against Claude, the Mustangs will be playing on foreign soil and against a ball club that is fighting to stay in the race. McLean has one district loss, at the hands of Clarendon and a loss to Wheeler will put them out of the race.

Owning victories over Claude and Silverton and sporting a 4 and 4 record, the Tigers bring an impressive defensive record into the contest. No club has been able to dent the Tigers defense for much and anything an opponent gets it dearly earns.

"We have got to have this one and boys know it," Coach Hill said. He went on to say, "The chips are down and nobody knows it more than the boys and I know that they will do a good job. The White Deer game is over and all this bunch wants to do now is get a Tiger."

The weather has hampered drills this week but all of the Mustangs should be in good shape for what shapes up to be one of the best football games in the Panhandle.

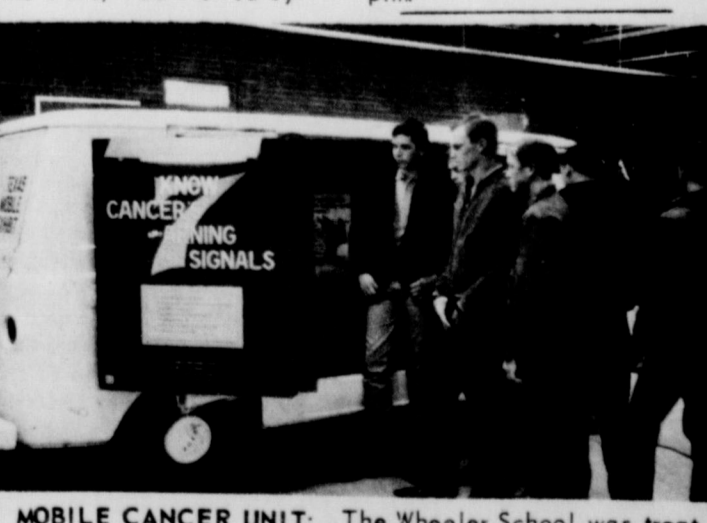
Mobile Caonser Unit Visits School

Colts Fall To Clarendon

A hot band of Clarendon Colts met the Wheeler Colts last Thursday night and even the cool wind couldn't cool them off as they whipped the local crew 28-14.

Playing on a wind swept field, Clarendon jumped into an early 16 point lead which the Colts could never overcome.

Clarendon drove 53 yards for their first touchdown with Longhan going over the Colts left side from one yard out. Gardner added two points and 2:47 remained in the first quarter as Clarendon kicked off to Wheeler.

A blocked punt gave Clarendon a big break and they took over at the Wheeler 4 yard line just four plays following their first score. It took Gardner one play to put Clarendon on the score board again. Tomlinson circled his left end for the two extra points and Wheeler trailed 16-0 as the first quarter ended.

Wheeler had a good scor-

ing opportunity late in the first half when they blocked a Clarendon punt and took over at the Clarendon 8 but were unable to cash in and lost the ball on downs at that point.

Scoring twice more in the second half, the Clarendon Colts built a four touch-down margin before Wheeler got to paydirt.

Dale Stevens got both of the Wheeler touchdowns with the last one coming on the last play of the game. Owning the ball at midfield, Wheeler had only five seconds remaining and it turned out to be the most exciting five seconds of the game. Stevens got around his right end but appeared to be hemmed in by several red shirted Clarendon players about the 35. Breaking free, Stevens sped down the sideline and into the end zone for the Colts final TD. Rodney Weatherly sneaked over for the two points after time had run out bringing the final score to 28-14.

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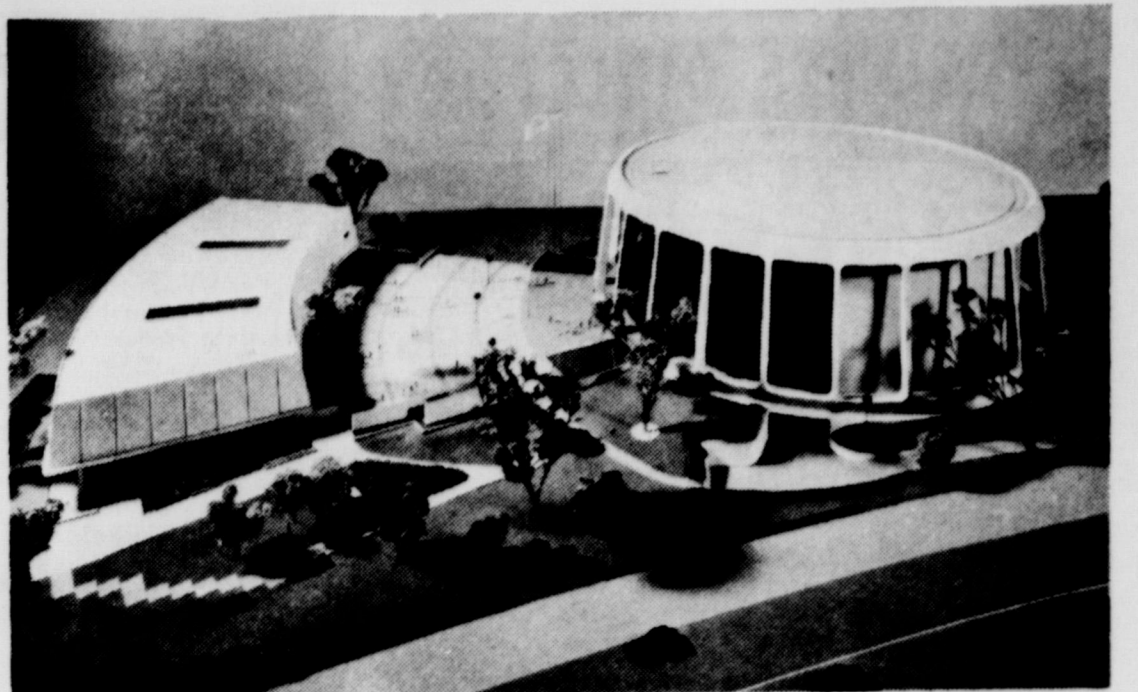

who will receive medals at this year's award banquet. The program will begin at 7:00 p.m. at the Shamrock High School Cafeteria.

Hog Meeting: Twenty hog men representing 7,000 hogs met last Tuesday night in Wheeler. Folks like Ben Griffin, Jim Blakemore, A.D. Eads, Morris Pillers, John P. Ambler, Walter Coward,

Larry Elmore, Glenn Elmore and Jerry Killingsworth were producers from Wheeler County who attended. Meat substitutes, he said are a big threat to our pork business.

A better way to market milo than unloading it at the market at harvest time was outlined at the meeting. Loyd Wilkins, Perryton, said hog farmers could realize sixty seven cents more a hundred pounds of milo by marketing it through hogs. His figures were based on a seventeen cent hog market with the gain costing fourteen cents a pound to put on. This would mean that milo could be marketed for \$2.32 a hundred instead of \$1.65.

Two meetings of interest to Wheeler hog producers were mentioned. The first meeting would be on Nov. 2 at Canyon. John White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture plans to explain the checkoff system that would be used to dock fat hogs a nickle a head if the legislature acted on a pending bill. As we understand it, the money would be used to promote the eating of pork. Those who wanted the nickle would get it back.

The second meeting was to be held Dec. 4 at Canyon. This is to be an educational meeting featuring hog specialists from Southwestern Universities and talks by outstanding producers in our area. This one looks like a bang-up good meeting. For those who don't have a copy of the program, drop by the office as I have a dozen or so extra copies.

Cotton: Government loan price for some first ginned cotton's in W.D. Mitchell at the M & M Gin in Wheeler reported some inch and 1/2 32 cotton bringing a government loan price of \$19.85 with a 46 mi cronair reading grading middling light spot. The cotton was Leonard Reid's.

Your School

"How Good is Your child's School?"

What to Expect of your School

First you need to clarify in your own mind what you should expect the school to do for your child. In other words, what are, or what should be, the goals of education?

Too many parents limit their evaluation of elementary schools to how well they are teaching reading, writing and arithmetic and of high school to how well they help meet college admission requirements. These are important, but you should expect more from your school if your child is to become a well-rounded individual.

The best-known and most widely accepted set of purposes of American education is known as the "Seven Cardinal Principles of Education." These principles were first expressed in 1918 by a commission appointed by the National Education Association. Almost 50 years later, in a 1966 survey conducted by the NEA, American teachers returned an overwhelming verdict in favor of the principles, and the statement is still considered a valid measuring stick against which to check school curriculum and activities. The "Seven Cardinal Principles" call upon the schools to seek these objectives: Health, Command of Fundamental Processes (including the "three R's"), Worthy Home Membership, Vocational Competence, Effective Citizenship, Worthy Use of Leisure Time and Ethical Character.

Another way of looking at goals of education was stated in 1938 by the Educational Policies Commission of the NEA and the American Association of School Administrators under these four headings: Self-Realization, Human Relationship, Economic Efficiency, and Civic Responsibility.

In 1961, the EPC proposed still another approach to school objectives, The Commission's new proposal holds that the "central purpose" of education should be the development of rational thinking, for rational thinking is essential in the achievement of all other purposes of education. And all educational activities should be carried out in ways that develop the thinking process.

Keep these objectives in mind as you appraise your child's school. And keep your mind open.

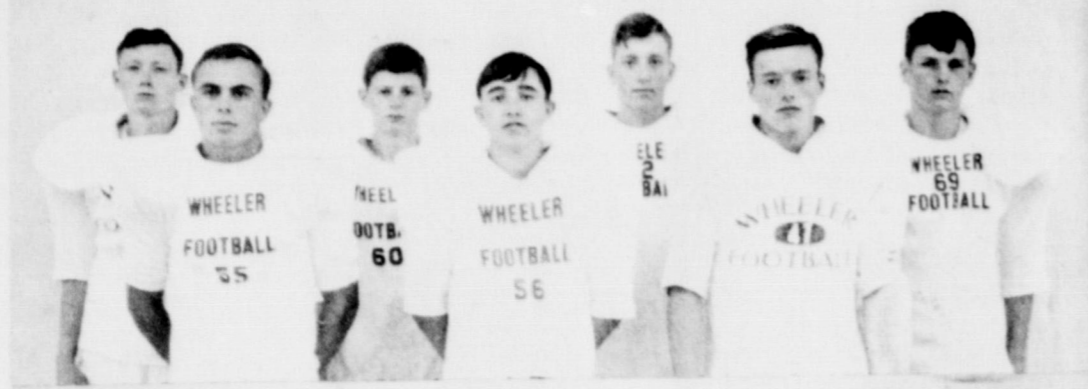
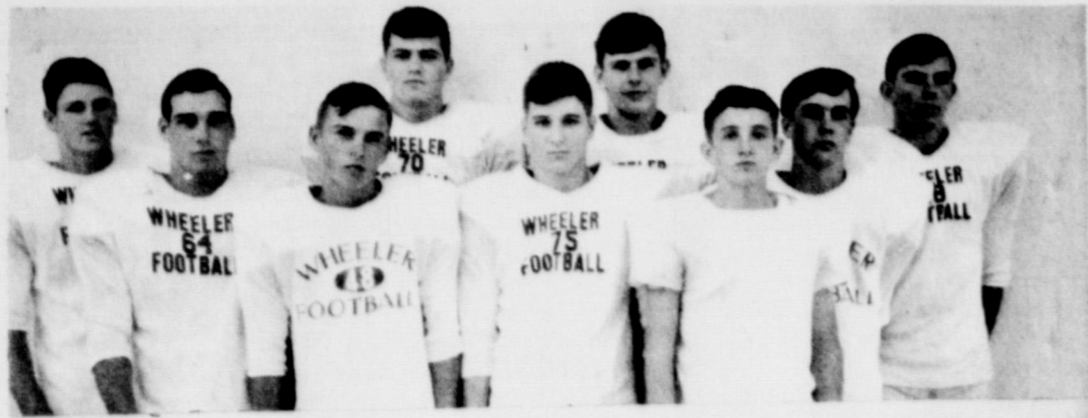
