

OPEN FORUM WHEELER CARE CENTER

Ever hear of OBRA 1987? We have. In 1987 Congress passed the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act. Along with many other things, it contained drastic changes in Nursing Home regulations.

The Implementation date for these changes has been set, changed and postponed but has now arrived. On October 1, 1990, the biggest change in Nursing Home regulations since 1967 will become effective.

An open Forum will be conducted at Wheeler Care Center at 7:00 on Tuesday, September 25, to explain and discuss changes at the Care Center

The State of Texas has already increased their reimbursement for cost to nursing homes to help pay for the additional expense and a very substantial increase in charges for private pay patients is forthcoming.

Some of the changes are:

- The requirement for a Registered Nurse on duty 8 hours per day 7 days a week.
- Licensed Nurses on every shift (Wheeler Care Center has already been doing this though not required.)
- The requirement for a Medical Director.
- The requirement for a Certified Social Worker.

The new requirements call for more attention to patient's rights including:

- The right to participate in their own health care plan.
- The right to make their own decisions in regard to placement in the Nursing Home. The right to refuse treatment or medication.
- The right to handle their own

The requirement for an Intensified Nurse Aid training

- The requirement for more detailed comprehensive patient assessment requiring more professional involvement.
- Arrangements for services of an audiologist, occupational therapist and physical therapist.

This information is being forwarded to you for your consideration regarding publication.

Our young people are leaving rurai areas upon completion of high school and few are returning to maintain a home and raise a family. With the growing need for qualified workers in the health care field we must attract trained personnel if we are to continue providing Hospital, Nursing Home and Home Health services to the populace of Wheeler County and other rural areas. New Federal laws have been passed and are now being implemented which will require additional disciplines such as Medical Social Workers and Therapists in a greater number than before.

Perhaps the Rural Scholar Recognition could be a part of the solution to the dilemma.

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

tution, which was signed by its authors, delegates from the American colonies, on September 17, 1787.

The Constitution was developed because the people in the colonies saw the need for a national government which could secure the people's right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

The final manuscript guaranteed that power was derived from the people. It provided checks and balances on that power through three separate branches of government -the Legislative, Judicial and Executive. This was a novel idea for the time. That the document has survived is a credit to the wisdom and integrity of its authors. Our Constitution and the amendments that have been added through the years have served us well. Because all of our citizens should participate in commemorating the anniversary of this event, I, Wendell Morgan, County Judge of Wheeler County, do hereby designate September 17-23, 1990, as U.S. CONSTITU-TION WEEK in Wheeler County, and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this worthy document.


