## Some Citizens May Have Social Security Money

Several Eastland County residents who are past the social security retirement age (62 for women, 65 for men) are failing to claim their money because of a misunderstanding, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

He added that the 1960 Amendments made a significant change in the retirement test. As before, benefits are payable for any month the insured person earns no more than \$100.00 in wages and is not very active in self-employment, no matter how high the annual earnings, and are due for all months in the calendar year if earnings are not over \$1200.

He gave these examples:  
Mr. A is 67 and his wife is 62. He is due \$100 retirement benefit and she is due \$37.50. He is still regularly employed at \$200 per month. Under the 1960 Amendments they can be paid \$600 in social security benefits.

Mr. B is 65 and still earning \$150 per month. His social security benefit is \$75 per month. Even though he works all of 1961 at \$150 per month, he can still be paid \$450 in social security checks. If he had a wife and child also due payments, the three of them could collect \$1068 in social security checks.

Miss C is 62 years old and now earning \$1750 net profit per year from her music studio. Her social security benefit, based on earlier and higher earnings, is \$80 per month. She can collect \$560 in social security benefits in 1961. But none of the three persons described above can be paid any social security checks until a claim is filed. ## James Tells of War Against Underworld

Tom James, youthful state representative from Dallas who headed the legislative committee which helped clean up Amarillo and Port Arthur, told Eastland Rotarians Monday that it is a popular misconception that government represents all of the people.

James told service club members that the government represents only those people who take an active part in politics and see that leaders who they agree with them are elected.

He told Rotarians it is their duty to see that people in city hall and the courthouse "represent you."

James traced the steps taken by his investigating committee to help clean up three situations, the John Milton Addison case, the "Amarillo case" and the Jefferson County situation.

He charged that the committee discovered that Jefferson County officials, at least a large number of them, have been taking bribes for some 30 years. He said he was told that apathy was the big problem, but that he found that bribery was the chief evil. In Port Arthur alone, James charged, officials were receiving more than \$100,000 a year in payoffs.

James said one of the chief things needed to clean up crooked officials is more power for grand juries. He said grand juries need the power to call in special legal aid and investigators.

The Dallas attorney credited the Amarillo GlobeNews with being the big factor in the cleanup campaign in that city. In Port Arthur ex-members of grand juries started the cleanup drive.

He said the only difference between Eastland and Port Arthur is the degree of cooperation between the people and elected city and county officials. He urged high pay for public prosecutors, and law enforcement agency employees. He said low salaries were

## In School Consolidation

# Both Sides Feel They're In Fight to Help Their Towns

(Editor's Note: This is the last in a series of articles giving both the pros and cons of the incentive school consolidation plan.)

Lack of trust, cut throat competition and a natural desire to "keep our schools" are the three things which are the biggest factors against consolidation of Eastland County schools under the new incentive payment plan.

Eastland County is unusual in that it has three towns of about the same size—Eastland, Ranger and Cisco—and several other good size communities, including Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, Olden and Desdemona.

A fact that everyone recognizes is that Cisco doesn't trust Eastland or Ranger, Eastland doesn't trust Cisco or Ranger and Ranger doesn't trust Cisco or Eastland. And the smaller towns don't trust any of the bigger ones.

Dr. James Whittington has headed the drive to consolidate the nine county high schools. He happens to be from Eastland and for that reason he is looked on with mistrust by Cisco and Ranger citizens, at least many of them.

Talk about the consolidation with the man on the street in Cisco or Ranger and he immediately charges that Eastland "is after our school." He is firm in his belief that Dr. Whittington plans to locate the one high school in Eastland.

Backers of the plan, including Dr. Whittington, deny this. They say positively that the school would be located on neutral ground. Those who oppose the plan nod their heads, flash a "knowing smile" and reply, "Yes, we know. We know."

## The DPS Story, 25 Years Of Service to Texas

(Editor's Note: Following is the first of a series of articles appearing in this newspaper detailing the evolution and organization of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the numerous vital services this agency provides for the people of Texas.)

The Texas Department of Public Safety on Aug. 10, 1960, rounded out a quartercentury of service and protection for the people of Texas in an era of trial and transition during which the present-day concept of law enforcement evolved.

Since its inception over 25 years ago, the department has become recognized as one of the most respected organizations of its kind in the nation.

The department was created by the legislature on Aug. 10, 1935, at a time when it was realized that the state's part in crime prevention and traffic control was inadequate and improperly organized.

A meager Highway Patrol at that time was under the jurisdiction of the State Highway Department, and the only existing state police force for criminal activity was the Texas Rangers, then under the supervision of the Adjutant General.

These two formed the nucleus of the department as it exists today, although it has been given many and varied duties and responsibilities since then.

The history of law enforcement in Texas is, in a sense, the history of Texas itself. It began in 1823, when Stephen F. Austin, having received permission to colonize the territory, realized that he would have to provide some form of protection for his colonists. He hired 10 men, and because they were required to range over a wide region to scout for marauding Indians, they became known as Rangers.

These were the forerunners of the Texas Rangers, whose tradition as fearless and competent lawmen has been carried forward into modern-day Texiana.

In 1927, the legislature, because of the increasing truck traffic problem resulting in actual and potential damage to highways and bridges and endangering the public safety, authorized the Texas Highway Department to employ 18 license and weight inspectors and one chief inspector to enforce existing regulations.

The principal reasons for the increase in truck traffic during 1927 and immediately prior to 1927 were the transportation of baled cotton from Central and North Texas to Houston for export, and the discovery of oil in the Burkburnett area.

The increasing use of motor trucks, many of them homemade and makeshift contraptions, with

inadequate brakes, steering mechanisms and tires for the loads they were carrying, created a serious menace to the safety of the traveling public.

The highway system, although satisfactory for normal passenger car traffic of the time, was not conducive to safety when these cumbersome affairs called trucks were operated over narrow, humped highways at 40 to 50 miles per hour. And many of these operators took their half out of the middle of these roads in order to keep their loads level.

Two years later, the legislature authorized the expansion of this group to 50 men, to be known as the State Highway Patrol, and to be charged with the duty of enforcing all laws relating to vehicles and their use on the public highways. This force was increased to 120 in 1931.

The law creating the Texas Department of Public Safety vested in the agency "the enforcement of the laws protecting the public safety and providing for the prevention and detection of crime."

The law provided that the department be composed of three divisions: The Texas Rangers, the Texas Highway Patrol, and the Headquarters Division. The Rangers were transferred from the Adjutant General's office, and the Patrol was transferred from the Highway Department, to the new Department of Public Safety.

The control of the department is vested in a Public Safety Commission of three members, each of whom serves a six-year term with one member's term expiring each two years. Commission members are appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The commission names the director and the assistant director.

On Sept. 1, 1957, the legislature authorized a major reorganization plan proposed by the Texas Research League after an exhaustive study. Under this plan the Department of Public Safety (Continued on Page Two)

decentralized its work loads and brought its personnel closer to the people.

This was done by creating six regional commands, each headed by a senior officer with the rank of major, who was placed in charge of the Highway Patrol, the License and Weight program, the Motor Vehicle Inspection program, Driver License examinations, Communications and the Safety Education Service in his region. Each regional headquarters maintains a limited crime laboratory.

The Texas Rangers are assigned to six companies with the same boundaries as the regional commands, each headed by a Captain directly responsible to the director of the department. The Narcotic Section and the Intelligence Section, each headed by an agent-in-charge, are part of the Director's Staff, operating statewide out of the Austin headquarters.

The supporting headquarters divisions, sections and bureaus all were consolidated into four major divisions—the Identification and Criminal Records Division, the Personnel and Staff Services Division, the Driver and Vehicle Records Division, and the Inspection and Planning Division.

The responsibilities of the department fall into three general categories:

1. General crime suppression and control.
2. Motor vehicle highway transportation management.
3. Disaster and emergency activities.

To meet these responsibilities
