Efforts Joined in Eastland

1973 in Eastland was a year when many joined efforts to improve a town. Setting off all the remodeling of buildings in the downtown area as well as the construction of new buildings was the massive planting of greenery through the co - operation of merchants, city officials, Boy Scouts, school children, and civic organizations.

The Civic League and Gorden Club's tree planting beautification program involved organizations, business firms and many individuals. It was a logical follow - up of a massive "Clean Up Eastland" campaign in the spring that not only helped improve the city, but through a community auction benefited the remodeling of an old building into a modern library. Citizen interest has encouraged the city council to begin greater efforts to tear down deteriorated buildings and houses

Three new industries have selected Eastland as a plant site. Six other already existing industries have continued to prosper.

Tourism has increased with the recognition given Eastland through its stamp mural window at the post office as well as the flag garden and ceremony. "Old Rip," the Horned Toad, was placed on display in a new glass case at the Courthouse with both inside and outside views available to tourists.







An old foe strikes again. The screwworm fly has almost been eradicated several times, but always seems to come back.

A cas of screwworms were positively identified southeast of Eastland on October 17. The larvae sample was sent to the screwworm Eradication laboratory in Mission where it identified. Another livestock owner called us from Carbon and said he had treated a case of screwworms, but did not collect an for identification.

This should be a warning to all livestock and pet owners to be on the alert for screwworm infestation. If larvae are found in animal wounds we encourage you to collect a sample and mail to the laboratory at Mission. Containers and mailing tubes are available at the county Extension office. We also suggest that livestock owners delay dehorning,

Take a few minutes and check the following items to make sure your home will be winterized:

- Insulation is most important... and can pay for itself in energy consumption savings. The usual recommendation is 6 inches of insulation for the attic and 4 inches for outside walls. Check FHA requirements for further information.
- Weatherstrip doors and windows, and caulk cracks and crevices to prevent drafts and the loss of heated air.
- Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent serviceman.
- Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least
- every 90 days. Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature to 60°F



Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.

Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use

Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.




