The Mustangs had to wait until Sunday, to celebrate the team championship, as a clerical error had given the team from Clarendon the meet trophy at the conclusion of the relays Saturday afternoon. The error was discovered within 48 hours, therefore the team championship belonged to the Mustangs who compiled a total of 121 points to runner up Clarendon's 118.

The Wheeler Colts scored 77 points this past weekend to earn a runnerup finish to the Booker Kiowas in the prestigious Wheeler Mustang relays. The Kiowas scored 102 points to win the track meet.

The Colts were led by the trio of Corey Case, Andy Francis, and Jason Bradley. All three boys were blue ribbon winners as Case won the discus with a toss of 123'1", Bradley won the long jump with a leap of 17' 1/2" and Francis won the high jump by clearing 5'4". Case also placed third in the shot and fourth in the 400 meter dash. Francis also garnered a third place in the 100 meter dash and fourth in the high jump.

Other ribbon winners for the Colts were Jarrod Ledbetter, fourth in the 200 m Hurdles, and fifth in the 110 m High Hurdles and the long jump; Saul Meraz, 4th in the 1200 meter run; Chad Rives, fourth in the Pole Vault and Jeremy Kenney, 6th in the 110 m High Hurdles.

The Colts will have to perform much better if they expect to win their ninth straight District Championship this weekend in Gruver, Texas.

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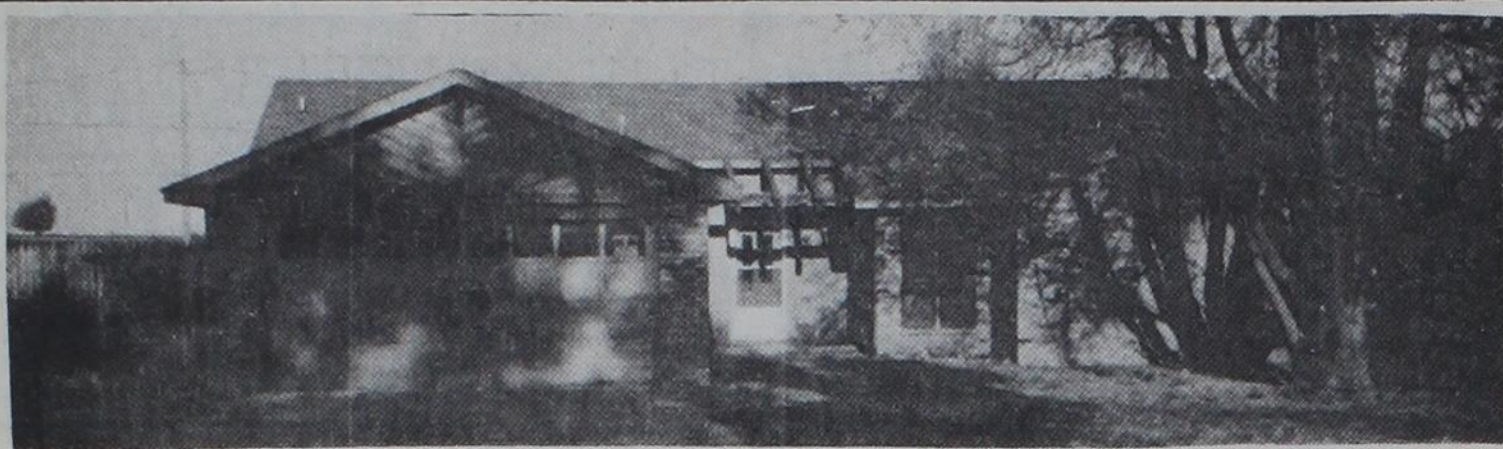

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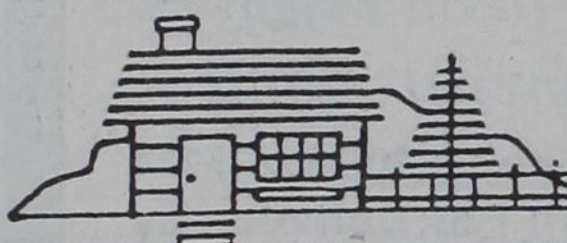

### From The Minister's Desk:

In the third chapter of John is recorded one of the most popular statements that Jesus ever spoke. This statement is: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (verse 16)

While this statement is extremely popular, it is often misunderstood. To correct this misunderstanding, it is helpful to divide this statement into three phrases. These three phrases are:—  
 "—God So loved—"

The salvation of man began with God and His infinite love. Because of His love, God made man in His image and "—breathed into his nostrils the breath of life—" (Genesis 2:7) And when man sinned and separated himself from God, the love of God did not cease. Rather God continued to love man, activating a plan for the salvation of man.  
 "—He Gave—"

This plan was consistent with the nature of God. Since God is just, His plan was just. And since God is merciful, His plan was merciful.

The fulfillment of this plan clearly occurred when God gave Jesus for the sins of man. When Jesus died for the sins of man, it satisfied the demands of God's justice. But His death also allowed God to mercifully forgive and forget the sins of man.

In the fifth chapter of Romans, the Apostle Paul described salvation as a "—free gift—" He wrote: "—The wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 6:23) Since a free gift cannot be meritoriously earned, it should be obvious salvation is by the grace of God.

Thus Apostle Paul emphasized this great truth in his letter to the church at Ephesus. He wrote: "—God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, even

Salvation is the free gift of God which is the results of God's grace not the meritorious work of man.  
 "—Whoever Believes—"

But will the grace of God save every man? No! It will only save the man who believes.

For years, man has debated whether or not faith saves. Such a debate is futile because the Bible plainly states that faith saves. (John 1:9-13, Romans 5:1-2) The real issue is not whether or not faith saves, but the type of faith that saves.

And according to the New Testament, the faith that saves is a faith that expresses itself in obedience. For example, the New Testament records that Jesus said: "He who believes in the Son has eternal life; but he who does not obey the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." (John 3:36)

To be saved man must have a faith that is expressed or demonstrated in obedience. In the second chapter of his letter, James posed some important questions when he said: "What use is it, my brethren, if a man says he has faith, but he has no works? Can that faith save him?" (verse 15) The implied answer to these questions is: "No". A faith that saves is a faith that obeys.

John 3:16 consists of twenty-five words which constitute a promise of salvation. But if this promise is to be obtained, it must be properly understood.

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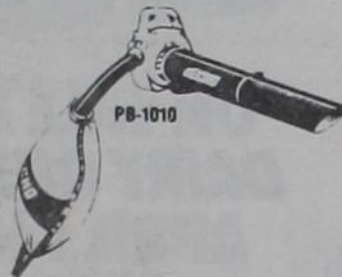
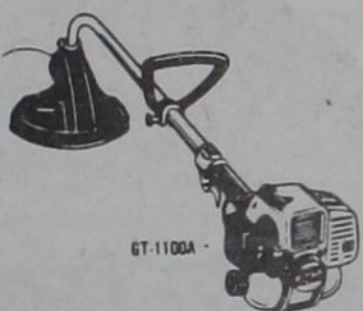

Never saw Oklahoma strut her stuff better. Orchards, Wild plums, lilacs, rebuds! I've heard our lilacs were here in 1918. Anyway, they are simply gorgeous, ten to twelve foot high. A couple of rebuds are higher than the house roof. Have five smaller blooming in our rebud forest.

I've had five inquiries about the tomatoes - two were long distance calls. Put a tablespoon of epsom salts, teaspoon of sulphur, 2 tablespoons of fertilizer in the bottom of the hole and mix well. Put about three inches of plain dirt on top. Set the plant. (If you



already have your plants set, put the salts, sulphur, and fertilizer in a circle around the plant and scratch in.) Rake the dirt in around the plant as it grows out of the hole. When set, shelter with a gallon milk jug, top and bottom cut out. Remove jug when weather settles. If freeze threatens, place crumpled paper around the plant.

Remember it takes two to tango, so plant more than one. You don't have to whip them if they bloom and don't set on. Just spray with Blossom set. It's wise to put a Porter tomato in the middle for good pollination. I plan to

have 4 Better Boys, 2 giant orange, 2 Roma along with the Porter. I plant 6 foot apart with lettuce and such in between. Sprinkle a good application of sugar around if you have nematodes.

## Pesticide Training Course Planned

A training and testing session for the Private Pesticide Applicator License is scheduled for Tuesday, April 23, 1991 in the Wheeler School Cafeteria according to Don King, County Extension Agent. The meeting is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The training session, which consist of slide-tape sets, will begin at 6:00 p.m. Following the training, Mr. Lavon Harmon of the Texas Department of Agriculture will give the test. Those who pass the test will pay a \$50.00 license fee and receive a license that is valid for five (5) years. The meeting should conclude by 10:30 p.m. Participants are encouraged to pick-up study material prior to the meeting. This study material may be obtained at the Wheeler County Extension office.

Anyone who purchases or uses a State limited Use (SLU) or Restricted Use (RU) pesticide in Texas must be licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture. The current rules for certification became effective on January 1, 1990. Under these regulations, people who wish to apply SLU or RU pesticides on their property fall into one of three groups.

Those who had a Private Applicator License as of January 10, 1989:

\* Will continue as a certified applicator

\* License is good indefinitely  
\* May purchase and use RU or SLU pesticides but may not supervise their use

Those who obtained a Private Applicator License between January 11, 1989 and December 31, 1989:

\* License is good through December 31, 1994.

\* Must attend a training course, pass the test and pay a \$50.00 license fee.

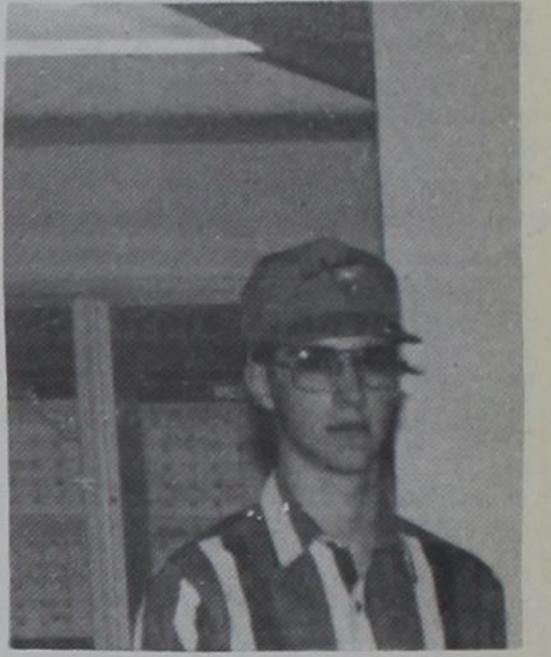
\* License good for 5 years.

\* May purchase and use SLU or RU pesticides and may supervise their use after training the individual applicator

Regardless of the method by which the applicator obtains a license; he must obtain 15 continuing education units (CEU's) within 5 years of the issuance of the license. Continuing education units are obtained by attending training sessions approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture. The meeting on April 23 is not approved for CEU's.

A meeting scheduled for May 9 at the Research and Extension Center in Amarillo will be worth 5 CEU's.

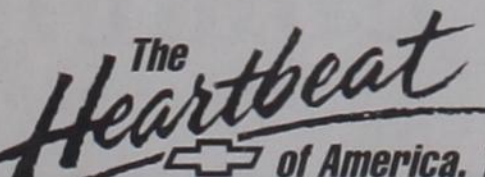


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## Co. Livestock Assoc. Annual Meeting

Despite only scoring 8.4 points a game, Wood's presence was felt elsewhere by teammates and opponents. The consummate team player, Wood's defensive prowess and his ability to can a clutch three-pointer was well known by those who played against him.

He dished out a team-high 112 assists in 1990-91 and also picked up 93 steals, yet another team-high.

Wood was the only senior starter on the Big Elk squad which finished with a 14-14 mark. At one time in the first semester, the Elks were 1-7.
