#### CHOOSING THE RIGHT WEIGHT PROGRAM

Are you like 46 percent of the women and 27 percent of the men questioned in a recent USDA survey who were attempting to lose weight? Has your passion to lose weight led you to join a weight -loss program?

In 1989, \$1.78 billion were spent on commercial weight-loss programs and \$5.49 billion on hospital or medical center-affiliated programs. It's predicted that the market for weight loss will increase by 10.6 percent annually through 1995. About \$35.8 billion will be spent on weight loss efforts this year alone, ranging from diet books and diet soft drinks to appetite suppressants and exercise clubs, according to John LaRosa, director of research at Market Data Enterprises, a research firm based in Valley Stream, New York.

Most people are aware that losing weight isn't easy even under the best circumstances. In addition, it can be unpleasant if a weight-loss program doesn't meet your needs.

Before selecting a weight-loss program, ask these questions:

\* Will the program be medically supervised? What contact will you have

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"no" needs more questions answered Does the program demand that you buy formula drinks, special supple-

ments or prepared foods to be purchased at meetings or from the clinics? Are prices for these products included in the quoted fee or are they

\* How fast is the weight loss? Recommended weight loss by health professionals is no more than one half pound to two pounds per week to guard against loss of lean muscle

\* What are the possible unpleasant side effect such as dizziness, dry skin or bad breath? How will your activities be restricted?

\*What are the program costs? Fees for many of the programs vary de pending on location and amount d desired weight loss. Are educational components of the program such a videos or audio cassettes and mainte nance periods included in the star dard program fee?

Use this information when sizing u a diet program. The only way to los weight safely is by following a soun weight loss program that results in healthy eating habits and includes a exercise component.

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

# **Emergency Farm Loan Applications Accepted**

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by Drought between 1-1-91 and 6-6-91 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Wheeler, FmHA County Supervisor Danny Wolf said today.

Wheeler County is one of 1 in 16 recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the Drought

Danny Wold said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500.00, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Mr. Wolf said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

'Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until 8-10-92 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the

new farming season," Wolf said. FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority

The FmHA office in Wheeler is open from 8:00 am to 12:00 noon 1:00 pm to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood, and other natural disasters in either 1990

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said ASCS official Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 per-

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13.

The 1990-91 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugarcane and tobacco; and all commercial nonprogram crops.

Harris said producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. He said that farmers will receive a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. " If a producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the county ASCS

Harris explained that a producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same farm for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program may be obtained from the local ASCS office.
