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Potential for Suttle Holcomb B Is Reported

L. F. Suttle Holcomb B Well No. 2, 2 miles northeast of Eastland, completed July 13, has a potential of around 145 barrels a day, it was reported Saturday. It was completed in the Strawn sand at 1,521 feet.

Drilled by the Irish Drilling Company, which has brought in four producers in the immediate field, the well is the property of L. F. Suttle Jr. and H. W. Porter and Tabor, Coleman & Carr of Midland.

The J. L. Dick well is being drilled for Forster, Carr & Scott on the J. L. Dick tract, 3 miles north of Eastland, by Irish Drilling.

Trumter Petroleum Company's Pauline Roberts No. 2, offsetting the same company's No. 1 two miles northwest of Rising Star, was reported recovering "sand-frac" oil at the rate of 18 barrels per hour with strong gas pressure when opened this week.

The well, bottomed at 1,050 feet, was perforated and treated with the sand-frac process Tuesday. It had a good showing of oil and gas when the formation was topped and operators said that it has the earmarks of a good small producer.

Wilson, Sayre, Freyschlag Head Eastland United Fund

The Eastland United Fund, one of the community's newest organizations, elected a president and adopted a constitution and by-laws at a directors' meeting Thursday night at the Texas Electric Service Community Room.

Vice President F. N. Sayre and Secretary-Treasurer Charles Freyschlag complete the staff. Chairman of the organization's first drive is due for appointment by the president next week.

The fund campaign will be held in the autumn, probably in the latter part of October, authorities disclosed.

Purposes of the movement were set forth as follows: (a) The raising of funds for agencies serving Eastland carrying on charitable and benevolent and wartime work; (b) The uniting as far as possible of the financial campaigns of non-profit local charitable and benevolent and welfare organizations;

(c) The distribution of the funds so raised among the participating charitable organizations; (d) Co-operating with the city and county authorities of Eastland and Eastland County, in protecting the citizens, corporations and associations of Eastland, against solicitors of unworthy, inefficient and unnecessary charitable, philanthropic or other appeals for money, supplies or other property.

Any contributor to the United Fund will be a member and entitled to a vote.

Organizations are admitted to participation in benefits from the United Fund by approval of the board.

The directorate is to be composed of no fewer than 18 or more than 25 members.

An annual meeting will be held not later than March 31 each year.

A screening and budget committee will make recommendations to the board concerning examination of prospective participants' requests.

President Wilson indicated that he will name standing committees in the early future.

"We hope to consolidate as many charitable drives as possible and practicable," said Mr. Wilson, "and thus eliminate much duplication of effort and loss of time on the part of solicitors and prospective donors."

Eastland County Melon Crop Coming On Market Steadily

Watermelons and cantaloupes will soon reach the steady-flow stage, to market. Probably the majority of watermelons are Black Diamond and yellow-meated Tendersweet.

Security Payments In Eastland County Monthly, \$32,783

In Eastland County at the end of last year 622 retired workers were receiving \$32,783 in monthly social security payments, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of the social security office in Abilene, Texas.

In addition to the retired workers themselves, 528 people were receiving \$17,483 a month as dependents of the retired workers or as survivors of deceased workers.

Although this is a considerable increase as compared with payments a year ago, it is certain that more people will receive larger payments in years to come because of changes in the social security law in 1954, Tuley says. Among the major changes were the following:

1. Computation of payments after "dropping out" up to five years of lowest social security covered earnings.
2. Extension of social security coverage to more farm workers

Polio Serum To Be Brought To County Sunday

Having received a telegram from health authorities at Austin concerning availability of polio serum there for Eastland County, County Health Officer Dr. L. C. Brown said Saturday that Sgt. Jess Cole of Ranger will go to Austin Sunday to bring this county's allotment back.

"We hope to obtain 650 doses of the vaccine," said Dr. Brown. "It is to be the second round, for the youngsters — last year's first and second graders — who took the shots in the spring."

Pits for professional boat racers will be installed in that general area also, it was decided.

More Farm Ponds Being Staked Off

Farm ponds were staked last week for Billy Bacon, 2 miles south of Cisco; Flora Snoddy, 8 miles southwest of Cisco, J. V. Heysler, 5 miles southwest of Nimrod and Robert H. Donovan 8 miles northwest of Cisco.

Landowners and Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the district made site selections for the above pond. A farm pond site selection includes the finding of suitable soil such as clay or shale that will hold water, a site with necessary drainage area, to keep a pond near full during normal rainfall.

A site with high ground on either side of natural drain makes for a good, economical pond. These ponds were located to give distribution of livestock water and in turn a more even use of grass.

Ponds were completed on the places of E. G. Hallmark of Nimrod, Stanley Miller, 2 miles north of Kokomo; Albert Hansen, 3 miles northwest of Cisco; J. S. Hatton, 3 miles northwest of Ranger, and Flora Snoddy, 3 miles southwest of Cisco.

Two diversion terraces, about 2,400 feet long, were run on the Snoddy farm to divert pasture water from cropland. These diversions emptied onto stable grass outlets. Terrace systems were run on the Dr. N. A. Prown farm, 5 miles west of Cisco, and Bill Childers, farm northwest of Cisco.

These terraces will prevent gully erosion and hold needed rainfall on the fields.

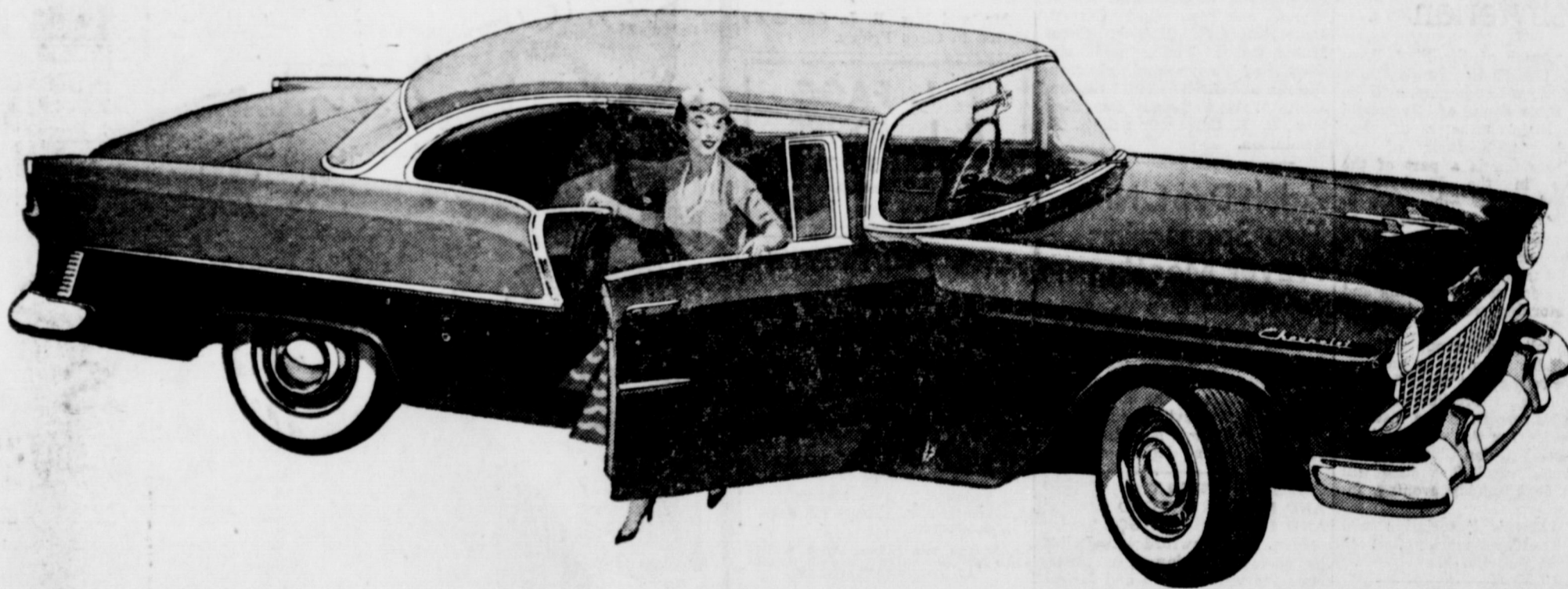

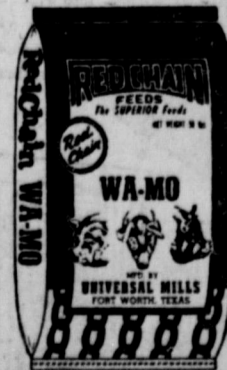
