FRIDAY IS DEADLINE FOR FILING FOR CITY OFFICES

A change in the date for the City Election was announced this week. The law calls for city elections to be held the first Saturday in April. Wheeler Citizens will go to the polls Saturday, April 6 to elect a mayor and two councilmen.

Friday is the last day to file for a city office. The change of the election date does not affect the filing deadline. The deadline for filing will remain Friday, March 1.

The mayor and two aldermen have filed for re-election. Mayor Don Earney and Councilmen Robert Denson and Pate Burton have filed with the City Clerk to have their names placed on the ballot for election to their respective positions on the Council.

Anyone who desires to run for the office of Mayor or Councilman must file their application with the City Clerk on or before March 1, 1968. The person desiring to seek election must be a qualified voter. Application blanks for filing may be obtained from the City Clerk, located Ramsey at the City Office.

Laura Guthrie will act as election judge for the city election. The election will be held in the City Hall.



Clark Woodridge To Speak Mon.

Wheeler School trustees whose terms expire are Jim Montgomery and Joe Weatherly. Neither of these men had filed at press time Wednesday.

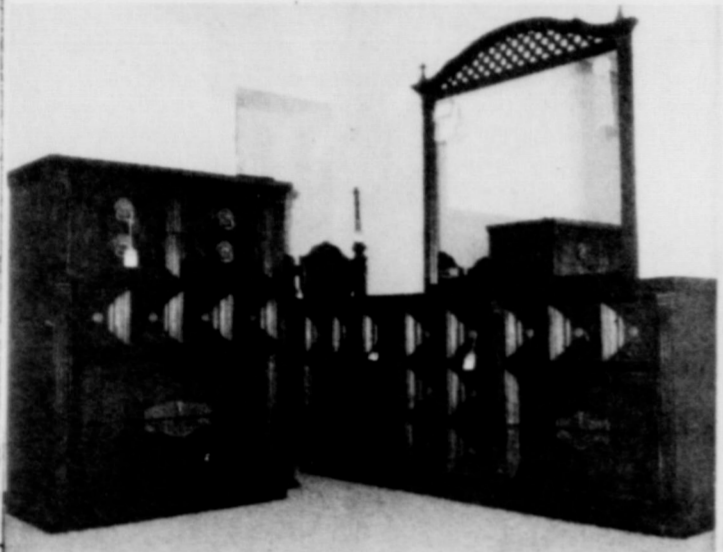

Are you as a cooperater of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District thinking about doing some grass seeding this spring? Are you wondering what kind of seedbed to prepare and what kind of grass to seed? When seeding into an existing cover of perennial junk grasses, the proper method of seedbed preparation is to run sweeps under the undesirable vegetation and leave it lying on top of the ground to prevent blowing. Then in late winter or early spring, it is ready to drill grass into. If you have a field with little cover, then you should plow the land once or twice depending on weed competition, then drill from 14 to 18 lbs. of any kind of sorghum. Do not permit sorghum to head out as it will compete with the seeded grass the next year.

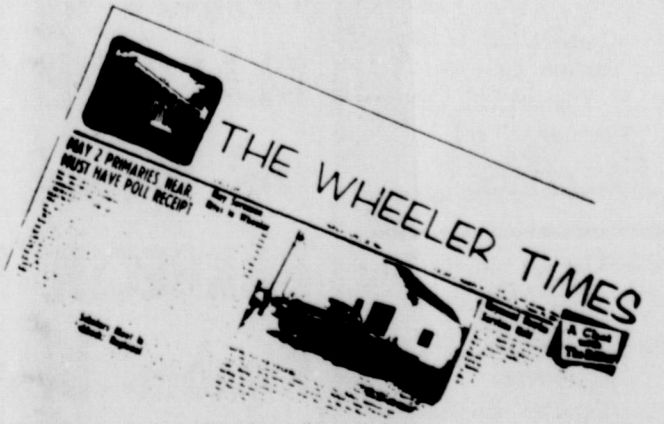

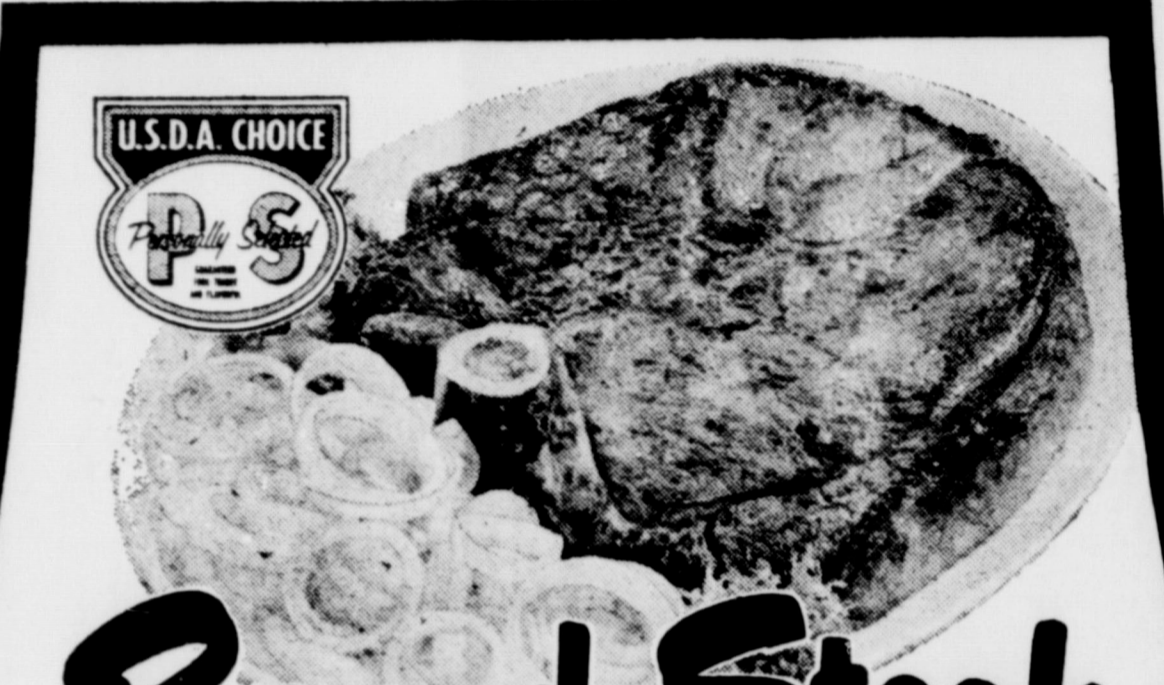
