**BROCCOLI CHEESE SOUFFLE**

1/4 cup quick-cooking tapioca  
1 1/2 cups milk  
4 egg whites  
1 tsp salt  
1 cup shredded process cheddar cheese  
Preheat oven to 325°  
Combine tapioca, salt and milk in a 1 qt. saucepan. Stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Remove from heat. Add shredded process cheese and stir until melted. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Fold in cheese mixture until well-blended. Pour into six individual souffle cups or a 1 1/2 qt. casserole; set in a pan of hot water. Bake until knife inserted in center comes out clean about 1 hour.

### Across the Fence

They're very complimentary. A very good feedback is coming in on evaluations of the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Program's Annual meeting. One observation: "We came to hear about grazing irrigated alfalfa, but were amazed to learn of the potential of irrigated lovegrass. On the basis of what we heard we decided not to graze our alfalfa, but are looking favorably at seeding lovegrass on seventy acres of new-

ground originally intended for alfalfa. Our water supply is short for alfalfa but from what we have heard it would be ample for lovegrass. We were impressed with the knowledge, enthusiasm and ability shown in presenting the lovegrass story."

A lot of acres will be seeded to lovegrass next spring, grazing of irrigated alfalfa and lovegrass, and rotational grazing with electric fences. Had a nice visit with Stanley Ryan, who ranches at Magic City a few days ago. He is one of

many producers who is planning to use more electric fences and distribute water a little better.

There'll be a gnashing of teeth. The lack of an active cotton market that will purchase all quantities of cotton produced and the continual decline of prices keeps the producer bewildered and can anyone blame him? It's not what can be done for the cotton farmer next year or what he can expect in the new farm program for 1974; but what can he do with the ginned cotton he produced in good faith through the influence of agricultural leaders and which is now stacking up on farms, gin yards, and warehouses?

The following was taken from the October NATURAL FIBERS ECONOMIC RESEAR-

CH REPORT No. 12: A lot of cotton farmers are putting this year's crop in the loan. With the cost of growing cotton at about 32¢ a pound in most areas, would you like to sell yours at 17-18¢? We asked one cotton farmer how things were going. He replied that he hoped to break even this year because he needed the money. This type of reply is all too expressive of the situation facing our cotton producers.

Imposition of a capital gains tax at death would, for all practical purposes, prevent the passing on of property by a deceased rancher to his heirs so they could continue the ranch, because of the heavy tax burdens involved in both an estate tax and a capital gains tax. We are consider-

ing holding a meeting Estate Planning for first part of December, you are interested, know.

This is the type I like to write. Back 1967-68, our Wheeler Program Building Co. inventoried all of the income for the County Rural Development Committee (US) assisted the committee in figuring the figures. At the time, Wheeler County total income of about million dollars with over 7 million dollars 18% of the total income coming from agriculture. Goals were set then effort to increase agricultural receipts 1976. The projected crease was projected about 15 million for doubling our farm income from 1968.

Along came the revolution and the expansion. If continuing close to 50% of the income of the county 1973 or an increase in only 5 years! The projected agricultural income in 1973 is anticipated to be close to 18 million dollars. In other words, years, we have not exceeded the 9 year set back in 1967-68, next 5 years should esting indeed!

This income does count agricultural program payments which incidentally, is 11¢ dollars. Seventy-five of the income is going come from (1) increased stocker steers - up 1 million from 1972-1973 creases in mother numbers approaching levels after 2 drought (3) feed cattle - up a few thousand head to 80,000 head - this is added figure only (4) milo crop - good price (5) increased hay price. Wheat, small grains and cotton are not expected increase income a lot 1973, although better could affect this estimate. How does our compare with surrounding ties? Our 1973 agricultural income will approach of (Chillicothe County) it'll be 1/2 that of Dea County and Moore Co 1968 agricultural income. Keep in mind these have long been recognized as "big" agricultural areas. And the future of ol' gallant, their supply, is fading fast. We won't have 1972 come figures for these ties until December. Is there any wonder farmers and ranchers surrounding counties been coming to Wheeler County to see what's on.
