


In PersonEarly **Primary Voting Begins Feb. 19**

Early voting for the March 10 primaries begins Wednesday and ends March 6 for in-person voting. Wheeler County voters may case ballots in the Wheeler County Clerks office, first floor of the Courthouse. The office will be open from 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday. Voters are required to present their voter registration certificates to the Clerk if they wish to vote early during this time.

The deadline for applications for voting by mail is March 3. The applications must be in the clerks office on that day and the return date for voted ballots is March 10th. Persons not over 65 wishing to vote early by mail must provide an address outside of the county for their ballot to be mailed to. A written application for early voting by mail MUST include the following: name, permanent address, address for the ballot to be mailed to, party preference, reason for voting early and the application MUST be signed by the voter making the request.



PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE FOR DISABLED VETERANS

Veterans with a service-connected disability can receive property tax relief in 1992 by filling out a simple exemption form at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.

The amount of exemption is based on the veteran's percentage of serviceconnected disability and can range from \$1,500 to \$3,000. The following taxpayers are eligible: A disabled veteran; a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried; a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried; a surviving spouse of a person killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at application time; a surviving minor child of a person who was killed on active duty, if the child is both under 18 and unmarried. Any eligible person who has not received this exemption before must apply by April 30. Those who received the exemption in 1991 need not re-apply in 1992. An applicant can claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home or any other property the applicant owned on January 1. The applicant must be a Texas resident in order to qualify and must file the exemption application at the appraisal district office by April 30. An applicant may be required to provide proof of the service-connected disability, such as documentation from the Veterans Administration or the branch of the armed services in which the veteran served. Depending on the applicant, proof or marriage, death, or age may also be required. 




