Mobeetie Cemetery

As most of you know the Mobeetie Cemetery has a problem with grass burrs. We need to work on this problem. We should be proud of the oldest still used cemetery in Wheeler

The cemetery was in use in 1876. Among one of the first buried there was Mollie Brennan. We found her last name spelled Bennon. She was a dance hall girl killed in a gun fight between Bat Masterson and Sergeant

The oldest tombstone still standing was in 1882.

The land on which the oldest part is on was purchased Jan. 27, 1914 from I.N. Bowers by the Noble Grand of Odd Fellows #794 and Chancellor Commander of Knight of Pythians #295 and J.J. Long of the Commercial Club of Mobeetie. This was for 4 acs. The other 5 acres was bought 16 of April 1943 from I.T. Goodnight and wife Agnes M. Goodnight by the citizens of the town and community of Mobeetie through the cemetery

committee. The Cemetery Association has the books all at the First State Bank. J.J. Long had the First State Bank in his store at one time. The Cemetery Directors are Randy McCurley, Austin Caldwell, Jack Finsterwald, Bill Ridgway, Cotton Ridgway.

They have a trust fund set up so they can have perpetual care in the future. They also have a general fund.

We have now started trying to get the money to spray the grass burrs. The first part will need to be put down in Feb. or March. This is a spray to help stop the germinating of the burrs. Then it will need to be sprayed with grass burrs spray several times to get the ones that comes up. It has been estimated it will cost \$15.00 or more this year for the 10 acres. We are taking donations for this. The money can be sent to the First State Bank. If it's for spraying be sure to mark spraying. It for the trust put Trust on it. Or otherwise it will go into the general fund which is for upkeep of the mower and other necessary

The Citizens are still helping with the mowing until the Trust fund gets big enough to make the cemetery a perpetual care cemetery.

The cemetery has grown so much it is too much for Mr. St. John to take care of by himself. He has done a good job all these years. Without him it would have been overgrown with weeds beyond fixing. Many thanks to him for his years of services.

It will take several years to get rid of the grass burr problem. With everyone pulling together we can do this.

We are still working on names of people buried there with out a head stone. We are trying to get all the names typed and place so if someone is trying to find a grave they can without having to walk the whole cemetery. All but the oldest part is drawn off by lots. We can't find a map or list of the older part.
