Wheeler ISD ENROLLMENT AUGUST 14

Wheeler ISD will have enrollment from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Friday, August 14.

All students will need to fill out an enrollment/information card.

New students to Wheeler ISD also need to complete a Home Language Survey, Student Health Information, and a request for release of records from your previously attended school. Please bring a copy of your child's immunization records for the school nurse.

If you child is enrolling in public school for the first time, bring an official copy of their birth certificate.

If you feel that you may qualify for free or reduced breakfast/lunch, you may apply for this service also.

School will begin on Monday, August 17 at 8:15 a.m.

Wheeler I.S.D. Elementary & Jr. High Registration

Registration for Wheeler Elementary and Jr. High Students will be on Friday, August 14, from 9:00 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. Students new to the District must provide their Birth Certificate and Immunization Records and Social Security Number.

High school students new to the district please report to the high school principal's office any business day between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. to enroll.

Classes will begin on Monday, August 17, at 8:10 a.m.

To Parents of Wheeler Elementary Students

Students in grades 1-6 at Wheeler Elementary will need tennis shoes to use in physical education. These shoes will be left at school. They do not have to be new, but they need to be clean, soles scrubbed, with no rocks

or stickers in the sole. Please be sure they are non-marking soles and absolutely no cleats. Shoes should be labeled with the child's name and grade. If there are any questions please contact Coach Finsterwald or Coach Newland at the school.

Kindergarten Registration Packet

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler ISD Kindergarten will become available Thursday, August 6, and may be picked up in the hall outside the Superintendent's office on business days: Monday through Thursday 8-12; 1-3 and Friday 8-12.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/emergency card; 2. Student health information (a two page questionnaire); 3. Home language survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names, before his/her child can be enrolled in school.

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

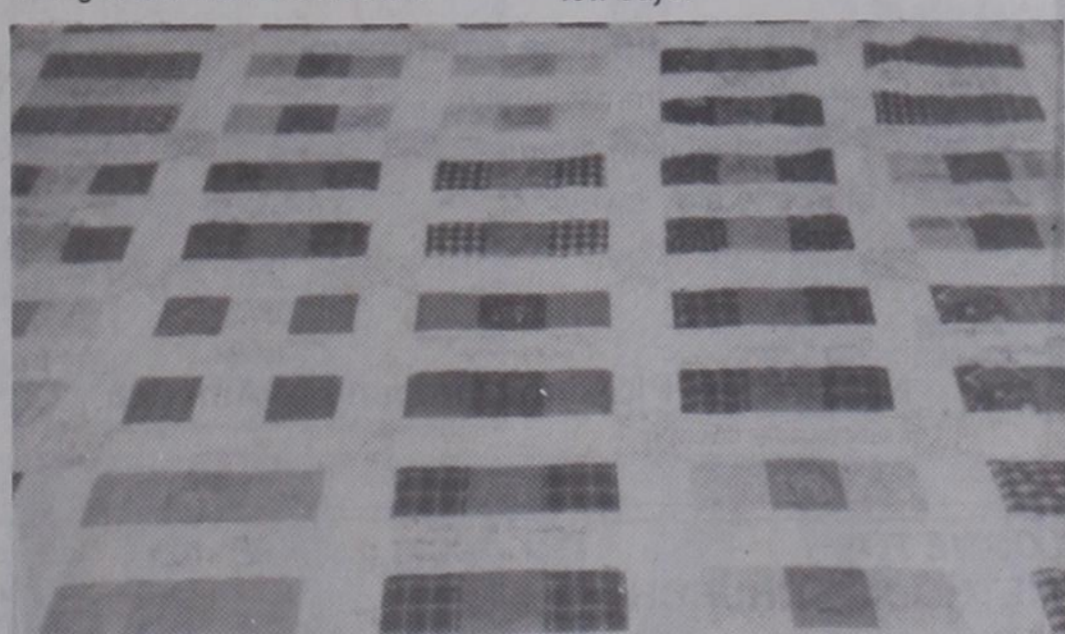
Mr. Barton was born in Reed, Okla. He was a retired machinist and a member of the Church of the Nazarene. He was a veteran of World War II.

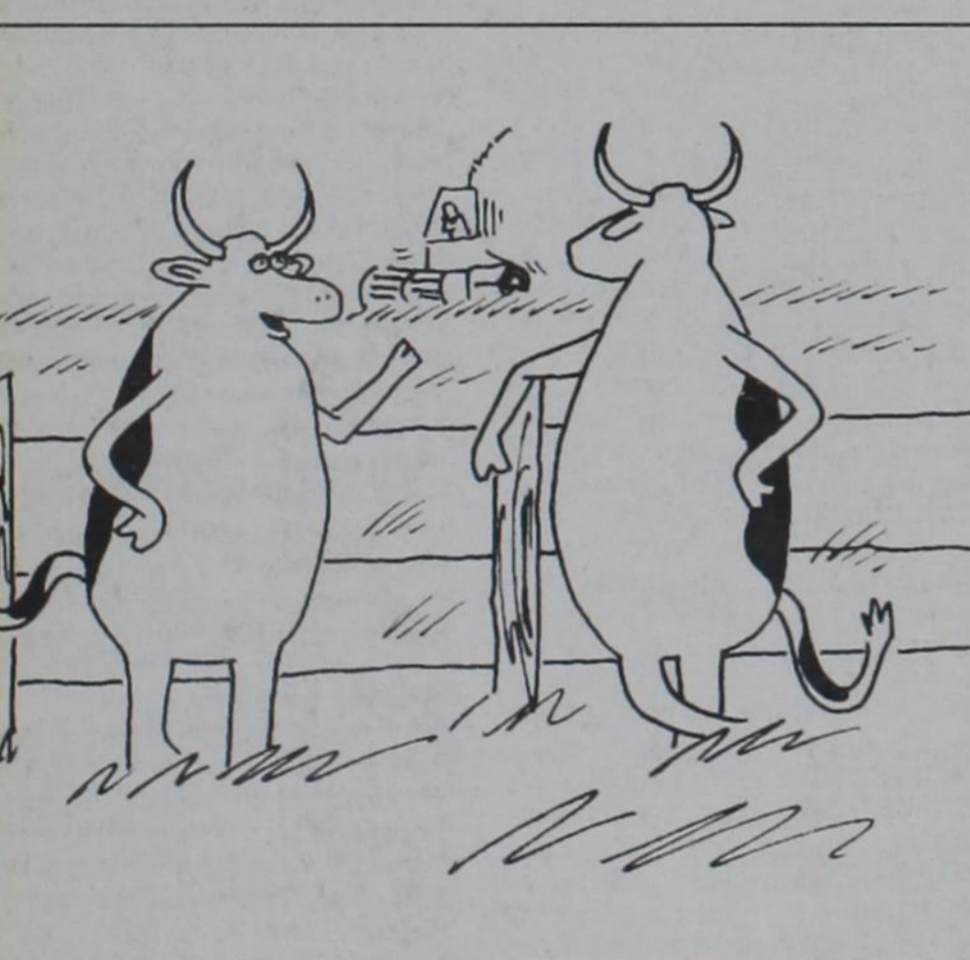

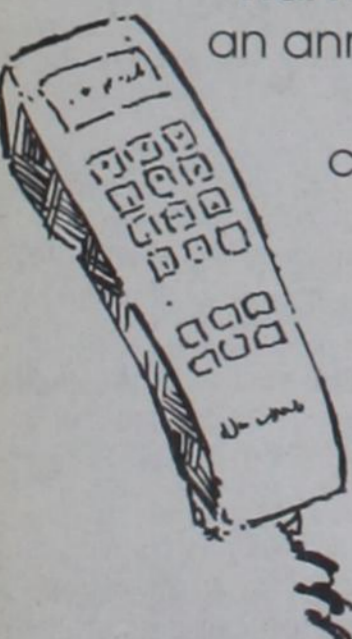

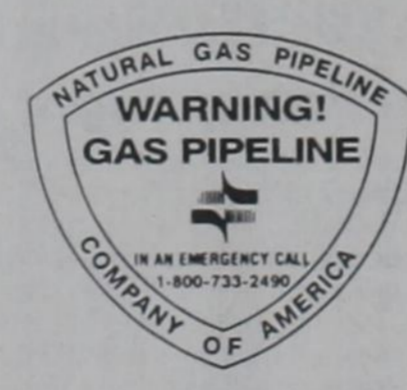

SUFFERING FOR CHRIST

(Part 7)

Romans 6:6, "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin." For several weeks, I have been addressing the subject of "suffering for Christ". Children of God sometimes suffer for the faith. I have shown you though that it is clear from the Scriptures that not all kinds of suffering is in the will of God. He has redeemed us from some things.

One thing that God has saved us from is sin. God does not want us to suffer because of sin in our lives. Sin causes trouble. It causes pain. It does indeed lead to suffering, but it is not a type of suffering that Christians are expected to endure. God has provided a way to be freed from the bondages of sin. Sinners cannot help sinning because that is their nature. When a person receives Christ and makes Jesus the Lord of his entire life, he becomes a new creature according to the Bible, and his nature is changed.

We are told over and over again that we are all sinners, but some of us (those who have received the Lord) are sinners saved by grace. That is not a correct statement. All have sinned. There is not a single one of you reading this article who has not sinned, and all therefore need a Savior. But upon receiving Christ, a person becomes a different kind of creature. He is not a sinner. He may do something that is sinful, but it goes against his new nature, and his conscience will plague him a great deal.

Believers are commanded to do something that non-Christians cannot do. That is, we are to reckon ourselves to now be dead to sin (dead means "separated"). We are told, "Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof."

It doesn't help us to live above sin as long as we keep calling ourselves "sinners saved by grace". We were sinners. We that are saved did get saved by grace. But, we are not still sinners. We are children of God. In fact, the Bible calls us "saints". We are not reckoning ourselves dead to sin while we call ourselves sinners though "saved sinners". God has not planned, nor is it His will, for us to continue suffering because of sin in our lives after we have accepted Him into our lives.

From the Minister's Desk:
From 1957 to 1976, Darrell Royal was the head football coach at the University of Texas. During this tenure of nineteen years, Coach Royal and his teams compiled an impressive won/lost record, winning the national championship in 1963, 1969 and 1970. For a successful football coach, Coach Royal had an unusual philosophy about the game of football. He believed the game to be a brutal game that did not build character in football players. In his biography, *The Darrell Royal Story* he is quoted as saying: "I would tell the parents of the players that I was recruiting that if they sent me a good one, I would probably send them a good one back. But if they sent me a weak one, I would probably send them a weak one back." Apparently Coach Royal believed that the development of character in children was the responsibility of their parents. I wish some of the critics of society were as perceptive in their observations. It has become extremely popular to blame churches and schools for the lack of character that many children demonstrate. Yet the Bible teaches that "—children are a gift—" to parents. (Psalms 127:3) Parents are also told "—to train—" their children in the way that they should go, disciplining them wisely and firmly. From these admonitions it should be obvious that parents are responsible for the development of character in their children—not schools and churches.

Of young people camouflaging the fact of impending parenthood with a marriage ceremony. Of rushing young girls into adulthood too soon. Of immodest dress in church and hugging at school. Of our letting our youth stay out at all hours and being tempted beyond their years. Of our wanting our children to have success more than goodness. Of broken hearts and ruined lives so needlessly. I am tired of churches and schools being blamed for these broken hearts and ruined lives. It is time for more parents to take responsibility for their lives and the lives of their children. Churches and schools can offer help and encouragement to parents, but the ultimate responsibility for the development of character in children belongs to their parents.

In a recent issue of McCall's magazine there was an article that hit the proverbial "nail on the head". The article said; "Parents, let your children know where you stand. They need parents who will love them and who will discipline them." There is a Chinese proverb that says: "You cannot carve rotten wood." A football coach like Darrell Royal, cannot. Neither can churches and schools. If parents send good kids to churches and schools, churches and schools will probably send good kids back to the parents. But if parents sent bad kids to churches and schools, churches and schools will probably send bad kids back to the parents.

1992 Property Tax Rates in Allison Independent School District

Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. 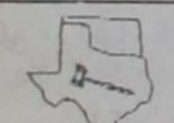
