Lee Ellis, a 27-year-old state Jaycee executive, will assume the duties of manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce on Dec. 3rd.

The board of directors of the Eastland Chamber voted unanimously Thursday to hire Ellis on a one-year trial basis.

He is a native of Dallas and has lived in Arlington since 1951 and is presently employed with American National Life Ins. Co. He is single.

As state chairman of publicity for the Jaycees, he has had opportunity to know many chamber executives in the state.

A graduate of North Texas State College, he holds a bachelor of arts degree and has attended Arlington State College.

Ellis is a 32nd Degree Mason, a Baptist and a Shriner.

"I will do everything within my power to make Eastland a good chamber manager," he told the directors after being informed of the unanimous vote.

He will receive \$350 a month plus automobile expenses. The agreement was that he would begin work on the first day of December, but he asked if he could postpone his official starting date until the following Monday, as Dec. 1 falls on a Friday — indicating that he might be a bit superstitious.

Frank Denton made the motion to hire him and Mike George seconded.

Arrangements for a secretary were discussed and it was agreed that in the beginning, probably only part-time help would be used, with Ellis making the selection of his office help.

## Rural Carriers Present Suggestions For Holidays

The rural postmen of Eastland would like to wish a merry Christmas to their patrons, and thank them for their splendid cooperation during the busy Christmas season last year. They are Varge Daniels and George Parrack.

To those of you who would like to help this year we offer the following suggestions:

Unsealed cards, without writing other than your name, may be mailed for 3c, but they cannot be forwarded or returned to you if undeliverable. Those bearing the letter rate of postage, 4c, can be forwarded or returned if undeliverable, provided they bear your return address. All sealed cards and those containing writing must bear the letter rate of postage.

Please be sure to buy your stamps in advance and place them on your cards and letters before putting them in the box for collection.

The Postal Regulations require that rural patrons stamp all greeting cards and letter mail during the month of December. Your carrier has a supply of stamps and you may buy them from him.

When addressing your cards, include the postal delivery zone number if known. This will materially expedite delivery to the addressee.

You can further assist by separating your cards for local and out of town delivery. When they are ready to be mailed, with stamps affixed in the upper right corner, tie them in bundles with all addresses faced the same way. Labels 14-A and 14-B are supplied without charge for your convenience in labeling the bundles. Or you may use slips of paper on which you have written, "All for Local Delivery" or "All for Out of Town Delivery."

Select a sturdy container and wrap your packages in good heavy paper and tie with cord or strong twine so that they will reach their destination in good condition. Write or print the address on one side only and place your return address in the upper left hand corner. Avoid the use of oiled or waxed paper for the outside wrapper. A card may be placed inside the parcel containing your name and address. A letter may be enclosed in the package.

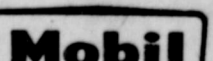

Readers Write

Editor: There has been much said, and written about the proposed plan of school consolidation of Eastland County.

There has not been enough emphasis placed on the real goal of such a plan.

How to stop mass exodus of youth to the cities should be one of the chief concerns of a rural area such as ours.

Even the survival of our towns depend upon the economic health of our rural people and with this in mind, I would like to quote several paragraphs from a much read rural paper, "The Texas Co-op Power" published by Comanche County Electric Co-op edition.

These paragraphs are from the November 1961 issue.

"What are the reasons for their continuing rush to the cities? The migration of youth is largely a result of the declining economy of rural areas."

"Industries, which would bring jobs, shy away from communities which cannot furnish good schools, hospitals, and other facilities."

Good schools, you will notice, is first in the list. I quote:

"Good Schools, provide adequate educational facilities, including vocational training in high school. Without such facilities, it is largely a waste of time trying to establish rural industries."

"With new industries come career opportunities. This and only this will keep three of every four rural youth from going to the cities before they reach thirty years of age."

I don't claim to understand all the arguments concerning the economics involved in the school consolidation plan, but I do know that cooperation is the American way of doing things.

If the local taxes, state and federal aid is not enough to provide for such a school that is proposed, we should all work together in this county to see it built.

"Build for the Future" should be our motto.

Accidents Take Big Toll During Hunting Seasons

AUSTIN — A warning against hunting accidents during the current season has been issued by T. D. Carroll, coordinator of information and education of the Game and Fish Commission.

For the 1960-61 fiscal year there were 59 hunting accidents reported through game wardens for the state. One fatality was a youth drowned while duck hunting, and one was an adult deer hunter who died of a heart attack while in the field.

Two of the 57 shooting accidents were not completely reported, leaving 55 persons whose accidents were officially reported. Of that number, 21 were minors, with 34 adults involved. Four women were involved in the accidents, one fatally.

There were 19 shooting fatalities, 13 of them self-inflicted due to carelessness. There were six persons killed by guns in the hands of other persons.

Thirty-six of the accidents, 15 of them fatal, were reported during the principal hunting season months, September through December.

"A number of these accidents might have been averted through hunter education," Carroll said. "Others were the result of plain carelessness."

"Too many hunters are prone to shoot at something that moves. There is sufficient game, especially in the deer areas of Texas today, for every person to take enough time to examine the animal and be sure it is one and not a person. Snap shooting in the brush also is very dangerous."

"Persons carrying out deer or dressing them in the field also should be careful they don't offer a target for the snap-happy hunter."

1,316 Animals Sold At Auction

Despite cold and drizzle, 1,316 head of live stock were moved through the Eastland Auction Co. Tuesday.

There were 256 sellers and 80 buyers with 1,170 cattle, 112 hogs and 34 sheep and goats sold.

Butcher bulls brought \$16 to \$18.10; butcher cows, \$14 to \$15.30; canners and cutters, \$10 to \$14; butcher calves, \$22 to \$23.70; stocker calves (steers) heavy, \$23 to \$26.60; light, \$30 to \$35; heifers, 2 less than steers; pairs of cows and calves, 140 to 227.50; butcher hogs, 15.50 to 17; and sows 14 to 15.

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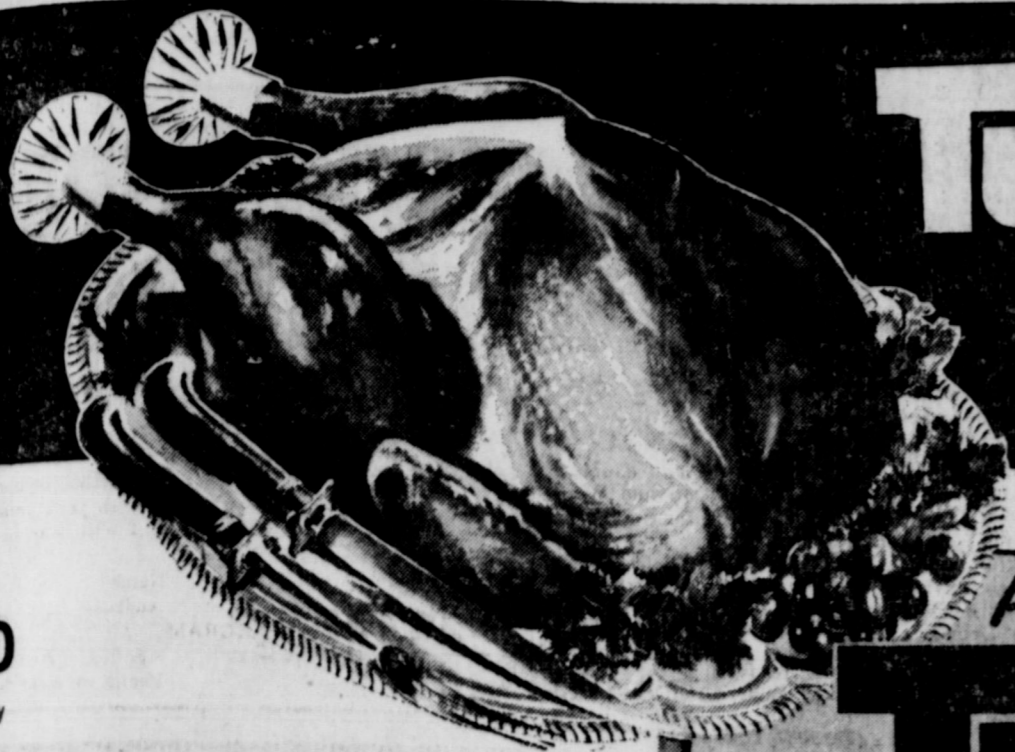

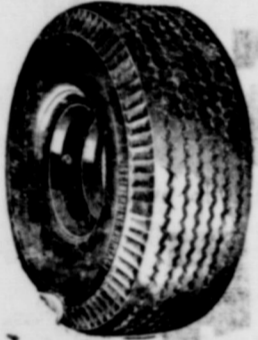

### Thoughts For The Sabbath

THE SECRET STORM  
St. Matthew 7:24-25  
I Corinthians 3:9  
By REV. NORRIS

I Cor. "For we are labourers together with God; Ye are God's husbandry, Ye are God's building."

St. Matt. "Therefore whosoever heareth these sayings of mine and doeth them, I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock, and the rain descended, and the floods came and the winds blew and beat upon that house; and it fell not, for it was founded upon a rock."

(SECRET)  
THAT THIS IS NOT REVEALED TO OTHERS (STORM)

A heavy fall of rain, snow, hail, sleet or sand and carries with it mighty winds, thunder and lightning. A storm also carries with it a series of destructed forces. Now any two of these together can be easily identified according to the scientific devices and meteorologies of today.

(a) Where lightning and thunder appear to an excess is called a storm.

(b) Where wind, hail and rain appear to an excess combined their forces can be called a flood or a hail storm.

(c) Sleet, snow and wind can unite their forces and we have a bluster.

(d) Wind and sand can mix, we call it a sand storm. Now with the intelligence of modern equipment it is very easy to foresee and foretell the approaching danger. And those that hear and obey may flee for shelter and escape from harm or injury.

But scientific devices, educated meteorologist and all other means that we have in action today can never tell us when or where a secret storm will strike. But every human regardless of age, color or creed can be sure that it will strike. And no human can ever boast of not being victims of this storm. For Jesus plainly points out that it happens to the wise and foolish alike. Listen to the scripture the rain descending, the flood came and the wind blew and beat upon the house of both buildings.

In the other storms that were mentioned when in progress may effect millions of people at the same time, but the secret storm affects one person at a time and no man, woman, boy or girl may have the same reaction. One commits suicide, another kills and another devouts, while another may lose all self-respect and control. But the man that hears and obeys God's will, will be able to overcome all forces of a secret storm, for they are many.

No storm is a storm with Jesus. These are the forces that might easily face a human in his life time: (a) The storm of bereavement, but with Jesus this is no storm. Ask the woman who had lost and mourned for her only son. For when Jesus came to the gate of the city of Nian there was a dead man carried out, the only son of his mother's and she was a widow; and many people of the city were with her. And when

the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her and said unto her, "weep not and he came and touched the brier and they had heard him stood still. And he said, "Young man, I say unto thee, arise," and he that was dead set up and began to speak and he delivered him to his mother. So bereavement is no storm for Jesus.

(b) The storm of impotence, no matter how long you have been a victim of this storm it is still no storm for Jesus, the impotent man will agree for he was among the victims that were at Jerusalem by the sheep market there was a pool which is called in the Hebrew tongue Bethesda, having five porches. In these lay a great multitude of impotent folk, of blind, halt, withered waiting for the moving of the water.

For an angel went down at a certain season into the pool and troubled the water. Whosoever then first after the troubling of the water stepped in was made whole of whatever disease he had and a certain man was there which had an infirmity tired and eight years. When Jesus saw him lie and knew that he had been down a long time in that case, he said unto him, "Will thou be made whole?" The impotene man answered him, "Sir I have no man when the water is troubled to put me into the pool, but while I am coming another steppeth down before me." Jesus saith unto him, "Rise, take up thou bed and walk." And immediately the man was made whole and took up his bed and walked. (c) The storm of trouble and a world of unrest for the mind of men never satisfies. One can so easily fall victim of this storm, but whether in prison or at sea trouble is no storm for Jesus. The disciples will bear me record for that night on the sea they toiled and struggled against contrary wind until the fourth watch of the night. But the same sea that they had trouble with was no trouble for Jesus, for he came walking on the same sea.

Our troubles are Christ's pathway. Listen to Paul with such encouraging remarks that where sin did abound grace did much more abound. He said the trouble that sin is able to get you into, God's grace is able to get you out. That's why the psalmist said, "Take the name of Jesus with you, Child of sorrow and of woe, it will joy and comfort give you, Take the name wherever you go." And in another scripture it is written, no matter who builds the building, no matter when you build, to survive the secret storm and be able to stand, acknowledge him in all thy ways and He shall direct thy paths.

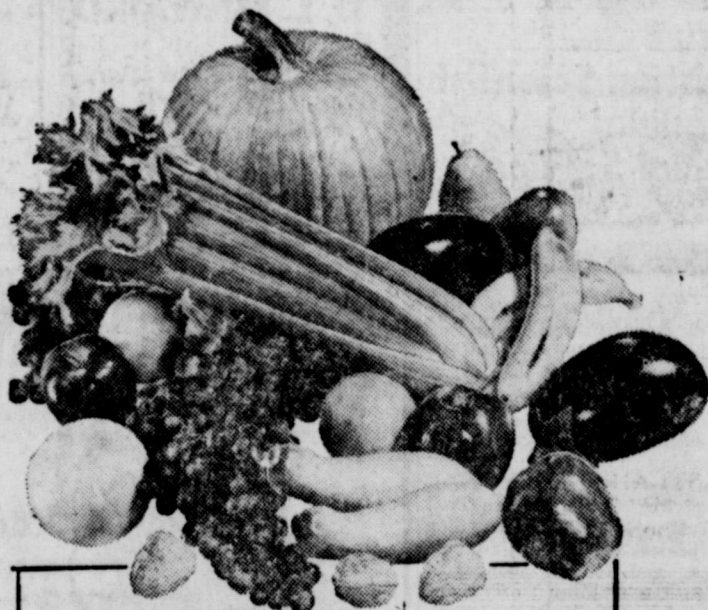
