# WHEELER CRUSHES SAYRE 16-0

At about ten minutes after 8:00 p.m. last Friday night, somewhere in Sayre, Oklahoma, a fat lady must have been tuning up her vocal chords. And Willie Nelson must have been singing "Turn out the Light" on somebody's car radio. All of the Cliques for a game being over could have applied to this one.

Yoggie Berra once said "It ain't over till it's over". But Yoggie obviously hasn't been to the last two Wheeler and Sayre football games.

This one was over early as the Mustangs jumped on Sayre en route to their 2nd straight shutout 46-0. Sayre never had a chance.

Fullback Mack Marshall started the onslaught carrying the ball all three times on the 56 yard opening drive. His 33 yard T.D. run capped the drive with just seconds gone from the scoreboard. The try for extra point was no good and Wheeler led 6-0.

After two good defensive series the Mustangs started their second scoring drive. Six plays later.

Quarterback Jason Beers connected on an 8 yard TD pass to senior spit end Brandon Chick for the Mustangs second score. The run for extra point was no good. Wheeler 12 Sayre 0.

Again, the Mustang defense stopped Sayre cold on their next possession. The Eagles lost 13 yards in 3 plays and were forced to punt from their own 3 yard line.

Wheeler took over at the Sayre 39 yd. line. Mark Marshall carried for 15 yards and the Mustangs were moving again. But a fumble at the one yard line by Brandon Chick, after a 17 yd. pass from Beers, halted the threat.

The Mustang defense held and forced Sayre to punt from deep in Eagle territory.

Sophomore Chad Dunnam came in to lead the Mustangs to paydirt. Driving 29 yards in 7 plays, Dunnam hit Junior Joe Dan Ledbetter on a 7 yard scoring strike to finish the drive. Jason Beers ran for the two point conversion and Wheeler led 20-0.

Sayre tried to get something going and picked up their first, 1st down of the game, but senior Jason Judd intercepted an Eagle pass to put the Mustangs back in control.

Wheeler went to the air again, as QB Jason Beers took the Mustangs from their own 44 yd line on a 7 play drive to the Sayre end zone. Wide receiver Brandon Chick caught a 10 yard pass from Beers for the T.D.

The kick was no good and Wheeler led 26-0 at the half.

Sayre hoped to mount a threat in the second half as they moved the football into Mustang territory. But they were disappointed again as Genaro Meraz picked-off an Eagle pass at the Mustang 28 yd line.

Fullback Mack Marshall rambled 53 yards to the Sayre 19 yd. line. Three plays later Nathan Willeford took it in for the score from 10 yards out. The Ike Finsterwald kick was good. Wheeler 33 Sayre 0.

The fourth quarter was no better for the Eagles as they fumbled on their own 27 yard line.

Workhorse Mack Marshall carried for a 25 yard gain and the 2 yard TD run. Finsterwalds kick was good and the Mustangs led 40-0.

Sophomore Chad Dunnam led the

Mustangs on the final drive of the night. Junior Mark Marshall capped the ten play drive with a 12 yd. TD run. Extra point was no good and the final score was Wheeler 46 Sayre 0.

Mack Marshall led Mustang ball carriers with 195 yards on 14 carries. Mark Marshall had 49 yards on 6 carries. Nathan Willeford picked up 49 yards on 7 carries.

Q.B. Jason Beers was 5 of 9 passing for 53 yards. Soph Q.B. Chad Dunnam was also 5 of 9 picking up 54 yards.

Brandon Chick led all receivers, with 8 catches for 88 yards. And Jimmy Winters was singled out at Booster Club for his best defensive effort of the season with 13 tackles.

The Mustangs recorded their 2nd straight shut-out 46-0

Atherton, Bryan Close, and Boyd Hiltbrunner, Commissioners precincts 1, 2, 3 and 4, respectively. Also present were: Margaret Dorman-County Clerk; Ron Gowdy-County Auditor; Jimmy Adams-Sheriff and Steve Emmert-County Attorney.

### Approval of Bills For Payment:

Bill Atherton made a motion which was seconded by Bryan Close to pay the bills as approved for payment and found listed in Volume 10 page 117, et seq. of the Minutes of Accounts Allowed in the County Clerks office. Motion carried unanimously.

### Approval of Time Sheets-Hourly Employees:

Boyd Hiltbrunner made a motion which was seconded by Bryan Close to pay the hourly employees, as shown from time sheets submitted. Voting: FOR-Bill Atherton, Bryan Close and Boyd Hiltbrunner; AGAINST-Elmer Harrison. Motion carried.

### Sheriff's Office-Personnel:

Sheriff Jimmy Adams met with the Court and advised that he did not have a submissal for this day.

Steven Emmert, County Attorney, advised the Court that he had researched the use of "Drug" money and "Petty Cash" money by the Sheriff's Department. He advised the Court that all but \$86.91 was accounted for by receipts or an affidavit. He recommended that the Sheriff personally reimburse the County in the amount of \$86.91.

Boyd Hiltbrunner made a motion

which was seconded by Bryan Close to request that Jimmy Adams, Sheriff reimburse Wheeler County in the amount of \$86.91. Motion carried unanimously.

Judge Morgan advised the Court that written requests have been received from Robert Judd and Dennis Hilburn for payment of vacation and overtime pay. After discussion, it was decided that the County Auditor and County Attorney will research this and have a proposal for the Court.

## SWCD Director Election, Oct 3

An election of the Soil and Water Conservation District director to serve in Zone 3 on the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 3, 1991 in the Wheeler Soil Conservation Service office announced Clarence Zybach, Chairman of the board. The election will be held at 8:30 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in the Soil and Water Conservation District director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a Soil and Water Conservation District director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and Water Conservation District directors serve four-year terms of office.

Zone three of the district includes an area beginning at a point where the Wheeler-Gray County line intersects the North Fork Red River: thence southeast along said river to a point where said river intersects section line on eastern boundary of section 14, block A-8, H&GNRR survey; thence south along section lines to a point where said section lines intersect Wheeler-Collingsworth County line; thence west along said county line to the southwest corner of Wheeler County; thence north along Wheeler-Gray County line to a point where said county line intersects the North Fork River, which is the point of beginning.

Current members of the board of directors of the Wheeler County SWCD are Clarence Zybach, Chairman, Briscoe, Texas, Darville Atherton, Sec.-Treas., Wheeler, Texas, Paul Macina, Vice Chairman, Shamrock, Texas, James Batton, Member, Mobeetie, Texas, and John Vermillion, Member, Shamrock, Texas.

The purpose of the Wheeler County SWCD, with headquarters in Wheeler, Texas is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers, and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

## Clarendon College Vocational Programs

Clarendon College students in just the vocational programs alone are putting over 160,800 miles on their odometers in order to attend classes this semester.

The average age of college students is getting older as adults recognize the need for training and retraining. Not all students live in dormitories on a campus.

There daily cost of getting to class is one that has to be added on to tuition and books.

This "miles traveled" figure is a finding of the needs assessment done to allocate the Carl D. Perkins grant Clarendon College received this school year to support students in its five vocational programs. Students in Childress, Shamrock, Pampa and Clarendon may use Perkins funds to study electronics, licensed vocational nursing, secretarial sciences, ranch and feedlot operations, or cosmetology.

The nursing students in particular do a lot of traveling, as they are required to take part of their clinical training in area hospitals. This training is provided by hospitals in Shamrock, Childress, Memphis, and Wellington as well as Amarillo.

Child care costs are paid for eligible vocational students through Clarendon College's Perkins grant. For parents trying to support families, these costs add up quickly. Without assistance, the costs of child care would be a barrier to a better life for the whole family.

This semester's Perkins grant pays for the daily care of 28 children while their student parents are in school.

Clarendon College's purpose in obtaining the Perkins grant is to make the vocational programs more easily available to area residents. To check whether you would qualify or for other information, call the Special Populations Coordinator at 806/875-3571.

Dorothy and Adrian Risner spent a couple of days last week with their grandchildren, Wade and Kari Childress in Oklahoma City.

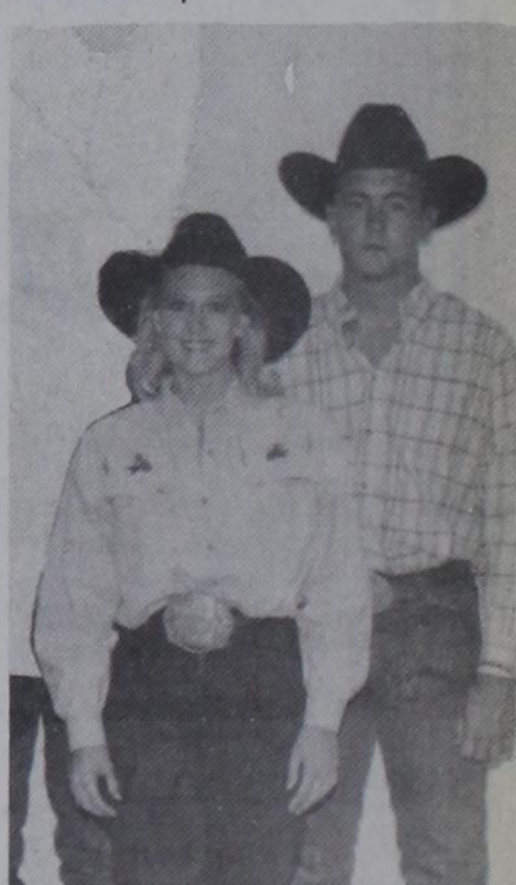
One day this week Joann Helton and Dorothy Risner had a "fun" day in Pampa.

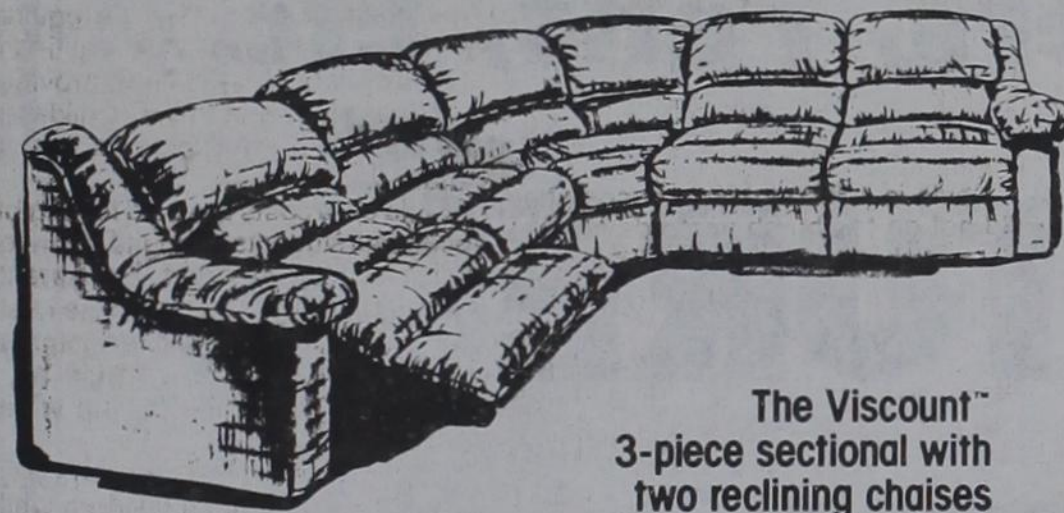
