Extension Update

PROTECT YOUR ENVIRONMENT BY USING YOUR KITCHEN WISELY

Protecting the environment has become a top priority. While the future of the environment lies to a great extent in the hands of government leaders and set policies, grassroots efforts to curb energy use can also make a significant impact on the state of the planet. Follow these tips to use less energy in the kitchen:

*Use the smallest oven possible to cook; larger ovens may use more energy than is necessary, which in turn can contribute to environmental damage.

*Save glass jars and plastic containers and use them instead of aluminum foil or plastic wrap to store leftovers.

*Take advantage of a crock pot, which uses little energy, for soups and stews or other dishes that takes a long time to cook.

*Cook with a pan that is the same size as the burner when cooking on an electric stove. If a six-inch pan is heated on an eight-inch burner, more than 40 percent of the heat generated by the burner is lost.

*When possible, keep the lid on a pot or pan during cooking. Spaghetti heated in a pot without the lid requires three times as long to cook as spaghetti heated in a covered pot.

*Keep metal grease-catching burner pans clean. Clean, shiny pans reflect heat upward toward the cookware, whereas dirty, blackened ones absorb heat and reduce cooking efficiency.

*Turn off electric burners a minute or so before a dish is fully cooked; a red hot burner will continue to generate heat.

*Keep air circulating inside the oven by staggering pans on upper and lower racks. Good air flow allows for efficient cooking of foods.

*Make sure the inside of the microwave oven is clean to maximize its ability to heat food.

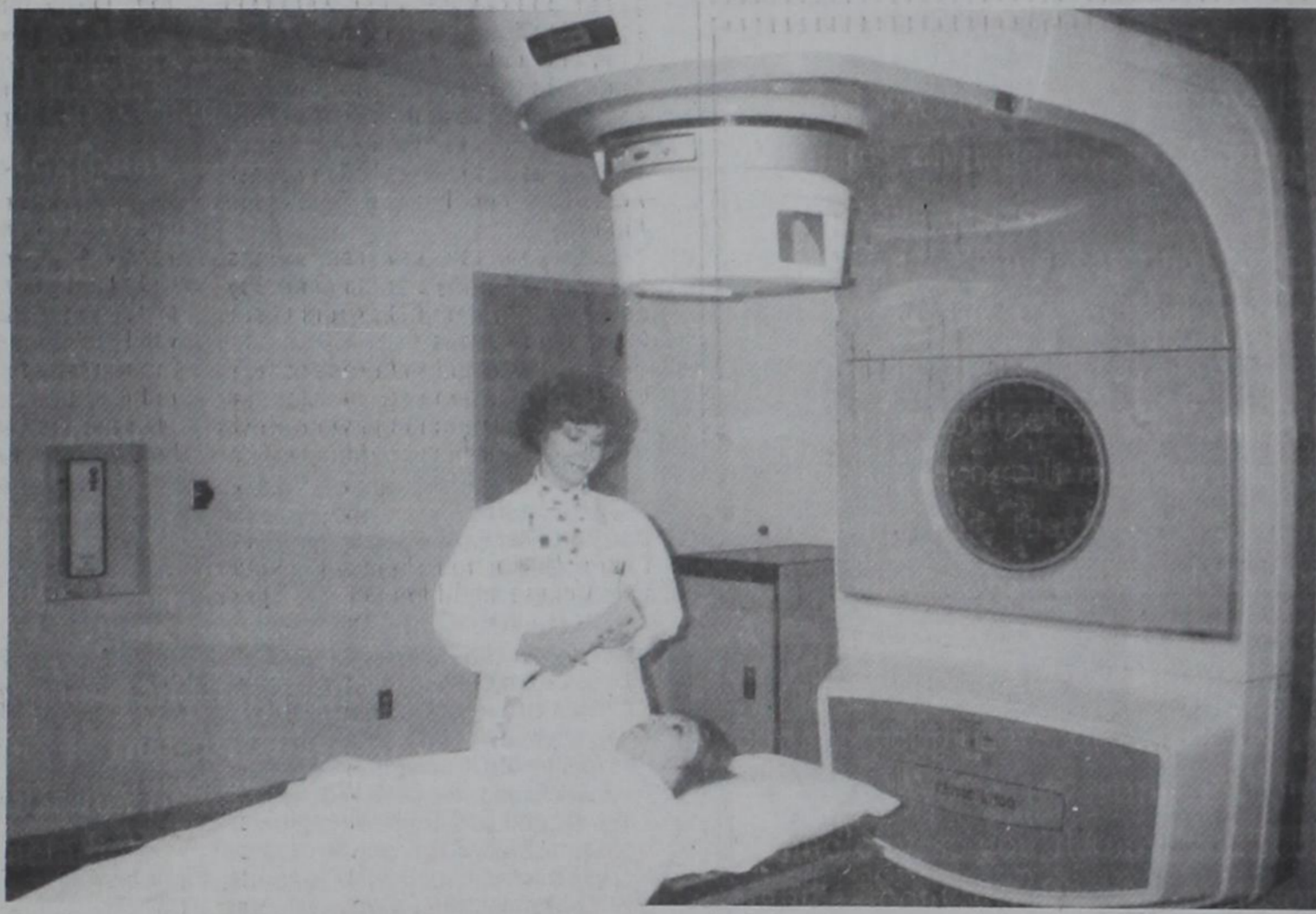

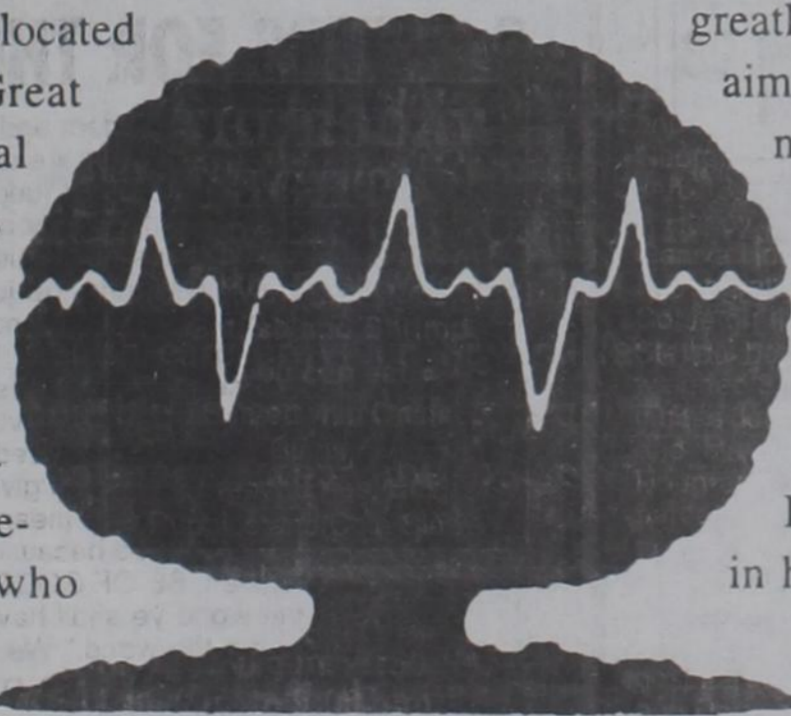

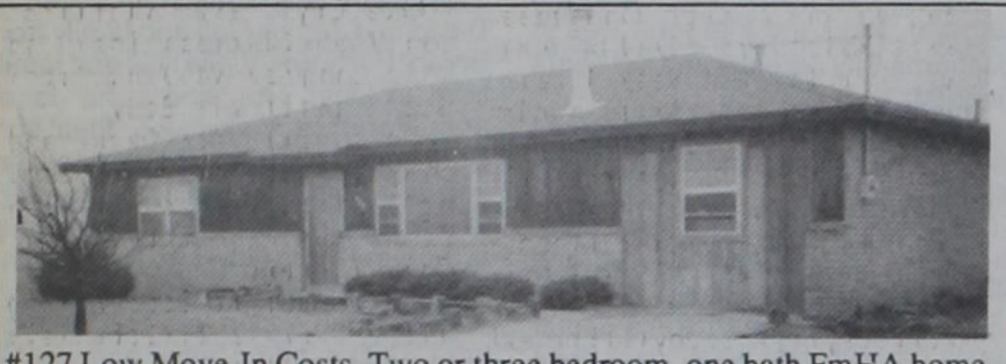

The next evening, the Mustangs travelled to Booker for a Saturday evening contest. Without three varsity players, the team was unable to keep pace with their former District rivals, the Kiowas coasted to a 67-48 win. The game was really decided at the free throw line, as Booker converted 7 more free throws than Wheeler attempted. Starters Hefley and Baize fouled out early in the 4th quarter and the effects were apparent as Booker scored 27 points in the fourth. Despite his early exit, Baize was able to contribute 17 points and 12 rebounds. Damon Remy added 9 points.

On Monday, the Mustangs travelled south to meet the 3A Vernon Lions. There, they found out what precision basketball is all about as the home-standing Lions shot over 55% from the field and methodically picked apart the Wheeler defense for a 77 to 51 win. Despite the loss by such a margin, many positives were seen.

"We made some plays that were outstanding because they had to be in order to be successful against a good team like Vernon," stated Coach Read. "Games like these help you improve because our kids can see what it takes to be a better team." Sophomore Wiggins led the scoring with 18 points. Joe Dan Ledbetter and Baize were in double figures also with 11 and 10 points respectively. Wiggins had 8 boards and Hefley added 6 more. Remy had 4 assists and only 1 turnover.

Following a U.I.L. mandated 5 day layoff, the Mustangs hooked up with the Lockney Longhorns of District 3-2A in the Claude Tournament. In typical post-holiday fashion, the teams combined for 36 turnovers and both shot around 50% from the free throw line. In the end, the breaks favored Lockney, who emerged a 62-57 winner over the Mustangs. Lockney was the eventual tournament runner-up as they defeated Claude

but lost to Channing in the finals. Three Wheeler boys finished in double figures: Wiggins had 13; Remy scored 11. Joe Dan Ledbetter pounded the boards for 10 rebounds and Baize added 8 caroms. Jarrod Ledbetter was a perfect 4 for 4 from the field.

Now playing in the consolation bracket, the Mustangs jumped all over the Kress Kangaroos in the second half enroute to a 79-61 victory. The Stangs outscored the Roos by 20 in the third quarter as Wiggins popped in 13 points in the 8 minute span. Wiggins was the team leader in scoring with 21 points as well as rebounding with 11 boards. Joe Dan Ledbetter and Chad Dunnam added 12 points each. Jason Hink came off the bench to tally 8 rebounds.

In the consolation championship, Wheeler avenged an earlier loss to Sunray by pulling away in the fourth stanza behind Joe Dan Ledbetter's 15 point quarter. Trailing by 4 after three periods, the Wheeler boys nearly doubled their score with 26 points in the final 8 minutes. Clutch free throws helped as the Stangs were 7 of 10 down the stretch. Ledbetter ended with 23 points and 9 rebounds. Wiggins chipped in 11 points and 8 rebounds. Baize added 7 boards. The final score was Wheeler 55, Sunray 46.

In another payback game Saturday, the Mustangs beat the Booker Kiowas, who braved the weather to travel for the game. Despite trailing at the end of each of the first three quarters, Wheeler was able to come away with a 9 point victory. Keys to the win were an improved free-throw percentage and gutsy defense by Joe Dan Ledbetter against Booker's Toby Wynn. Besides Stellar defense, Joe Dan added 14 points and 12 rebounds in leading the Stangs to a 58 to 49 win. Wiggins again led the scoring with 21 points. Justin Hefley played a fine game against the Kiowa pressure as he had to turnovers in the game. Chad Dunnam played some of his best basketball in the second half with some key rebounds and steals in the decisive fourth quarter.

For his performance in games against Miami, Booker and Vernon, Phil Wiggins was chosen player of the week by the Pampa News on December 24. In the three game span, Wiggins scored 52 points for a 17.3 average. This included shooting 46% from the field and 67% from the line. He also contributed nearly 6 rebounds per game. "Phil has been a pleasant surprise for me this year. He does so many good things for us. It is difficult to mention them all. Probably the best thing is that he is developing into a very good leader on and off the court. I am pleased to see one of our players be honored this way," commented Coach Shawn Read. Phil is a sophomore at Wheeler High School and is the son of Billy and Tobytha Wiggins.

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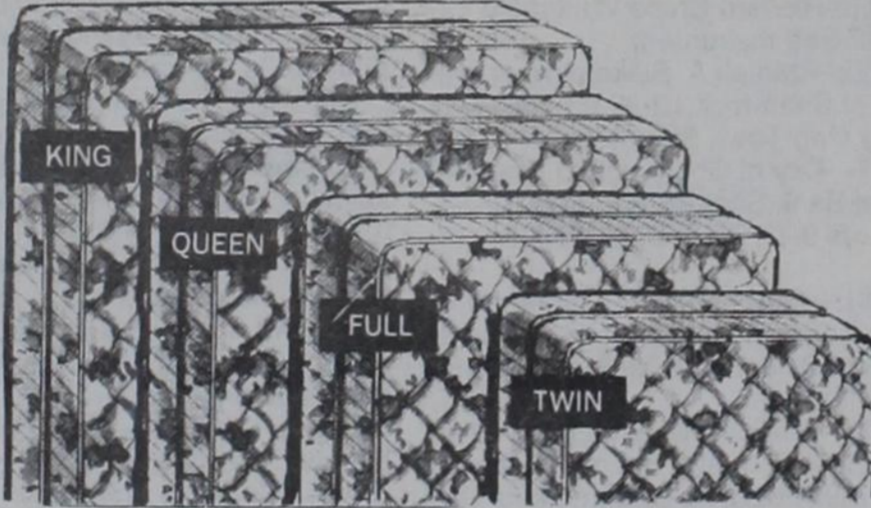

Extension Update

"DOTS" INCREDIBLE

Take a visit to a local clothing store or glance through some mail order catalogs and you will see that polka dots are still in fashion. Polka dots are seen in a variety of colors and sizes. Some polka dotted fabrics are washable. Others are dry clean only. Many of the dots are not dry cleanable especially on stencil prints. A stencil print has a raised surface design and is made by applying a lacquer to the fabric through a stencil template. The template can be made of cardboard, wood, or metal. Color is applied over the stencil by rollers, brushes, or sponges.

Stencil printed polka dots can be recognized by their glossy, paint-like appearance on the surface of the fabric. They often need a plasticizer to keep them soft and pliable. The plasticizer may be soluble in dry cleaning solvent. When the plasticizer dissolves, it causes the dots to stiffen, curl, shrivel, or crack. Stencil printed polka dots are usually used on rayon, acetate, polyester, nylon, or synthetic/cellulose blended fabrics. Occasionally, stencil prints are seen in outerwear garments.

When caring for polka dotted fabrics, follow the care label to avoid permanent damage such as bleeding of the color to your fabric and clothing investments.

The annual national Spelling Bee, co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University, Canyon, is open to any student who must not have passed beyond the eighth grade at the time of their individual school finals; and must not have reached their 16th birthday on or before the date of the national finals.
