## One Dead, One Injured In Shooting

Keith Leon McLaughlin, 46, died early Monday morning as the result of gun shot which severed the femoral artery in the upper thigh. McLaughlin died shortly after arrival by ambulance at Parkview Hospital.

The situation is being investigated by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department under the direction of Sheriff Jimmy Adams.

A domestic quarrel led to the shooting. The incident occurred at the victim's home, the McLaughlin Ranch 5 miles northwest of Mobeetie. It has been reported that two shots were fired, but it is not certain who fired first. The shooting took place shortly after midnight.

Also injured in the shooting was the wife, Vickie McLaughlin, 37. She remains in Parkview Hospital in satisfactory condition.

An autopsy was performed on the body in Amarillo.

Funeral services for McLaughlin will be today, Thursday, June 7, 1990, at 2:30 P.M. at the First Baptist Church of Mobeetie. Rev. Ralph Hovey, pastor will officiate.

Burial will be in Mobeetie Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

McLaughlin was born in Wheeler and attended Mobeetie schools, graduating from Mobeetie High School. He attended Frank Phillips College. He lived in Pampa for several years before moving back to Mobeetie in 1979. He worked for Kerr McGee

for 20 years. He belonged to the Masonic Lodge and First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Vickie; his mother, Edith McLaughlin of Mobeetie; three sons, Kent McLaughlin of Mobeetie, Mike Kelsey of Pampa and Jimmy McDaniel of Mobeetie; two step daughters, Brandi and Misty Mumford, both of Mobeetie; and three grandchildren.

Shirley Lorene Helms, 69, died Monday, May 7, 1990 in Canadian.

Services were held at 3:00 p.m. Thursday, May 10, in Allison United Pentecostal Church. Rev. F. R. Johnson, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Zybach Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

She was preceded in death by a son, Kenneth Helms, in 1981.

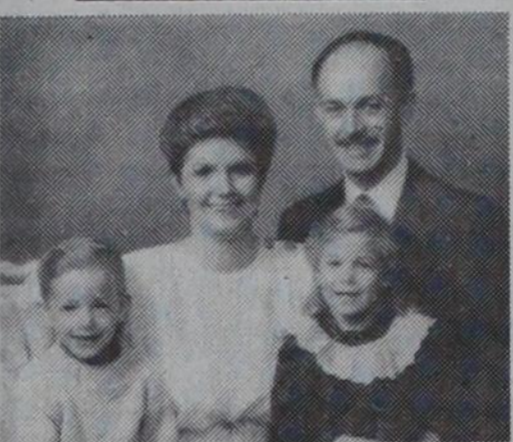
### Shot Doctor Shooting Camp At Briscoe

### From The Minister's Desk:

The first verse of the hymn, "This World Is Not My Home", says: "This world is not my home, I'm just passing thru. My treasurers are laid up somewhere beyond the blue; the angels beckon me from heaven's open door." From these words an important question can be raised. This question is: "What relationship should disciples of Jesus have with the world?"

One of the clearest teachings of the new Testament is that disciples of Jesus should be separated from the world. Romans 12:1-2 says: "I urge you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is spiritual service of worship. And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of

your mind, that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect." Disciples of Jesus should be separated from the world, living by nobler principles and higher values.

But while they should be separated from the world, disciples of Jesus should not be isolated from the world. For example, consider the first century disciples of Jesus. After their baptism into Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of their sins, they did not retreat into the safety of a church building and isolate themselves from the world. Rather they

involved themselves with the world.

Disciples of Jesus must recognize that the new Testament teaches that there is a difference between separation and isolation. James 1:27 says: "this is pure and undefiled religion in the sight of our God and Father, to visit orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself unstained by the world." According to this text, a faith must be "...pure and undefiled...", but it must also be involved with the world, visiting "...orphans and widows in distress...". Yet this faith must always keep itself "...unstained by the world."

It is crucial that disciples of Jesus recognize the difference between separation and isolation. When they isolate themselves from the world, disciples of Jesus cannot do what Jesus commanded them to do when he said: "Go therefore, make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit..." (Matthew 28:19) The world will never be evangelized by disciples of Jesus who have isolated themselves in the safety of a church building.

This world is not the "...home..." of disciples of Jesus. They should be separated from the world, but they should never pervert their separation into isolation.

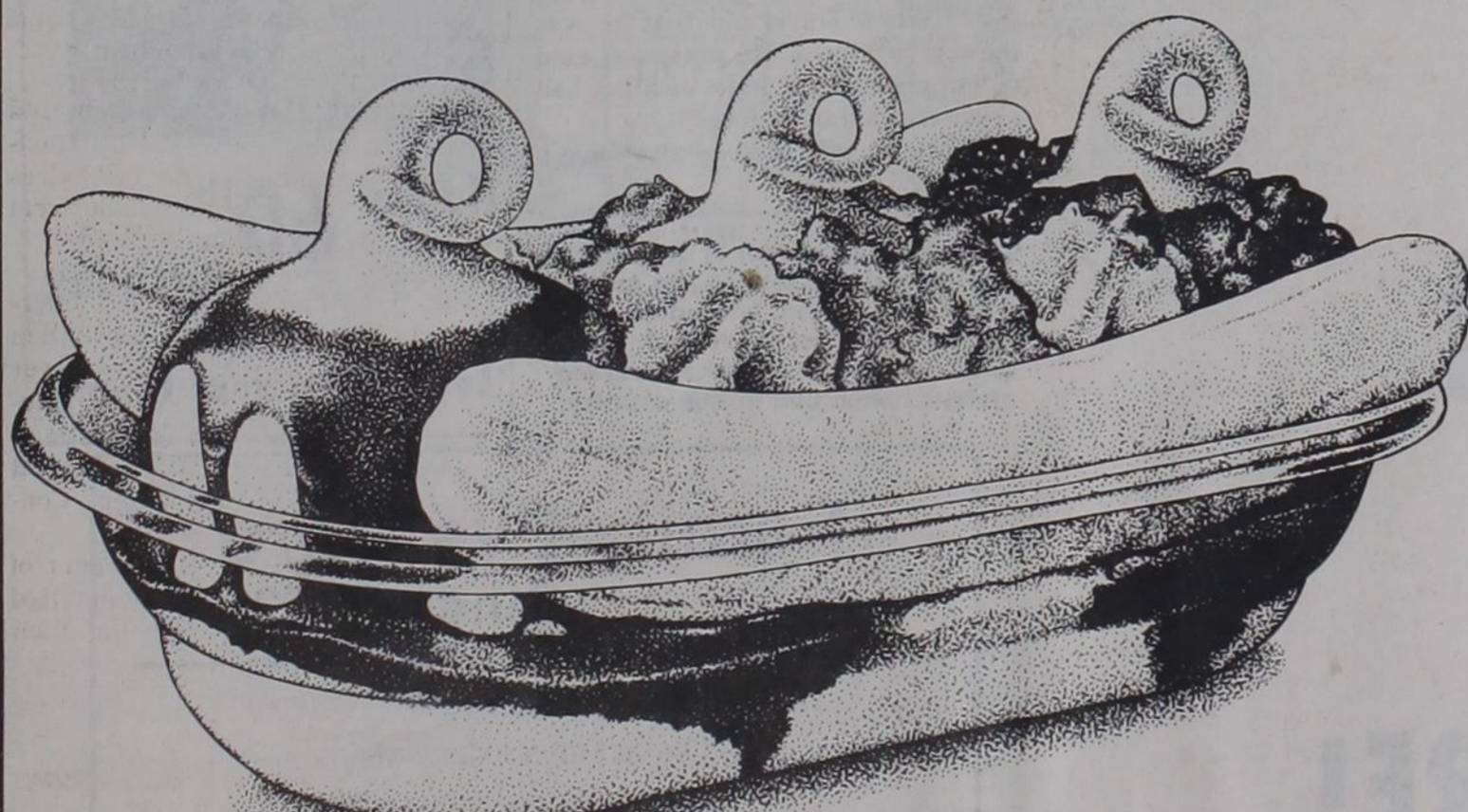

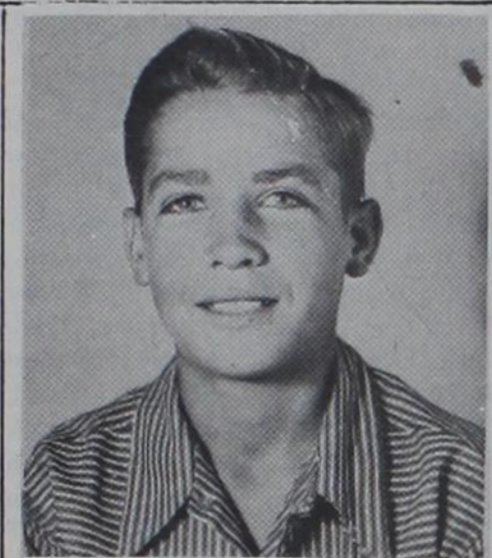
