WHEELER COUNTY 4-H JUNIOR RODEO DATES

The Wheeler Invitational golf tournament was held Saturday and apparently everyone entered had their usual good time. The tournament is held annually with Shamrock being the host. The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, August 1, 2, 3, 1985 at the Wheeler Rodeo Arena. Each performance will begin at 7:00 P.M.

Entries are now being taken at the Wheeler County Extension office, Box 448, Wheeler, Texas 79096, (806-826-5243). Books will close at 5:00 p.m. Friday, July 19. Contestants then must call the Extension office on

July 25, to find out which night they are up.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Bill Hext of Glazier, Texas. Trophies will be awarded through 3rd place in each event in the 6-9 and 10-12 age groups and buckles will be awarded for All-Around in each division. Contestants must enter two events to be eligible for All-Around.

This year money is being paid back in the 13-14 and 15-19 age groups.

The 5 and under and 6-9 age groups will compete on Thursday night and all other age divisions will compete Friday and Saturday nights.

The following are the age, divisions and events for the rodeo:

5 years and under: Stick Horse Barrel Race, Stick Horse Flag Race, Goat Ribbon Race, and Stick Horse Pole Bending.

Ages 6-9: Calf Riding, Pole Bending, Barrel Race, Flag Race, and Goat Ribbon Race.

Ages 10-12: Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Barrel Race, Pole Bending, and Flag Race.

Ages 13-14: Bareback Ponies, Steer

Riding, Breakaway Roping, Ribbon Roping, Goat Tying, Pole Bending, and Barrel Race.

Ages 15-19: Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Breakaway Roping, Pole Bending, Barrel Race.

There will be a jackpot steer saddling Friday and Saturday night for all ages. The younger contestants will have a calf scramble each night.

The family requests memorials be made to American Lung Association or to favorite charity.

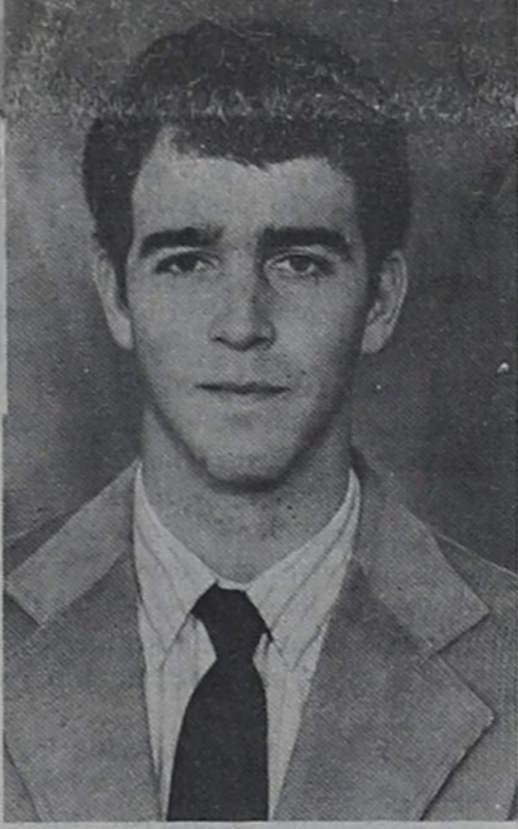
Services Held For Raymond N. Johnson

Willis Malone and Mr. White from Amarillo were guests representing Blockering Ferris Indio or the B.F.I. Dumpsters.

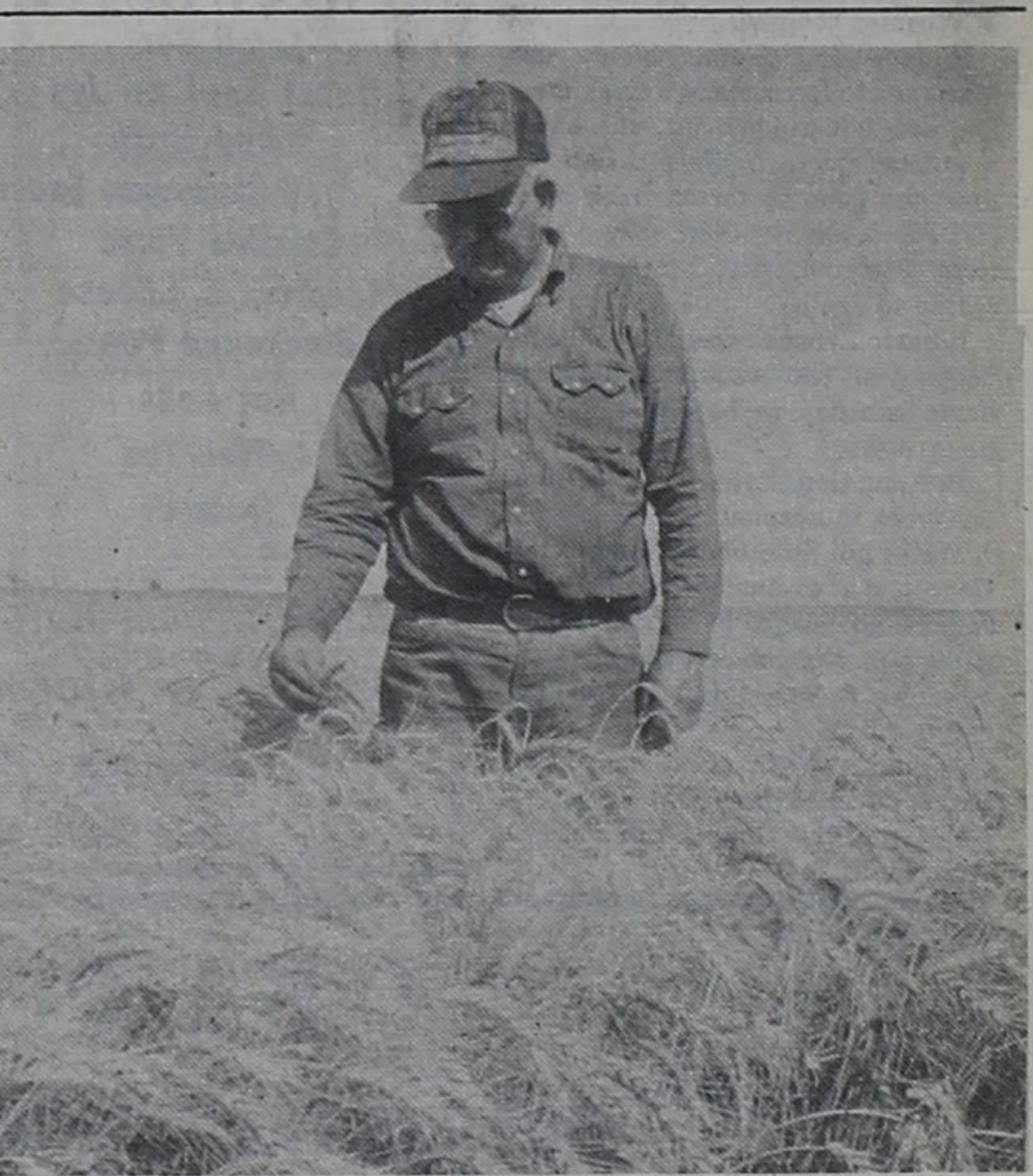
The new contract for the dumpsters was discussed.

HYBRID WHEAT: John C. Vise is shown here standing in his field of hybrid wheat. The grain is in the experimental stage, but is expected to have the same effect on wheat farmers as the hybrid grain sorghum. The "Bounty Hybrid" is advertised to

produce 10-20 percent more grain and offer additional grazing for livestock. In this field John C. had two types of wheat; the hybrid produced in excess of 60 bushels, but the production of the other wheat was not reported at press time. Both types were irrigated and the cattle preferred the hybrid for grazing. The bottom picture shows you a comparison of the difference in the size of the heads; the left is the hybrid and the right is the non-hybrid.

Crop Residues
For Wildlife

Don't forget wildlife when harvesting wheat and oats. Quail, pheasant, mourning dove, turkey, and other birds find food and cover in fields of small grain. This is especially true when young broods are being raised.

Strips of unharvested grain around field edges near brush or tall grass provide excellent food and cover for turkey and quail. Pheasant utilize unharvested strips along terraces or areas that may be too wet to cultivate. Doves use shattered seed where soils are shallow and the stand of grain is thin.

Even if the entire field is harvested, these same areas can be left untilled until the next planting season to provide food and cover for wildlife. Without tillage, waste grain is available to the birds, plus the stubble will provide cover until the next crop is planted.

If an area in the field has a thin stand of grain and a good stand of sunflowers, save this area for dove hunting next fall. Do not burn the small grain stubble. Wildlife benefits are lost as well as organic matter; plus soil is exposed to erosion. The Wheeler County SWCD and the Soil Conservation Service encourage soil protection through proper use of small grain residues.

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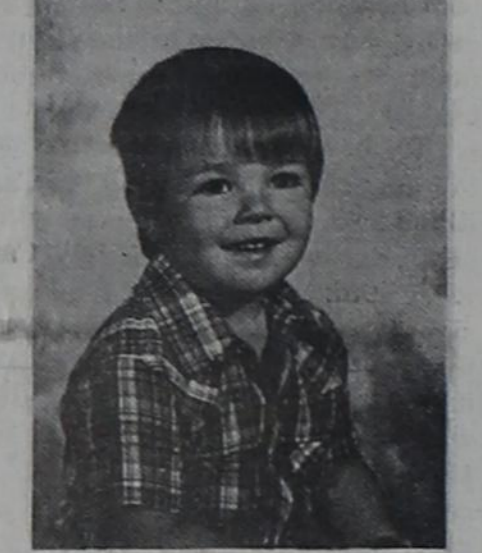

WATCH UP FOR POWER LINES

Power lines can be dangerous.

Touching irrigation pipe to a power line can divert the electricity through the pipe... and to anyone in contact with it. In this part of the country, this is the leading cause of farm injuries and deaths in electricity-related accidents. Any equipment of unusual height represents a potential danger. Lift arms on field equipment, combine auger spouts and even radio antennas can cause serious injury or death if they, and you, make contact with a power line.

Keep an eye up for power lines. Watch up, for safety's sake.

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Conservation Tillage Reduces Operations

Conservation tillage is a method of farming that reduces the number of operations per field. Fewer operations result in more crop residue on the soil surface. The extra residue helps to improve the tilth and hold moisture in the soil. Farmers on the High Plains have noticed an increase in production with conservation tillage. The cost for producing a crop is less than for conventional farming methods because of fewer trips to the field. It often takes several years for benefits to become evident with conservation tillage. Conservation tillage implements are expensive, but the cost can be reduced by modifying present equipment.

Wheat is being harvested in Wheeler County. This would be an ideal time to implement a conservation tillage program. Leave the stubble standing until the next crop is planted to help hold moisture. Weeds can be controlled with Roundup or other contact herbicide. If a summer crop is planned, experiment by planting a portion of the crop directly into the wheat stubble.

For more information on conservation tillage, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.

Federal Dollars To Fight Grasshoppers

Ranchers in 17 western states are keeping one eye on Washington this week and another one on the horizon. The ranchers are awaiting the arrival of almost \$10,000,000 in federal funds to fight the expected onslaught of hordes of grasshoppers. Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) surveys indicate that this summer will bring more hoppers than any time in the last 30 years. Mild weather has already resulted in the early hatching of huge numbers of the hoppers in several western states. The federal funds will be used to conduct spraying of federal, state and private rangeland threatened by the grasshoppers. APHIS is responsible for the grasshopper eradication programs on private rangeland will be shared equally by the federal and state governments and participating ranchers.

The APHIS grasshopper control programs have proven their effectiveness over the years, but timing is essential. A well organized spray

program is like a large scale military operation. To gain effectiveness, spraying should be done as close to the hatch period as possible. There is little that can be done once the hoppers hit.
