





This company is now operating in Eastland under a franchise granted our predecessor Company 40 years ago. Because we are required to continually add to our facilities serving the people it is not practical to run close to expiration of our present franchise before requesting a renewal. That is why we have made the request at this time.

The franchise requested by us is simply a permit to continue in business and is not exclusive and would not prevent the granting of a franchise to a competing plant or prevent the City from voting bonds to go into the electric business on its own account.

The franchise requested does not in any way limit the right of the City to regulate electric rates and service. We have many fifty year franchises.

We sincerely regret that a report has been circulated that the Company's Monahans franchise is for ten years. The person in Monahans who gave the information in response to an inquiry confused the franchise with a contract under which the Company supplies the City with street lighting and water pumping. The City of Monahans in 1929 approved a fifty year franchise to the Company.

We should have a long term franchise to justify our investment in new and additional facilities as Eastland grows and time goes on. We want you to have the facts as stated here so that you will not have any erroneous ideas about this franchise.

The more than 120 employees of the Company in this area will be affected by the granting of the proposed franchise. We have a large payroll at (1) the Leon Power Plant and (2) the Division Headquarters of the Transmission De-Partment and (3) at the District Office located in Eastland. Because of the unusually large concentration of employees here our payroll is three times our revenue from sale of electric service to all of our customers in the City of Eastand and our taxes are a substantial source of income to the City, County and School districts.
