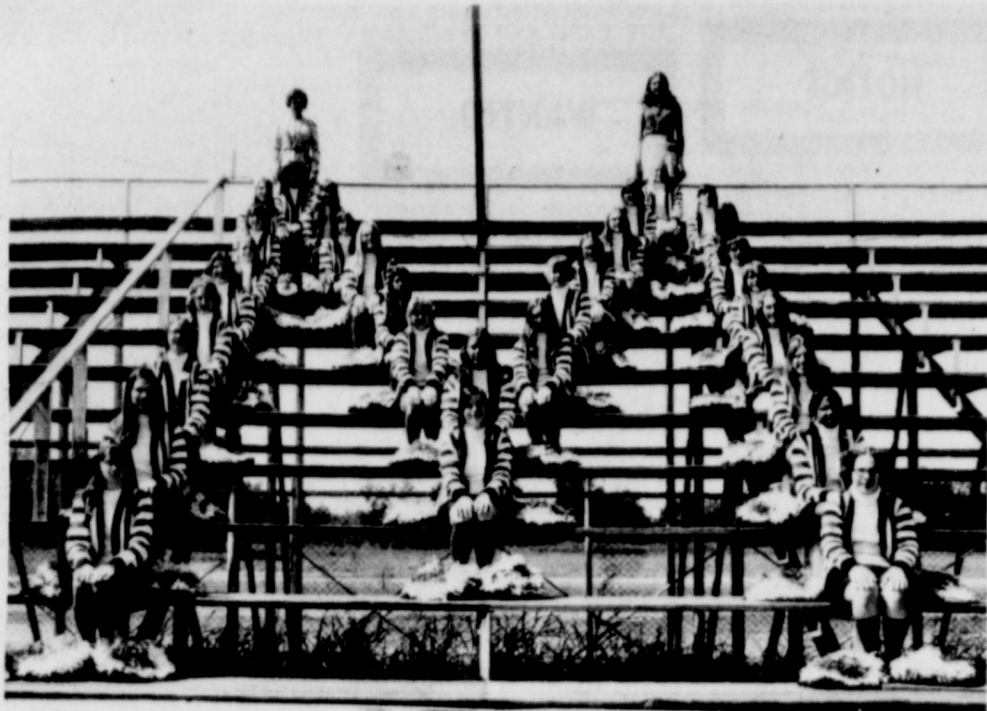

Doug has attended high school at Wall, Texas, located eight miles east of San Angelo, Area II. His father works in a San Angelo bank.

While a member of the FFA Doug has carried out a number of outstanding agricultural projects and has participated in a variety of FFA contests. He was runner-up in the Area II Public Speaking Contst for the past three years. He served as president of the State-winning Chapter Conducting Team in 1973-74 and was a member of the State-qualifying Dairy Products Judging Team in 1972-73. GORDON SPOT

An old foe strikes again. The screwworm fly has almost been eradicated several times, but always seems to come back.

A case of screwworms were positively identified southeast of Eastland on October 17. The larvae sample was sent to the screwworm Eradication laboratory in Mission where it was identified. Another livestock owner called us from Carbon and said he had treated a case of screwworms, but did not collect an for identification.

This should be a warning to all livestock and pet owners to be on the alert for screwworm infestation. If larvae are found in animal wounds we encourage you to collect a sample and mail to the laboratory at Mission. Containers and mailing tubes are available at the county Extension office. We also suggest that livestock owners delay dehorning,

castrating, and branding until we have colder weather and the threat of screwworms is past.

The second annual Eastland County hay show was held Tuesday, October 22. A total of 13 bales were classified in the blue ribbon group.

All entries were classified and compared to the standard of a perfect bale of hay. Fifty percent of the score was based on the protein analysis. The other 50 percent was based on physical characteristics such as maturity, texture, leafiness, foreign material, and color. A score of 100 would be given to a perfect sample. All hay entries that scored over 85 got a blue ribbon. A score between 70 and 84 got a red ribbon and hay scoring between 50 - 69 received a gold ribbon.

R.D. Hart of Eastland was awarded a blue ribbon on a bale of alfalfa hay.

Several men took blue ribbons for bermudagrass hay. They were Truman Brown of Eastland, Glen Rockey of Baird, B.L. Hunter of Eastland, Weldon Tankersley of Morton Valley, J.D. Griffin Jr. of Carbon, and Delbert Tarver of

Rising Star. Leo Williams of Desdemona and Morris Underwood of Ranger each received blue ribbons for grass mixture hay. H.L. Ferris of Ranger had a bale of peanut hay to receive a blue ribbon.

For sudan hybrid hay, several men took blue ribbons including N.E. Richardson of Ranger, Truman Brown of Eastland and Hood King of Eastland.

Red ribbons were awarded to the following hay exhibitors: Mose Nantz, Joseph Housson, Dr. L.R. Gholke, Hood King, W.F. Yardley, J.W. Ratliff, Durel Reid and Mike Collins, Buddy Canet, Tony White, Paul Norris, Ross Hodges, Leo Williams, Durwood Burgess and Weldon Tankersley.

Gold ribbons winners were Charles Underwood, Sam Kimmel, and Milton Crawford. Hay that did not classify as high as 50 did not get a ribbon.

The hay judge, Dr. John Chapin, was very complimentary of the quality of the hay. He said it was much better hay than was in last year's show.

We would like to thank the farm and ranch stores in Eastland County who helped sponsor the hay show. The show was planned and conducted by the Rural Development Committee.

- 1 cup water

Wash apples and insert a wooden skewer into center of each apple. In a saucepan, combine sugar, corn syrup and water. Heat, while stirring, until sugar dissolves. Continue cooking to 240°F. on a candy thermometer (or when a small amount of the syrup dropped into very cold water forms a soft ball which flattens on removal from water). Remove from heat and stir in peanut butter. Dip each apple into syrup to coat. Stand apples skewer side up on plate to cool.

Bob Pogue Key Person In Helping Decide Fate Of I-27

Congressman Bob Pogue of Waco might be the key person in helping decide the fate of Interstate 27.

Individuals and organizations interested in helping secure the Plains-to-Port Highway through Eastland might want to consider contacting Cong. Pogue and telling him in their own words why they think the major north-south highway route should go through Eastland.

Of course, Cong. Omar Burleson would be of tremendous help too, but the fact remains that all of the some 23 proposed routes for the highway go through his district (which includes Eastland County), so he probably can't be in a position of recommending one route over another.

Letters probably should go to both and they may be written to the House Office Building, Washington, D.C.

It would appear that Eastland is the ideal hub on Interstate 20 for the Lubbock to Houston Route.

The Texas Highway Department has given the Federal Highway Administration the State's report on a study of possible routes for extension of Interstate 27 southward from Lubbock.

In all, 23 routes are mentioned in the report, and there is no recommendation for any particular route.

Assistant State Highway Engineer M.G. Goode said "we didn't make a recommendation because the Federal law giving us the money to make the study didn't ask for any recommendation."

The law was the Federal Aid to Highway Act, which directed that a study be made of possible extension of I-27 the shortest Interstate highway in the system, to the south.

The report is voluminous, and notes that the fact that proposed route was not included in the demand for the study was a reason for its length. "Because of the lack of a designated route, the study of the necessity and feasibility of

extending I-27 in a southerly direction to intersect I-20 and proceed further to intersect I-10 soon reached epidemic proportions."

The study did show a need for extension of the Interstate highway, which runs from Amarillo to Lubbock. It found the need to take the cattle and agricultural products from the region to the Gulf Coast, and noted that the route would tie together a number of military installations located in West Texas.

Seven hearings were held on the proposal, in Abilene, Big Spring, Houston, Lamesa, Lubbock, San Angelo and Snyder.

The proposed routes, running from Lubbock, would all go through either Lamesa or Snyder. The proposed routes spread out from those points to other locations, covering practically every city of any size in West and Central Texas.

Routes proposed include: From Lubbock to Lamesa to connect with I-20 at Stanton,

northeast of Midland, and running south to I-10 at Ozona; from Lubbock to Lamesa to I-20 at Big Spring to San Angelo and following one of several possible routes to connect with I-20 to the south;

From Lubbock to Snyder to I-20 at either Colorado City or Sweetwater then from Colorado City to Robert Lee to San Angelo to one of several routes, or if to Sweetwater then to San Angelo to several routes to I-10.

Routes from San Angelo would connect with I-10 at Sonora or at Junction or through Mason and Fredericksburg to Boerne or to Brady and Austin and to either Luling or through La Grange and to Columbus.

Other routes would take the road through Abilene from Snyder. The proposed routes spread out from those points to other locations, covering practically every city of any size in West and Central Texas.

Routes proposed include: From Lubbock to Lamesa to connect with I-20 at Stanton,

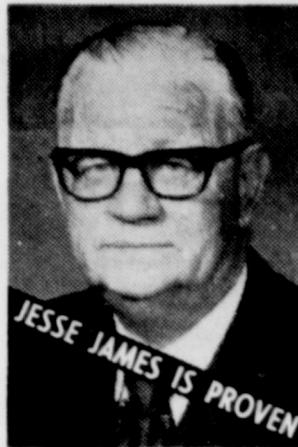

Opens Soon**

Archery season begins in Eastland County Nov. 1 for 31 days game warden Kenneth Payne reports.

No special permit is required for deer harvested during archery season, he said. Regular Deer Season opens Nov. 16 thru Jan. 1, with a limit of two deer, either sex. Special antlerless deer permit is required for killing antlerless deer during regular gun season. Permits are issued to the land owner and the hunter must pick them up from land owner, Mr. Payne explained.

Some 2,000 antlerless deer permits were issued at Eastland Courthouse on Oct. 15-16.

Quail Season opens Dec. 1 thru Feb. 16 with a limit of 12 per day.

Duck Season: Split Season--Nov. 9 thru Nov. 24 and Dec. 9 thru Jan. 19.

A guide to Texas Hunting can be obtained from local game warden or places where hunting and fishing licenses are sold.

There will be no open season on turkey in the county this year, he said.

REA Loan

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Congressman Omar Burleson announces the approval of a \$1,565,000 Rural Electrification Administration loan at two percent interest to the Comanche County Telephone Company, Inc., at Comanche, which serves in Comanche, Brown, Eastland, Erath and Mills Counties.

The purpose of the loan is to finance facilities to connect 351 additional subscribers, construct 29 miles of new line, upgrade service in the Newberg, Proctor and Sidney exchange to all one-party lines, also to construct a new dial central office building in the Newberg exchange, and finance system improvements.

Loan Approval

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Congressman Omar Burleson announces the approval of a \$10,253,000 Rural Electrification Administration loan at five percent interest to the Brazos Electric Power Cooperative Inc., at Waco, which serves in Parker, Comanche, Cooke, Eastland, Erath, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Throckmorton, Wise Young and Baylor Counties.

The purpose of the loan is to finance construction of 52 miles of 138 kV transmission line, finance construction of 42 miles of 69 kV transmission line, the conversion of 62 miles of transmission line, the construction of 13 substations, and increase capacity of existing facilities and finance general system improvements.

Get Out And Vote

A massive "Get Out The Vote" telephone campaign entitled Operation Take Ten For Texas was announced today by Democratic Party Chairman Calvin R. Guest of Bryan.

Thousands of letters to members of the State Democratic Executive Committee, Democratic County Chairmen and delegates and alternates to the 1974 State Democratic Convention, were mailed today from the State Party Headquarters urging each of these individuals to take ten minutes of their time on Nov. 4 to call five of their Democratic friends to vote on Nov. 5 and to urge each of their friends, in turn, to call five additional Democrats to remind them to vote.

"Every democrat in the state must bear a share of the burden in directing a major effort toward voter participation on Election Day," Guest stated.

"The State Party is allocating over ten thousand dollars to the Senatorial Districts to assist in this effort," Guest continued.

Coordinating this effort for the Democratic Party of Texas will be Lem Allen of Kingsbury, Chairman of the Texas Democratic County Chairman's Association and Maxine Lee, Vice President of the Texas AFL-CIO.

All Democratic nominees have been urged to stress the importance of this telephone campaign. It is anticipated in coming weeks well over fifty thousand additional pieces of mail will give impetus to this effort.

The Democratic Party plans to use a county-wide voter participation committee in each of the four Multi-District counties (Harris, Dallas, Tarrant and Bexar) and Senatorial District Committees in the remaining Senatorial Districts.

In each district, the county chairman, members of the S.D.E.C. and members of the Democratic National Committee will serve on the district steering committee and will, in turn, appoint other committee members representing all of the constituent Democratic groups.

Guest said, "I feel that a campaign of this sort involving Democrats in every nook and cranny of the state will be the most effective undertaking in the recent history of our Party. We're not asking for money for a change, we're simply asking for a little time and talent from our constituents."

Bob Bullock Winds Up Campaign

Austin--Bob Bullock, Democratic nominee for Comptroller, this week winds up his campaign to bring a new era of openness, efficiency and common sense to the Comptroller's office.

"This office belongs to the people and it should be run accordingly," Bullock said. "It is the heartbeat of state government and must keep up with the changing times."

The present Comptroller, Robert S. Calvert, is retiring at the end of the year.

Bullock, formerly Texas' Secretary of State, has campaigned in every county in Texas in both the general election race and the Democratic primary. He swept the primary by carrying 253 of the 254 counties.

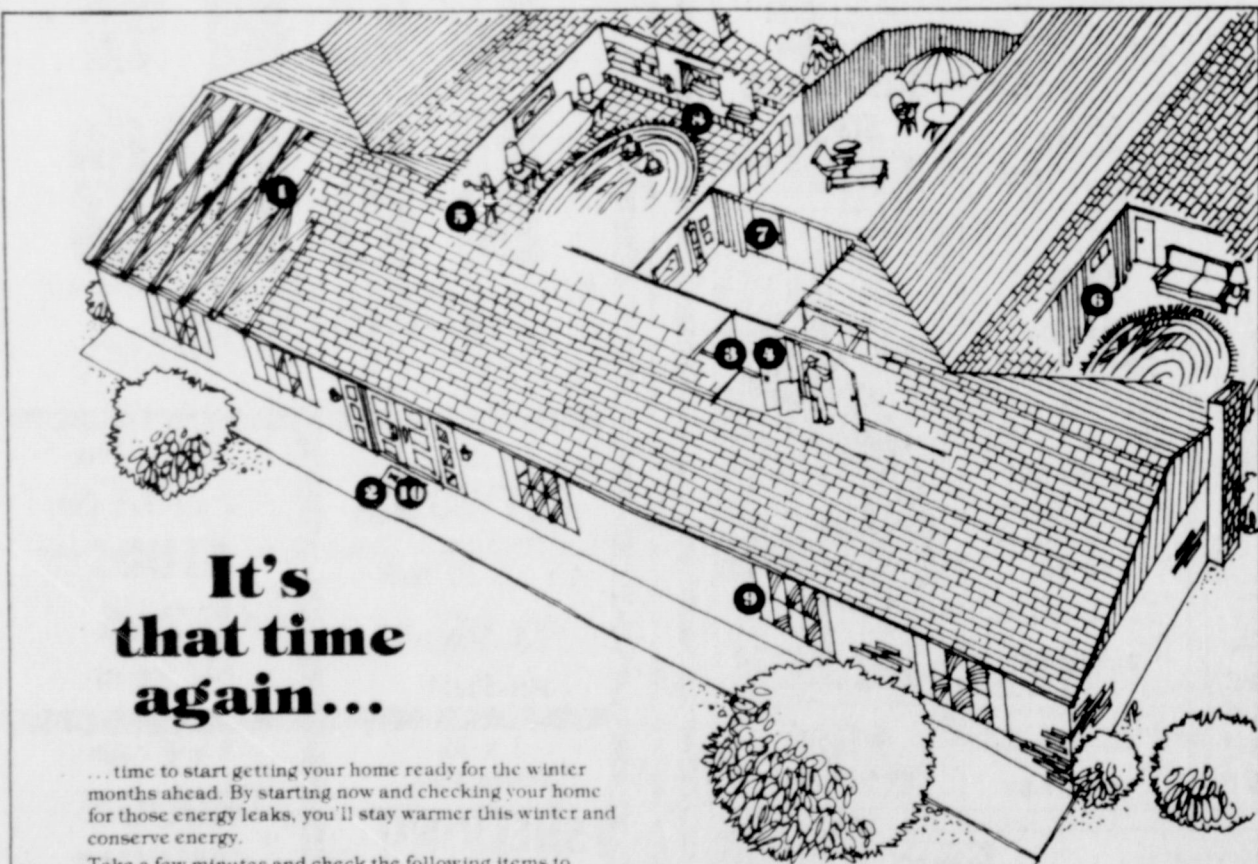

...time to start getting your home ready for the winter months ahead. By starting now and checking your home for those energy leaks, you'll stay warmer this winter and conserve energy.

Take a few minutes and check the following items to make sure your home will be winterized:

1. Insulation is most important... and can pay for itself in energy consumption savings. The usual recommendation is 6 inches of insulation for the attic and 4 inches for outside walls. Check FHA requirements for further information.
2. Weatherstrip doors and windows, and caulk cracks and crevices to prevent drafts and the loss of heated air.
3. Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent serviceman.
4. Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least every 90 days.
5. Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature to 60°F.
6. Don't place curtains, furniture or other objects in front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
7. Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.
8. Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use.
9. Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.
10. Keep the opening and closing of doors to a minimum to reduce the loss of warm air.

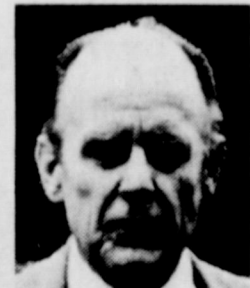

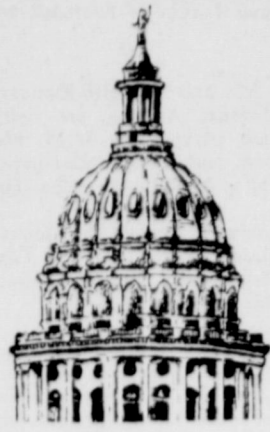
