## MUSTANGS GET SECOND SHUTOUT,

### WHIP SAYRE 42-0

The inept Sayre Eagles became the Mustangs second victim of the young season last Friday night and drew blanks to the tune of 42-0 as a near capacity crowd watched at Nicholson Field.

Wheeler's JV unit could have given the Mustangs more competition than did the Eagles as the Mustangs coaching staff cleared the bench in the last half as the frustrated Eagles not once got to the midfield stripe.

Not only did the Mustangs rack up their second shutout in a row, they also stopped their opponent from gaining a single yard rushing for the second week in succession. Sayre could net only 5 yards total offense for the entire game as the Mustangs rolled up 356 yards.

For the second time in two games, the Mustangs put points on the scoreboard via the pass interception route as Brandon Chick picked off a Sayre pass and sprinted into the end zone for the Mustangs second touchdown. Chick also set up the Mustangs first TD with a 31 yard punt return four plays deep in the game to the Sayre 44.

Ike Finsterwald got the nine play

scoring drive started with a 9 yard gain on a reverse off the left side and then the Mustangs pounded the Eagles with Mack Marshall and Nathan Willeford with Willeford hitting off right tackle for the six points from a yard out.

Sayre seemed confused on the Mustangs "swinging gate" alignment on the extra point and quarterback Jason Beers passed to Chick for the two pointer, giving the Mustangs a quick 8-0 lead.

A 41 yard drive late in the second quarter put the Mustangs into a comfortable 22-0 halftime bulge, that could have been worse, and sophomore tailback Mark Marshall got his first of two touchdowns for the night

on a six yard run around his right end. Alamo Altamirano booted his second extra point.

The Mustangs drove from their 29 to the Sayre 8 in the last minute and half of the second quarter but time ran off the clock at that point. Using the passing game very effectively moved the Mustangs quickly downfield. Jason Beers, who had a good night

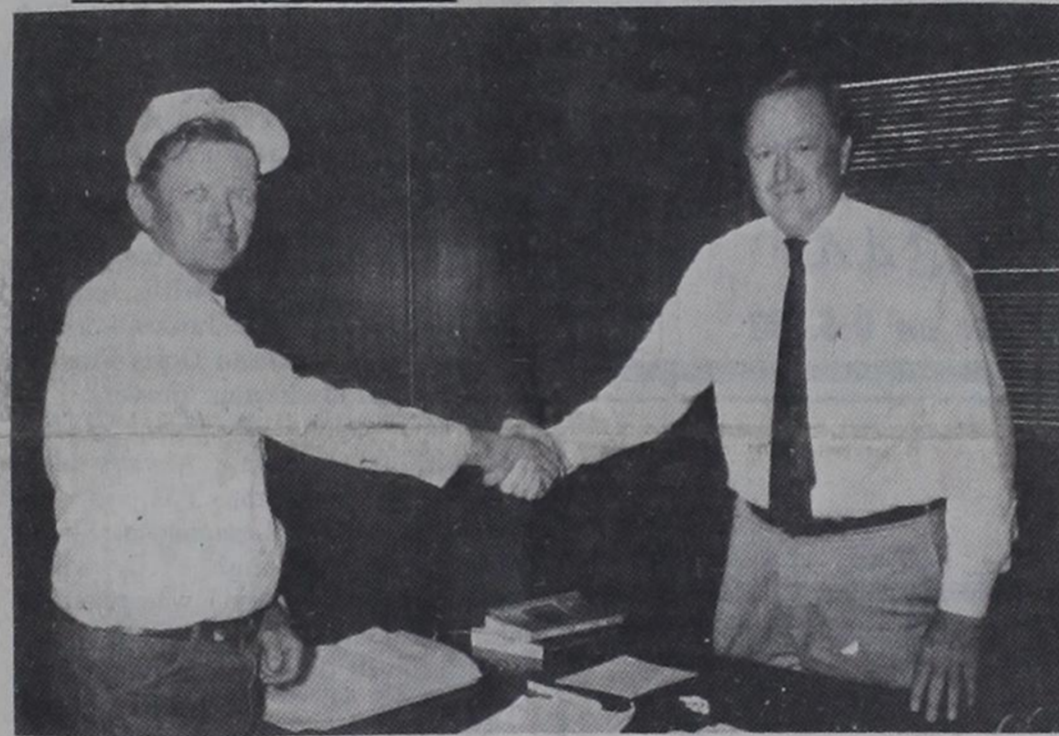
### Services Held For Bob Davis

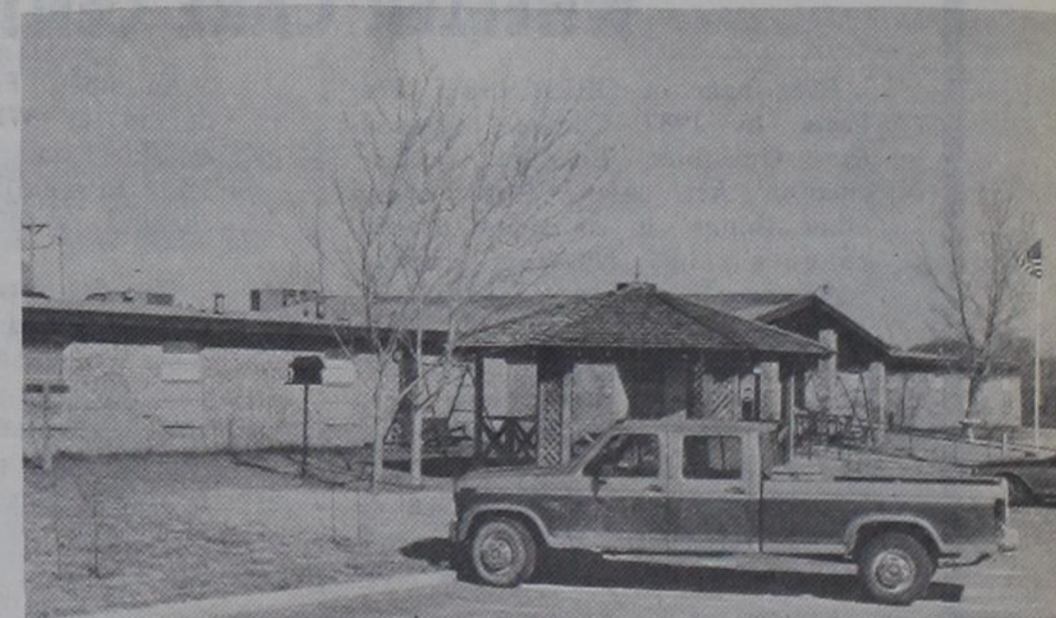

This facility is the source of employment for over 80 people in the Wheeler area.

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## OPEN FORUM

### WHEELER CARE CENTER

Ever hear of OBRA 1987? We have. In 1987 Congress passed the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act. Along with many other things, it contained drastic changes in Nursing Home regulations.

The Implementation date for these changes has been set, changed and postponed but has now arrived. On October 1, 1990, the biggest change in Nursing Home regulations since 1967 will become effective.

**Some of the changes are:**

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ The requirement for a Registered Nurse on duty 8 hours per day 7 days a week.</li> <li>✓ Licensed Nurses on every shift (Wheeler Care Center has already been doing this though not required.)</li> <li>✓ The requirement for a Medical Director.</li> <li>✓ The requirement for a Certified Social Worker.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ The requirement for an Intensified Nurse Aid training</li> <li>✓ The requirement for more detailed comprehensive patient assessment requiring more professional involvement.</li> <li>✓ Arrangements for services of an audiologist, occupational therapist and physical therapist.</li> </ul>
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**The new requirements call for more attention to patient's rights including:**

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ The right to participate in their own health care plan.</li> <li>✓ The right to make their own decisions in regard to placement in the Nursing Home.</li> <li>✓ The right to refuse treatment or medication.</li> <li>✓ The right to handle their own finances.</li> <li>✓ We can no longer subject patients to treatments or restrictions against their will even though the family may desire the treatment—unless the patient has been adjudicated incompetent by a court order.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Unless the patient is declared incompetent by court order we cannot keep them against their will.</li> <li>✓ Restraints may no longer be used except in rare cases which are documented as necessary after exhausting other enabling devices and consultations with appropriate health professionals. **PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

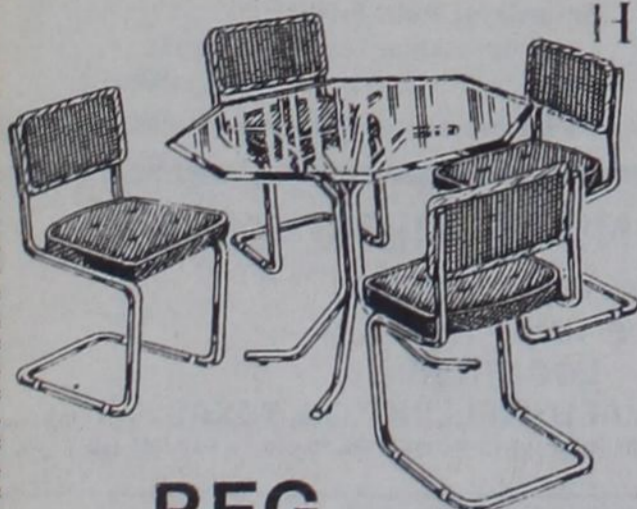

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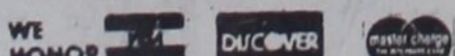

# FARM & RANCH SAFETY WEEK

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

I, Wendell Morgan County Judge of Wheeler County do hereby declare the week of September 16-22, 1990 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Wheeler County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the President has proclaimed estimates indicate that in 1989 farm work accidents resulted in approximately 1,300 deaths and 120,000 disabling injuries. The death rate was 42 per 100,000 workers, among the highest compared with the composite rate for all industries of nine per 100,000. Many more farm and ranch residents and workers were killed or seriously injured in home, recreation and roadway accidents. An undetermined number of people involved in agricultural work suffered job-related illnesses known to cause disability or death; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide farm and ranch accident prevention education campaign is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau; the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council; the Texas Safety Association; the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the 4-H Clubs; the Texas Education Agency through the Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, the Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau with the theme, "CUT FARM SAFETY RISKS IN THE '90'S"; and

WHEREAS, accident prevention is often a matter of common sense; putting into practice basic safety rules like always buckling your safety belt;

reading and following instructions in operator's manuals and product labels; and many other simple, sensible measures that involve little or no extra time, effort, or expense.

THEREFORE, I urge all those who live and work on farms or ranches to take necessary precautions to protect their safety and health - on the job and off. I also urge leaders in the agricultural community to bolster safety and health efforts in your area by example and by educational programs.

## Positive Earnings Mean Lower Rates

The Tenth Farm Credit District today reported a 63 percent increase in net income for the first six months of the year, over the same period last year.

As a result of the \$24.5 million in earnings, the bank was able to reduce interest rates to its nearly 60,000 member/borrowers during the second quarter.

"The combination of strong earnings and our improving capital position allowed us to reduce both short-term and long-term interest rates during the quarter," said Donald R. Rogge, chief executive officer.

In April, the bank lowered its discount rate to Production Credit Associations by 25 basis points, and in May Federal Land Bank Association variable rate loans were lowered 30 basis points.

"The reduction will help farmers and ranchers improve their operating income, thereby strengthening the agricultural economy throughout the district," Rogge said. The district, which comprises 20 Production Credit Associations in Texas and 50 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, reported combined net earnings for the second quarter of \$12.8 million, compared to \$7.5 million for the second quarter last year.

Loan volume of \$3.6 billion at June 30, 1990 is a 3 percent decline from the \$3.7 billion outstanding at

December 31, 1989, and is attributed primarily to normal seasonal loan payment patterns and slow demand for new loans.

Bank management predicted that the prospect for future volume growth in the near term will hinge on the agricultural sector's economic turnaround.

"New loan demand remains slow as borrowers continue to reduce debt expense in order to improve the profitability of their operations," Rogge said. "This trend may continue as long as borrowers have limited expectation of improvement in their earnings potential."

Nationally, the Farm Credit System reported combined net income of \$171 million for the second quarter, compared to net income of \$180 million for the same period last year. Net income for the first six months of the year was \$362 million, compared with \$356 million for the first six months of 1989.
