The Eastland County Adult Leaders Association met in the Texas Electric Building in Eastland on November 20th. The meeting was opened by playing a get-acquainted game.

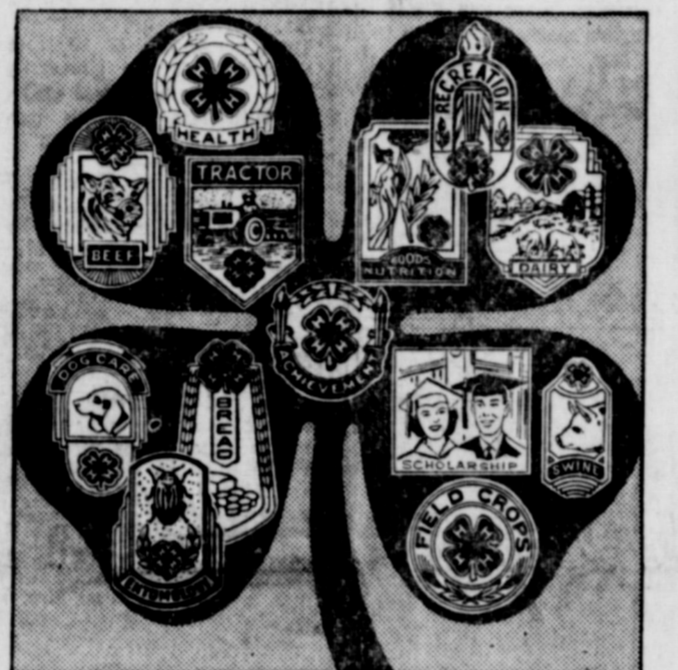

Deer Hunters Pay Fines For Hunting At Night

Maurice Dry, Eastland County Game Warden, had a busy time late Thursday night and early Friday morning, when he made two separate arrests for illegal deer hunting.

to Ranger, where they were lodged in the city jail until Friday morning.

At 9:30 Friday morning they were taken before Justice Springer, where charges of hunting deer in a closed area with aid of an artificial light were filed. Both pleaded guilty of the charges and were fined \$117.50 each, which included court costs.

When the pair left the Justice of the Peace office on their way to Eastland County jail, they were trying to figure out how many days they would have to stay in jail to pay off the fine, at the rate of \$3.00 a day allowed by the county.

The first arrest was made by Dry and Game Warden J. C. Moore of Stephenville, about 10 p. m. Thursday near the Tudor Community on Highway 16. Two De Leon high school boys were arrested for using a spotlight and hunting at night. The boys were both 17 years of age.

The pair had in their possession a spotlight that was worn on their caps and a .30-30 rifle. The two officers heard shots before the arrest was made.

The youth were brought to Ranger and taken before Justice of the Peace Ruby Springer. A guilty plea was made and they were fined \$43.50 each including court costs. The boys were returned to De Leon after paying the fine.

The second arrest was made by Dry on his return from De Leon. He said that he spotted a car driving very slow along Highway 16, near the first overpass on Highway 80. The car turned off the road into a shallow ditch and the headlights picked out a deer in a field next to the road. Shots were fired by occupants of the car before Dry arrived on the scene.

This time it was two Ranger teenagers, ages 17 and 19. The 19 year old has just completed a term in the penitentiary. Fresh blood was found in the car and two pocket knives with blood stains on them, were also found.

The two Ranger teenagers had in their possession a .22 rifle and a 12 gauge shotgun. Also, shells for a .270 rifle were found in their pocket, but no gun was discovered.

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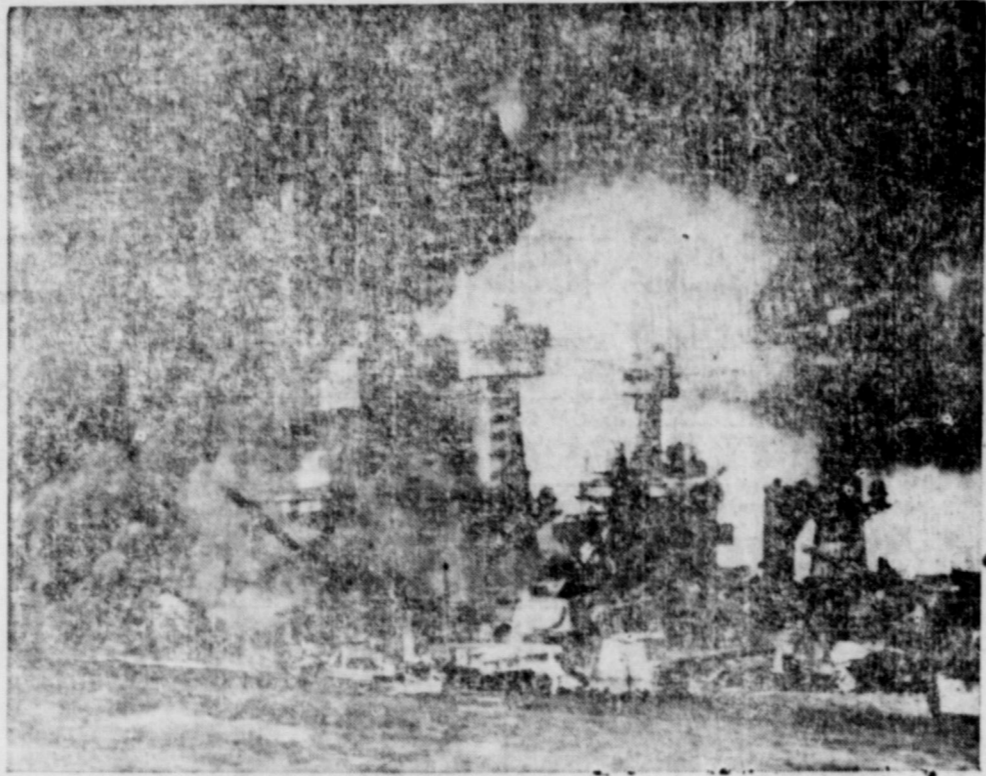
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ON THE MORNING OF DEC. 7, 1941, the Japanese made a surprise air and submarine attack on Pearl Harbor and the Army and Navy airfields of Hawaii. Caught on the ground or at their moorings were about 300 U. S. airplanes and almost 100 ships. Aircraft destroyed numbered about 140 in addition to approximately 80 damaged. Of the eight U. S. battleships at Pearl Harbor, five were sunk, one severely damaged and the other two hit. Two destroyers and nine other ships were sunk or severely damaged. The Pacific fleet's three aircraft carriers, not at Pearl Harbor on that fateful morning, escaped damage. Casualties among the military personnel numbered over 3,000 including more than 2,300 killed. The Japanese made no effort to land at Hawaii, nor had they any plans to do so. The slogan "Remember Pearl Harbor" became reminiscent of "Remember the Maine." The attack precipitated, on Dec. 8, America's declaration of war upon Japan and the beginning of active U. S. participation in World War II.

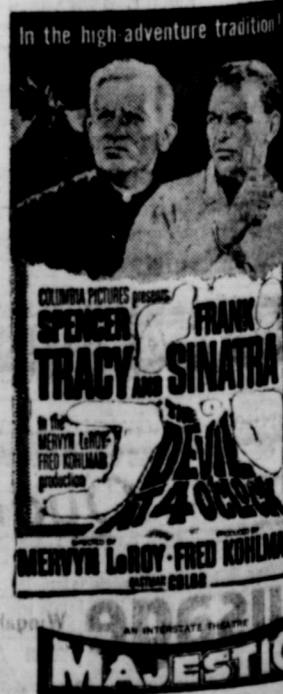

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'Please Mail Early' Asks Postal Officials

It's time to start planning your Christmas card and gift mailings, Eastland Postmaster Mrs. Art Johnson said today as she launched the 1961 "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign.

Looking ahead to what may be the biggest Christmas season ever, the Postmaster said further, "Here are the things to watch to help in getting every Christmas card and package delivered before December 25th—

Check your Christmas card and gift lists carefully. Be sure each address is complete with full name, street and number, city, zone and state. Avoid abbreviations of city and state names.

For your gift packages, secure heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord and adhesive tape. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift packages if you will add the appropriate First Class mail stamps to the postage for the package itself.

Stock up on postage stamps—by doing this soon, you'll save lots of time that might be spent standing in line later on. When you go to the Post Office, ask for a supply of labels which read, "All For Out of Town Delivery," so that before you mail your Christmas cards you can sort them into two groups, with the addresses all facing one way, thus expediting delivery.

The Post Office will help you plan your Christmas mailings. Get a copy of Pamphlet No. 2, which gives full information about

proper packaging and wrapping of parcels.

First class postage is best for mailing your Christmas cards. All cards sent by 4c postage may include a personal handwritten message, and they'll be forwarded or returned, if that becomes necessary. Be sure to put your return address on your Christmas card envelopes. It's socially correct to do this, and enables both you and your friends to keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

Predicting that this year's Christmas mail will set an all time record, even exceeding the number of pieces that were handled here in the pre-holiday season of 1960, the postmaster pointed out the importance of planning your Christmas mailings now to avoid a lot of headaches when the Christmas rush comes in earnest.

She said further, that through the excellent cooperation of the public during recent Christmas seasons, he has been able to get all of the Christmas cards and packages dispatched and delivered before Christmas Eve.

"We can all make the 1961 'Mail Early For Christmas' Campaign a big success," he continued, "if we'll all take a personal responsibility in planning our Christmas mailings so that cards and gift packages going to most distant points are mailed by December 10th, and earlier, if possible. Christmas packages for local destinations should be mailed by December 15th, and be sure to mail your Christmas cards for friends and relatives in this area at least before Christmas."

The Apostle Paul, in writing to the church at Corinth, so felt the need of Christian love among them, he devoted the thirteenth chapter of his first epistle to love.

He concludes this chapter with these words, "And now abideth faith, hope, and charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity." I Cor. 13:13.

Hunters Urged To Follow Safety Rules

Deer are plentiful this year and there is also an abundant supply of hunters. Which will you kill? Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist, warns that a lot of hunters will be shot unless commonsense safety rules are followed by everyone in the field.

Can you imagine how it would feel to be hit by the slug from a deer rifle? Or perhaps even worse, how it would feel to be responsible for shooting one of your hunting companions? In either case, the prevention is much easier than the cure, advises Cooper.

Hunting rules are so simple that many hunters don't bother to practice them. Every year scores of hunters fall victim to gunshot wounds, and the excuses follow the same old pattern. "I didn't know the gun was loaded." "Well, he looked just like a deer in that thick brush." And so it goes, every year.

Many hunting accidents could be prevented if hunters would follow the simple rule of "Don't shoot unless you bet your life that you know what you're shooting at." Another cardinal rule of hunting is, "Don't leave your stand until everyone quits hunting." Every step taken through the brush raises your chances of being mistaken for a deer, and this could prove fatal.

Always assume every gun is loaded until you have opened the action and looked for yourself. Before you fire a gun, make sure it is in good working order and the barrel is clear, warns Cooper.

Then there are the people who manage to shoot themselves. Climbing fences with a loaded gun, leaning one against a tree or car, or throwing a loaded gun into the car are ways to add your name to this list. The remedy for these potential accidents is simple: don't do these things and don't hunt with people who do.

There is no open season on people. Use your head and don't violate that rule, and don't let one of your friends "poach" on you, Cooper concludes.

Mr. Perry spoke to the audience on results of the recent election.

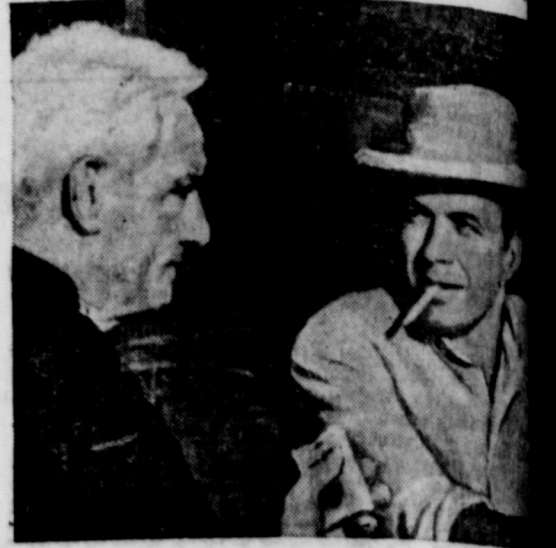
