For Civic League

County To Purchase War Memorial Plaque

Eastland County Commissioners met in a special called session at 10 a.m. Friday in the Courthouse and approved the request of the Eastland Civic League, that the county purchase for the placement in the lobby of the courthouse, a plaque in commemoration of county servicemen who died during World War II and the Korean conflict.

The commissioners, who have been studying the request, approved it unanimously. Mrs. Tom Stamey, president of the League, had made the request at a meeting of the commissioners previously. At the first meeting, the court decided that further study of the proposal was necessary as funds for the plaque were requested from the county.

County Judge John Hart noted that a similar plaque displayed in the courthouse lobby in honor of World War I veterans was paid for out of county funds. This fact seemed to remove any objection that any commissioner might have had to the proposal, for no opposition was voiced.

Approving the proposal were Commissioners Carl Lamb of Cisco, Tip Arthur of Ranger and Eastland, Buck Collins of Rising Star and Judge Hart. B. M. Bennett, commissioner from Carbon, was absent from the meeting but Judge Hart said that he had indicated his approval of the proposal.

The Eastland Civic League, which has been collecting names of county war dead over the past year, is composed of a group of women who are dedicated to civic advancement. Prior to the meeting, Mrs. Stamey said securing a

plaque in honor of the county war dead of World War II and Korea was the League's project for the year. Funds for the plaque will come from the permanent improvement fund. It will cost about \$500 compared with \$1,735 for the plaque now on display, the commissioners estimated. Mrs. Stamey said a dedicatory ceremony for the plaque was being planned for Memorial Day, May 30.

The group has compiled a list of 147 names of county war dead of the two conflicts for inscription on the plaque. Anyone having any information concerning deceased veterans of the county was requested to contact the Civic League.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Second Baptist Church for Lawrence Clifford Floyd, 36, who was killed about 3 p.m. Saturday in Ranger, when a car slipped from a car jack and pinned him beneath it.

Rev. Frank Brooks, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, officiated, and burial was in the Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

The accident happened at the home of Floyd's father-in-law, Lynn Gentry, at 904 Paige St., in Ranger. Relatives said Floyd was beneath the car putting on a tail pipe and had the right rear wheel off when the vehicle slipped from the jack.

He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Ruby Springer. Mr. Floyd and his wife, the former Gwendolyn Marie Gentry, had lived in Point Comfort, Tex., four years. For the last two years he worked as a welder for Alcoa Aluminum Co. Prior to that he was employed there by Belco Construction Co.

Born March 11, 1925, in Ranger, he was a graduate of Ranger High School and Ranger Junior College. He served three years with the Navy in World War II and was a member of the Point Comfort First Baptist Church. He was married Aug. 14, 1948 in Ranger, in the First Methodist Church.

Surviving are his wife, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Floyd of Monahans; two sons, Larry and Gary Lynn, both of the home in Point Comfort, and two brothers, C. R. and T. R. Floyd, both of Monahans.

Warning On Removing Thermostats

Removing the thermostat from an engine to "correct" cooling system over-heating can greatly increase fuel consumption, reduce power and contribute to spark plug fouling due to the accumulation of excessive carbon deposits on the insulators.

Pointing to the fact that many farmers frequently remove the thermostats from tractors and trucks, engineers at Champion Spark Plug Co. advise this practice may contribute to spark plug fouling. Always check to see whether a thermostat is installed before performing any work on an engine which has a spark plug fouling problem.

The thermostat is vitally important to proper cooling system and engine operation. It never should be removed and the engine allowed to operate without it.

Frayed Cables Tipoff To Need for Replacement

Corroded, frayed or partially broken battery, starter and generator cables frequently are an indication that the interior metal strands have become brittle, and that the entire cable is apt to break. Cables in this condition should be replaced to eliminate high resistance in the various circuits which may result in eventual starting failure if not corrected.

Worn Throttle and Choke Shafts May Let Dirt In Engine

Many times when an excessive amount of dirt enters the engine, the air cleaner is at fault. However, this condition also may be caused by worn choke and throttle shafts in the carburetor.

When new, these shafts fit snugly against their bearing surfaces preventing any dirt from being drawn into the carburetor. However, after the tractor has been operated for some time, the shafts may wear to the point that a sloppy fit exists between shaft and bearing surface. Due to high manifold vacuum it's possible for dirt to be sucked directly into the carburetor through the opening between shaft and bushing.

For this reason, both the throttle and choke shaft should be examined frequently for excessive wear.

Correct Reach Important When Selecting Spark Plugs

When selecting spark plugs for an engine, always be sure the plugs are of the correct reach for the engine.

According to Champion Spark Plug Co., if plug threads are too long, they will enter the combustion chamber where they may heat up causing preignition. Plugs with threads that are too long also may strike the valves or pistons causing engine damage.

TWO MASTERS

Marvin Bishop had been in an automobile accident and felt that he should be able to recover damages from the driver of the other car. He went to see Lawyer Smith, and in the course of telling Smith his story, it developed that the driver of the other car was insured by a company represented by Smith.

As soon as Smith learned this fact, he stopped Marvin from telling him any more about the case and explained that he could not represent him. Smith pointed out that the "conflicting interest" resulting from his representation of the insurance company prevented him from representing Marvin. He said he owed it to Marvin not to hear anything from him which he might use against him if the matter were taken to court.

The situation outlined above illustrates one of the basic principles in the ethics of a lawyer, namely, that he cannot represent

"conflicting interests." Basically, this is but the lawyer's way of phrasing the old axiom that a man cannot serve two masters. A lawyer's duty is to give his full and complete efforts to his client and he cannot do that if there is a conflict between the interests of two of them. The reasoning behind this rule is that a lawyer should not appear in court representing both sides of a controversy.

If both Marvin and the insurance company are regular clients of Smith, then it is Smith's duty to refuse to represent either one of them in case of altercation between the two.

If attorney Smith is one of a group of lawyers practicing together as a partnership, then he

must be careful not only of avoiding a conflict of interest between the clients he is personally serving, but between his clients and other clients of the partnership as well. As far as Smith is concerned in determining whether there is a conflict of interest, any client of his partners is his client and vice versa.

There are, of course, cases where a lawyer may represent more than one of the parties to the same transaction without violating the rule of professional conduct against serving interests which conflict. Such a situation might develop where two old clients of the same lawyer were purchasing and selling a piece of property. If both clients so desired

and understood, the lawyer might, with complete propriety, look after the interests of both in such a transaction.

Generally, however, the lawyer will be very careful to scrutinize such situations. Therefore, if a lawyer should tell you that he cannot represent you because he already represents "conflicting interests," remember that he is only

their federal unemployment tax from 3 percent to 3.1 percent for the year 1961. It also told the employers of some changes in social

security tax, but did not change the social security tax rate. During January, Internal Revenue Service's telephone rang

and the postman called. Hundreds of employers wanted a new tax table to take care of the social security increase from 3 percent to

3.1 percent. There is no new table. There is no increase in social security taxes, but the increase in federal unemployment tax. Internal Revenue does not have a new Circular E. The tax folks carefully explained what had happened to the hundreds of employers who called, but a lot of taxpayers did not call.

You guessed it. The returns for the first quarter of 1961 are starting to come in. Many of these returns have been carefully prepared using the 3.1 percent rate for the employee and 3.1 percent rate for the employer. Internal Revenue will have to work with employers on correcting these returns since the correct rate that should have been paid is 6 percent, not 6.2 percent.

Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director, has this advice, "Mr. Employer if you have not filed your Form 941, please pay 6 percent, not 6.2 percent."
