When I said good-bye and moved away.

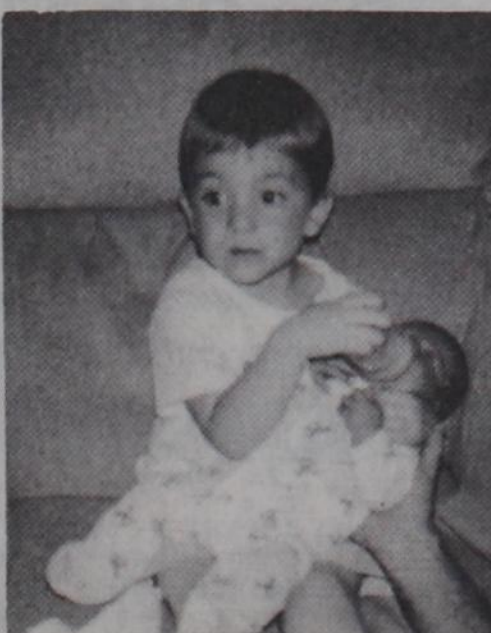
Although we're separated and far apart,

DALLAS AREA JUNIOR HIGH STUDENTS TOUR HERITAGE BEEF CATTLE COMPANY

A group of Dallas-area junior high students traded in their tennis shoes for cowboy boots to gain a first-hand look at award-winning environmental practices Thursday, October 3.

Twelve boys and girls from McKinney, Texas participated in the "Country Living Program" — a program designed by the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA) and the North American Association of Environmental Educators (NAAEE) — to learn real-life environmental lessons at a working cattle ranch in Wheeler, Texas.

The program consisted of a day-long environmental workshop taught by cattlemen, mid representatives from conservation groups, local universities and state government agencies. It took place at the Heritage Beef Cattle Company.

"We want to inspire a strong 'envirovision' — the ability to see years down the road," said Rodney Weatherly, manager of the Heritage Beef Cattle Company. "As a parent, I want tomorrow's youth to follow in my footsteps, understanding that what we're doing today affects the next generation. This program will provide these youngsters with a taste of country living, that they otherwise may not

NAAEE's Volunteers in Neighborhood Environments (VINE) program served as a catalyst for selecting participating teens in the Country Living Program. All teens must have demonstrated a commitment to learning about environmental issues and a willingness to volunteer their time to employ good environmental practices in their neighborhoods.

"The Country Living Program provides teens with the opportunity to develop leadership skills by further educating them on environmental issues," said NAAEE's VINE Network Director Karen Hollweg. "It also exposes them to potential career opportunities, that otherwise would have been unknown to them."

The NCBA, a result of the merger between the National Cattlemen's Association and the National Live Stock and Meat Board, is a consumer-driven, producer-directed organization representing all segments of the beef cattle industry. The organization officially began operation on Feb. 1, 1996. The North American Association for Environmental Education is dedicated to promoting environmental education and supporting the work of environmental educators around the world.

MACRONUTRIENT NEEDS FOR PEOPLE 65 AND OLDER

Now more than ever before, the nutritional needs for macronutrients - water, fiber, carbohydrate, protein and fats - are very important.

Why worry about it now? Mainly because by the year 2000 there will be approximately 40 million people in the United States over the age of 65. Many will remain active and healthy. Others will suffer from one or more chronic diseases, live alone or have varied backgrounds and living situations. That's why knowledge about the macronutrient needs of this over 65 age group is important.

Not to be forgotten is the nutrient water. When it comes to the elderly, water consumption is of special concern since they have inadequate water intake. This is caused by a decrease in the antidiuretic hormone with aging and more water loss through their urine. Memory loss or physical incapacity may prevent the ability to satisfy their thirst or inability to express their need for fluids. For whatever reason, dehydration is a common problem for the elderly. Dehydration can be prevented by consuming approximately 1-1/2 to 2 liters of fluid per day, or more if there is vomiting, diarrhea or other increased fluid loss.

For a variety of reasons, fiber in our diet is important for all of us. Water-holding fibers, such as found in wheat bran, along with adequate water intake, are helpful with reducing constipation and in decreasing formation of diverticula in the colon. Soluble dietary fibers - those in oats, legumes

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and fruits - have been reported to improve control of blood sugar in diabetes, lower total cholesterol, the "bad" cholesterol (LDL cholesterol) and triglycerides without changing HDL cholesterol (the "good" cholesterol). Both types of fibers are found in fruits and vegetables. Be cautious of more than two to four servings of fruits which can cause an increase in blood sugar, especially in persons with diabetes.

High quality protein found in meats, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts group are of special interest for this age group for maintaining fitness since a wasting away of muscle each decade after age 45 occurs. Protein

requirements remain constant as for other ages with the exception of stress from an illness or infection, thus requiring additional protein.

Energy intake needs to be enough to maintain a normal weight and prevent undesired weight loss. Overeating fats and carbohydrates results in protein used for energy draining necessary amino acids. Decreased muscle mass and less physical activity reduce the need for calories so fat intake is usually decreased in the elderly to about 25 percent to 30 percent of total calories. Protein, 10 percent to 15 percent, and carbohydrate, 55 percent to 60 percent, intakes are about the same as for the general public.

Moderation in eating and changing the diet such as reducing cholesterol to reduce risk factors are good for any age. Following a balanced meal plan such as the USDA Food Guide Pyramid which promotes good health without creating undue hardships or decreasing their quality of life is the type of dietary recommendations being made by most of the health organizations. So find out more about changing your eating habits the pyramid way to promote health and well-being, contact your local county Extension agent in family and consumer sciences or a local dietitian.

On September 8, a Sunday morning, my sister and I, two senior-age women from Denver, were enroute from Dumas to Oklahoma City when our car quit running in Wheeler, right at the courthouse, on SH 152.

It was about 10:45 a.m. when we had the troubling problem of getting our car repaired, when service places were all closed. Almost immediately a gentleman stopped to help, Mr. Kent Ware, and as he was examining our engine, an associate of his in a Wheeler garage drove by, Mr. Gene Keelin. Other people stopped to help, with the heart-warming result that in little over an hour we were again on our way to Oklahoma City, where a relative was critically ill; and in fact, died in a few days.

Nowhere in this country could we have been helped more, and with such good spirit. We experienced western neighborliness at its finest, a demonstration of the hospitality of the West.

We will ever be grateful for this experience, not only to these caring citizens but to the entire, and great, community of Wheeler. Will you, please, convey our deepest appreciation to the community? We thank you.

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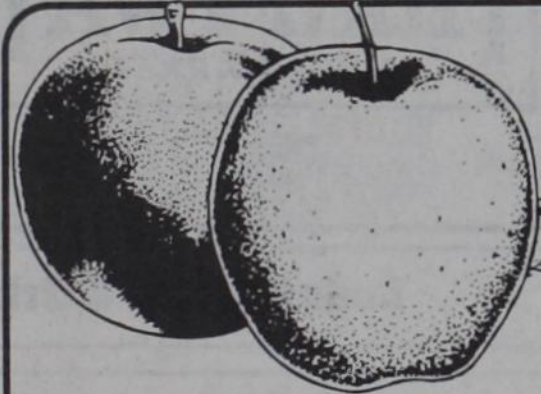


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Sweetwater News

Extension Provides Free Opportunity For Disposal of Pesticides, Chemicals, Tires

The Texas Agricultural Extension state are invited to dispose of unneeded waste pesticides and agricultural chemicals. The collection locations also will recycle tires, batteries, waste oil and oil filters.

Clifford Hoelscher, professor and posed. This will be a good opportunity to help clean up trash in the community.

The Extension Service has contracted with a private pesticide disposal company to collect and dispose of the waste chemicals. The company takes the materials out of state where they are incinerated.

More than 950 tons of waste pesticides have been collected by the program. A total of 168 tons were disposed of during the 1996 spring program alone. Only 66 tons were disposed of in 1995.

The Texas Panhandle collection will be conducted from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m., in Amarillo at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Experiment Station, seven-tenths of a mile west of FM 2381 on the 1-40 service road.

This collection site will be taking empty pesticide containers for recycling. Hoelscher said these containers must be triple-rinsed and clean in order to be accepted.

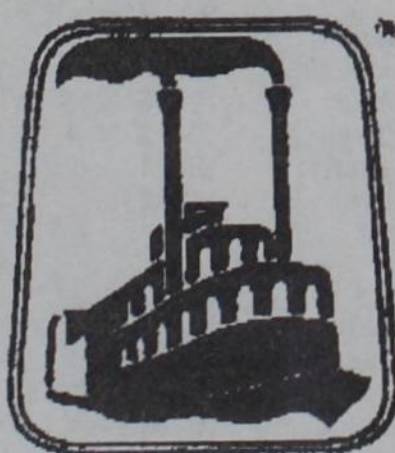
