DARVILLE ATHERTON IS NAMED THE OUTSTANDING COMEBACK FARMER

Mr. and Mrs. Darville Atherton of Briscoe have been selected as the Outstanding Comeback Farmer of this area. The following is the article which was submitted to the judges of this contest.

A spark from a douser battery against butane pressure, a violent explosion, and the beautiful June morning of 1967 was ripped apart for the Atherton family! Only seconds before, Darville Atherton and his two sons, Arville 19, and Rusty 16, had been busy cleaning a bulldozer radiator with the butane pressure; then, they were burned so badly that it was a miracle that even two of them survived. Four weeks later, Arville died as a result of his burns while his father, Darville, pondered the physician's diagnosis that he (Darville) would never be able to use his hands again.

To Darville Atherton, a man who had already received a thirty percent disability in World War II, the diagnosis only served as a challenge. In 1944, the famed 1st Marine Division stationed at Guadalcanal was in the process of landing in the Pelew Islands when artillery hit Darville's landing craft, blowing it out of the water. He received his thirty percent disability as a result of the explosion.

It is apparent that personal tragedy is no stranger to

this Wheeler County farmer. It has marred his life first as a young man serving his country and again as a devoted father trying to teach his sons the value and joy of work.

Today, Atherton is known as a hardworking farmer and rancher who not only overcame severe hardship and personal tragedy, but helped heal the land and soil as well. Overcoming the pitfalls and heartache that life has dealt him were probably not the only handicap laid in the way of this Comeback Farmer.

Darville is especially proud of the fact that his oldest son Rusty, is following in his dad's footsteps. Rusty, is presently a Marine stationed at 29 Palms, California while completing an electronics training course. Rusty has had a longtime ambition to return to the farm.

Twenty-three years ago, Darville Atherton didn't have a thing. Today, although he has some debts, he owes relatively little. In a few weeks he plans to make the final mortgage payment on his 120 acres located about thirteen miles east and eight miles north of Wheeler. The next project he has in mind is a new modern home for the family.

Things weren't always going so well. As a child, with his father in a Tubercu-

losis Sanitarium, the bulk of the farm chores were allocated to Darville and his brothers. Cotton and milo was grown and harvested by hand and mule power then. The ability to overcome hardship and adversity stuck with him, strengthening his belief in hardwork.

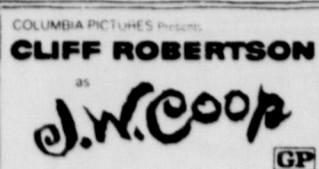
Returning from the war, Darville married a Briscoe girl in 1947 and for the next two winters he drove back and forth daily to work in road and bridge construction at Borger. In 1948 he returned to farming as a share cropper raising milo and cotton on thirds and fourths. For four years he ran a dairy to supplement his crop income. By carefully managing his income, he was able to purchase his first place - 640 acres. In the late 1950's, with an operating loan from the Farmer's Home Administration, he bought forty-five head of cattle and started to build his herd. Now, a hundred mother cows have helped increase his income. The carrying capacity of his land has doubled since he bought it. In 1963 he bought another section of land and in 1967 added another 120 acres.

Everything his cattle eat is raised on the farm. Atherton weans an amazing ninety-five percent calf crop. A practice he believes in is running a

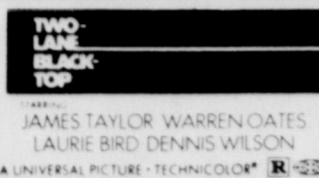

The rains may come too late for our wheat crop. Moisture is badly needed for newly seeded lovegrass plantings.

N.L. Sechrist's peaches appear to be gone. The frost got most of 'em.

There may be a better way to control elm leaf beetles. A result demonstration conducted by the County Agent at Spearman showed that 15% granular Di-syston, a systemic chemical, at the rate of 2 1/2 ounces per inch of trunk diameter would control 98% of the elm leaf beetle damage. One of the biggest drawbacks to spraying in our area has been the lack of adequate equipment to reach the tops

of the tallest trees. The Di-syston gets into the say of the trees and control is brought about when the insect bites into the leaf surface. A number of milo producers have been controlling greenbugs the last few years with di-syston. Mrs. C.J. Meek of Wheeler said elm leaf beetles that hibernated in her attic last winter were coming into the house. They're certainly a pest to be watched.

They're selecting club calves all over the county. Tommy and Cindy Christner of Wheeler have joined the Wheeler Rocker 4-H club. Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Christner, have selected two Charolais-Angus cross-bred steer calves for their 1977-78 project. PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

Pat Palmer, CHDA, always hearing about the kinds of diets. True adequate nutrition - many are not. Be check to see if it's balanced before entering your health by...

Fruit and Vegetable Group - 4 or more servings of fruits and vegetables; include - A citrus fruit or other fruit or vegetable that contains Vitamin C. A dark green or deep yellow vegetable for Vitamin A at least every other day. Other vegetables and fruits to complete the requirements of 4.

Meat Group - 2 or more servings of beef, veal, pork, lamb, poultry, fish or eggs. Dry beans, peas, and nuts contain protein so they may be used as alternates.

Bread & Cereal Group - 4 or more servings of all breads and cereals that are whole grain, enriched, or restored. Cooked cereals, ready-to-eat cereals, cornmeal, crackers, flour, macaroni, spaghetti, noodles, rice, rolled oats, baked goods (if made with enriched or whole grain flour).

The above can serve as a guide to check your diet to see if you're getting the nutrients you need. Your doctor can and should give his approval to any diet that you might use.

People eat first with their eyes. Then with their taste buds. To me, nothing looks any more appetizing than strawberries, whether they are served by themselves, with cream, in shortcake, pies or cakes!

I know of several people in the county who do grow strawberries. Seems like the first batch of ripe berries from a garden are always so good!

A hidden bonus in strawberry eating, lies in their nutritive value, they're high in Vitamin C. A half-cup of strawberries -- a dish of strawberries and cream or a large piece of strawberry pie -- give you all the Vitamin C you need for a day. Strawberries that ripen on the plant contain more Vitamin C than those picked half-ripe and held until fully ripe.

From reading, I noticed that glass ovenware coated with Teflon II is now available in a variety of sizes. Various casserole and bake sets feature easy-care, scratch-resistant Teflon II interiors. Colors include poppy or avocado with a black interior, and white and blue flowers teamed with a blue interior. Should be easy cleaned.

Many of you may have this recipe, because it is such a good one. For those of you who don't, here it is. (This dish prepared by a girl from Gray Co. won the fruit & vegetable division in the District Food Show)

Broccoli Casserole
1 1/2 tsp. dried celery flakes
1/4 cup chopped onion

2 10oz. pkg. frozen broccoli spears
1 can cream of chicken soup
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
2 tbsp. water
2 tbsp. margarine
3/4 cup instant rice
3/4 cup milk
8 oz. sliced American cheese flakes. Combine celery flakes, onion, broccoli, rice, cream of chicken soup, milk and Worcestershire sauce. Layer broccoli mixture and cheese in 1 qt. casserole dish and top with remaining cheese. Bake at 325° for 35 min. or until browned on edges. Serves 6-8.

bull to fifteen-twenty head of cows.
 As a cooperator in the Great Plains Program since 1963, he has seeded Indian grass, side oats, grama, little bluestem and switch grass with all of his land being reseeded. Range land is sprayed regularly and cross fenced. As a pioneer irrigation farmer in the county he started with water from the creek. Now, he has three drilled wells and enough irrigation equipment to water 180 acres of alfalfa and some midland bermuda grass.

Alfalfa is his major crop and he produces an average of seven tons per acre each year. For over twenty years he and his family have custom baled 50-75,000 bales, annually, for other farmers in the community. He operates a baler, swather, truck and loader. His wife, Sammy Lee, drives the tractor. The whole family works because as Darville explains, you can't get help when you need it. Haybaling starts at 11:00 and may continue till daylight; most folks don't want to work those hours.

The 160 acres alfalfa field was once a pack-marked sand hill cut with gulleys fifteen feet deep. A bulldozer was hired and later purchased to do the necessary filling and leveling required. Today, he can easily produce seven tons of hay per acre.

Tanned, weathered skin marks Darville as a man who likes to be out doing things. He is modest about his conservation achievements. His kindly humor and unassuming manner apparently contributed to his uncanny ability to overcome hardship. He has membership in the Farmer's Union, the Farm Bureau, American Legion, is a Master Mason and has served the Briscoe Baptist Church for several years. For seven years he was a member of the Briscoe School Board.

He has served as assistant Sunday School Superintendent and Church Treasurer for the Briscoe Baptist Church for the last few years. Helping underprivileged children in the community is one of his long range goals. One time he helped a Mexican-American boy buy a motorcycle so he could come and help with farm work and hold a job. When the job was over and the teenager left, Darville still found himself paying for a motorcycle.

Darville believes the future of farming in our area looks good. He thinks the farmers will have to make what they have produce more, instead of buying more land. "Using wise conservation and reclamation techniques,

Booby Trap for Trespassers



Sure enough, that very night a trespassing youth touched off the gun and received a bullet in the leg.
 In due course, the victim filed suit against Harper for damages. At the trial, the latter insisted he had a right to use force to protect his property against intruders who were bent on mischief.
 But the court held that the method he had chosen was too drastic, merely for the prevention of petty theft. The judge said deadly weapons could not be used when there was no personal danger to either the property owner or his family.
 Generally speaking, a property owner cannot use greater force by means of a booby trap than he could use if he were on the scene in person. Even vicious dogs, left at large, have been frowned upon as a kind of booby trap.
 "A savage dog," observed one judge, "is a dangerous instrument."
 Nonetheless, milder measures may be justified. Take this case: A suburban home owner, tired of having trespassers tramping across his lawn, stretched a barbed wire fence from a corner of his house to a corner of the lot.
 Not long afterward, a man was hurt trying to scale the fence. Suing for damages, he charged that such a fence was "meant to injure people."
 But the court decided that the fence, with its barb in plain sight, was meant simply to make trespassing more difficult — a perfectly legitimate purpose for a property owner.
 It is worth mention, however, that this particular fence was not placed alongside a public sidewalk. In some communities, that would be forbidden by local ordinance. Reason: too much chance of injuring an innocent passerby.

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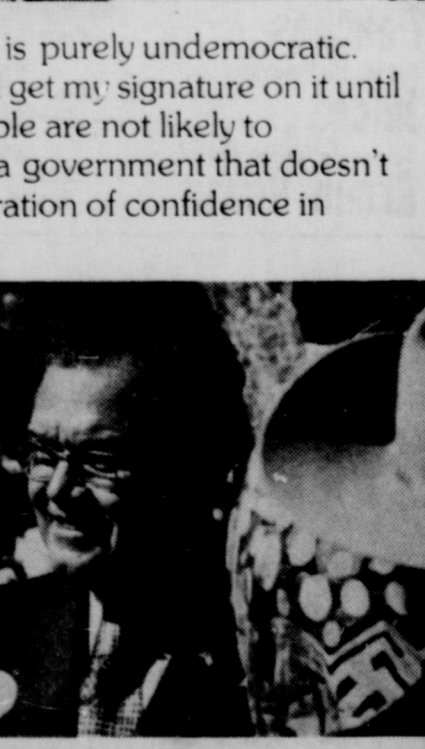
