#### SUFFERING FOR CHRIST

I Peter 4:12-13, "Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: But rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings."

If someone doesn't know what God has provided and promised, he won't have the provision or promise. If someone doesn't know how to take proper care of the body and does things to it such as eating harmful foods all the time or smoking, it will take a toll and cause suffering which has nothing to do with serving Christ. It has to do with violating natural laws and paying the price for it.

REMEMBER THIS! This will help you greatly. The Lord does not ever want you to suffer anything from which Christ redeemed you. It couldn't be His will to redeem you from something and also be His will for you to suffer with it. In next week's article in this newspaper, I want to show you some things from which we that are Christians have been redeemed.
