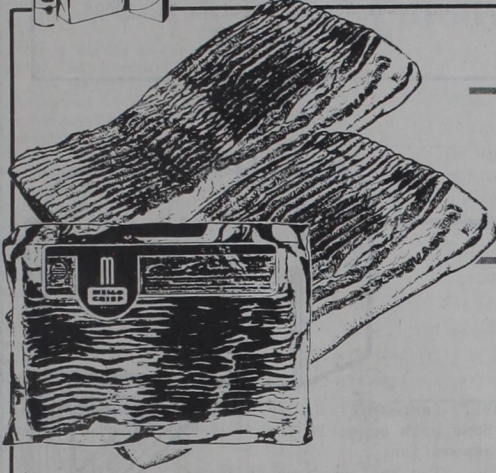

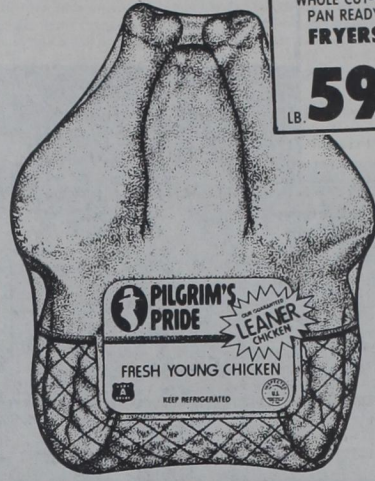

Canadian Annual Fall Foliage Festival

Canadian's annual Fall Foliage Festival, which includes a tour of historic homes, a Classic Car Show, a Quilt Show, an Arts and Crafts Show, Country Kitchen and other special events will be held Sunday, October 21st. Some of the events will also be open on Saturday, October 20th.

The Fifth Annual Classic Car Show will be held at the County Exhibition Building from 10 to 5 Saturday and 11 to 5 Sunday. Antique, classic and later model cars, trucks, street rods, motorcycles and model cars will be on exhibit. Admission will be \$2 per person at the door. Moon Man will provide entertainment for the two day event.

The River Valley Pioneer Museum will be open Saturday and Sunday from noon to 5. An exhibit of the work of area photographers and the Artist of the Month showing will be on display. Admission to the Museum is free.

On Saturday evening a Calf-Fish Fry will be held on the back lawn of the museum located on Highway 60-83, starting at 6 p.m. Live music will be provided and admission will be \$5 for adults and \$3 for children 12 and under.

FENCEWALKER will provide country western music for the Saturday evening dance at the City Auditorium beginning at 9 p.m. Admission will be \$5 per person.

Sunday's festivities will include a free Arts and Crafts Show at the

Canadian Elementary School from 11 to 5. The Women's Service League will sponsor the Country Kitchen 11:30 to 4:00 also at the school. Hot beef brisket sandwiches with beverages, will be sold for \$5. Desserts will be extra.

The 1990 Tour of Homes will feature the homes of Dick and Gail Waterfield, J.B. and Carol Reid, and Dell and Elise Krehbiel. In addition to these historic homes, the Citadel Gardens of Dr. and Mrs. Malouf Abraham and the artwork of Conrad Cooper (on display at the Moody building downtown) will be included. The tour is from 1 to 5 Sunday and tickets will be \$5 per person. (Children under 12 accompanied by an adult will be admitted free of charge.) Tickets for the Tour will be available at the River Valley Pioneer Museum and the Canadian Elementary School on Sunday.

The Museum will sponsor a Quilt Show Sunday afternoon between noon and 5 at the former Anthony's building on lower Main Street. Admission will be \$1 per person.

Live musical entertainment will be provided at the Gazebo Park Sunday afternoon between 1 and 4. There is no charge for this event and visitors will have the opportunity to sit and enjoy the music.

There is no charge for the Nature Trail and Foliage Tour in the Lake Marvin area northeast of Canadian. Visitors may enjoy an unescorted drive to Lake Marvin where a nature trails will be marked. Maps and information will be available at the Museum both Saturday and Sunday, at the Canadian Elementary School Sunday, and at the entrance to the lake area on Sunday. Foliage should be beautiful for the weekend.

Dr. Larry Barbour Named in AAFP

Dr. Larry Carl Barbour of Wheeler, TX has been named a Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national medical association representing 69,000 family physicians and medical students.

The Degree of Fellow may be attained in either of two ways: Successful completion of 600 or more hours of accredited continuing medical study, or achievement of diplomate status in the specialty of family practice as a result of passing a certifying examination administered by the American Board of Family Practice. The AAFP also requires that Fellows be members for at least 6 years.

Fellowship entitles the conferee to use the title, "Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians", or "FAAFP". The degree was conferred October 9 upon more than 400 members of the Academy in conjunction with AAFP's Annual Convention and Scientific Assembly in Dallas, TX. Fellowship candidates wore academic robes and mortarboard caps. They were recognized according to state chapter, and the oath of Fellowship was recited en masse.

The AAFP, headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri, was instrumental in establishing the medical specialty of family practice in 1969. It was also a pioneer in continuing medical education (CME), requiring its members to maintain 150 hours of approved CME credit every three years.

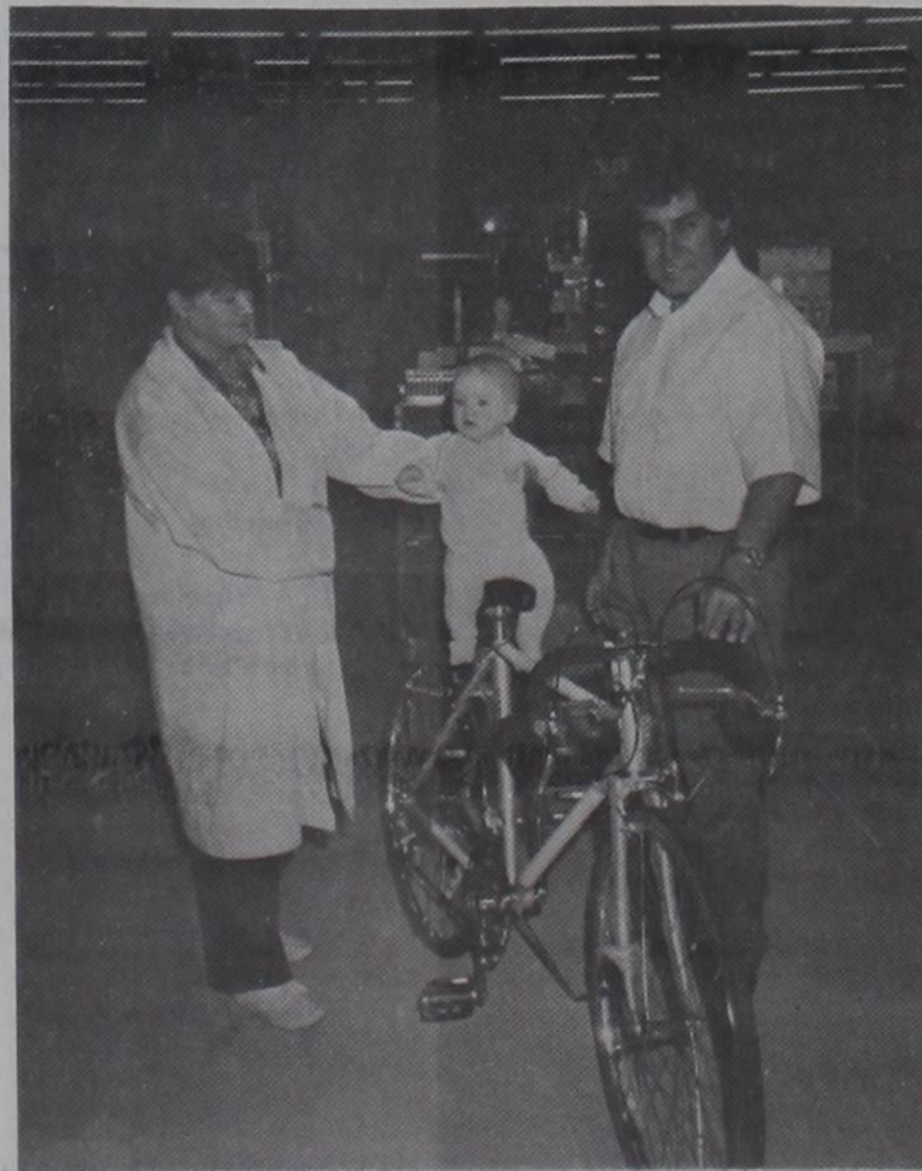
