In Person Early Primary Voting Begins Feb. 19

Early voting for the March 10 primaries begins Wednesday and ends March 6 for in-person voting. Wheeler County voters may cast ballots in the Wheeler County Clerks office, first floor of the Courthouse. The office will be open from 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday. Voters are required to present their voter registration certificates to the Clerk if they wish to vote early during this time. The deadline for applications for voting by mail is March 3. The applications must be in the clerks office on that day and the return date for voted ballots is March 10th. Persons not over 65 wishing to vote early by mail must provide an address outside of the county for their ballot to be mailed to. A written application for early voting by mail MUST include the following: name, permanent address, address for the ballot to be mailed to, party preference, reason for voting early and the application MUST be signed by the voter making the request. From the Minister's Desk:

I recently read an article that contained some terrifying statistics about child abuse. These statistics were:

Two hundred thousand children are physically abused each year.

Fifteen to twenty percent of American families abuse their children.

Two thirds of all child abuse occurs with children under four years of age and one-third are under six months of age.

The number one killer of children of under five years of age is child abuse.

Child abusers are found in every category of society. No social, economic, or religious types are excluded.

Most of us recognize the tragedy of these statistics and would agree that parents who commit such abuse should be criminally prosecuted. But we fail to recognize that physical abuse is not the only way that parents can abuse their children. Child abuse is also committed by parents when they fail to teach their children a standard of morality.

President Theodore Roosevelt once observed: "Educate a man in mind and

not in morals and you make a menace to society." And there is much evidence that such a mistake is being made. For example, eighty-five percent of teenage marriages are forced marriages. Thirty-seven percent of these marriages end in divorce the first year of marriage and five years after marriage fifty percent are divorced. In 1990, one million teenagers were jailed in this nation. Forty-nine percent of these teenagers were under eighteen years of age.

As these statistics clearly show, there are many children who are characterized by a permissive and immoral attitude. But who is responsible for this attitude? The parents of these children are! They have failed to teach their children a standard of morality.

While some parents are too rigid in the training of their children, it does not justify others who are too indulgent. Parents must teach their children a standard of right and wrong. And when parents fail to teach this standard of right and wrong to their children, they are guilty of child abuse.

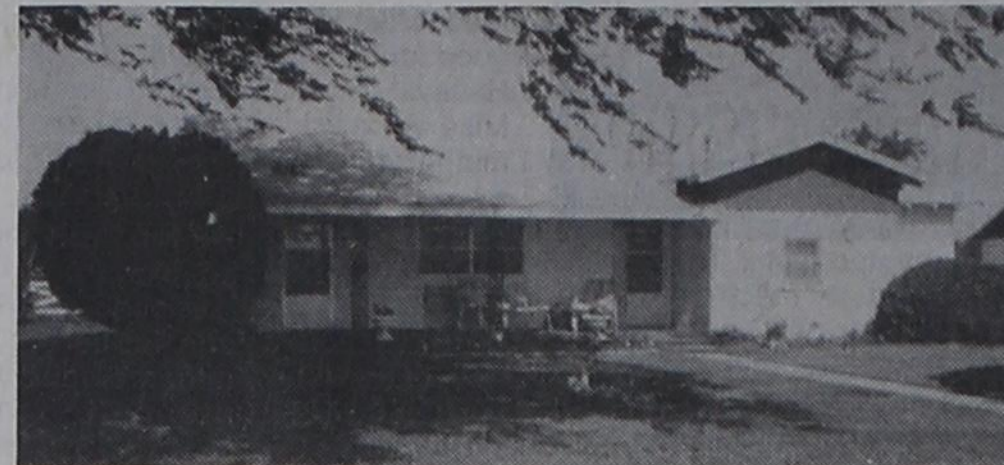

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE FOR DISABLED VETERANS

Veterans with a service-connected disability can receive property tax relief in 1992 by filling out a simple exemption form at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.

The amount of exemption is based on the veteran's percentage of service-connected disability and can range from \$1,500 to \$3,000. The following taxpayers are eligible: A disabled veteran; a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried; a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried; a surviving spouse of a person killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at application time; a surviving minor child of a person who was killed on active duty, if the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

Any eligible person who has not received this exemption before must apply by April 30. Those who received the exemption in 1991 need not re-apply in 1992.

An applicant can claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home or any other property the applicant owned on January 1. The applicant must be a Texas resident in order to qualify and must file the exemption application at the appraisal district office by April 30.

An applicant may be required to provide proof of the service-connected disability, such as documentation from the Veterans Administration or the branch of the armed services in which the veteran served. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death, or age may also be required.

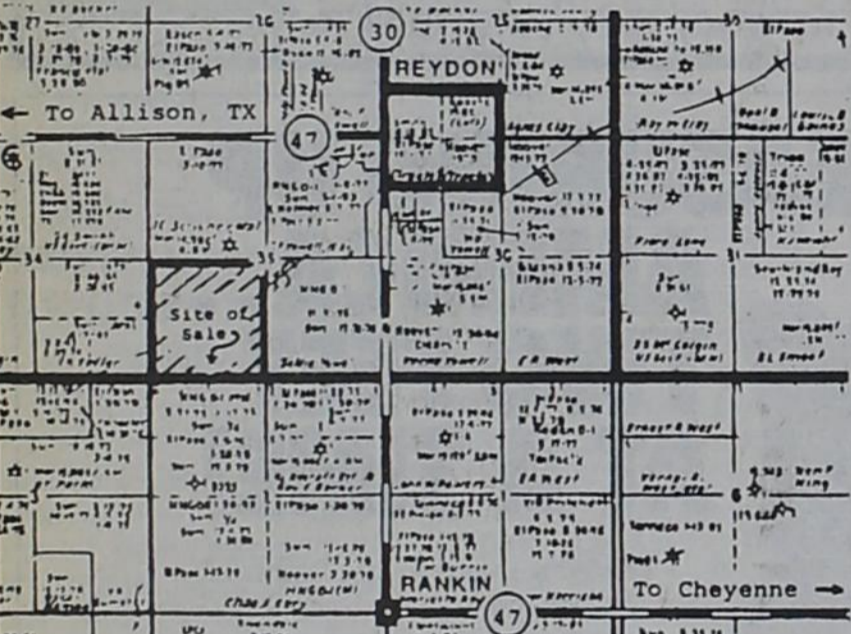
