

Mustangs Quest For Play playoffs Starts Friday

The preliminaries are over and the Wheeler Mustangs now get down to the business at hand and that is their quest for the District 1-1A championship and it starts Friday night at Nicholson Field when the Gruver Greyhounds come calling.

On paper the Greyhounds don't pose too much of a threat to the Mustangs but overconfidence has ruined many ball clubs and especially in district competition and the truly good teams don't get slipped up on.

Gruver's record is an unimpressive 1-4 but their offense is built around the passing game and this is one phase of the Mustangs defense that has been vulnerable at times and this week could see the Mustangs with a completely revamped secondary.

Texas' no pass, no play rule knocked two young men off the Mustangs varsity and an injury to the backup safety has put the Mustangs secondary in a bind. "We are hoping Jimmy Winter gets the doctors O.K. this week to play but we could have to use someone with no experience

whatsoever in Nathan Willeford's safety spot on defense," Karcher said this week.

Gruver will run from the 1 on offense with the fullback in an offset which will enable him to get into passing routes. The Greyhounds put the ball in the air more than most teams and they depend on this phase of their offense to move the ball although they haven't been able to get into the end zone that much, having scored only two touchdowns in their five games.

"I believe we can run on Gruver some and we need to keep the ball away from them because you never know when a passing team will hit a big one on you," Karcher added.

Joe Dan Ledbetter has been bothered with a slight ankle sprain this week but should be in pretty good shape by Friday night and he and Winter are the only Mustangs on the injury list.

"We really dominated Vega last week but I think our tradition helped a lot in the way we controlled play," Karcher said in looking back at the Vega victory. The head coach of the Mustangs stressed the fact that the Mustangs have got to continue to improve each week if their hopes for the '90 season are to materialize.

With the start of district play, all games in the regular season will now have a 7:30 kickoff.

Co Incident Leaves Teenager Dead

An incident in the Magic City area Monday night left one Nebraska teenager dead and the other in custody. The deceased was a parolee escapee.

The two teenagers had stolen a pickup and were traveling the back roads in search of fuel, when they stuck their vehicle in the river about noon. They had roamed around for about 8 hours and came upon a rural home in the Magic City area.

The lady of the house became concerned and called the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department. Deputy Ricky Walden responded and ordered the two to place their hands on the hood of the car. One turned and pointed a 'sawed-off' shotgun at the officer. Rick threw the patrol car in reverse and obtained some protection. He then ordered the gun be dropped. The youth then placed the shotgun to his head and pulled the trigger. The second youth was then taken into custody.

Most of the rest of the night was spent in search of the pickup.

The deceased had commented to his companion earlier that he would not go back to prison. A 17-year-old is considered an adult in Nebraska in cases involving crime.

Luttrell to Coordinate St. Jude's Bike-A-Thon

St. Jude Hospital is non-sectarian, interracial and provides medical care for over 3,200 active patients. Currently, over \$183,000 is needed each day to keep the doors open. These funds come primarily from public contributions.

This year's Bike-A-Thon is dedicated to Brooke Simon. Five-year-old Brooke, from Decambre, Louisiana, developed Wilms' Tumor in November, 1988. Following the removal of her left kidney, she has undergone radiation and chemotherapy. Though her prognosis is good, her fight still continues.

We are grateful for the concern that Mrs. Luttrell has for our work and we hope the citizens of Briscoe will support the Bike-A-Thon to help provide the funds that are needed to preserve the world's greatest asset... "Our Children."

play, the Wheeler Mustangs took their "Black Attack" to Vega last Friday night and completely dominated the Longhorns and gave them a 54-0 whipping.

Even though the visiting Mustangs didn't score their second touchdown until four minutes deep in the second quarter, they were in command from the time they lined up for the opening kickoff.

It wasn't as if the Mustangs were trying to run up an impressive score

as the Mustangs coaching staff cleared their bench in the last half and eight different players added yards to the Mustangs 355 gained on the ground. Even tackle Ronnie Hungate got in on the ball toting action.

This was the Mustangs first action of the year against a Class A team with only undefeated Wellington being able to put a blemish on the Mustangs record and the Skyrockets have been the only club to put any kind of numbers in the stats by being

able to run at all on the Mustangs smothering defense.

"We knew that our defense would have to carry us for awhile until our young backs got some experience and they have really come through for us," head coach Ronnie Karcher exclaimed.

Forcing a quick punt after kicking off to Vega, the Mustangs covered the 60 yards to paydirt in only five plays with fullback Mack Marshall going the final 18 on his only carry of the drive. Alamo Altamarino booted his first of four PAT's and a 9:08 of the first quarter, the Mustangs had begun the

outing.

The state's fourth ranked team in Class A, according to the Harris rankings, made the Longhorns offense a pathetic gesture throughout the game as the white clad Mustangs stuffed the run for a minus 5 yards for the game and Vega could only complete 2 of 16 passing attempts.

Six plays before the first quarter was over, Vega was forced to punt for the fourth time and Jason Henderson booted the ball to the Mustang 43 from which point the Mustangs methodically drove the distance.

Fourth and six faced the Mustangs on the Vega 15 after 11 running plays when the Mustangs went to the airways for the first time in the game and it was good for six points when quarterback Jason Beers found his big tight end, Matt Smith, with the scoring toss and Altamarino kicked the Mustangs into a 14-0 margin.

Two possessions later, the Mustangs added their third TD on a quick, three play drive from the Longhorn 44. Mark Marshall got his first of three touchdowns from 35 yards out with 2:36 to play in the first half.

Recovering a fumble at the Vega 40 with under two minutes remaining in the half set the stage for the Mustangs fourth touchdown of the game.

Time remained for one play after a Beers incompletion at the 5 and the Mustangs gave the call to Ike Finsterwald and the Mustangs wingback came through with the TD run as zeroes flashed on the scoreboard and Wheeler had 26 points.

It just got worse in a hurry for the host Longhorns in the second half when the Mustangs put 13 more points up in less than three minutes of play in the third quarter and tailback Mark Marshall got his second and third six pointers of the game on runs of 12 and 17 yards.

Vega was forced to kick from the end zone after receiving the second half kickoff and a short 11 yard boot gave the Mustangs the ball at the Vega 20. Mack Marshall got 8 to the 12 and then it was Mark Marshall going in from that point.

Fifty three seconds later the Mustangs had put another six points on the scoreboard after recovering a fumble on the Vega 20. Beers got 3 on a keeper and Mark Marshall traveled the final 17 yards into the end zone and Wheeler had a 39-0 cushion with nearly a half to play.

Starting from their 26 after a 15 yard fine, the Mustangs were able to cover the 74 yards in just four plays with number two quarterback, Joe Dan Ledbetter, passing to Brandon Chick for a 41 yard scoring strike as the Mustangs tried to hone their passing game, and the Mustangs took the 46-0 lead into the final quarter.

The only time the Longhorns were able to really put down a Mustang threat ended up costing them points anyway, this time via the safety route. Wheeler came up a yard shy of a first down at the Vega 3 after driving from their own 32 but Travis Hughes tackled Adrian Monzingo in the end zone two plays later to give the Mustangs another two points.

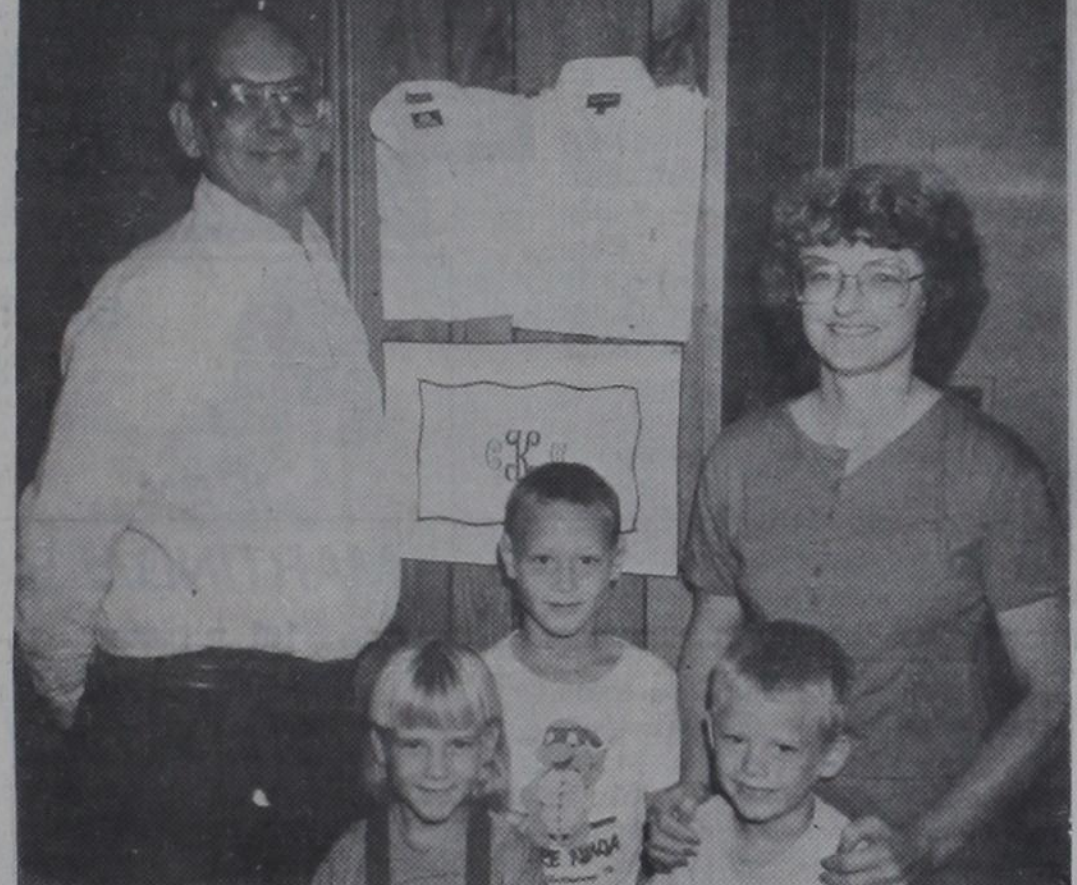
Vega had to kickoff following the safety and Nathan Willeford returned the pigskin 15 yards to the Vega 47. Willeford then got the Mustangs final scoring drive underway as he rambled 13 yards and Finsterwald capped the drive with a 25 yard scoring run and mercifully, for the homestanding Longhorns, this was the Mustangs final possession of the game.

Margaret does not have any set hours to be in her shop. You are welcome to call or stop by any time or any day that you have questions or a job to be done. Her number is 826-3630.

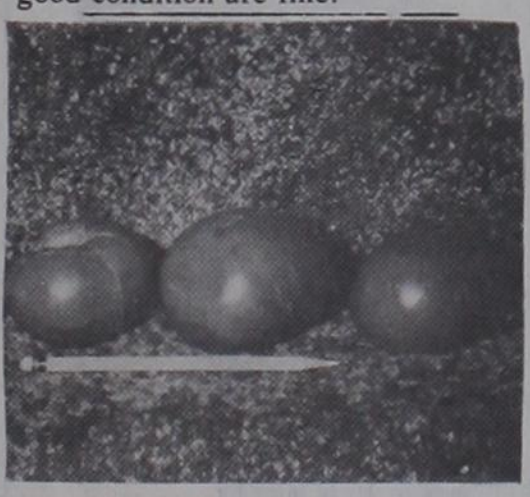

LETTER TO THE WHEELER MUSTANGS

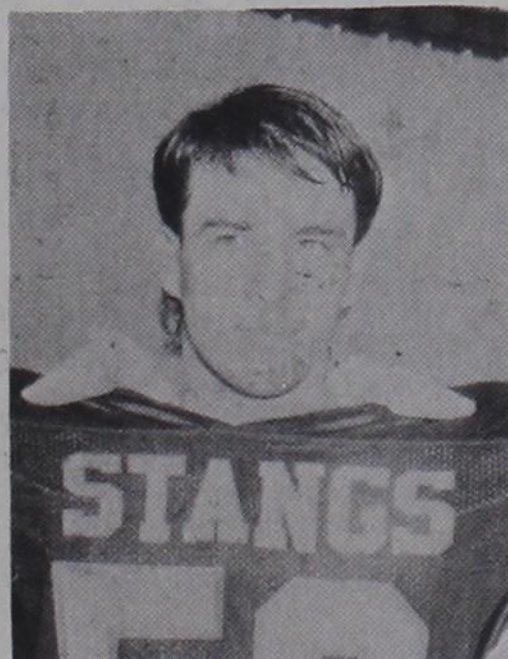

Our fans were received in a friendly manner also. many have spoken of the well-mannered crowd and fine athletes.

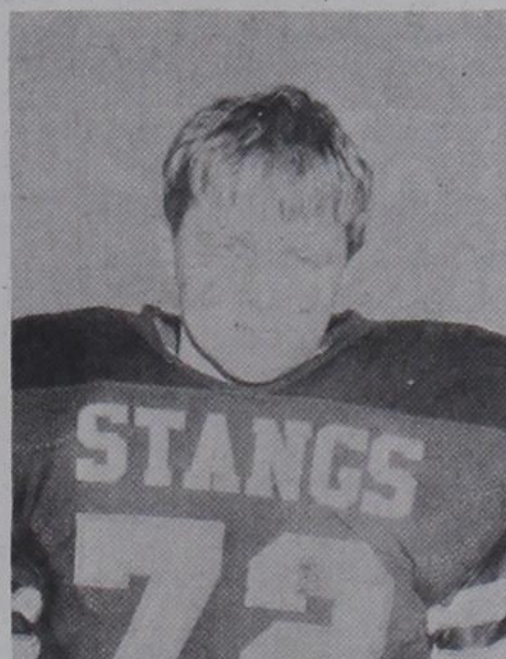

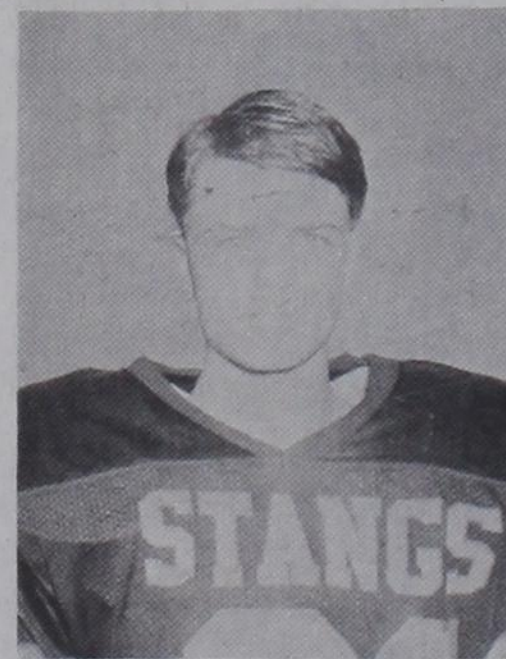
TRAVIS COOK

A rehearsal dinner hosted by the groom's parents and close friends of the bride, was held in the home of Don and Karen Meshew of Earlsboro.

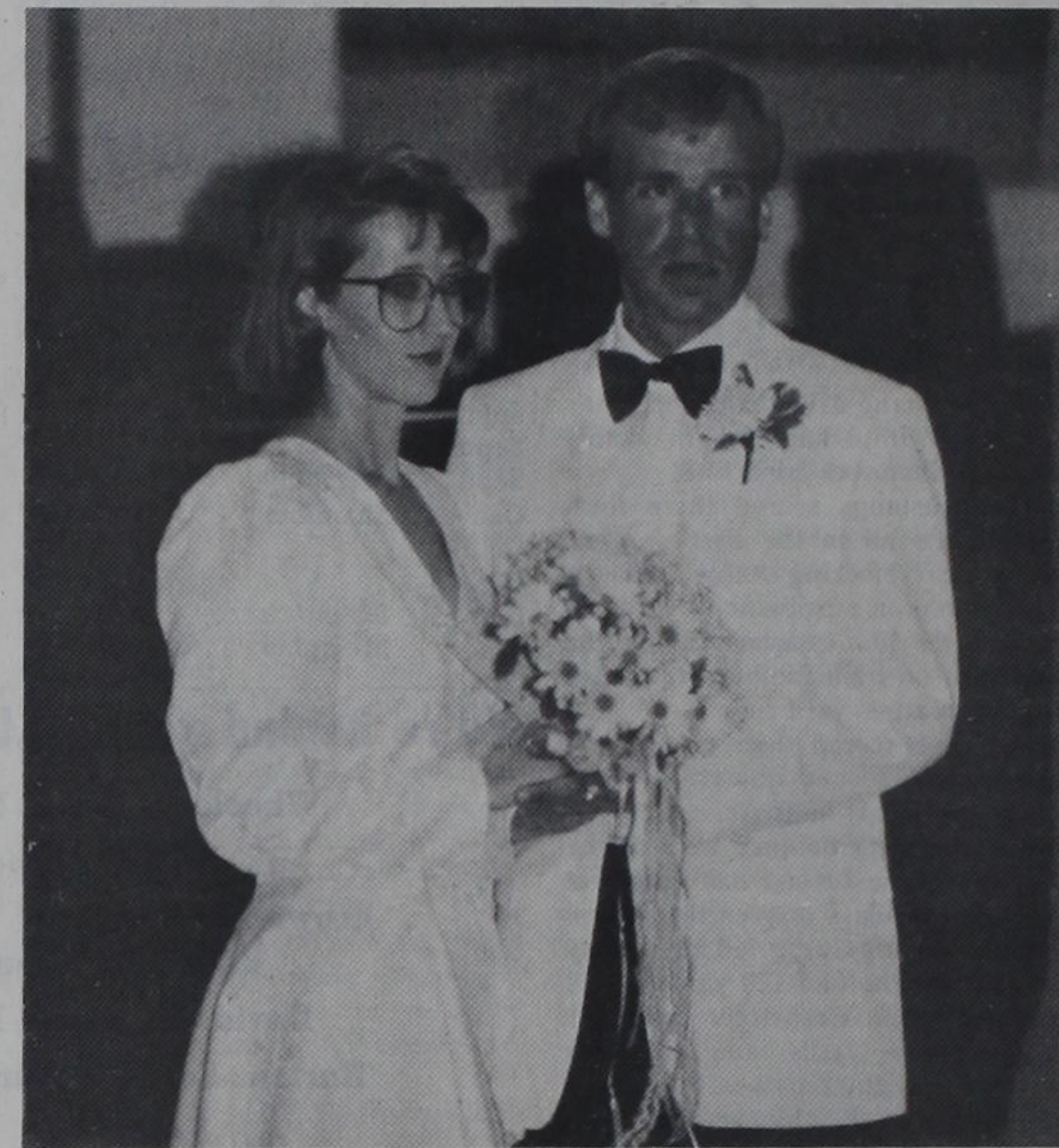
The bride is a 1981 graduate of Earlsboro High School and holds a Bachelor of Science Education degree from Oklahoma Baptist University and has done graduate work at the
