4 Burglaries Solved

Cecil Bailey, Jr., 20, and Kevin Corcoran, 21, were taken before Judge Doyle Ramsey for arraignment on burglary charges Thursday afternoon, June 14. The pair are charged with the burglary of the Wheeler Co-op and Hibler Implement.

While at the Wheeler County courthouse for the arraignment, Bailey escaped. He left the courthouse and remains at large. Officers were called in from Shamrock and Canadian, Roberts and Donley counties and DPS Officers. Greg Smith circled the area all afternoon in a plane, trying to spot the prisoner.

At one time Bailey was thought to be hiding in a tree row north of town. The fire department was called to help with the search, but without results.

The search continued into and through the night, but Bailey remains at large.

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department is following up on numerous leads. There have been indication that Bailey is still in the area, but Sheriff Adams feels he left.







Amelia Sims Attends NWT Conference

From this historical illustration, disciples of Jesus can learn an important lesson. Genuine conversion is a commitment to the Lordship of Jesus and it is a commitment that people must make of their volition.





Emergency Farm Loan Applications Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by severe storms, flooding and tornados are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Wheeler, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor John D. Wolf III said today.

Hemphill and Wheeler Counties are two of several in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the severe storms, flooding and tornados.

Wolf said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loans needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan", the supervisor said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 18, 1991, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season," Wolf said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office is located at 112 West Oklahoma in Wheeler and is open from 8:00 a.m. to noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Mondays through Friday.


