Old & New Mobeetie Unite

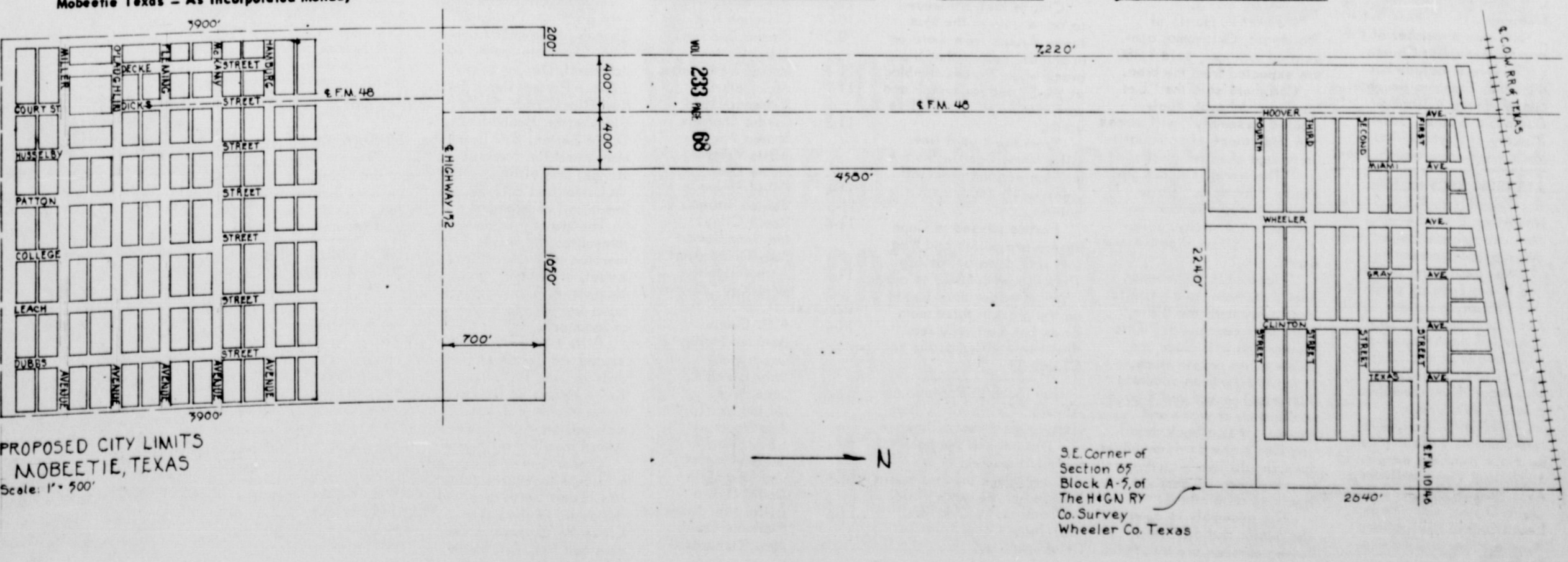

Jehovah's Group To Have Conv'n.

O. Caruthers, presiding minister of the Shamrock congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, announced at a recent meeting that plans have been finalized for a circuit convention including 22 congregations in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles and Western Oklahoma.

Convention officials revealed that the City Auditorium in Altus, Oklahoma has been selected for this assembly, Dec. 2 and 3.

Delbert V. Harris of Woodward, Oklahoma, convention manager, said 1,300 are expected from the area.

Caruthers said the "Let Us Serve Jehovah Wholeheartedly Assembly" will stress the importance of spirituality in an age of materialism.

"The world is under great stress," he said. "Daily the news media reports on revolution, anarchy, pollution, war, crime, disease and death."

"Jehovah's Witnesses feel that there is a definite drift away from the Bible," Caruthers continued. "This convention will place the Bible in its proper place. It is not simply an accurate historical record and a good collection of prose and poetry. It is a book detailing God's standards by which men should live including worship, morals, and our dealings with others."

The assembly is open to the public and all Bible-loving persons are invited.

Greg Forbes, Claude quarterback who was a thorn in the Mustangs side all night, rolled to his left at the 34 and spotted Cope, who had circled out of the backfield and had gotten behind Rusty Cole at the 50, all alone and hit him with a perfect strike and it was no contest from there to the end zone.

Forbes barely nudged it across into the end zone on the two point conversion but it was enough and Claude jumped into a 7 point lead that Wheeler just couldn't overcome.

Twice more in the first half Wheeler had big scoring threats go by the boards that could have conceivably put them up by a touchdown at halftime.

After Claude went on top, the Mustangs ran the kickoff pass to their 41 and proceeded to grind it out on the ground to the Claude 17 on the running of Britt, Fischer and Ware.

Britt lost a yard on first down and came back with 4 at right guard. Stevens picked up 6 at left guard leaving the Mustangs a yard shy on fourth down.

Stevens got the call on the counter on the important down and the effort came up inches shy on the measurement and Claude took over on their 7.

Cole picked off a Forbes pass, the first of two interceptions he made in the game, at the Claude 48 midway of the second quarter and Wheeler punched it down to the Claude 15 for a first down.

On third down, Fischer slipped to the turf on the 24 as he was fading back to pass and the halfback pass effort by Stevens fell incomplete on fourth down.

The only offensive bright spot for Wheeler in the third quarter came when Ware broke for 18 yards on a trap to get their lone first down.

It was a different story defensively as Claude kept the pressure up and a fumble recovery by Dale Helton at the Wheeler 35 and another interception by Cole at the 30 kept the visitors at bay.

Late in the third quarter, Claude jumped on a fumble by Ware at the Claude 41 and not only stopped a Wheeler venture into Claude country but used it to start the drive that put the icing on the cake as far as the score was concerned.

Once more Forbes came up with the big play. With third and five at the Wheeler 45, Forbes was chased back to his 35 attempting to pass and simply outran his pursuers and got the ball away somehow and Bobby Jones snagged it at the Wheeler 40 encircled by four gold clad Mustangs and then broke out of the trap and ran to the 27 where Cole bounced him out of bounds.

Claude just proceeded to drive it down the Mustangs throats from there on in and did get another big break when Forbes fumbled at the 27 and recovered and was able to squirm for five yards.

From the 4 yard line, Billy Merrell got in the scoring act and drove off right tackle for the six pointer.

Forbes passed to Cope for the two points and Wheeler was down by the big 15 points with 10:19 to play. Wheeler got their hands on the pigskin three more times but their only real threat was killed at the Claude 37.
