



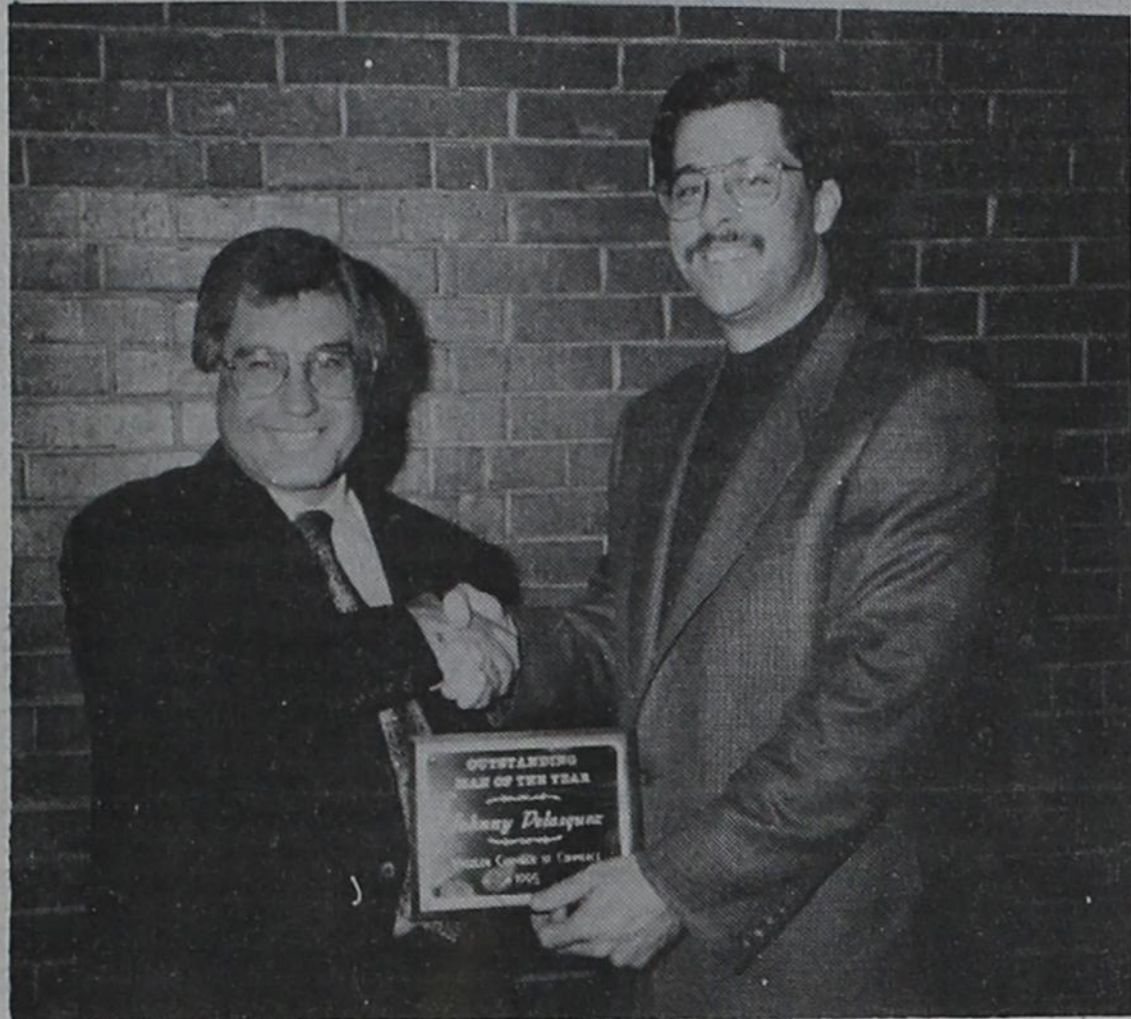

in Dallas.

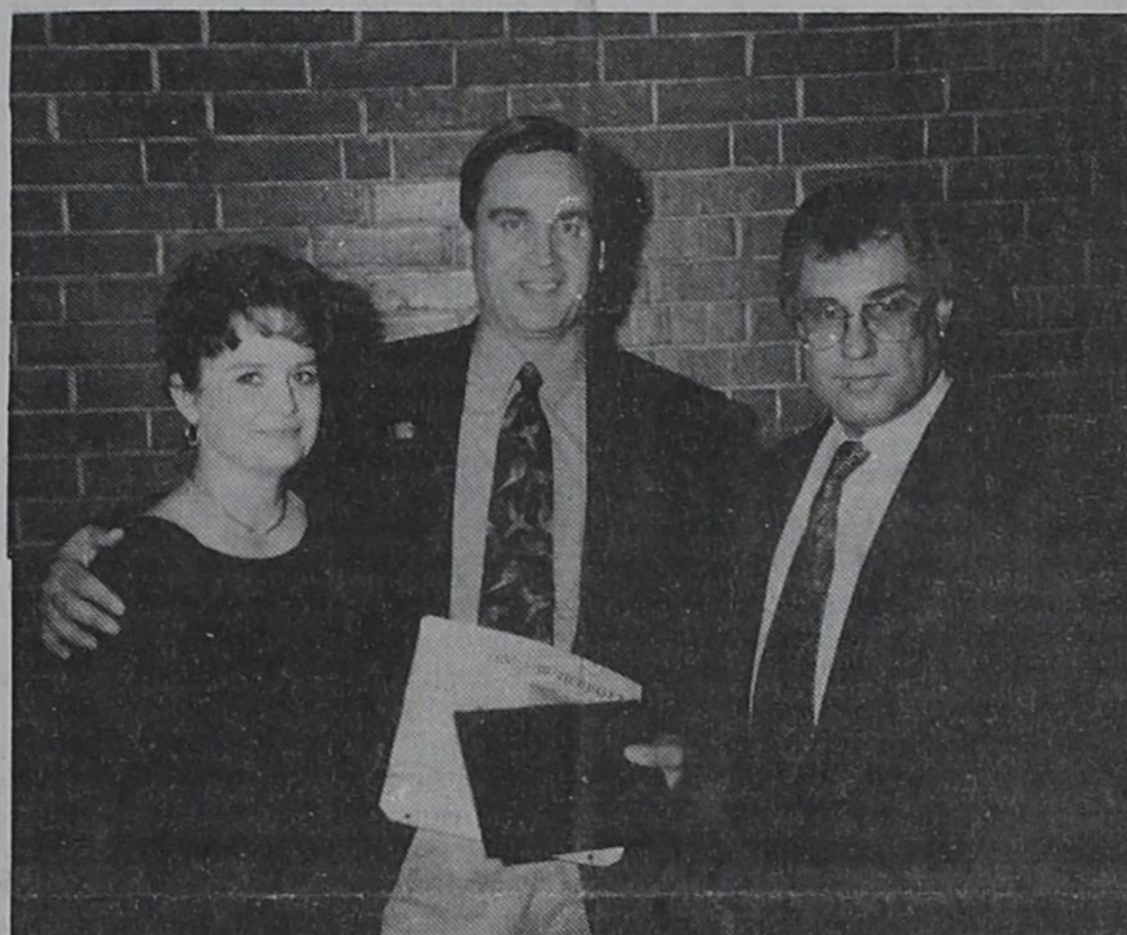

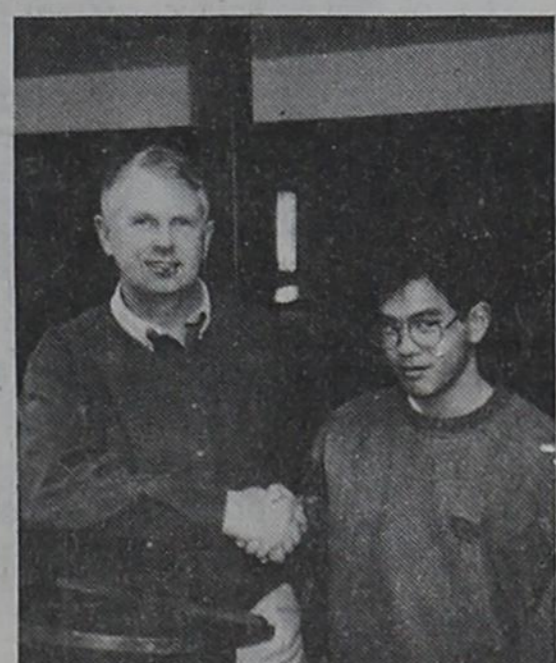

J. R. Black Sentenced To 15 Yrs. 6 Mo. in Prison

J. R. Black, a Wheeler County farmer and rancher, was sentenced Friday, February 9, to 15 years and 6 months in prison after pleading guilty to indecency with a child.

Black was indicted April 25, 1995 on second degree felony charges. He had posted \$12,500 bond and remained free until Friday. Fourteen witnesses asked the court not to consider probation.

Former Wheeler Resident, Joyce Holleny Dies

Joyce Faust Holleny, 71, an elementary-school teacher in Monroe Township for 27 years, died Wednesday, December 27, 1995 at Kennedy Memorial Hospital/Washington Township Division.

Born in Wheeler, Texas, she graduated from Wheeler High School, and studied for two years at Texas Tech and completed her bachelor's degree at Glassboro State College (now Rowan College). She retired in 1987.

"She was an extremely caring and loving person, and every child that came through her classroom benefited from this," said Elizabeth Sabatelli, a close friend.

After years of teaching elementary education at different grade levels, Mrs. Holleny got her master's degree in reading and specialized in remedial reading, Sabatelli said.

Mrs. Holleny was an inspiration to her students and to others, said Sabatelli. After Sabatelli moved here from London, where she had been a teacher, Mrs. Holleny motivated her to return to college and to teaching Sabatelli said.

Mrs. Holleny was a member of First United Methodist Church in Williamstown, where she was a past president of the United Methodist Women and served on the church's administrative council. She had been a member of the Beta Chapter of the Delta Cappa Gamma Society International, Alpha Zeta State of New Jersey since 1968. She served as the Beta Chapter's president in 1980-82. In 1983, she helped organize the Pi Chapter and was elected its president earlier this year.

Mrs. Holleny was active in the New Jersey Education Association and the New Jersey Retired Education Association; she was recording secretary of the Gloucester County Retired Education Association for many years.

Joyce was the daughter of former residents Rupert and Edna Faust, granddaughter of Hamlin and Rose Flanagan. She is a cousin of Edwina Flanagan Dalton of Pampa and a cousin of LaRue Flanagan Pierce of

PIONEER SPIRIT HALL OF FAME: Added to the local Pioneer Spirit Hall of Fame this year was Bus Dorman. He was born June 14, 1914, in a half dug-out, seven miles south of Wheeler. Bus was the oldest of nine children. He was raised in the Twitty and Dozier communities. He married Myrtle Mildred Green on November 27, 1933. Bus played semi-pro baseball for Elk City, Oklahoma City, Little Rock, Ark., and the Amarillo Gold Sox. He and his wife moved back to Wheeler County in 1951. He was elected sheriff and served in that capacity for 26 years. As sheriff, he never wore his gun unless the situation warranted. He is a member of Wheeler Church of Christ, Wheeler Kiwanis, Shamrock Boosters, Lions Club, and Mustang Boosters. He was instrumental in forming the "Courthouse Quartet", a singing group composed of himself, Ernest Henderson, the late Clois Hanner, and the late Hester Dodson. Bus is a loyal supporter of Wheeler and Wheeler County and has been known as an avid fan of our youth and their activities, especially all sporting events. Bus is "known by young and old to be a man of his word and only deals in truth and honesty". "He has influenced many people during his life and is respected by everyone, which is nearly a thing of the past," stated Jim Alvey (right) in making the presentation.

Services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday in Carmichael-Whately Funeral Directors Colonial Chapel with the Rev. Charlie Price, pastor of First Baptist Church in Canyon, officiating. Burial was in Memory Gardens Cemetery.

Mr. Schaub was born in Wheeler and had lived in Pampa since 1946. He married Bonnie Meathenia in 1944 at Wellington. He worked as an electrician and instrument technician for Cabot Corp. for 32 years. He retired in 1977.

He was a veteran of World War II.

PRODUCTIVITY APPRAISAL MAY LOWER FARM & RANCH TAXES

Texas law provides farmers, ranchers and timber growers with a way to lower their property taxes known as productivity appraisal.

If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock or timber instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity appraisal can lower the taxable value of your land and lower your property taxes as a result.

This type of appraisal is based on a five-year production average per acre which is capitalized using a rate set by law. As a result, the taxable value can vary from year to year.

If your land has never received productivity appraisal, you must apply to the appraisal district no later than April 30th to get the tax benefit for 1996. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but with a penalty.

If your land already receives agricultural appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If you receive a notice to reapply respond as soon as possible. FAILURE TO RESPOND COULD LEAD TO YOUR EXEMPTION BEING DENIED.

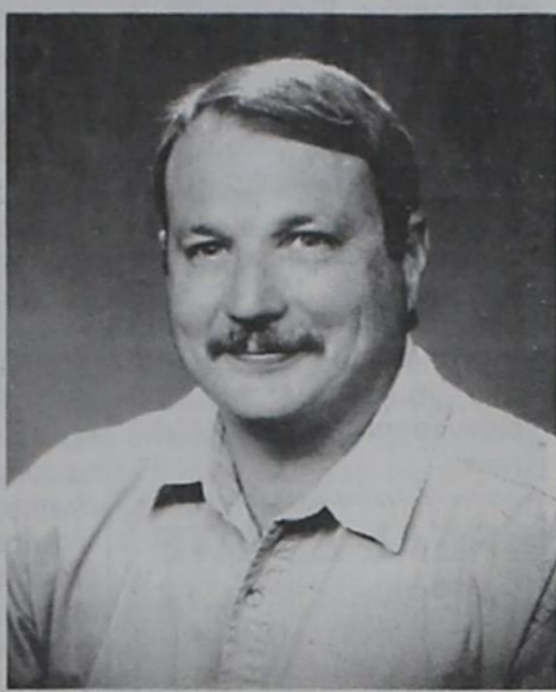

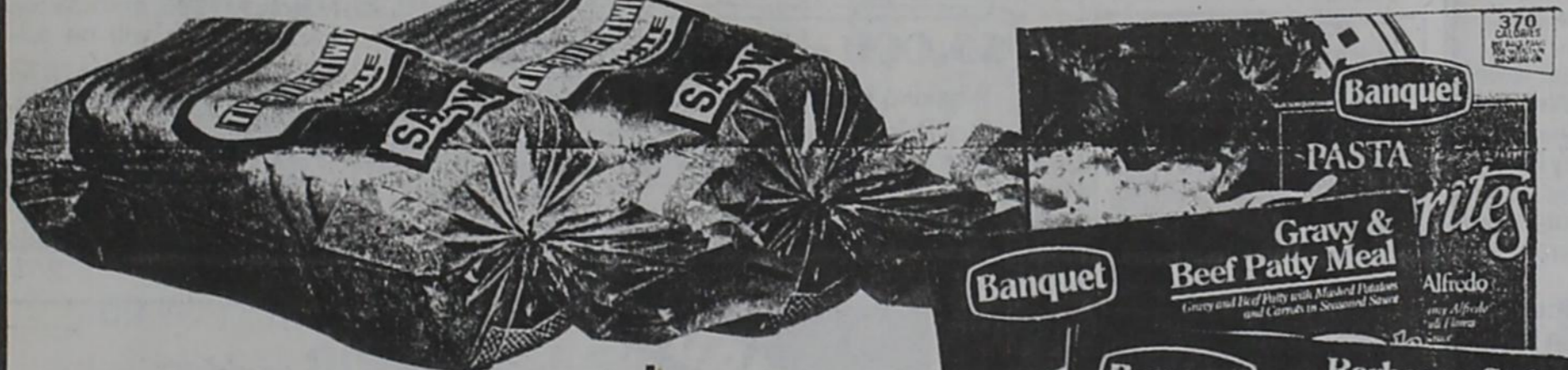

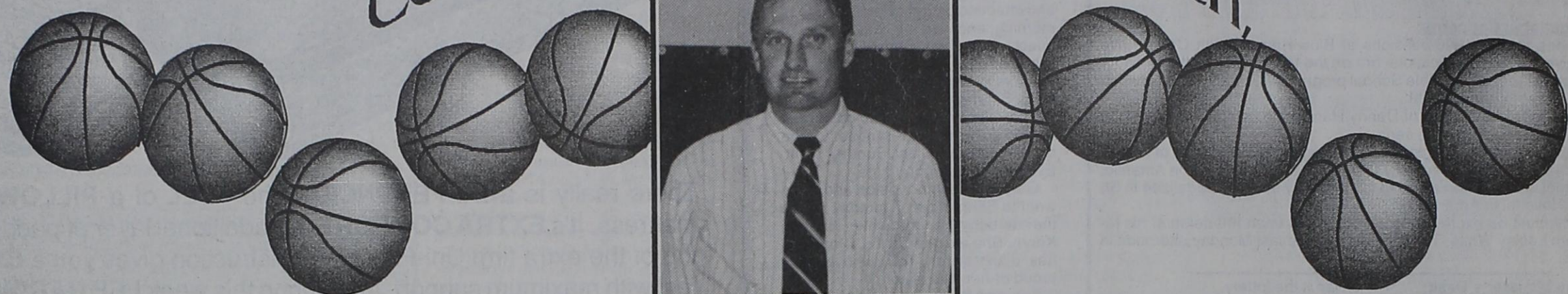
