BLOOD MOBILE TO BE HERE WEDNESDAY

This is the final call for blood donors in the Red Cross blood mobile on Wednesday, August 2, 1967. Please note all people must be between the ages of 21-60, be in good health, meet these requirements: must be at least 18 and 21 years of age; must be at the mobile on August 2, 9 to 1. The young people are invited to participate also - if you are between 18 and 21 years of age with the consent of the parent. The form to be signed by the parent to sign will be ready for you and your parents signature. Please read these instructions carefully as to who should give. Of course the doctor's attendance will make the final decision as to whether you should or should not give.

A. REGARDING IMMUNIZATION:
1. Rabies: one year after last shot.
2. Small - Pox: Two weeks for "Two Weeks for "No Take." for "Take" after scab comes off.
3. Yellow Fever: Two weeks after last shot.
4. Typhoid: 24 hr. after last shot.
Typhus: 24 hr. after last shot.
Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever: 24 hr. after last shot.
Influenza: 24 hr. after last shot.
Tetanus: 24 hours after last shot.
Cholera: 24 hr. after last shot.

Diphtheria: 24 hr. after last shot.
Polio: 24 hours after last shot.
Sabin Vaccine: (oral) no waiting period.
B. Vitamin, hormone, liver, antibodies and related products and other injections-donor must be evaluated by the physician on an individual basis.
Cortisone - 1 month after last dose.
C. EXPOSURE TO CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS DISEASES:
If donor has been exposed to infectious or contagious diseases in or out of the home, he should not be scheduled for three weeks.

If there is more than one child in the family, he should not be scheduled for three weeks after the last patient has recovered.
DIET
PROPER DIET: It is important that you eat to maintain your strength, "but avoid fatty foods for four hours PRIOR to donation."
Suggested Breakfast: Fruit, fruit juices with generous amounts of sugar. Cream of Wheat or oatmeal with sugar and trim milk, toast with jam, jelly or honey. (no butter.)
Suggested Lunch: Clear soups without fats, sandwiches (no butter or mayonnaise) roast beef,

tongue chicken, lettuce, tomato, onion or cucumber (catsup), eggs, if eaten, boiled or poached.
Vegetables: prepared without fat. Bread: toast or crackers, no butter.
Salad: Vegetable, fruit or dairy cottage (no mayonnaise or oil dressing.) Use lemon juice, vinegar, salt or sugar.
Dessert: jello or fruit.
ADVISABLE TO FORCE LIQUIDS: Any carbonated drinks, coffee, tea (without cream), water.
FOODS EXCLUDED: Fried foods, cream, butter, mayonnaise, oil dressings, peanut butter, gravy, ham, bacon, pastries, nuts and chocolate.

Following are revisions of "Instructions to Blood Donors."
1. Proper diet:
While it is not desirable for donors to ingest heavy, fatty meals, they should not go without food at the regular mealtime prior to donation. Light refreshment such as fruit juices, bread crackers, dry toast, raw vegetables, jam, jelly or honey, skimmed milk, black coffee or tea is desirable during a 4-hour period prior to donation.
Please do "not" eat fats (such as cream, butter, fatty meats or fried food) for at least 4 hours before your appointment.

2. Fire-fighters:
Volunteer or regular fire-fighters should not donate blood within 36 hours of a possible call-for-duty. In smaller communities where much dependence is placed on the volunteer fire-fighter, it would be advisable to divide these volunteers into two groups, each group to donate alternately.

Arrington's grave at Mobeetie has arrived. The dedication of these two markers will be held at the Old Settlers Reunion at Mobeetie, Sept. 4. The marker for Mobeetie is located at the caution light between old and new Mobeetie on highway 152. The marker was paid for by Mabel Arrington and Isabel Huselby, daughters of Mark Huselby. Curtis Kidwell, Maintenance Foreman with the Texas Highway Dept. and his men are responsible for having erected the sign. Markers for Pagan Community and Stiles' Rock Barn have been paid for and approved. Mrs. Paul Macina collected \$110 in donations to pay for the marker to be placed at the Pagan School. The Marker for the Rock Barn on Stiles Ranch was paid for by the Stiles family. Beverly Whittle of Shamrock is working on seven historical markers for North Wheeler County. Plummer Stage Coach Stand, location where Shamrock Methodist Church was organized, North Ward School, Elwood Park, Exum House and the Town of Shamrock. Myrtle Cowan Rites Are Read Wed.

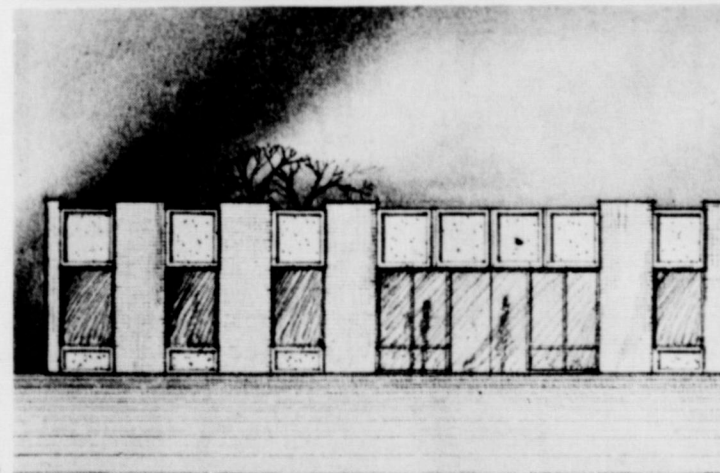

FIRST STATE BANK DISPLAYS DRAWING OF NEW BANK FACILITIES

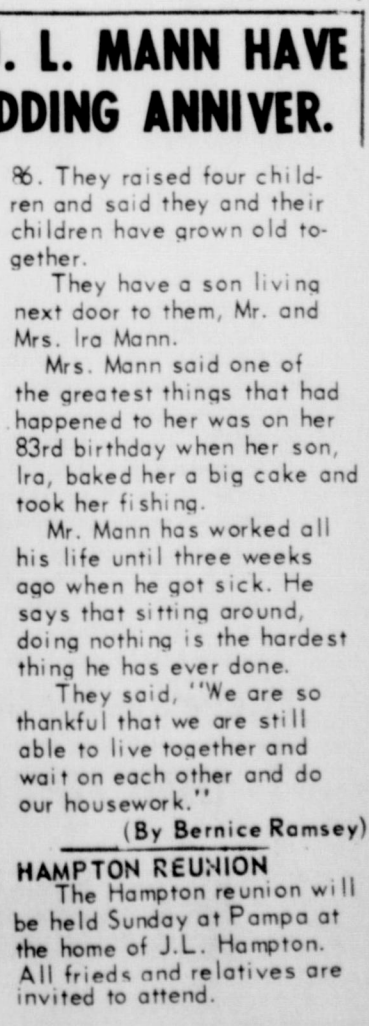

Many of the gardeners are finding that the squash vines are just full. There are so many, that your family couldn't possibly eat them all. Not only that, but they are getting tired to boiled squash, fried squash and baked squash. After all squash is a good source of Vitamin A which helps prevent night blindness and it would be sad to see them go to waste. Try this recipe for variety.

Chicken Baked Squash
3 cups cubed yellow squash
2 T. butter or margarine
1 can condensed cream of chicken soup undiluted
1/2 cup chopped nuts
2 T. chopped pimento

1/4 cup soft bread crumbs
2 T. melted butter or margarine

Alternate layers of squash bit of butter, soup, nuts and pimento in casserole. Top with bread cubes and butter, tossed together, bake at 375 degrees F., 40 minutes or until tender. Serves six.

One of our neighbors, Mrs. Nola Wright, has been kind enough to share with us her favorite recipe.

Cream Raisin Pie
2 cups sugar
3 large eggs
3 T. vinegar
6 T. milk
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves and nutmeg
1/4 cup margarine
1 cup raisins

Prepare unbaked pie crust. Mix together the ingredients. Spread the raisins on the bottom of pie crust. Pour ingredients over the raisins. Cook.

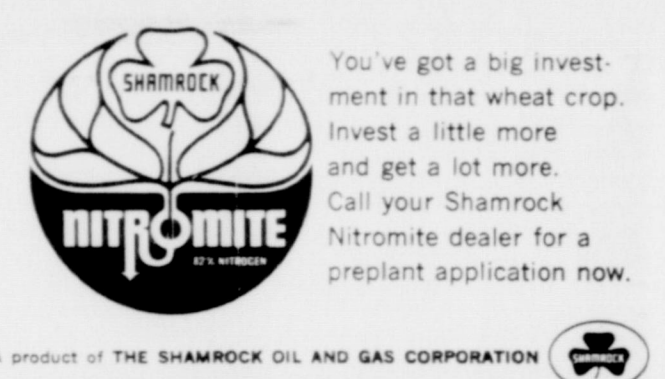

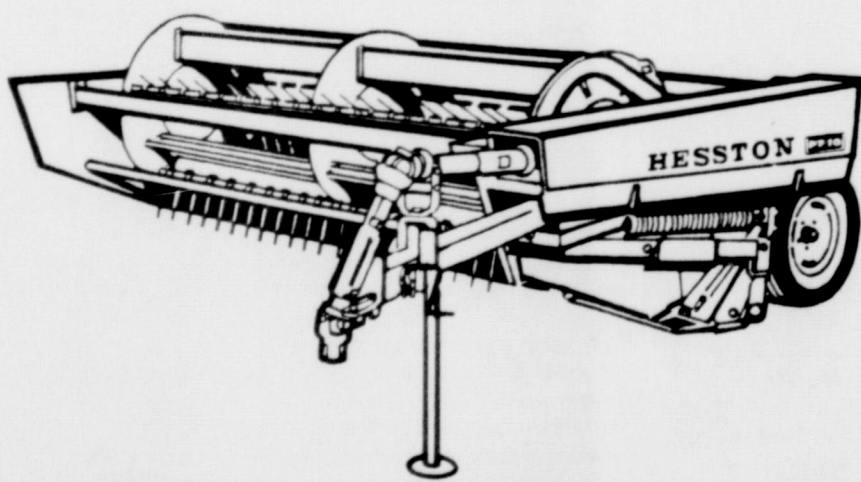

ACROSS THE FENCE
 By Max Hatter, WCAG

Lots of moisture and high humidity has turned what looked like a real good year into a little less than that cause' Boll Weevils in cotton and plant lice on maize are out to get their share too. Infestations of boll weevils in some fields are approaching 25-30 percent and punctured squares in some fields looked like that good old Baylor line when mighty Mo wanted to give Edd Hargett a little running room last year.

A&M Entomologists say Guthian is most effective of several insecticides for boll weevils. Some of our cotton farmers have decided to "fly it on." We have the guide at no cost at our office in the courthouse in Wheeler listing the materials needed if control is necessary. We understand that you may want to consider control if 20-25% of 100 random selected squares are punctured. Most of our infestations run around 10-12 percent.

Then there's the scare in the High Plains about maize Dwarf Mosaic, a disease supposed to cut yields in half. We have all the ingredients here to have some too. Johnson grass, plant lice and maize. The aphid is supposed to be overwintered in the Johnson Grass which is the source of infection and then transmit the virus to maize fields.

County 4-H Record Books:

Insects: Be on the lookout for buildup of aphids or plant lice in Okra and Squash Bugs on squash. Aphids cause bacterial wilt as they transmit the wilt organism. Use 5-10% malathion dust or spray on aphids and Sevin on squash bugs.

Briscoe Board meets Aug. 3rd at 8:30, to review the budget for the upcoming year.

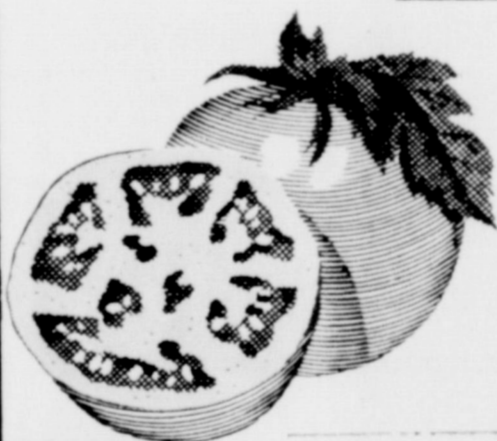
