Largest Crowd of Year Is Predicted

Long Rivalry Due Extra Added Color

The Ranger College Rangers will meet the Cisco College Wranglers Saturday night in Maverick Stadium in Eastland in the big game of the year for the Rangers.

There will be more riding on the outcome of this game than any other of the year. First, it will be the first appearance of the Rangers or of any team in the Peanut Bowl, and the Eastland County Peanut Bowl championship is riding on the outcome of the game.

It has been a long time since an Eastland team has gone into a Dublin game as the underdog, but they will definitely be in that position Friday night. It was in 1954 when the Mavs last encountered Dublin as the underdog. That year Dublin won the district title, but Eastland upset them in the final game of the year.

This year Dublin has mowed down every opponent they have

facied. Last week they nailed down Cross Plains by a score of 44-8. DeLeon beat Cross Plains only 20-0, and the DeLeon team is supposed to be the hottest team in the district.

Eastland's starting line-up will probably have Tommy Beck, 138, and Joe Shoemaker, 140, at ends; Bill McCleskey, 170 and Tony Jordan, 165, at tackles; Bill Moylan, 160, and Bill Jones, 170, at guards; Gary Culpepper, 160, at center; and James Lewis 162, John Strout, 168, Mickey Gagner, 165, and J. D. Ables, 140, in the backfield.

Game time is 8 p.m.

Pre-Peanut Bowl Week Is Hectic Over Ranger Way

A Negro man, Cary Harrison, of Ranger, landed in jail Wednesday night after a wild ride in an automobile down Ranger's Main Street, through the Mayor's front lawn, and into the new home of Mr. and Mrs. Buck Wallace.

The car driven by Harrison evidently went out of control in the 400 block of West Main Street, jumped the curb on the south side of the street, made a circle through Mayor W. F. Creager's front lawn, went back across the street and jumped the curb on the south side of the street, narrowly missed a large tree, and p'cking up speed and power all the way plumped into the wall of Buck Wallace's new home. The car struck the wall at the peti on of a bedroom and bathroom. A hole approximately 15 feet wide was knocked into the wall.

Residents in the neighborhood were mystified as to the cause of the disturbance until they rushed out and spotted the car imbedded in the wall.

One resident reported that the crash sounded as though a freight train had r'led in. Another reported that it sounded as though a jet airplane had broken the sound barrier in front of his house.

One of the largest crowds of the year is expected in Eastland Saturday for the first annual Eastland County Peanut Bowl parade and football game. Proof of interest in the game is the fact that Eastland Jaycees have announced that all 1,000 reserved seats at Maverick stadium have been sold.

The Peanut Bowl, which has grown into a major attraction in just a few short weeks, will match the undefeated Cisco Junior College Wranglers against the Ranger College Rangers. Kickoff time is 8 p.m. at Maverick Stadium.

The Bowl event has attracted statewide interest and Gov. Price Daniel thought that it was such a good idea that he issued a proclamation making Saturday Peanut Bowl Day in Texas. The Governor praised Eastland Jaycees for their promotion of the game.

And the peanut industry has taken the bowl game under its wing. Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will give away 2,500 bags of salted Spanish peanuts at the game and five area shellers have each contributed \$20, a total of \$100, to be given away as door prizes. The money will be awarded in five equal lots of \$20 each at the end of the football game, just before the winner of the game is presented the Peanut Bowl trophy for the school to keep one year. The trophy will be retired by the team which first wins three games in the Peanut Bowl.

Donors of the door prize money are Ranger Peanut Co., Gorman Peanut Co., DeLeon Peanut Co., Durham Peanut Co. of Comanche and Waldrip Peanut Co. of Dublin.

The Peanut Parade will feature at least four bands and many floats, riding groups and other interesting entries. The parade will form on Lamar Street and will travel from there south to Main, then west down Main to Daugherty, south on Daugherty to Commerce then east to the courthouse square and Seaman Street, then north to Firemen's Field, where the parade will end.

Trophies will be given to the three best bands and plaques will go to the best three floats.

Bands marching in the parade will be from Ranger, Cisco, Gorman and Eastland high schools.

Jaycees announced that they will operate concession stands at the game and hotdogs and drinks will be available.

Riding in the parade on the queen's float will be this year's Peanut Queen and six princesses. The queen is Mary Kay Rush of Ranger, who was chosen for the honor by three out-of-county judges. Princesses are Paula Norris of Carbon, Johnnie Harris of

Rising Star, Linda Harrison of Gorman, Mary Laird of Cisco, Cindy Fox of Olden and Betty Young of Eastland.

The queen and her princesses will also be presented at halftime of the game. The four county high school bands will be another feature of the halftime show.

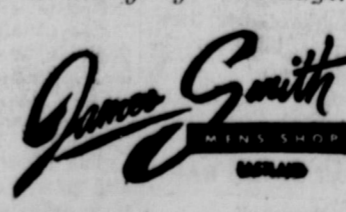

School Safety Week Is Set By Governor

Governor Price Daniel said today that Texas school superintendents, principals and classroom teachers have responded enthusiastically to his request for sponsorship of the third annual Texas School Traffic Safety Week during the week of Sept. 18-24.

The special observance was originated in 1958 at the request of the Governor and was directed toward schools teaching driver education. Last year, it was expanded to a statewide classroom project, and more than 33,000 teachers gave special safety instructions in daily classes.

Governor Daniel, in a special message to Texas public school newspaper editors, said: "The vital importance of this particular phase of the traffic safety movement in Texas cannot be underestimated

nor can we afford to ignore it. The lives of the brightest and most active members of today's Texas civilization are at stake. When we realize that 545 of the 2,453 persons killed on our streets a year were young Texans between the ages of 15 and 24, the high school and college age bracket, then we see how tragic our problem has actually become. Those 545 young Texans represented 22 per cent of all the traffic victims, despite their energy, and fast reactions.

"We have accurate figures which tell another part of this tragic story. Young Texans between 15 and 24 held about 18.3 per cent of all Texas driver's licenses last year, but they were involved in about 27 per cent of all the traffic crashes outside Texas cities. This, also, is much too high, considering the real ability of today's young Texans."

The Governor said these figures, and similar statistics for previous years, had led him to obtain the cooperation of the Texas Education Agency, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas Safety Association in designing and planning Texas School Traffic Safety Week. Special brochures have been

mailed to nearly 20,000 schools whose classroom teachers have already ordered the teaching aids. The three agencies named, along with the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, prepared and printed the special materials. Orders already filled are more than half the total ordered last year, and officials expect at least 40,000 teachers to present the program this year.

"We know the boys and girls of Texas, anxious to become good citizens as well as good drivers, will be interested in what we are

trying to do to help our lives and those of their and relatives," the Governor

added.

Bible Course Offered at Ranger College

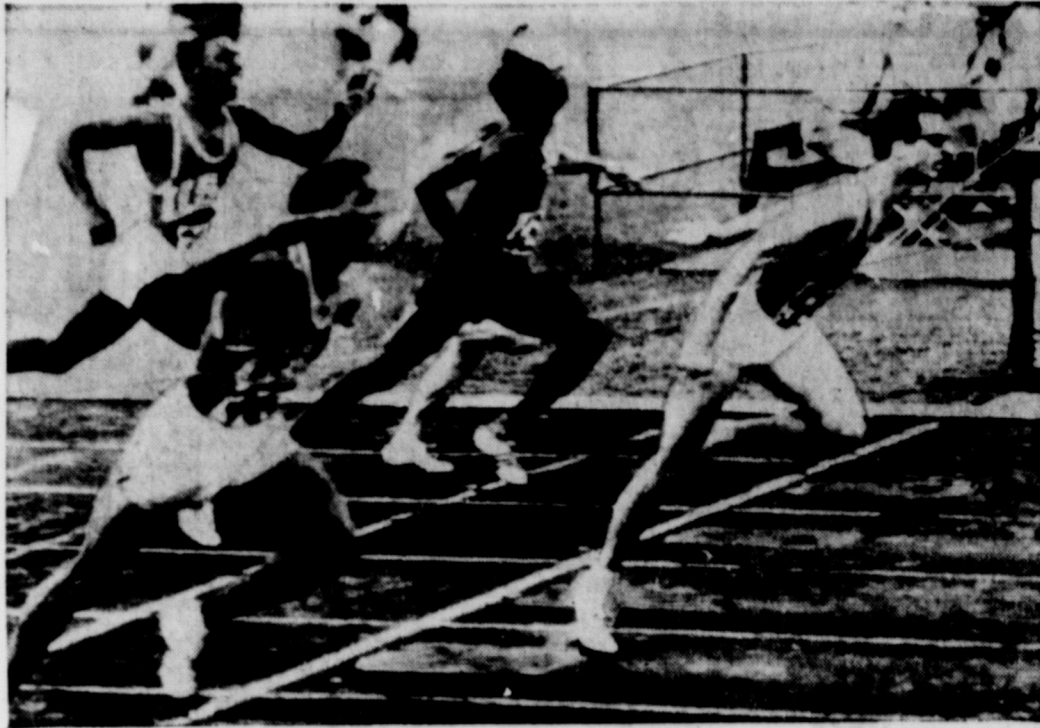
Bible 201, The Life and Teachings of Jesus, will be offered in the night school of Ranger College.

government that would squarely face such problems as economic growth, taxes, school and water.

Milk Production Can Be Increased By 5-Step Plan

A five-step plan that can increase milk checks is recommended by A. M. Meekma, dairy husbandman for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The plan includes the keeping of production records. There's a choice of official testing (AR, HIR, DHR), standard DHIA, owner-sampler, and weigh-a-day-a-month. Using information from such records, herds have been able to return in excess of \$1 for labor above the average for the state.

Secondly, develop a good breeding program. Make sure your cattle have inherited ability to produce large quantities of milk and fat according to their feed. Breed cows to proven sires. If proved sires aren't available, use a young bull with an ancestry of proved sires and dams. Research shows it may soon be possible to "insure" 10,000 lb. producing cows by following good breeding and management practices.

Thirdly, choose a good feeding plan. Make sure cows get enough energy, protein, minerals and vitamins. Home-grown feeds, pastures and other forages are the cheapest and best feeds for dairy cattle. That's true if they are harvested and stored to save a high percentage of the nutrients. Early cutting, for example, increases net energy percentage of hay by 25 percent over late cutting.

Fourthly, manage carefully. Labor, machinery and equipment must be used efficiently these days. Self-feed hay and silage whenever possible. Practice sanitation. Wash and wipe the udder before milking. Use a strip cup to check on abnormal milk. If you see signs of mastitis, milk that cow last. Give the cows a 6-8 week rest period between lactation periods. Such a rest can boost production 10 percent over no dry period.

And finally, maintain milk quality. Cool milk immediately after milking to 40 degrees or below. Feed strong-odored feeds, such as silage, only after milking. Keep pastures free of weeds and seeds that cause objectionable flavors in milk.

Asserting that this interrelated development demands better leadership in the state government, the handbook said:

"Texans can choose 'normal growth' and barely get along, or they can choose growth upon growth' and become the possessors of one of America's greatest industrial and economic complexes. Democrats have failed so far to lead the way."

The manual said GOP candidates would avoid Democrat factionalism, cooperate with private research groups and public-spirited Democrats—help Texas meet the challenge of the "Crucial Sixties."

Pointing to the 56th Legislature's tax fight as a vivid illustration of Democrat factionalism, the manual said:

Trail Ride To Be Staged At San Antonio

A 137-mile trail ride which may become one of the largest conducted by modern trail riders, will be staged by San Antonio this October in connection with the world premiere here of the epic movie "The Alamo".

Present estimates by the Bexar County Sheriff's Mounted Posse, which will arrange and conduct the five-day ride, indicate that as many as 1,000 riders may start out on the trail. The sheriff's posse committee appointed to conduct the ride, said invitations to join the trek will be sent to all known trail ride clubs in the state, but added that individual riders and trail riders from out of the state will be welcome to participate.
