6 AMMENDMENTS ON BALLOT SATURDAY

It's election week once more all over Texas.

Voters in 254 counties will decide Saturday (Nov. 11) whether they want six more amendments to the State's Constitution.

A light-to-moderate vote is predicted. November 11 is opening day of the deer and turkey hunting season in most counties. This means a lot of hunters will be in the field instead of the voting booth.

However, election day also is Veterans Day and backers of the proposed amendment to revive the Veterans Land Program are staging an active get-out-the-vote campaign. So are supporters of two other amendments—the one authorizing the state to issue bonds to finance expansion of the Texas Parks system and that permitting state officials and employees to hold more than one office.

Six constitutional amendments are on the ballot in the following order:

Proposition 1 on the Ballot You vote FOR or AGAINST "the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

This is a proposal to amend Article VIII, Sec. 9 of our State Constitution, which names the funds for which a county may levy ad valorem taxes and provides that the total levy for General Fund, Permanent Improvement Fund, Road and Bridge Fund and Jury Fund purposes shall not exceed eighty cents. The same section also authorizes an additional fifteen cent ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of public roads, if approved by the voters.

This section formerly set a maximum tax rate for each of the four funds. In 1956 it was amended to eliminate these maximums so long as the total of the tax levies for these four funds as by the commissioners court does not exceed eighty cents on the \$100 valuation.

The only change made by the amendment to be voted on in November would be to add the following words: "Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund without regard to the purpose or source of each tax."

Proponents say that the amendment would allow counties which exceed money in one fund to transfer this money for use by other funds which are short or exhausted. This flexibility would sometimes forestall a need for additional taxes.

Opponents of the amendment express apprehension that, if free and unlimited transfer of money between these four major county funds is allowed, some internal cash controls that safeguard the assets of the county will be lost.

The interpretation and the application of the amendment, if it is adopted, may depend largely on the views of the county auditor or other fiscal officer in each of the counties.

Proposition 2 on the Ballot You vote FOR or AGAINST "the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

Proposition 3 on the Ballot You vote FOR or AGAINST "the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-c, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such

funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Proposition 4 on the Ballot You vote FOR or AGAINST "the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables, and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

Proposition 5 on the Ballot You vote FOR or AGAINST "the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-e of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Seventy-five

Million Dollars (\$75,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Park Development Fund to acquire lands for State Park sites and to develop State Parks."

Proposition 6 on the Ballot You vote FOR or AGAINST

"The constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state of the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."



FIRE The Wheeler Fire Department was called to the scene of a fire at the west edge of Wheeler Thursday evening. A 3-room house with attached shed was completely destroyed by the blaze. GAS PROCESSING PLANT TO BE LOCATED NEAR MOBEETIE

Gerlane Petroleum Company, Inc. has announced plans to build a new gas processing plant in the 50-acre Mobeetie Field, Wheeler County, in the Texas Panhandle.

E. E. Thorne, president of Gerlane, stated that the plant would be located near the townsite of Mobeetie, with construction to begin in the near future to meet scheduled completion in April, 1969. He added that the normal gas throughput would be 12,000,000 cu. ft. per day, yielding 19,000 gallons natural gas liquids, and that plant capacity would be 16,000,000 cu. ft. per day and 24,000 gallons natural gas liquids. Plant process will be the refrigerated-oil absorption type, operating at 150 pounds pressure. Cost of the plant project was not disclosed.

The Mobeetie Field is a multi-pay area consisting of five producing zones, namely the Missouri (gas), Upper Missouri (oil & gas), Dogleg (gas), Ellenberger (gas), and Atoke (gas). Gerlane's plant will process all gas produced in the field, which is sold by producers to pipeline. All gas is gathered and delivered by producers' and pipe line company facilities. Gerlane is operating here is Breckenridge, Texas.

Missionary Will Speak at Church

The Rev. Hubert L. Sone, a Methodist missionary to China and Malaysia for 42 years, will speak at the First Methodist Church, in Wheeler, Sunday evening, Nov. 12 at 7:00 P.M. His topic will be "Working With Christ in Asia." Also, he will show color slides and have a question and answer period.

Dr. Sone of Fort Worth, retired in 1962. Going out first as a missionary to China, Dr. Sone arrived in 1920, was assigned to teach in Soochow University and later did evangelistic work in the city of Huchow. In 1933 he was appointed to the faculty of the union Nankin Theological Seminary as professor of Old Testament.

Dr. Sone served in Nanking until 1951, two years after the communist take-over of mainland China. In that year, he left China and was transferred to Singapore, Malaysia (now a part of Malaysia). He was appointed to the faculty of the union Trinity Theological College in Singapore, where many Methodist ministers and church leaders in Malaysia and the nations of Southeast Asia are trained. He taught and served as President of that college until his retirement.

Dr. Sone grew up in Plainview and attended Clarendon College, taught school in Dumas before he became a missionary.

This first hand information on Southeast Asia should help all of us to understand more fully, the Asian mind and spirit.

TIGERS UPSET MUSTANGS 12-7

Wheeler climaxed an 86 yard drive early in the fourth period Friday night to break a scoreless deadlock with McLean, but the Tigers came storming back to score twice and take a 12-7 decision in the important District 2-A clash.

Fullback Fred Good powered over from the nine yard line with 9:43 on the clock to set the stage for the fourth stanza fireworks. The conversion attempt was good and Wheeler was ahead 7-0.

Wheeler and McLean now stand 2-1 in District A-1 and Wheeler is 5-4 for the season and McLean 5-4.

Fullback Thacker Haynes and quarterback Joel McCarty spearheaded a 70 yard drive to put McLean back in the ball game. Haynes gave the drive its impetus when he unreeling a 23 yard dash on the first play of the series. The junior fullback plunged over from the four yard line to cap the drive with 6:20 left in the game. The two point conversion attempt was no good.

Wheeler attempted to go on the march again, but the drive bogged down at their

own 44 and forced them to punt.

A high snap from center ball and McLean recovered on the Mustangs' 30.

Haynes again was the big gun for the Tigers. He scampered down to the 15 on the first play of the series and came up with the big play on a critical third-and-five situation at the 10. With first down and goal to go about a foot from paydirt, the Tigers hammered away and Haynes plunged in from inches out with 46 seconds to go. The conversion attempt was no good and McLean led 12-7.

The Mustangs moved to the air and quarterback Bobby Ware engineered his charges down to the McLean 19. But time ran out to kill the Mustang threat.

Victory for the Tigers set the stage for a possible repeat of last year's three-way tie for the district crown by Wheeler, McLean and Clarendon.

Clarendon, which downed Silverton 29-20 is now the district leader at 3-P. But if Wheeler should beat Clarendon next week, the district race would again have to be decided by the toss of a coin.

Veterans News AVAILABLE FOR VETERANS

Most of the 60,000 veterans returning to civilian life each month will be buying homes that are comparable in quality to the homes many World War II veterans "traded up" to after years of building equity in their less expensive first homes. Jack Coker of the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office said that nationally 130,000 veterans have applied for loans under the 1966 G.I. Bill. Many of the homes bought by this group, he says, are in the \$17,000 class. The average home bought on a G.I. loan immediately after World War II cost \$5,395.

Vietnam era veterans and cold war veterans are eligible for home loans and most other benefits on the same basis as veterans of other wars. They must have at least 181 days active military service with at least one day of that service after January 31, 1955. Veterans can get a VA guarantee for up to \$7,500 of a home loan, Coker said, for 10 years after discharge, plus one year for each three months of active duty.

It was the World II G.I. loan program, Coker theorizes, that accounted for much of the upgrading in homes for veterans. World War II veterans purchased homes at the rate of half a million per year, he said, and few could afford down payments. A VA guarantee allowed them to get loans from private lenders and the equity they

built up while making payments on this first home put many of them in a position to buy a larger home with conventional financing in later years. During the housing boom of 1951-1955, when nearly 7.5 million new nonfarm homes were started, VA loans financed the purchase of nearly one of every five houses built. More than 70 percent of World War II veterans have bought homes since returning to civilian life and over 40% used a VA loan.

As of October 1, the VA will be authorized to make direct loans in certain areas up to \$25,000, instead of being limited to \$17,500 as before. Veterans interested in a guaranteed or direct home loan can secure further information from the Regional Office at 1400 North Valley Mills Dr., Waco, Texas 76710.

WASHINGTON REPORT

By Bob Price, Congressman 18th Congressional District

I have introduced a bill known as the Balanced Economic Development Act which could, I believe, reverse the trend of farm migration to big cities and help revitalize our rural areas.

This is forcing farmers to adopt every possible mechanization to get their crops planted, cultivated and harvested. The machinery is very costly and is beyond the means of the smaller and medium-sized farmers. They are going out of business. The larger farmers with credit resources and the small family groups who are less than a living wage are the only ones able to survive.

And, unless we can find a way to pay fair prices for the production of food, we are headed for a corporate-type, conglomerate agriculture that will force thousands and thousands more rural people into the cities.

The American people want some balance between the rural and the urban sectors. There should be some opportunity for those who wish to live in the country to find decent work there and to have access to reasonably good education and health services.

And the flood of migrants is no better for the cities than for the declining rural areas.

The result of this economic imbalance has been substandard housing, polluted air, uncontrolled crime in the streets, congested highways, rundown schools and unrest among certain minority groups.

CONSUMER EDUCATION—Clothing

Do words like Fastel, Zefran, Dynel, Kodel, Creslan, Arnel, Vinyon, Vycron, Fortisan confuse you when you purchase a fabric or clothing? Don't you wonder, "Do you wash it or dry clean it?" There are so many textiles on the market today, that how to clean the fabrics is no longer a simple problem of wash or dry clean. So don't fret when you don't have the answers on how to clean them all. Very few people do.

Many of today's fabrics are blends. Cleaning characteristics vary with the kinds of fibers combined and the proportions used. Some of the blends that are rated as having good wash-and-wear qualities are as follows: 65% or more Dacron with cotton; 55% or more Dacron with rayon; 50% or more Dacron with Orlon; 75% or more Orlon with rayon; 70% or more with Orlon with wool; 80% or more Orlon with cotton; 80% or more Acrilan with cotton; 70% or more Acrilan with rayon; 70% or more

for cleaning at the side. If at anytime the homemaker is in doubt about cleaning, she could refer to her notebook.

Sometimes washing instructions are given but are very vague such as "washable," or "do not dry clean." What does washable mean? Can you wash it in the machine or must it be done by hand? Do you use hot, warm or cold water? Mild soap or detergent? The washing instructions just takes the responsibility off the manufacturer, but it could leave the consumer with a ruined garment.

Also keep in mind the complete garment - dress, slip, suit or etc. A dress made of washable fabric could be trimmed with a material whose color would run.

The National Institute of Dry Cleaning suggests these ideas to protect yourself.

1. Do not buy products that do not carry complete cleaning instructions, that you do not know to clean from previous experience, or that the store can't tell you how to clean.
2. Don't throw away hang tags. Keep information handy.
3. Read labels carefully, particularly the small type with detailed instructions.
4. In some cases you may be able to locate a brand with a round seal with the words "Certified Washable. American Institute of Laundering" meaning that sample of the product have passed the institute's test for washability.
5. Where shrinkage is important, look for a manufacturer's guarantee. When not guaranteed, buy the article a size larger and let it shrink to shape.

No matter how careful you are there is always a chance of being stuck with an improperly labeled product. So as a final precaution shop at stores that will give you a refund for unsatisfactory merchandise.

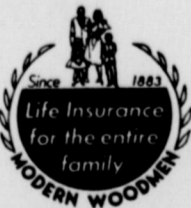

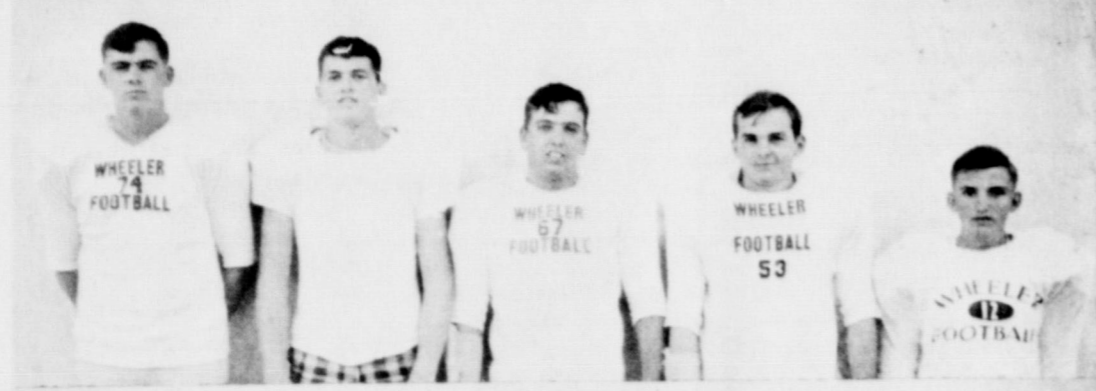
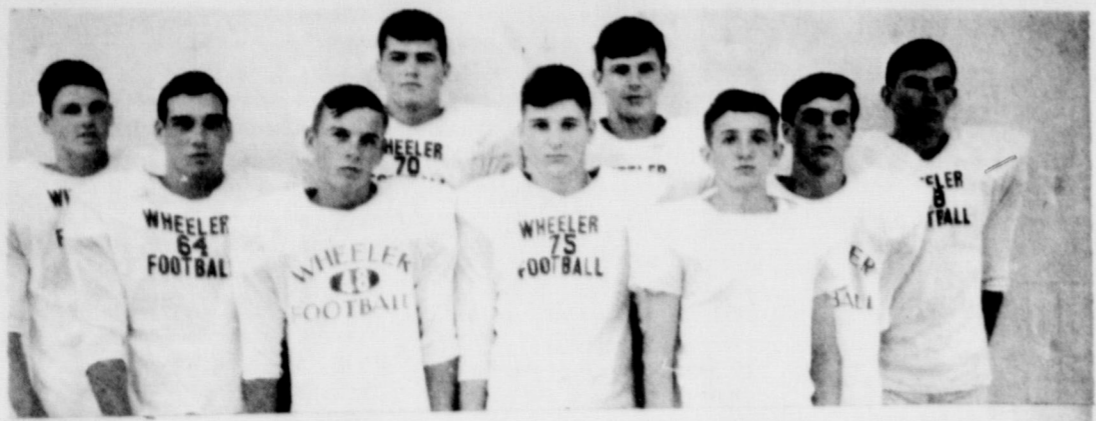
