Salary Increase Approved For City Employees

Salary increases totaling some \$10,000 a year were approved for city employees by the Eastland City Commission in regular meeting Monday evening at City Hall.

In the four hour session the Commission also approved a tentative 1975 budget and endorsed the application for a Bicentennial designation for the city.

Mayor W.Q. Verner presided with all commissioners present except Mr. Charles Marshall who was ill. Everett plowman appeared before the commission concerning a water bill at his trailer park west of town.

Mr. Doug Fry and Mr. John D. Isenhower, both of west of Cisco, appeared explaining the recent misunderstanding regarding the establishment of the water system.

Doug Underwood appeared asking procedures for having a street paved.

A decision on the diverting water from the new sewer plant was tabled awaiting a report from the Water Quality Board concerning the procedures necessary.

A discussion was held and will be studied toward the opening of a one-way west-bound alley north of the post office with the outside post boxes to be placed on the north edge of the post office property so that motorists may deposit mail into the boxes from the left side without getting out of their cars.

The raises were distributed between the some 27 city employees.

Halloween Demands Driver Responsibility

Driver responsibility to young pedestrians will increase on the nights of October 26th, the night for the annual PTO School Carnival, and the 31st, which is Halloween. Jim Arnold, Administrator of the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety, issued a reminder for all motorists to be mindful of their responsibility to the youngsters as they set out on their "trick or treat" adventure. Said Arnold, "Halloween is not statistically one of the more accident prone seasons, but it is a time for us to be aware of the children. These youngsters are going to be crossing streets with thoughts of having fun and ringing doorbells. Many will not be remembering their instructions to watch for cars. Therefore, I urge each motorist to be especially mindful of young goblins during the evening of

Halloween." Arnold expressed optimism to the small amount of accidents that actually occur during Halloween, but he added that it never hurts to be reminded of the responsibility. "If children start out before dark and are reminded to cross at intersections after looking for oncoming cars, then maybe we can pass this period without injury or death to any young pedestrians. A car moving at a snail's pace has a much better chance of coming to a halt if necessary and this could result in saving a life," Arnold concluded.

A spokesman for the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety said children could wear light colored clothing, carry lighted flashlights, and display reflective tape on their costumes to be seen from greater distances.

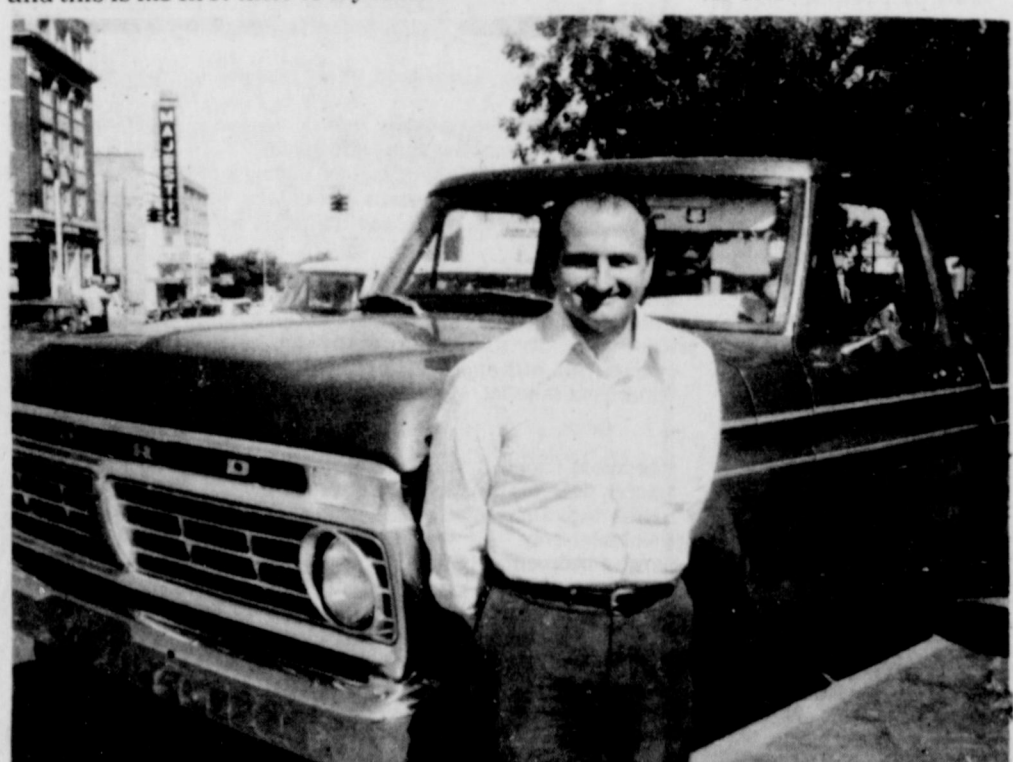

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PETER FONDA and SUSAN GEORGE are fugitives in a wild car chase in "DIRTY MARY CRAZY LARRY," an Academy Pictures production for 20th Century-Fox release

FROM "EASY RIDER" TO "EASY DRIVER"

From "Easy Rider" to "easy driver." That's a good description of Peter Fonda, starring with Susan George and Adam Roarke in Academy Pictures' "Dirty Mary Crazy Larry," directed by John Hough for 20th Century-Fox release

Peter portrays a stock-car racer on the lam, whose penchant for doing "crazy" things and driving like a madman knows no end. He is the super-driver and Peter brings it off in top manner.

"Yeah, I've given up motor bikes for cars," Peter admits. "As a matter of fact, instead of getting my kicks out of bikes I find peace and solitude on my sailboat. And I now get around in a car, a German make and not a 'bug'."

"It's safer, surer and saner, and you're not polluting the atmosphere and antagonizing the noise-abatement societies."

However, this placid attitude could not be contained when producer Norman Herman offered Peter the starring role in "Dirty Mary Crazy Larry."

Peter accepted the role, and with this acceptance he shouldered the responsibility of driving a souped-up version of a '68 Charger, along with the cracking up of some 18 vehicles, most of them law enforcement cars which chase him in the film.

As for Fonda, all the fast driving, the feeling of high speed and the intricate precision camera work necessary to capture the crashes, the skid-arounds, the car jumps—one off a drawbridge—and the near-misses, all of these served to make the film an exciting project.

"When we started filming, I just thought it was going to be another film," Fonda says. "But as we got into the work, when all

those crazy stunts took place behind me and I saw some of the filming in the rushes, I couldn't help but get excited."

Basically, the story deals with two stock-car racing enthusiasts who extort \$150,000 from a store-owner so they can build a race car. The law gets a clue on them, and the two (Fonda and Roarke) with an uninvited guest (Susan George) are chased by police in a suspense-clogged pursuit that will leave fans exhausted at the end.

"Talk about action," Peter says. "There's a stunt every five minutes in the film. That's what Stunt Coordinator Al Wyatt said and you better believe it."

But the overall essence of the story does not center only on the chase. There are conflicts among the trio being pursued, conflicts with characters they encounter en route and also a running conflict with law officer in charge of police operations—Vic Morrow.

Morrow bails and harangues "Crazy Larry" (Fonda) on the two-way radio set-up in the Charger, driving Larry and his pals to distraction in a battle of mental gymnastics that would bring out pride in a psychologist.

It all makes for what Fonda recalls as one of his favorite roles, what you might call his four-wheeled "Easy Rider." "Dirty Mary Crazy Larry" was written by Leigh Chapman and Antonio Santean from a novel by Richard Unkeis.

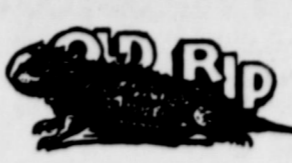

Send season mail without any delay

Watch the calendar! You can make sure your Christmas cards and packages are delivered on time if you just follow a simple rule — mail early.

Although "it's the thought that counts," a Christmas card or Christmas gift received in the mail late can be disappointing. Not to mention the aggravation it produces among U.S. Postal Service employees who are deluged with billions of cards and packages during the season.

So, to get holiday material delivered on time, and help the postman perform his duty, use zip codes and keep some deadlines in mind:

— Before the last week of November begins, send out parcel airtel packages and cards to servicemen overseas.

— By the end of November you should have mailed: surface parcels to Alaska and Hawaii; packages via parcel airtel to the Arctic and Canada; and airmail parcels and cards to South and Central America, and the Near East or Far East.

— During the second week of December, try to take care of these holiday mailings: international greeting cards and parcels to Africa, Near East and Far East; surface mail for the whole United States (including Alaska and Hawaii); airmail parcels and cards to Canada, Eu-

rope and Mexico. — And finally, by the end of the third week in December, with only three to five days to spare before the 25th, send all airmail parcels and cards to Alaska and Hawaii as well as all destinations in the continental United States.

Neighbors keep Yuletide spirit alive with trees

One of the most beautiful sights at holiday time is the Christmas tree. It's always been a family tradition to select a tree, spend time together trimming it, and gathering 'round it Christmas morning.

This annual custom requires the cutting of thousands of trees each year, but there are ways to compensate for this. Some communities have come up with a solution, but it requires cooperation and contributions from the townspeople.

The idea is to have an area of land set aside for transplanting Christmas trees. At holiday time, people can buy potted, live trees. After the season ends, either collectively, or individually, the live trees are sent back to be transplanted again for next year.

The trees might be sent to the growers who raise the trees specifically for the Christmas season.

Christmas legends 'round the world

The custom of kissing under the mistletoe has its origin in an old Scandinavian myth about Freya, the goddess of love and beauty.

Mistletoe was once considered a healing herb; and wearing it hung around the neck was believed to ward off disease.

December — the winter solstice — has always been a festive time. In ancient Rome, December 17 marked the start of the week-long Saturnalia, a time of festivities in which people gave presents, lighted candles, and adorned their houses with greens.

The Twelve Days of Christmas are a carry-over from Roman times; the festivities of the Saturnalia were followed by Twelve Holy Days, which ended on January 1, called the Calends of January.

In Spain, tradition has it that children's gifts are left by the Wise Men, passing through on their way to Bethlehem. Youngsters leave their shoes on the window sills, filled with straw for the Magi's horses; next morning, the straw has been replaced with toys and sweets.

In Ireland, the church candles lighted at Christmas may be snuffed only by someone whose name is Mary.

Children in Holland and Belgium get their Christmas gifts on December 6, which is St. Nicholas Day.

Decorations of greenery at Christmas were forbidden by the early church fathers, because of its association with Roman customs. It wasn't until the 16th century that greenery began to be used.

The Christmas tree came to England when Queen Victoria married Prince Albert. The Prince brought the custom with him from his native Germany.

Christmas carols were banned by the Puritans in 17th century England. But for 200 years, many carols were kept alive by country people, and finally rediscovered in the 19th century.

French peasants believe that daughters born on December 25 will be wise, witty and virtuous.

Holiday begins on festive note when St. Nick brings music-makers and melody to small fry

Music is one of the ingredients which make up a festive holiday season. And the fun is multiplied if every member of the family can join in the caroling or music making. While young children are not quite ready for full size instruments, music stores carry dozens of items suitable for the moppet set.

Instruments "ideal"

Small, and relatively inexpensive, there are many true instruments that will add to a youngster's fun and understanding of music. And, they are ideal stocking stuffers.

The American Music Conference, a not-for-profit education and research association, recommends that parents select true, scaled-down instruments rather than toys for their offspring. Real instruments will help a child develop concepts of rhythm and melody, an "ear" for correct tones as well as physical coordina-

tion and proper breathing which will be helpful when the youngster begins instrumental study.

Excellent beginning instruments for the very young child, says the AMC, are rhythm sticks, claves or triangles which cost under \$1.

Flute-like recorders

The recorder is another instrument recommended for parents to consider. A member of the flute family, the recorder comes

in the \$2 to \$12 range. For toddlers, educators recommend any of the percussion instruments — bells, xylophones, tambourines, small snare drums, tone blocks, triangles or rhythm sticks — which can be purchased separately or in sets. Prices for individual instruments range from less than \$1 to about \$5, sets from about \$10 to \$20.

Polish children receive their gifts not from Santa but from Mother Star, who wears a long white dress and veil, and her companion, Father Star.

In Italy, children's gifts are supposed to come from La Befana, an old woman of legend. The children hang their clothes in a conspicuous place on Epiphany Eve, and the next morning find their pockets filled with goodies.

In 1644 under Oliver Cromwell's regime, the observance of Christmas was forbidden by an act of Parliament.

The Pennsylvania Dutch name for Santa Claus is — *Pelznickel*.

"Christmas" got its origin from "X," an abbreviation of Christ deriving from the Greek letter X (ch) beginning His Name.

In the Philippines, Christmas is known as *Santo Nino* and children sing carols and parade through the streets behind a band.

Christmas Seals originated in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 1904. It was the idea of a postal clerk named Holboell, who dreamed them up as a benefit for a children's hospital.

In Czechoslovakia, fortunes are told after the evening meal on Christmas by pouring melted lead or wax into water and studying the shapes formed.

In Puerto Rico, children at Christmas put boxes on the roof — instead of hanging stockings.

An age-old Christmas custom: Cut an onion in half, peel off 12 layers (1 for each month to come) and fill each with salt. On the next morning, the peelings containing damp salt indicate rainy months.

The beauty of a fresh tree basic to joys of Christmas

This Christmas, about 35 million evergreen trees will be taken home for the holidays.

Once there, some will be graced with traditional candles and angels, others laced with sparkling tinsel and twinkling lights. Whatever the decor, its success will largely depend on the basic beauty of the tree.

The American Forest Institute notes that there are different kinds of Christmas trees from which to choose. One may suit your decorative tastes more than another.

Balsam fir — one of the most popular, with a pungent fragrance and short flat needles that stay fresh a long time.

Scotch pine — has full branches and clusters of long needles that give a soft appearance.

Douglas fir — an elegant-looking tree with soft, spiraling needles that are themselves decorative.

Red pine — has clusters of long shiny needles, a pleasant fragrance, and spreading branches with turned-up ends from which to hang ornaments.

Blue spruce — usually harder to find and more expensive than other types, but one of the most beautiful. Noted for its symmetrical shape, dense needles and unusual silver blue color.

Almost all Christmas trees, says AFI, come from special tree farms which total 450,000 acres nationally. The trees are scientifically nurtured to achieve the size, shape, and texture suitable for decoration. Care may include bracing to keep the trunk straight, cutting back to encourage fuller growth, and shearing to develop a triangular form.

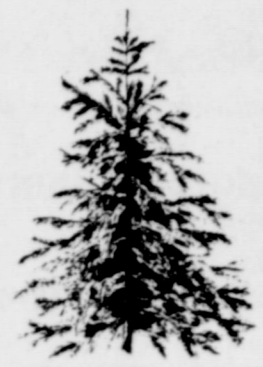
Christmas trees take from 6 to 12 years to mature. Some Christmas trees come from managed forests and are removed in thinning operations undertaken to allow remaining trees to grow faster.

AFI points out that since most Christmas trees are specifically raised for that purpose, it is incorrect to think of their use as forest depletion. Trees are renewable, AFI notes, and enough can be grown on properly-managed woodlands to meet the country's varying needs.

Use of fresh trees for Christmas is environmentally sound for another reason, says AFI. Trees use only solar energy to grow. But manufacturing artificial trees from plastic or aluminum requires large amounts of energy resources such as oil and electricity.

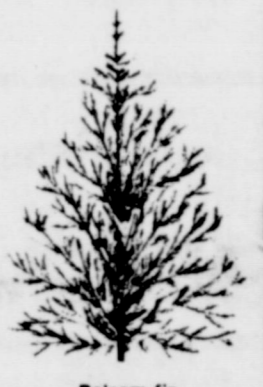

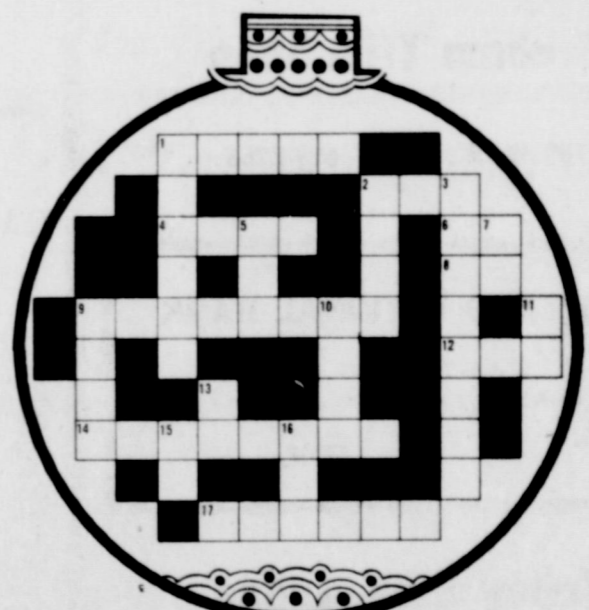

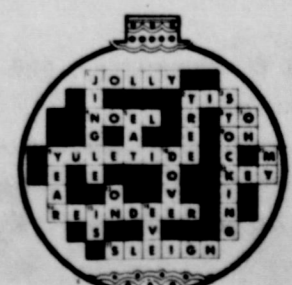

Honey Substituted For Sugar

COLLEGE STATION--In these days of high sugar prices, many people are turning to honey--one of the oldest known sweets, one authority reported this week.

"It is easily digested because it consists chiefly of simple sugar--dextrose and levulose, which the body readily absorbs," Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said.

Honey is unique because it is the only unmanufactured sweet available in commercial quantities, she pointed out.

"The main commercial brands of honey come mostly from alfalfa and clover blends. Blending makes a product with uniform color and flavor," the specialist explained.

She noted that there are several forms of honey made.

--Liquid, or extracted, honey

is that removed from the comb. --Comb honey is honey just as it is stored by the bees.

--Chunk honey is a combination of comb and liquid honey. It consists of pieces of comb with extracted honey poured over them.

--Creamed, or granulated, honey is extracted honey that has been formed into minute crystals, giving a creamy texture. It makes an excellent spread, according to Mrs. Clyatt.

--Honey butter is a mixture of honey and butter.

"Honey will keep indefinitely stored tightly covered in a dry place at room temperature. If it becomes granulated, place the container in warm water to reliquify."

"Heat extra-thick honey in warm water for easier pouring. A good way to measure honey is to lightly grease the cup or spoon so the honey will pour out more readily," the specialist said.

record of farm products produced and sold during 1974; and third, selected farming activities during 1974 such as number of days of off-farm work by the farmer, amount spent for farm labor, for custom work, for feed, for gasoline and oil.

To report this kind of information, a farmer will need to have a few simple records. The Census Bureau is urging each farmer to have his records of quantities harvested, products sold, major farm expenses and the like readily available so that he can easily and accurately fill out his census report when it comes.

It is from the Census of Agriculture, conducted every five years, that data are taken to form the basis for programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Congressional farm legislation, farm organization policies, farm programs established and administered by State departments of agriculture, and many other services provided by colleges, business firms, manufacturers, publishers and broadcasters.

The Census of Agriculture is the only source of statistics on agriculture that are comparable from county to county nationwide. It is the sole source of comprehensive data tabulated for each State and for the U.S. For farms classified by size, tenure, type of organization, market value of products sold, and type of farm enterprise.

Every farmer's report is confidential by law. It may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used for statistical purposes. The mail census method reinforces confidentiality. And it allows the farmers to complete his report at his convenience with accurate information from his records.

Aerosol Sprays On Way Out

COLLEGE STATION-Aerosol hair sprays may be on the way out, according to one authority. "Reports of malfunctions and health hazards with aerosol sprays have caused the industry to turn to pump style bottles for hair spray," Mrs. Janice Carberry, family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, noted. She said that for years pump bottles were used for dispensing hair conditioners and setting lotions, but now they will be used for hair spray too. "Hair sprays will have to be reformulated before they can be put into non-aerosol packages. Only 50 to 70 per cent of the spray is active ingredients—the rest is propellants. Ingredients in the pump style bottles can be totally active."

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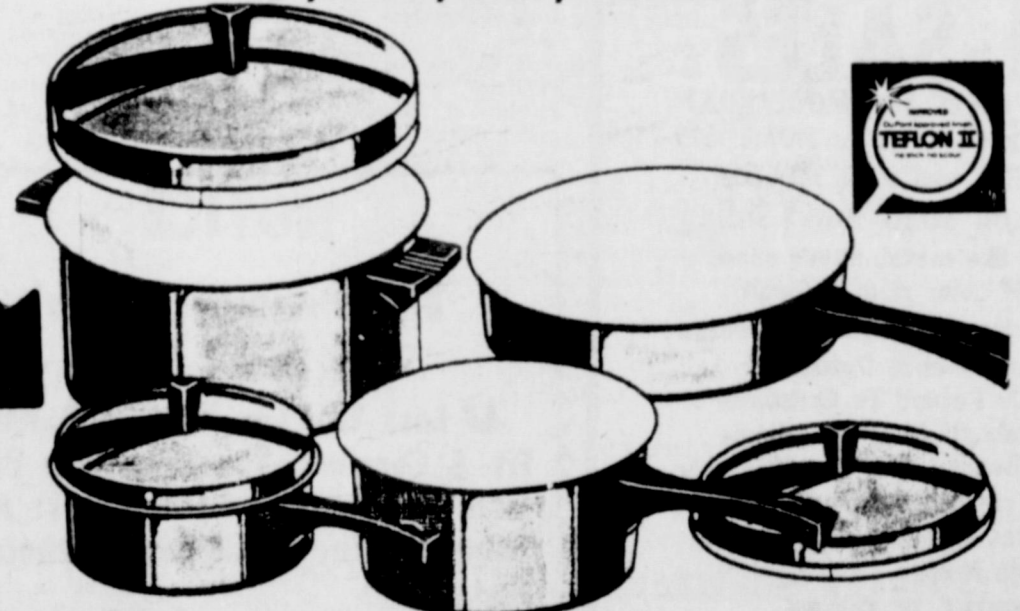
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
