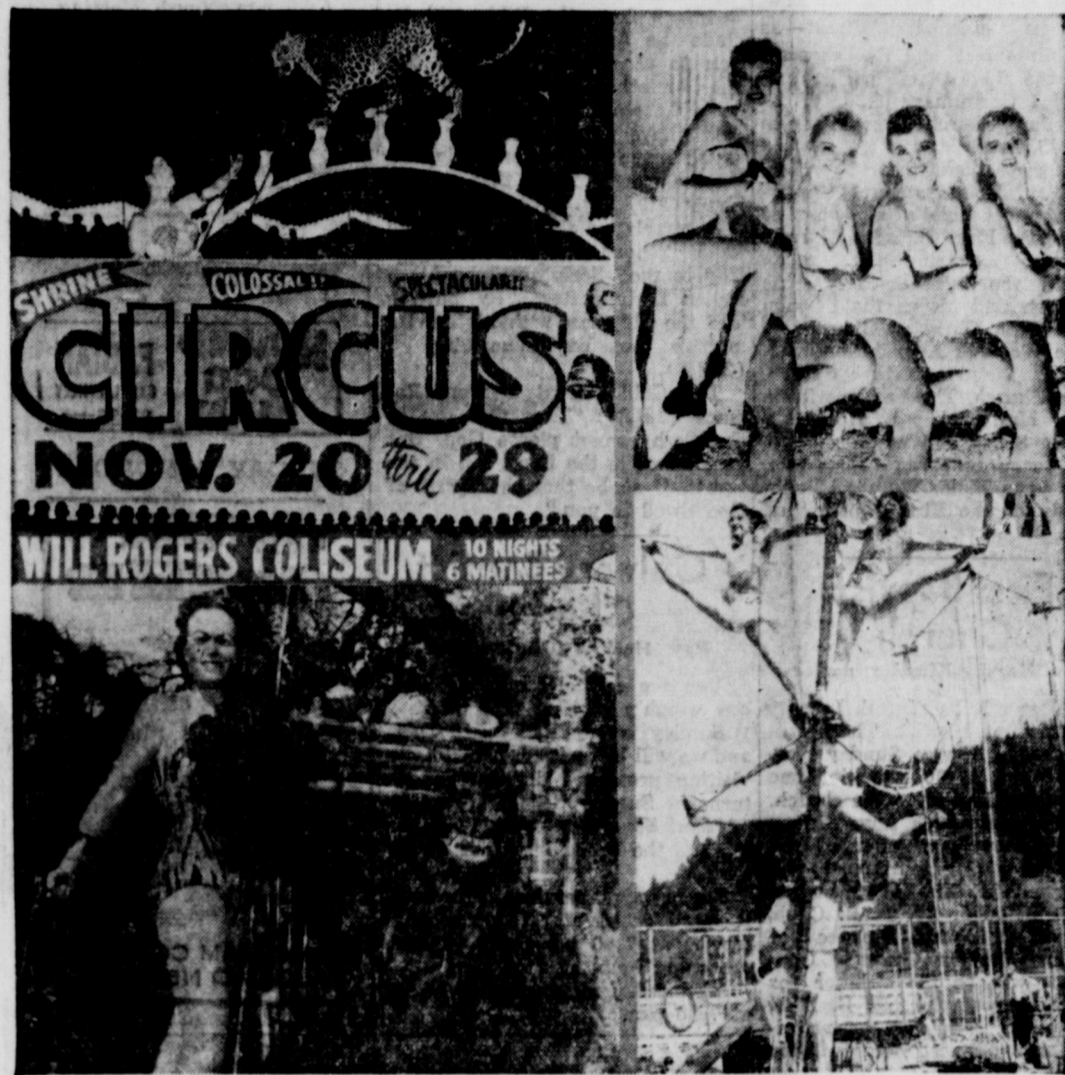
Muscular Dystrophy March Monday Night

The ultra-modern laboratory complex is now completed, and it is the first research center devoted exclusively to study of the muscle and its pathologies. The director of the center is Dr. Ade T. Milhorat. In the lobby of the Institute is a plaque, inscribed to the associations of fire fighters—a tribute to the continued humanitarian

Dogies Snap Cubs' 25-Game Win Streak

Eastland's Junior High School Dogies broke a 25-game winning streak Thursday when they defeated the Gorman Juniors 22-12 in the final game of the year for the locals.

The Dogies, coached by Joe Ingram, handed the Gorman team their first setback in two years, and did it in Gorman's own stadium. The win revenged an early season loss to the Cubs.

Eastland piled up a 14 point lead before Gorman came alive to make a game out of it.

At halftime the Dogies led 8-0 on the strength of a seven yard run by Gary Graham. Graham also ran over the extra points. The touchdown was set up by a 30 yard pass play from Graham to Phillip Kline.

Eastland scored again in the third period. This time Graham took it over from the 10 but the Dogies failed to get their extra points. Again the TD was set up by a pass play from Graham to Kline, this toss carrying 20 yards.

Gorman fought back for two touchdowns, but couldn't get their extra point tries across. In the final quarter, with Eastland leading, 14-12, Manuel Herrera tied the game with a five yard touchdown scamper. Graham carried across the extra points.

Eastland was on Gorman's two yard line when the half ended. The win gave the Dogies a record of four wins, two ties and two

losses. The locals twice beat Cisco and won once over Gorman and once over Ranger. The two ties were with Cross Plains and Ranger, and the two losses were to Cross Plains and Gorman.

Ranger Pushes Mavs to Cellar With 20-0 Win

Ranger's Bulldogs downed the Eastland Mavericks, 20-0, Friday night in Maverick Stadium to give the Mavs the privilege of finishing in last place in District 7-AA.

Playing in an icy blizzard, the Mavs couldn't get an offense going long enough to score. Ranger, showing the better offense, capitalized on breaks to win, while the Mavs couldn't take advantage of the breaks they got.

Ranger scored once after getting the ball on the Maverick five, again after having a pass tipped into a receivers arms and got a safety on a bad center.

Neither team scored in the first quarter, but Ranger got their winning touchdown midway in the second period when Mickey Garner went back to punt on his own 18. The ball was centered over Mickey's head, and Ranger took possession on the Mav five.

From that point Jerry Anderson took over. Anderson got one yard on first down, was hit at the line of scrimmage on second down, fumbled, but the Dogs came up with the ball on the Mav one for a three yard gain. Anderson carried the nose of the ball across on third down. The extra point try (a run) failed.

Facing third and 10 on his own 20, Garner went back to punt in the waning seconds of the third period of play. He got off a beauty, a 70 yarder, but the officials called a clipping penalty, brought the ball back to the original line of scrimmage and penalized the Mavs to their 10. Garner tried to kick again, but got a bad snap and Ranger trapped him in the endzone, giving the Dogs two more points.

The next Ranger TD came on a 28 yard pass play. Anderson passed to End James Henry for the score. Henry played heads up ball. A Mav defender deflected Anderson's pass into the air and Henry ran under it for the TD. Again the extra points failed.

Anderson's passing arm again

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got the Dogs a score. This time Jerry hit End Charles De Los Santos, a freshman, for 13 yards and the touchdown. The play was well executed, and caught the Mavericks napping. Ranger still couldn't run over the extra points.

It was a hardfought contest, and both teams were badly hampered by the icy wind. Ranger's three

touchdowns all came with the wind to their backs.

Cisco's Lobos proved themselves as real district champions by beating Coleman, 40-6, in the big District 7-AA game. Ballinger surprised Winters, 26-0, in the other district match.

Cisco will play DeLeon in district action.

Illegal Fishing Tops the List of Violations

AUSTIN — Fishing without licenses topped the list of game and fish violations in September, according to the director of law enforcement, Texas Game and Fish Commission.

One hundred and ninety-eight persons were charged with fishing without the required licenses. Game wardens arrested 15 for failure to have resident hunting licenses.

"Everyone had substantial notice that new licenses would be required after August 31," said the director. "Many people go right on fishing without a license, either because they put off buying one or because they forgot about one until they're in the boat and fishing. Nevertheless, a violation is committed and it cannot be overlooked."

Hunting out of season did not pay off for 22 persons who were caught in the act. Trespassing dropped far below the monthly average, while hunting with unplugged guns jumped up a notch or two. Another 14 were charged with hunting from an auto and 17 were hunting dogs in closed season. A dozen hunters had too many doves.

Nine persons were charged with killing quail out of season and another 8 shot squirrel in closed season. In all, 43 persons were charged with killing game out of season.

A total of 369 charges were filed during the month by State game wardens. The persons charged paid a total of \$7,115 in fines and \$679 in court costs. One person served time in jail, 5 pleaded not guilty, 3 appealed to a higher court, one had his fine suspended, and 31 cases were dismissed.

Since you can't penalize a team but half the distance to its goal, the official stepped off 10 yards to the Dog 10 against Ranger and signaled clipping. That, of course, was where the ball would have been anyone could see, considering the fact that's where Mickey Garner kicked it to.

From that point, with Ranger leading 6-0, Garner was trapped behind the goal for a safety. The penalty not only robbed Eastland of the 70 yard punt to the Dog 10, it cost them the wind that made the punt possible. They had to kick off from their 20 into the wind.

Holland Bulbs Are Distributed At League and Garden Club Meet

He stated that when one buys a new car he must give it gasoline and oil to make it run. The new bulbs require feeding and inoculation in order to present perfect blooms and healthy plants. He recommended the following steps in planting bulbs. 1. Prepare the bed by working thoroughly, mixing one part peat moss or cotton seed hulls to two soil. 2. Inoculate bulbs by dusting in a paper bag with the prescribed poisons and nutrients. 3. Plant six inches deep, placing a little sharp sand and a tablespoon of bone meal under each bulb. 4. For finest blooms, fertilize bulbs in the spring as soon as the first shoots appear. Mr. Wilson showed a color and sound film on roses and also spoke on rose culture.
