We stopped for a short time in OKC and returned home later in the evening.



Tanner Collins Named "Athlete of the Week"

Tanner Collins was named Amarillo's National Bank Athlete of the Week in the *Amarillo Globe News*. Facing the high-powered Happy offense in a six-man bi-district clash Friday in Groom, Wheeler was going to need some offense of his own. The Mustangs got it from senior running back Tanner Collins in a 99-56 victory. Collins carried 21 times for 264 yards and six touchdowns, teaming up with backfield mate Cole Hathaway to combine for 388 rushing yards and 10 TDs. Collins scored on runs of 62, 30, 10, 10, 8 and 4 yards and recorded 12 tackles on defense.


Coach Toby Tucker, stated that "Tanner is a special kind of running back, but I think he'd be the first to admit that any running back would be envious of him getting to run behind a great offensive line. He and Cole stepped in there and did a great job against a very good football team."

Tanner states, "It started off with the offensive line doing their jobs. It (our success) had everything to do with everyone doing their jobs, doing the things they needed to do to win the game."

Tanner is active in Future Farmers of America and Volunteer Fire Department.

He plans to attend South Plains College and plans to transfer to Texas Tech and become a coach.



Edgar Owen Hubbard, 73, died November 10, 2005, in Pampa, Texas

Graveside services were at 2:00 PM Saturday, November 12, 2005, at the Wheeler Cemetery in Wheeler, with Rev. Jeff Taylor, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Pampa, officiating. Arrangements were under the direction of Carmichael-Whalley Funeral Directors.

Mr. Hubbard was born September 1, 1932 in Wheeler, to V. B. & Etta Kate Hubbard. He graduated from Wheeler High School in 1951 and received a football scholarship to West Texas State University. He received a B.S. degree from West Texas State University in 1957 where he was a member of the T-Club. He was a veteran of the U. S. Army, serving as a medic in Germany during the Korean Conflict. He was employed by Santa Fe Railroad for several years in Amarillo. He had been a resident of Pampa for the past 4 years, moving from Canyon where he had resided for 40 years. He was a Methodist.



Chace Horton, #82, tackles the ball carrier to end the game.





Kelly Timmons, #25, stops the quarterback short of first down.




Chucky Rivera, #37, tackles the ball carrier on the four yard line.

It might not be providing us extra time to finish the task (like was done in Joshua 10), but it will always be something. The Lord will give us strength. The Lord will provide. 





Holiday Travels Are Urged To Slow Down

DPS urges Thanksgiving travelers to slow down, buckle up and drive sober.

All available DPS troopers will be patrolling Texas roadways during the Thanksgiving holiday. Troopers will be looking for drivers who are intoxicated, speeding or not properly secured—or who have passengers who are not properly secured.

"Texas travelers should know that we will be on the lookout for unsafe driving," said Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., director of the DPS. "We want to make sure that everyone reaches their destination safely."

If last year's numbers are any indication, troopers will be very busy. During the 2004 Thanksgiving holiday period (Tuesday through Monday), DPS troopers arrested 653 people for driving while intoxicated. Troopers also wrote more than 18,800 tickets for speeding; more than 3,500 tickets for seatbelt violations; and cited more than 4,600 drivers for operating a motor vehicle without insurance.

"We would rather that Texas drivers voluntarily comply with the law than have to write them tickets," Col. Davis said. "Besides, complying with these laws will make you and your loved ones safer when you travel."

Since roads are more likely to be crowded, DPS reminds drivers to leave themselves plenty of time to get where they're going. Avoid bad driving habits that lead to road rage, such as:

- Not using turn signals
- Driving in the passing lane
- Tailgating, flashing lights or honking
- Using high beams in traffic
- Not allowing adequate time for a given trip.

When confronted with aggressive drivers, the DPS recommends that you:

- Put your aside in the back seat and move aside.
- Do not speed up, block lanes, slam or tap on brakes.
- Report extreme cases of reckless driving to the appropriate authorities.
- Do not retaliate, gesture or make eye contact.
- Make sure everyone is buckled up.

Information on Prescription Drug Benefits

After more than two years of preparation, the new Medicare prescription drug benefit will be available beginning January 1, 2006. Many of you may have already received information from companies about plans that offer Medicare prescription drug coverage.

All 42 million Medicare beneficiaries are eligible to receive this benefit. But, as is true when considering any other purchase, people need to be good consumers.

First, everyone needs to understand that the Medicare prescription drug coverage is a voluntary benefit. No one is required to take it. You may already have drug coverage from another source, such as an employer or a union. If you are satisfied with your current coverage, you can choose to stay with your current plan.

If you decide you want to sign up for the new benefit, you will still have to choose the best plan for you. Unlike most of what the government has to offer, the Medicare prescription drug benefit is not a "one size fits all" program. It is insurance offered by private companies with the government paying part of the cost. And, there are many plans from which to choose. In Texas, 20 organizations have been approved to offer Medicare prescription drug coverage plans in our state. Beneficiaries will also be able to acquire Medicare prescription drug insurance as part of more comprehensive plans that include health care services along with drug coverage.

The companies offering these plans are in competition with each other as to both benefits and cost. All companies authorized to offer the drug plans must meet Medicare's minimum requirements. They are required to cover all medically necessary drugs and to contract with pharmacies in the areas where beneficiaries live. But, with so many plans available, retirees need to do some careful shopping to choose the plan that works best for them.

As with most insurance, the prescription drug benefit will involve premiums, deductibles, and other costs. The prescription drug benefit does not make medicine totally free. But, it will make prescription drug coverage available to help the millions of older Americans pay for medicines. The White House estimates Medicare prescription drug coverage will save an average retiree \$1,300 a year.

The benefit should be especially helpful to those faced with very high drug expenses. Under the standard plan, once a beneficiary's out-of-pocket drug expenses for one calendar year reaches \$3,600,

they will be required to pay just 5 percent (or a small co-payment) for the rest of their drug purchases that year. All of their other drug purchase costs will be covered by the plan.

There is also extra assistance available for those with a low income. For Medicare beneficiaries who meet the eligibility guidelines, the savings on drug purchases will be substantial. Millions of low income Medicare beneficiaries could pay no more than \$5 per prescription.

To make the decisions that are right for you, a little study probably will be necessary. Information is likely to come to you from many sources. A good place to start is the Medicare website at www.medicare.gov or the toll-free number, 1-800-MEDICARE. If you are currently on Medicare, you should soon receive a booklet in the mail called "Medicare & You 2006." That booklet will provide information about the drug benefit.

The first Medicare prescription drug benefit enrollment period is November 15, 2005 through May 15, 2006. No one should have to make a rushed decision. Talk things over with family, friends, and others you trust to help you analyze your options. And, certainly feel free to call my office if I can be of any help.

November Is Lung Cancer Month

November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month and the Great American Smokeout is scheduled for Thursday, November 17, 2005.

Every year in November, the American Cancer Society holds the Great American smokeout to help smokers quit cigarettes for at least one day, in hopes they will quit forever.

It takes an estimated 172,570 people in the United States will be diagnosed with lung cancer. Cigarette smoking is by far the most important risk factor in the development of lung cancer. Cigarette smoking accounts for nearly 90 percent of all lung cancers.

The Tobacco Dependence Center at The Don & Sybil Harrington Cancer Center offers cessation counseling and provides education on secondhand smoke and nicotine to help tobacco users quit.

Sharri Miller, RN, BSN, Harrington Cancer Center Community Education and Tobacco Cessation Manager, Tobacco Treatment Specialist offers this advice for quitting smoking:

"Quitting smoking can be difficult and takes commitment, support and time. It may take more than a few tries, but it is possible. More than 45 million Americans have quit smoking; that equals approximately 2500 quit daily. Remember, quitting tobacco use is the single most important thing you can do to improve your health. Allow us to help you with this process and live a longer, healthier and happier life."

Three vital elements for a successful attempt to stopping smoking are: 1) Counseling to help users understand and change their behaviors; 2) Medications to help ease the discomfort of withdrawal from nicotine; 3) Follow-up to prevent relapse.

TxDOT Outdoor Advertising Info.

Texas Department of Transportation controls outdoor advertising signs on highways.

Before anyone puts up an advertising sign along an interstate or primary highway, they had better check in with their local Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) office.

State law [Texas Highway Beautification Act, Transportation Code, Chapter 391 and Title 43, Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 43, Subchapter I] requires TxDOT to control the placement of any sign located within 660 feet of the highway right of way, which is visible from the main traveled lanes.

Outside of urban areas, this control extends to include any sign if it is visible from, and erected for the purpose of its message being seen from, the main-traveled way of the highway.

Although there are some exceptions, before erecting or maintaining an outdoor advertising sign, a sign owner must first obtain an outdoor advertising license from the TxDOT Right of Way Division office. In addition, a permit is required for each sign. The application for a sign permit must be made to the District office regulating signs within the county in which the sign will be located.

In placing signs, it is important to know that no sign can be located in a manner that creates a safety hazard. This includes:

- causing a driver to be unduly distracted in any way;
- obscuring or otherwise interfering with the effectiveness of an official traffic sign, signal or device; or
- obstructing or interfering with the driver's view of approaching merging or intersecting traffic.



Commissioners' Court Meeting; Community Building Is Discussed

Wheeler County Commissioners' Court met in regular session on Monday, November 14, 2005, at 10:00 a.m., in the commissioners' courtroom of the Wheeler County Courthouse.

Nineteen items were on the agenda awaiting the commissioners' action.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved.

The court accepted the monthly reports of the Justices of the Peace, County Treasurer, County Tax Assessor, County Clerk and District Clerk.

The hourly payroll time sheets were approved for payment.

The court voted to pay the bills as presented.

No action was taken on the county's budget.

There was no action to be taken on the courthouse restoration project.

The commissioners voted to reinstate the burn ban, effective Thursday, November 17.

David Cross met with the court to ask for their help in getting rid of the abandoned vehicles he had picked up off the side of the road and parked in his lot. The commissioners agreed to help him find a means of disposal. These vehicles are worthless as salvage.

Dr. Ben Ed Hillhouse, representing Wheeler Area and Activity and Improvement Council met with the court to inform the court on the progress being made in the plans for a Wheeler Area Community Building. Wheeler Area and Activity and Improvement Council is looking at putting the new structure on the west side of the Wheeler County Show Barn. The Council has \$250,000 at the present time to be used toward the financing of the \$1 million plus community building.

The court agreed to deed the land necessary for the building. The City of Wheeler will own the building and be responsible for insurance.

A basement is presently being considered for use as a community storm shelter.

Joel Finsterwald met with the court to get permission to purchase two pickups for the Sheriff's Department. The department needs a 2-wheel drive extended cab vehicle at a cost of \$21,250

and a 4-wheel drive 4-door pickup at a cost of \$24,000. The request will be on the agenda on November 28.

Sheriff Finsterwald informed the court of the removal of Mack Marshall from the payroll as a full time employee effective October 31. He also asked permission to keep Marshall as a part time employee. The court approved.

The court approved three county road crossings. Shear Wave, Inc will cross County Road 29 and T. Enbridge Pipelines (Texas Gath-

ering), L.P. will cross County Road 10.

Brigham Oil and Gas, L.P. was allowed to extend a permit they have.

Scott Porter was re-appointed as a member of the Wheeler County Central Appraisal District's Board of Directors for a two-year term.

The commissioners adopted a resolution for the Federal Off-System Bridge Program, a part of TxDOT for the construction of a bridge in Precinct 3.

Margaret Dorman, County Clerk, informed the court of the voting machine. She had decided on for the county. The voting machines are to be in use for the 2006 primary elections.

The total cost of the machines will be \$120,875 with the county having a grant for \$114,902.75 for the purchase. Sixteen voting machines will be purchased with software. There will be two extra voting machines purchased. Voters may vote by machine or paper ballot.

The court voted to advertise for sealed bids for the sale of a 1995 Utility Semi-Trailer.

The court will next meet in regular session on Monday, 28, 2005.

On this 14th day of NOVEMBER, 2005 the Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas meet in Regular Session, and found that circumstances present in all the unincorporated area of Wheeler County, Texas, create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning, therefore,

The Commissioners Court of Wheeler County, Texas, by this Order, hereby prohibits outdoor burning in all of the unincorporated area in Wheeler County, Texas. This burn ban takes effect NOVEMBER 17, 2005, and will terminate FEBRUARY 17, 2006, Ninety (90) days from that date.

A person who violates this prohibition will be charged with a Class C misdemeanor pursuant to Article 240.906 of the Texas Local Government Code.
