

turkey you will buy? Size of the ready to cook bird may range from 4 to 24 pounds and larger--from fryer roasters to large toms. Practically all turkeys retailed -are young (3 to 6 months) quickly grown and suited to much methods of cooking as broiling, frying or roasting. Boneless turkey is increasing in volume--boned and rolled, both cooked and uncooked. Boneless cooked turkey rolls are a real convenience item.

for buying are based on the number of servings you can expect to get from various sized birds. When buying whole ready-to-cook turkeys under 12 pounds, allow 34 to I pound per serving. For larger birds allow 1/2 to 3/4 pound. With uncooked boneless turkey roasts allow 1/3 poundper serving. The following is a guide for turkey size and number of servings:

keys are more economical and they are excellent for use in future meals.

The majority of turkeys are sold frozen and thawing requires special care. There are two recommended procedures for thawing: (1) Thaw in the refrigerator in the original wrap or on a tray. This requires one to three days, depending on the size of the turkey. (2) Thaw the bird, still in its original water tight wrap under running water (cold) or emmerced in cold water changing the water frequently. Thi sprocedure requires 6 to 7 hours for larger sizes.

Thawing at room temperature is not recommended because of the possibility of contamination.
