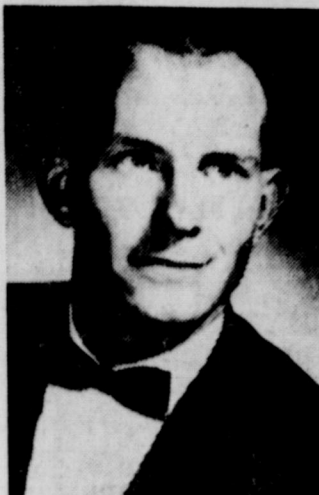

IN CURRY CASE Curry Case Stopped In Eastland, Transferred To Palo Pinto County

Bulletin After three days of questioning prospective jurors, Judge W. J. Oxford called a halt to the Nathan Curry murder trial in Eastland County Wednesday at 4:15 p. m., ordered it transferred to 29th judicial district, Palo Pinto County, and set the date for October 14, 1963, at 9 a. m.

Curry's attorney, John Watts, objected to Palo Pinto County and requested that the case be transferred to Breckenridge in Stephens County or Abilene in Taylor County. Like several other of Watts' requests, Judge Oxford over-ruled these proposals.

Watts said that he had heard lawyers classify Palo Pinto County as being a "state juror county."

All but 16 of the prospective jurors were questioned before the trial was brought to a halt.

Three motions by Attorney John Watts—asking for a change of venue, a continuance and a mistrial—were overruled by Judge W. J. Oxford Wednesday morning as selection of jurors in the Nathan Curry murder trial continued.

Seven persons were questioned Wednesday morning and Charles Martin of Eastland was qualified.

Watts' request for a mistrial resulted from an article in the Wednesday morning Reporter-News in which Correspondent Helen Murrell commented on the action of Mrs. Jack Hailey of Cisco, a prospective juror.

Judge Oxford refused also Watts' request to put Mrs. Murrell on the stand, stating that the local papers are the most-read, and that the article in the out-of-town paper probably wasn't read by enough people to create prejudice. However, the judge did instruct Watts to ask the remaining potential jurors if they had read the article.

The Stephenville judge announced that he would not consider the venue change until all the prospective jurors had been questioned.

The continuance was asked by Watts because a material witness, Claude Simmons of Cisco, can not testify in open court because of illness.

Only 37 veniremen remained to be questioned in the Nathan Curry murder trial as it entered its third day in 91st District Court in Eastland Wednesday.

Lee Wilson of Ranger was qualified Wednesday afternoon. The state has had 34 witnesses subpoenaed and the defense has called 19 so far.

Pace slowed daily as efforts were made to select a jury. Ten potential jurors were qualified Monday (out of 25 questioned), but only seven were found acceptable to both sides Tuesday (with 39 questioned).

There was more and more talk of moving the trial, but Judge W. J. Oxford continued in his earlier promise to get a jury in this county.

Only 17 prospective jurors had been qualified by 5 p. m. Tuesday in the Nathan Curry murder trial now in progress in 91st District Court.

Two, Mrs. Jack Hailey of Cisco and Elgie Crisp of Rising Star, were qualified Tuesday morning. They were the only two qualified out of eight questioned during the morning.

A. D. Taylor, Dale Trout and H. J. Carothers of Eastland, Mrs. Arlin Birt of Cisco and C. J. Davis were qualified Tuesday afternoon.

And speculation around the courtroom halls was increasing with wondering if a jury could be obtained, in view of the slow process thus far.

Selection of the 12 jurors in the Nathan Curry murder case went into its third day Wednesday.

The last murder trial in Eastland County was held in January, 1950, in 91st District Court, when Mrs. Elva Moad of Cisco was found not guilty of murder.

Defending Mrs. Moad were the late Allen D. Dabney and Earl Conner Jr.

Ten persons were qualified Monday, but a total of at least 32 is needed to determine the final 12, because both the defense and the prosecution has the right to "cut" at least ten names.

The ten qualified Monday aren't yet on the jury, because either or all of them could be cut by the attorneys. The ten are Paul Maxwell of Rising Star; Henry W. Sims and William A. Leslie of Eastland; Norman Randle, a Negro, and Charles P. Mosley, both of Ranger; Jesse L. Parker, E. V. Rodgers and Jack Harrison of Gorman and Carl Lamb and S. G. Clary of Cisco.

The original venire of 196 was trimmed to 106 by sundry excuses.

Jurors were not being qualified for the death penalty during the preliminary questioning.

Judge W. J. Oxford, of Stephenville, ordered selection of the jury to begin Monday afternoon after rejecting both a motion on continuance of the case until a later date and a motion for dismissal based on "double jeopardy."

Watts said Curry would plead "not guilty" and that as an alternative he will plead "not guilty by reason of temporary insanity."

Watts said that he had heard lawyers classify Palo Pinto County as being a "state juror county."

All but 16 of the prospective jurors were questioned before the trial was brought to a halt.

Three motions by Attorney John Watts—asking for a change of venue, a continuance and a mistrial—were overruled by Judge W. J. Oxford Wednesday morning as selection of jurors in the Nathan Curry murder trial continued.

Seven persons were questioned Wednesday morning and Charles Martin of Eastland was qualified.

Watts' request for a mistrial resulted from an article in the Wednesday morning Reporter-News in which Correspondent Helen Murrell commented on the action of Mrs. Jack Hailey of Cisco, a prospective juror.

Judge Oxford refused also Watts' request to put Mrs. Murrell on the stand, stating that the local papers are the most-read, and that the article in the out-of-town paper probably wasn't read by enough people to create prejudice. However, the judge did instruct Watts to ask the remaining potential jurors if they had read the article.

The Stephenville judge announced that he would not consider the venue change until all the prospective jurors had been questioned.

The continuance was asked by Watts because a material witness, Claude Simmons of Cisco, can not testify in open court because of illness.

Only 37 veniremen remained to be questioned in the Nathan Curry murder trial as it entered its third day in 91st District Court in Eastland Wednesday.

Lee Wilson of Ranger was qualified Wednesday afternoon. The state has had 34 witnesses subpoenaed and the defense has called 19 so far.

Pace slowed daily as efforts were made to select a jury. Ten potential jurors were qualified Monday (out of 25 questioned), but only seven were found acceptable to both sides Tuesday (with 39 questioned).

There was more and more talk of moving the trial, but Judge W. J. Oxford

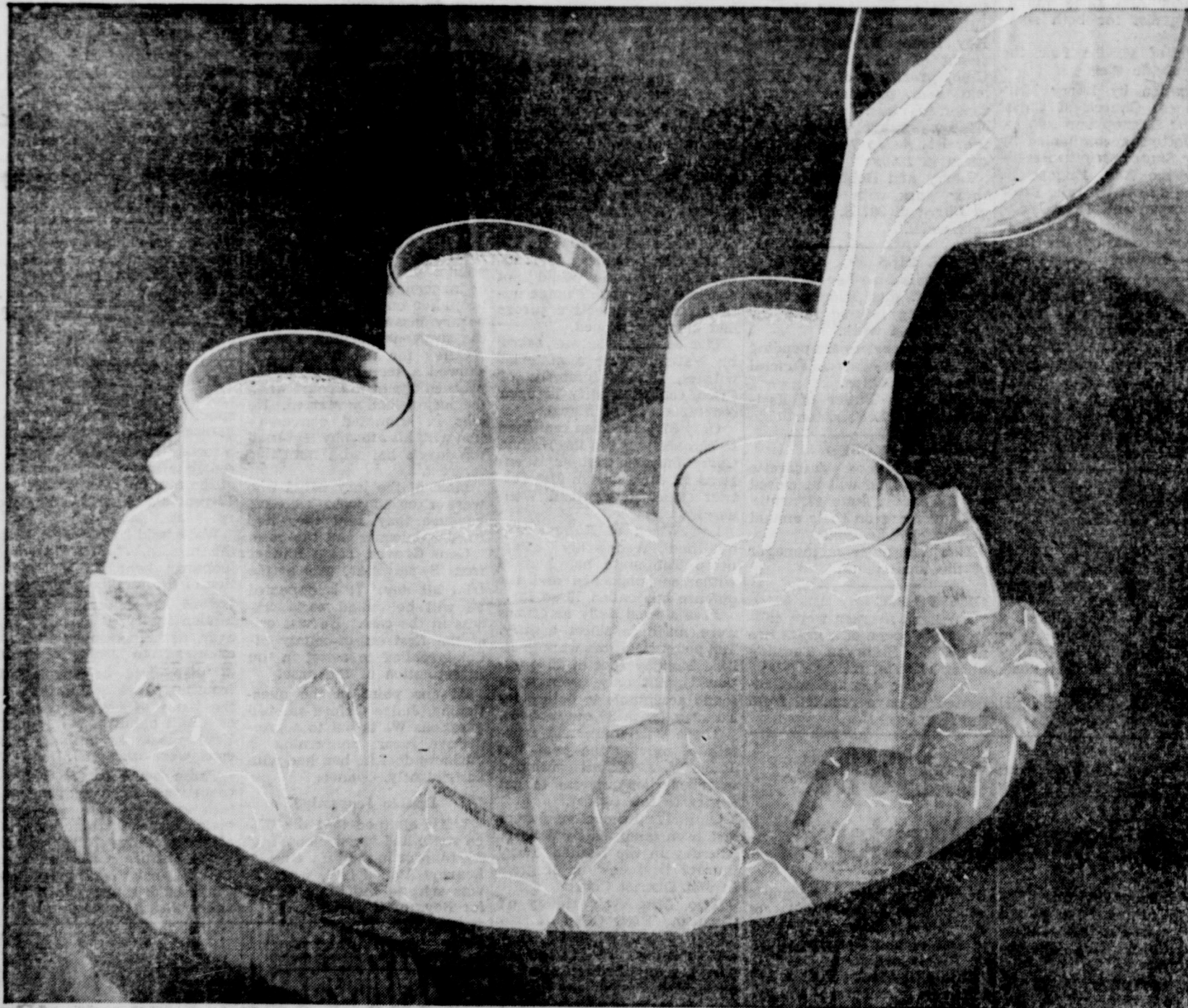

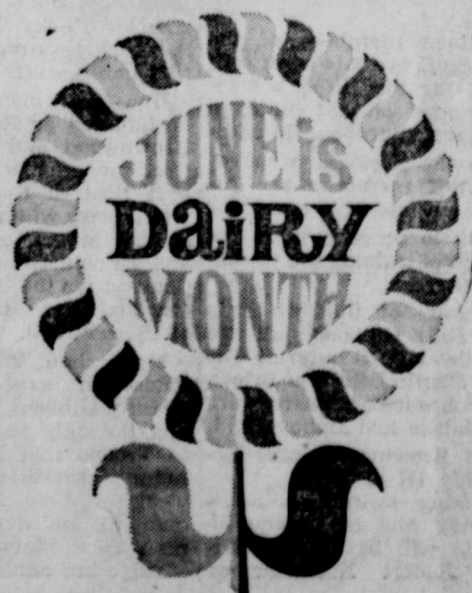

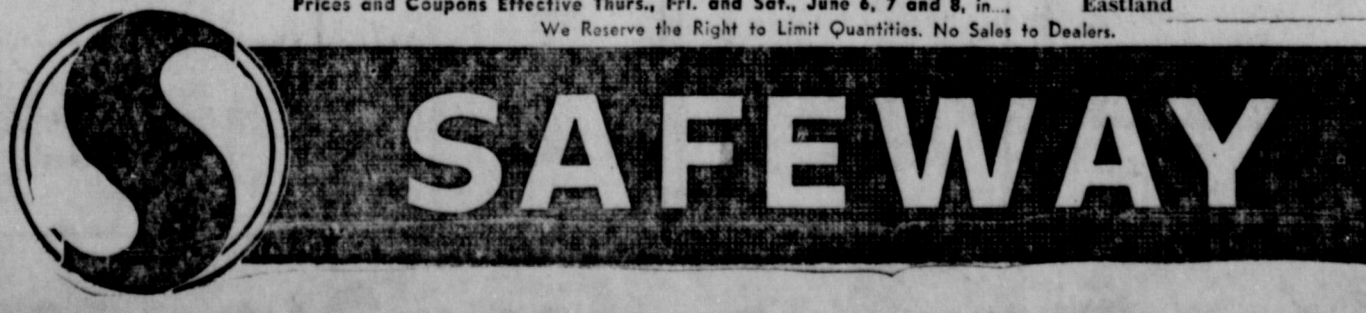
